Vote Registration Very Slow Here

An all-out effort is being made in Lynn county to acquaint all people not paying poll taxes of their opportunity to register in order to vote, states George McCracken, Lynn county tax assessor and collector.

However, Wednesday morning only 26 had taken advantage of the free registration opportunity, available until next Wednesday, March 17.

Mr. McCracken's office in the court house is open for registration from 8:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. Monday through Friday, where anyone may register for a vote, but he will also take registration blanks any time if called.

In addition, blanks are available at New Home Co-op gin office, Wilson Co-op gin office, Moore Insurance Agency in O'Donnell, Grassland Butane, New Moore Store, and Aldridge Store and Paymaster gin at Draw.

Recently, Federal District Court granted a 30-day stay of its original decree declaring the poll tax to be unconstitutional until March 26.

Since then, U. S. Attorney General Nicholas B. Katzenbach, has attacked the Texas registration period as being insufficient, and has ordered FBI agents to investigate tax collectors offices to see that proper effort was being made to register voters free without regard to other qualifications.

The following person may register for a vote:

Those subject to payment of a poll tax during the period ending Jan. 31, 1966, in order to qualify to vote in the 1966 elections, but who did not pay the poll tax or obtain a "poll tax not paid" certificate.

Anyone receiving an exemption receipt need not register, nor need those persons 60 years of age before Jan. 1, 1965.

Texas Attorney General Waggoner Carr has issued a stinging rebuke to Katzenbach for his interferences in regard to Texas integrity and subsequent assignment of the FBI to investigate tax of fee registration procedures. But, knowing the Federal government no longer recognizes any other authority, an all-out effort in Texas is being made to see that people are informed that they can register to vote free without regard to race, creed, color, or even the ability to read and write.

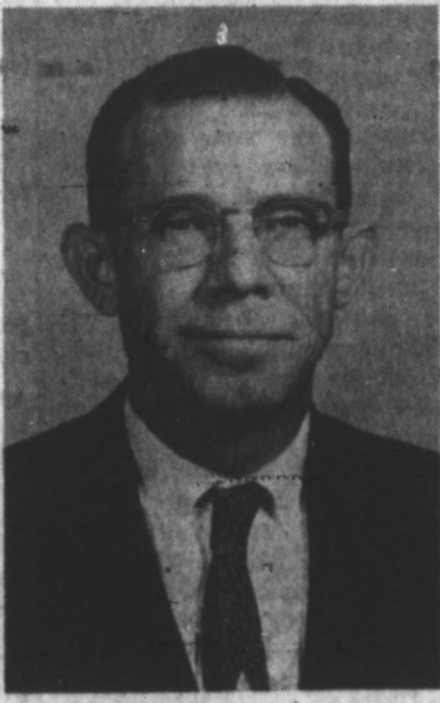
Garza Livestock Show This Week

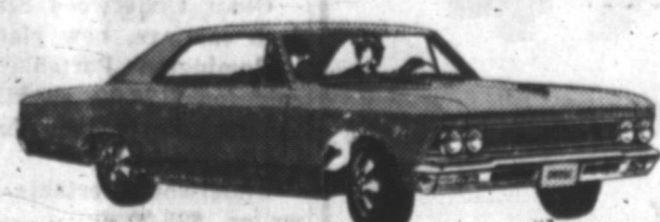

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

By C. WILSON HARDER

Perhaps rather than a good five cent cigar, what this country needs more is for somebody to figure out how to expand 100% by another ten per cent or more.

At the present time a blue ribbon commission is holding hearings all over the nation to determine why consumers pay more for food, and farmers get less.

Rep. H. R. Gross of Iowa recently pointed out that farm income in 1964 when total national income was \$309 billion dollars was \$24 billion less than 14 years previously when the total national income was less than half the 1964 level. Yet food prices are higher.

Or it can be stated another way. In 1948 wages and salaries accounted for 60.4% of the national income, and fringe benefits another 2.6%, for a total of 63%. By 1964 wages and salaries had jumped to 64.8% while fringe benefits had almost tripled to account for 6.2% of the national income. This then totalled 71%, for an increase of 8%, of which about half is accounted for by fringe benefit increases.

In 1948, farm income accounted for 7.8% of the total national product. In 1964, farm income dropped to 3.3%.

In 1948 small business and the National Federation of Independent Business

professionals accounted for 10.1% of the total national income. By 1964 this had dropped to 7.6%. The total drop of share of national income for these two groups is 8%, or precisely equal the increased percentage that went to wages and salaries and fringe benefits. As already stated of this increase, half was accounted for by jumps in fringe benefits.

Without the multi-billion dollar farm price support programs, farm percentage of total national income would undoubtedly be substantially less.

To be sure, by and large, the small entrepreneur, the professional people, and the farmer, may or may not be getting some higher prices and fees, but they are also paying more for everything they must buy, thus the only true guide to the state of the economy is the percentages of the national income received.

Increased fringe benefits such as welfare grants and pension funds do not come out of thin air. Somewhere any increased percentage for them must come out of some other segment of the economy. You just cannot go higher than 100% of the total national income.

Eventually, if an American middle class is to be preserved, there will have to come about a coalition of effort by the independent entrepreneur, the professional worker, and the farmer to halt the inroads being made by power hungry labor leaders aided and abetted by vote hungry politicians.

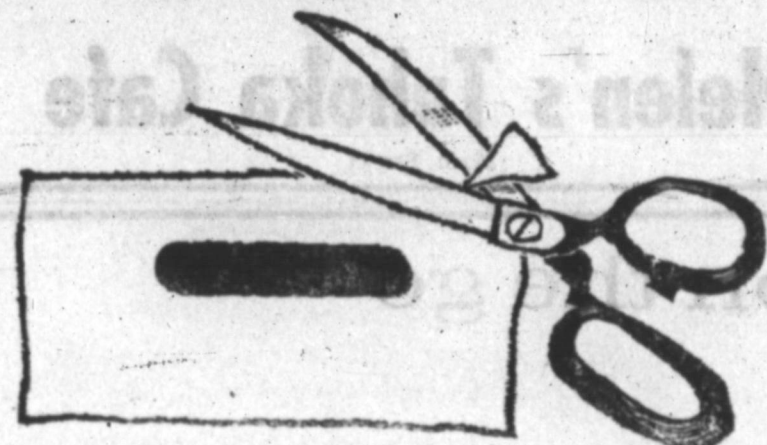

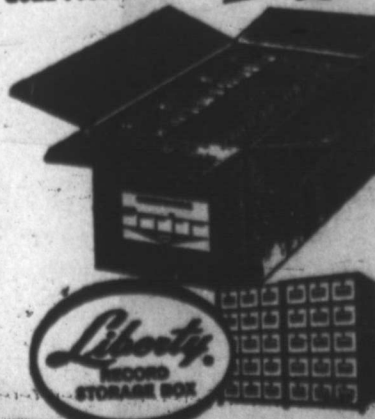

Minted Brownie Pie
14 chocolate mint Girl Scout cookies, 3 egg whites, dash of salt, ¼ cup sugar, ½ teaspoon vanilla, ½ cup chopped nuts, sweetened whipped cream (¼ to 1 cup heavy cream).

Chill cookies in refrigerator a few minutes. Break, cut or roll between folds of waxed paper to even crumbs. Beat egg whites and salt together until soft peaks form. Gradually beat in sugar beating until stiff peaks form. Fold in cookie crumbs, nut meats, and vanilla and spread in buttered, 9-inch pie plate. Bake in slow oven, 325 degrees for 35 minutes. Cool thoroughly. Serve with sweetened whipped cream on each wedge or spread sweetened whipped cream over top. Chill 3 or 4 hours and garnish with curls of shaved unsweetened chocolate.

(Continued from Front Page) and came to Tahoka in 1905 from Benjamin. She was married to Dr. S. H. Windham on February 3, 1910, one of the town's first physicians and also a rancher.

Dr. Windham was murdered by a trusted ranch hand at the Windham ranch headquarters in southern Terry county in 1923. One child was born of the union, now Mrs. Fenner (Juanell) Tubbs, 3222 23rd street, Lubbock.

Mrs. Windham was married a second time in 1931 at Lubbock to Tom Garrard, attorney, later Lynn county judge and one of the organizers, with John Heck of Wilson, of Lyntegar Electric Cooperative. Mr. Garrard died here in 1955.

"Miss Linnie" was one of Tahoka's most gracious ladies, honored and respected by all who knew her. She was a life-long member of the Christian Church. Just about two weeks ago she had promised to write her reminiscences of early days in Tahoka, along with some early day pictures.

In addition to her daughter, she is survived by one grand-daughter, Mrs. Obie Stalcup of Charleston, S. C., and one grandson, Tom Tubbs of Lubbock; three step-sons, T. T. Garrard of Seagraves, H. C. County Judge Walter Mathis Among First To Receive Medicare Card

County Judge Walter M. Mathis was one of the first in Lynn county to receive his Medicare eligibility card, states Gerald L. Schantz, Social Security Administration representative.

Judge Mathis enrolled late in 1965 when the enrollment period first began. His card indicates he is eligible for both Hospital Insurance Benefits and Supplemental Medical Benefits beginning July 1, 1966. He is eligible for these benefits even though he is working full time.

Those persons who enrolled later and who are now enrolling will receive their eligibility cards in the future.

The Social Security Administration district office in Lubbock is anxious that everyone who is over 65 have an opportunity to enroll. The deadline for enrolling is March 31, 1966.

If you are over 65 and are still working and earning too much to receive monthly benefits, or if you are over 65 and have never

worked under Social Security and have not yet enrolled, you must do so by March 31st. You may do this by going to the office in Lubbock or contacting the representative, Mr. Gerald L. Schantz, on his next visit to the Courthouse in Tahoka on March 21st. This is the last time he will be in Tahoka before March 31st.

If you cannot do either, you may use the special coupon below:

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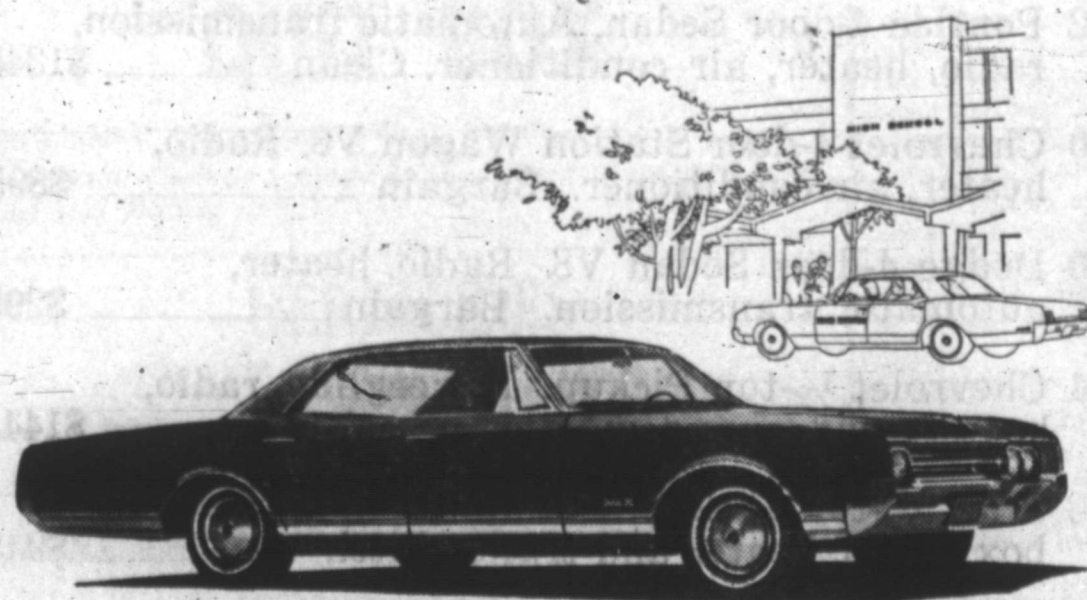

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March came in like a lion, all right, the first three days being a bit breezy. In fact, Thursday, March 3rd, was one of the worst by far. That was just a sand storm. Thirty-one years ago to the day, on March 3, 1935, came the grand-daddy of them all—a dust storm such as that portrayed in the oil painting by Myrtle Rochelle which hangs in Collier Parker Pharmacy. At about the Sam Sanford place, the boiling, rolling black cloud sweeping down upon us became so frightening that we turned around and barely made it to Wayside Store, then run by Mr. and Mrs. Poindexter. The wind was not so high, but the air was so saturated with the fine dust that one could hardly see his hand before his face at 3:00 p. m. in the afternoon. Other motorists had crowded into the store. Even inside the store, dust permeated the air to such an extent that a light 10 feet away seemed dim and clouded. You new-comers may think this a "big windy," but it's no Texas tall tale.

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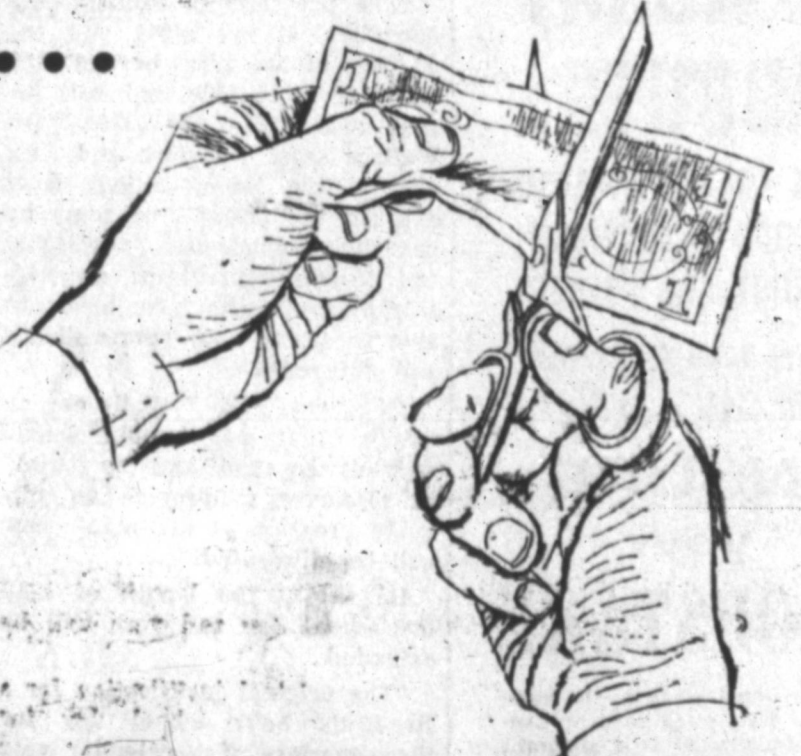
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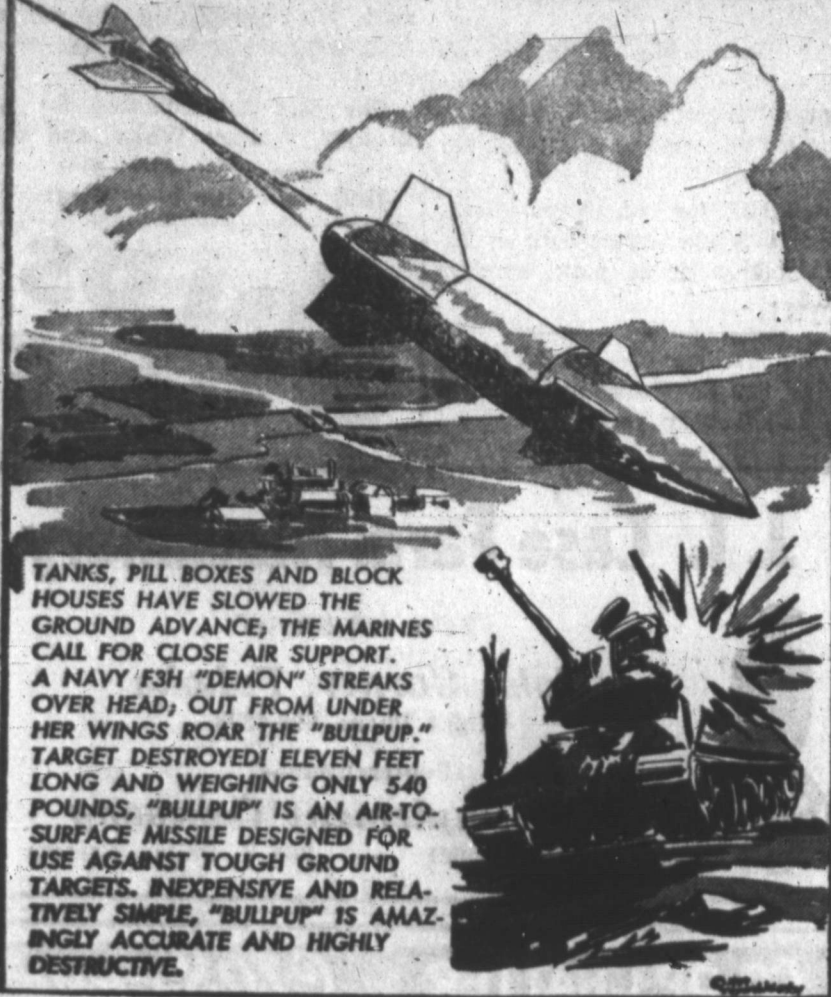

Federal Aid Is Here To Stay

Lubbock—Dr. Morris Wallace, Head of Texas Tech's Education Department, believes Federal aid to education is here to stay and views that assistance—combined with other factors—as bringing about a reshaping of today's public school system.

He predicts that the "K-4-4-2" system will be used as a basis for the realignment. The system would reach downward to include kindergarten and go upward to add two years of junior college—all under the public school system.

"The provision of kindergarten education at age 4-5½ and the addition of two years beyond high school is inevitable and will become a reality in the 1970's," Dr. Wallace says. The 13th and 14th year at the junior college level will aid the nation's economy by providing academic, vocational and technical programs for capable students who have been unable to attend four year colleges and universities.

"It is also clear," Wallace comments, "that many public school districts too small and too limited in resources to provide an adequate program at reasonable cost will be eliminated."

He thinks the length of both the school day and year will be extended.

"The original justification for a five-to-six hour school day for three-quarters of a calendar year no longer exists," Dr. Wallace says. He explains that while a seven-to-eight hour school day for 11 months will increase the nation's investment in schools, the result will be more economical both in terms of educational outcomes and greater use of facilities and personnel.

The need for increased range and pasture management is becoming more prevalent each year as the cost-return factor in ranching continues to be the dominating factor for survival of profitable ranching enterprises in this area.

Range Management, with its many phases of government, is essentially managing livestock in such a manner that the forage produced on the ranch is harvested to the most benefiting use of the grazing animals. Harvesting to be grazed so heavily that the plants are not able to survive, and reproduce new growth and new plants which has been the practice on much of the rangeland in the past periods of use.

To aid in obtaining better range management the rancher should first possess an accurate knowledge of the forage that is being produced on the ranch, how the forage responds to grazing, the optimum time to graze the forage, the grazing animal which will best utilize the forage, and is the rangeland producing a superior or inferior plant composition. A sound range management plan will also include provisions for periods of drought which are frequent in this area.

John Graves, Range Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service, Lameta, is now available to provide range conservation assistance to ranchers in the Lynn County Soil Conservation District. Graves can be contacted through the Lynn County Soil Conservation Service work unit office

The six events will be pony bronc riding, steer riding, ribbon roping, barrel racing, pole bending and goat tying.

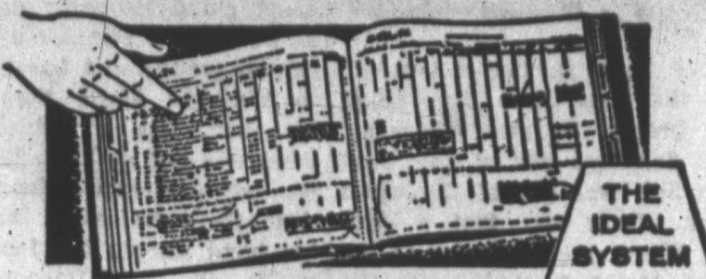

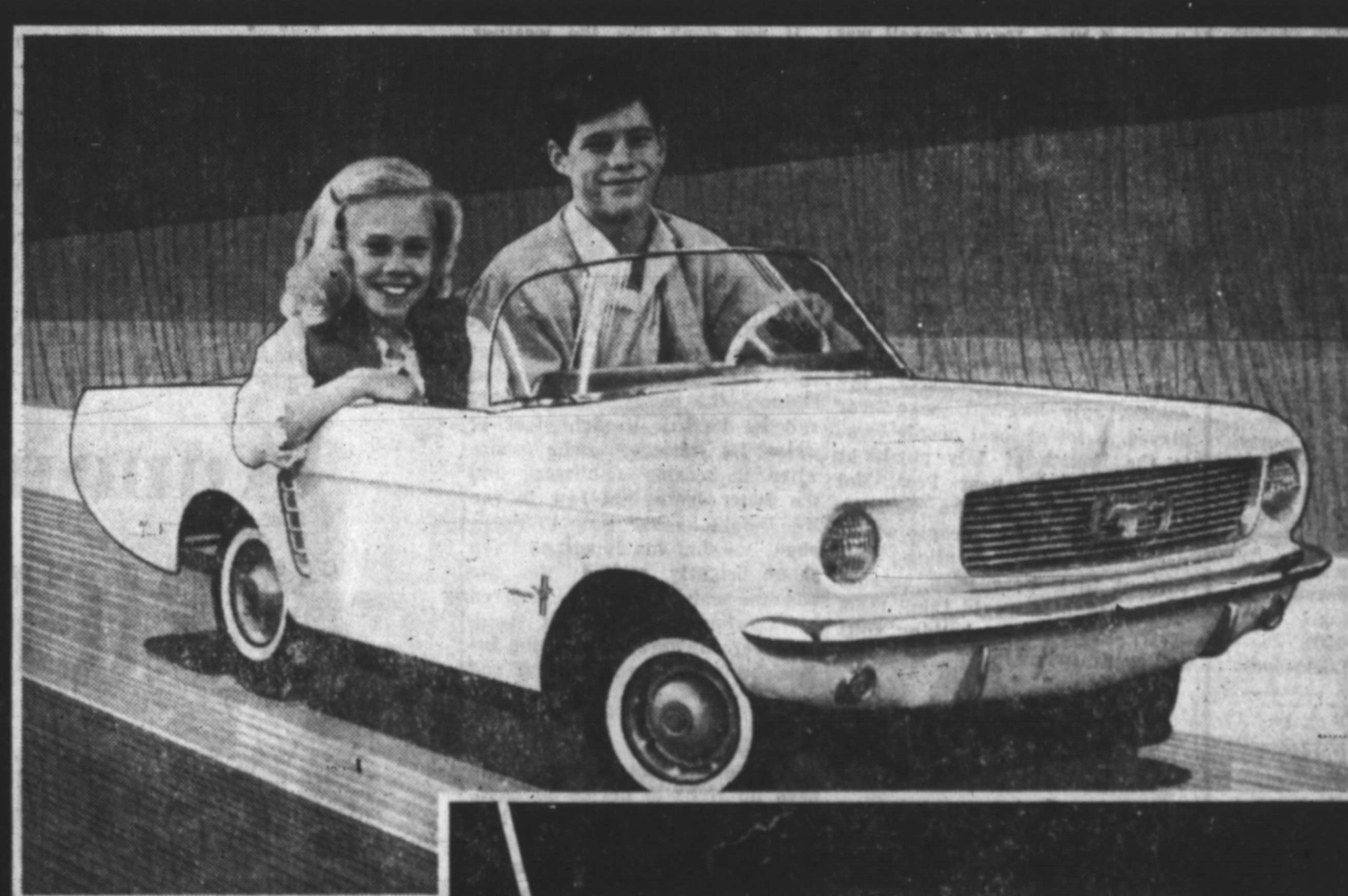
