School Trustees Elected In Four County Districts

The four Lynn county school districts each elected two trustees to serve three-year terms in the elections Saturday, and in most cases present trustees were re-elected to office.

Tahoka re-elected Clifton Hamilton, board president, and Roy Stephens, secretary. There were 316 votes cast, Hamilton received 240, Stephens 208, and Albert Curry received 151. There were four write-in votes.

At O'Donnell, where there were seven candidates for two places, Elbert Crawford with 209 and Harold Barrett with 207 votes were elected new board members. Votes for others were: Harold Mires, 53, Mrs. Ivan Line 50, Charlie Beckham 46, J. M. Wood 40, and Arol Moore 31.

Wilson re-elected Jiggs Swann, who received 81 votes, and elected a new member, Dale Zant, who led the ticket with 88 votes. Other candidates were: James Savell 70, Ray Foster 45, and Douglas Neugebauer 31.

New Home returned to the board its chairman, Dick Turner, 97 votes, and member A. C. Fillingim Jr., 66 votes. O. R. Phifer Jr. received 57 and Dudley Zant 28 votes.

Harlan Dean of Precinct 4 and Graham Hensley of Precinct 2 were re-elected to the county board without opposition.

Roberts Heads School Board

Tahoka School Board met Tuesday night, canvassed election returns, swore in the two re-elected members, Clifton Hamilton and Roy Stephens, and elected officers.

James F. (Sonny) Roberts was elected president of the board to succeed Hamilton, Elmer Owens vice president to succeed Roberts, and J. T. Miller secretary to succeed Stephens. Other members are Martin White and Edward Bartley.

Prior to the meeting Mrs. Madeleine Hegi and the Homemaking girls served the board the annual dinner held at the beginning of the new school board term.

Silver Star For Capt. Don Blair

Capt. Donald R. Blair, 27, killed by Communist ambush on January 8 in Viet Nam, was honored posthumously at ceremonies Tuesday at 1:30 p. m. in the ROTC chapel on West Texas State University campus, Canyon, when Col. Henry L. Calder of the U. S. Army presented five citations and medals to his family.

Receiving the awards for the family was his little son, Scott, age 6. He was presented the Silver Star, the Bronze Star, the Air Medal, the Combat Infantry Badge, and the Purple Heart, all "by direction of the President of the United States."

Donald was reared in Tahoka, and still has a number of relatives here. Mrs. Carl Gene Spears is his sister, and she and husband attended the ceremony, which she said was very touching and impressive, made more so because a number of his old college teachers, coaches, and other associates were present.

Born at Hawley, Don came to Tahoka at age six with his parents, who now live in Canyon. He was an exemplary student, clean-cut, an outstanding football player and track man here, and graduated in 1956. He went to West Texas on a four year football scholarship, where he lettered three years and was outstanding in football for kickoff runbacks. His parents moved to Canyon with him, and live at 2708 Third in that city.

Canadian Water Pipeline Is Now Building Into Tahoka

Fulton People Like Tahoka

"We have never gone into any town anywhere that we have received such a friendly welcome as we have in Tahoka," Bill Stell, office manager here for R. H. Fulton & Co., pipeline contractors on the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority project said.

"We feel we will enjoy living in your town," Stell continued. The Chamber of Commerce and City of Tahoka took measures ahead of time to help get the 90-man crew and their families places to live, although about 15 families have trailer houses.

The firm has built many of the major giant water, gas, and oil pipelines of the U. S. and some in foreign countries. This is just one of their units. Among the others is a larger one now engaged in laying the CRMWA pipeline from Plainview to Canyon.

Fulton has leased the Hester building, formerly Seth Lewis Const. Co., a block south of the square on Sweet Street, where it has offices and repair shops for the Lubbock, Slaton, Tahoka, (Continued on Back Page)

Work on the Canadian River Water pipeline from Lubbock south was getting into "high gear" this week as R. H. Fulton & Co., contractors, began work on the sector between Farm Road 211, just west of Wilson, south to Tahoka.

Most of Fulton's 90 men working on the Lubbock to Lamesa project have moved into Tahoka, although a few will remain in Levelland until the close of school. Fulton has just completed laying of the water line from Lubbock to Levelland and Brownfield.

Fulton is building DC-6130, the project from Lubbock south and west, on a low bid of approximately \$8.75 million, Dess Chappelle, engineer for the Bureau of Reclamation, told The News Wednesday.

Contract on this sector of the huge pipeline system to serve 11 Plains towns calls for a 72-inch line from the regulating reservoir to the treatment plant northeast of Lubbock, a 42-inch line to the southeast of that city, then a 27-inch line about 8 miles south to a point where a 16- and 14-inch branch line has been built into Slaton, a 24-inch line to the Tahoka regulating station now being built at the northwest outskirts of Tahoka, a 21-inch line to O'Donnell, and finally an 18-inch line into Lamesa.

The 24-inch concrete pipeline is now being strung just north of Tahoka. The line will cross under US Hwy. 87 four miles north of town, proceed directly south to the Tahoka station, then down Avenue P in front of the Tahoka High building, under US 380. South of Tahoka, the pipeline will follow US 87 into O'Donnell and Lamesa.

The crew lays 1,000 or more feet of pipe a day. From six to eight months will be required to complete the project.

Concrete pipe for the aqueduct is being manufactured by Gifford-Hill-Americo of Lubbock and Cen-Vi-Ro of Texas, Plainview.

R. H. Fulton & Co., a Lubbock firm, is said to be the biggest pipeline construction firm in the world, and has developed much (Continued on Back Page)

City Officials Elected Tuesday

Citizens of Lynn county's four towns elected city officials Tuesday.

Tahoka re-elected without opposition three members of the City Council, R. W. Rutherford, Alton Cain, and W. T. Kidwell. Holdover members are Jack Jaquess and H. B. McCord Jr. Mayor Meldon Leslie is also holdover.

Wilson had an unusual occurrence as Victor Steinhauser, present member of the Council, and J. P. White tied with 21 votes each, and a run-off will be necessary. Harold Key, with 29 votes, was re-elected. Other candidates were: C. E. Campbell, 18 votes, and Virgil Kimbrell, 7. The holdovers are D. J. Hutcheson, Alfred Krause and Clarence Nelson, and A. L. Holder holds over as mayor.

O'Donnell elected a new mayor, Elvin Ray Moore, who received 250 votes. He succeeds L. J. Hash, who was not a candidate for re-election. Wayne Carroll received 252 votes and becomes a new member of the Council, succeeding Ralph Knight, who was not a candidate. Hollis Swinney was re-elected, receiving 243 votes. Rumor of a spirited write-in campaign failed to materialize.

Also, there was no opposition at New Home, where Robbie Gill, Winston Davies, and Dick Turner were re-elected in very light voting. J. W. Edwards is the hold-over mayor, and the other two councilmen are O. R. Phifer Jr. and G. B. Mayfield.

Flippin Winner In Spelling Bee

Mark Flippin, 11-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Welch Flippin, won the Lynn County Spelling Bee in competition with a second cousin last Friday.

Mark, a fifth grade student, is participating in the contest for the first year. He and his second cousin, Deborah Draper, also 11, and a fifth grade student in the same school Mark attends, spelled to the deciding point of the bee. They are students in North Elementary School in Tahoka. Deborah is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bland Draper.

Regulating Tank Being Constructed

Regulation Tank No. 7 of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority now under construction at the northwest outskirts of Tahoka, North 8th and Avenue P, will have three purposes, according to Dess Chappelle, resident engineer.

1. The regulation tank will serve as a pressure reducing station to hold back gravity flow, permitting saving on pipe by reason of lower pressure in the flow from here to O'Donnell and Lamesa. The tank also makes water readily available to the City of Tahoka.
2. The facilities will guard the valve structure on the main aqueduct line in case of a stoppage to the south. When the 170,000 gallon reservoir reaches a near maximum depth, valves to the north on the aqueduct will close automatically.
3. The Tahoka turn-out structure will meter Tahoka's water and restrict use to 510,000 gallons per day, although additional water may be taken.

The regulating tank will be 38 feet in diameter and 23 feet high. Brown-McKee, Inc. of Lubbock, is the sub-contractor for R. H. Fulton & Co., and electrical work is being done by Rowan-Wallace Electric, also of Lubbock.

In addition, to the south of this reservoir, City of Tahoka will build a 150,000 gallon take-point reservoir, possibly next year, for which money is already on hand.

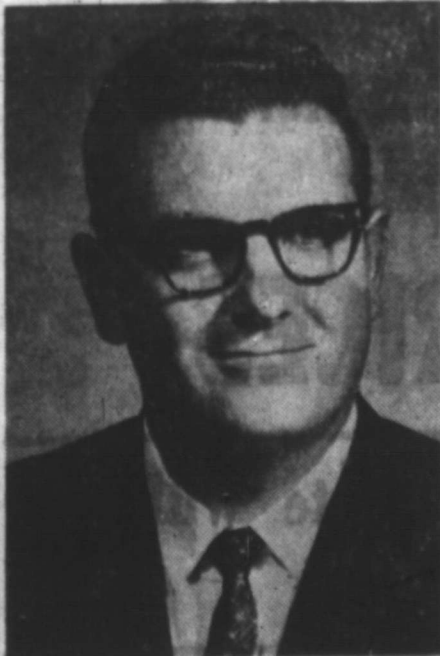

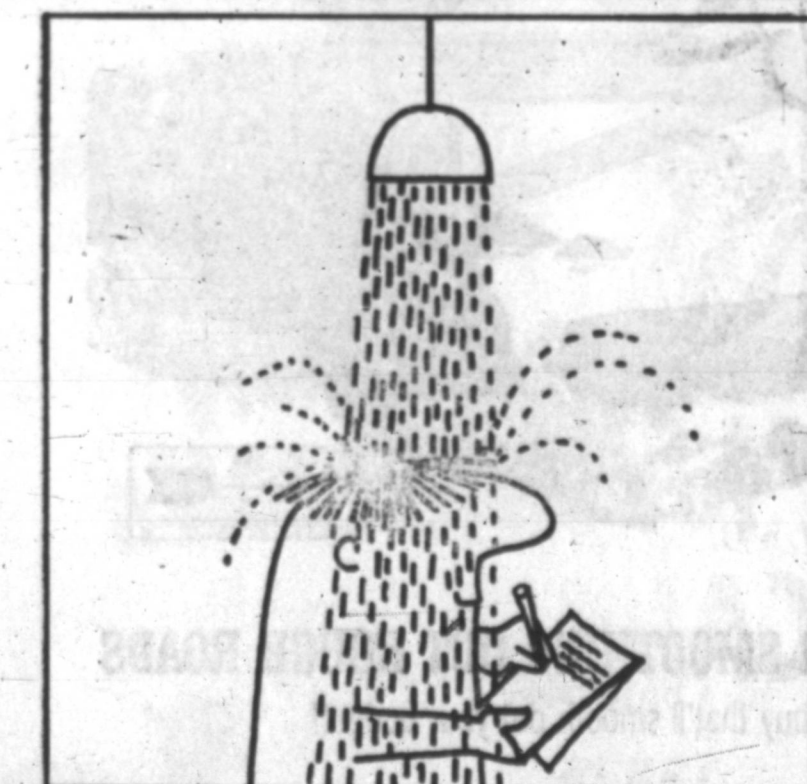

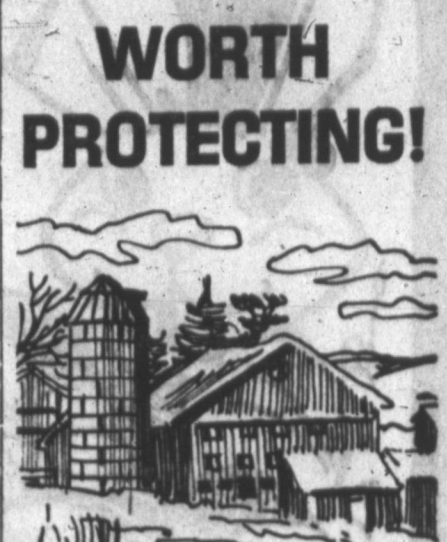

(Continued from Front Page) Center, and two children were born to the union, the boy and a girl, Sara Sue, 4.

On getting his degree and his ROTC commission as a lieutenant in 1960, he went into the Army, served a hitch, worked in Lubbock a while, discovered the Army was his first love and re-enlisted.

He went to Vietnam in June last year, and went into action almost immediately. The five citations, a couple unusual for an Armored Division man, tell the story of his service briefly.

The Silver Star citation says: "For gallantry in action: Captain Blair distinguished himself by gallantry in action on 8 January 1966 while serving as advisor to Long Hai Regimental Forces Non-Commissioned Officer Training Center, Phuoc Tuy Province, Republic of Vietnam. While on a road clearing operation the unit was ambushed by a numerically superior Viet Cong force. The intensity of the initial attack created confusion among the friendly forces. Captain Blair, though wounded, exposed himself to the hostile fire in an attempt to rally the troops and direct the fire of the surviving friendly forces. Displaying great determination and fortitude, Captain Blair disregarded his personal safety in order to direct the withdrawal of the unit. Captain Blair fought courageously until mortally wounded but his brave actions and personal example were instrumental in preventing heavy casualties. Captain Blair's conspicuous gallantry in action was in keeping with the United States Army and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service."

The Bronze Star Medal was presented for distinguished service from June 8, 1965, to January 8, 1966, in instituting ingenious training programs, innovations, and leadership in Viet Nam.

The Air Medal was presented for "meritorious achievement during sustained aerial operational activities against hostile forces from June 19 to December 7, 1965, courage and dynamic leadership in aerial flights under extremely hazardous conditions as a non crew member on 25 combat missions."

The other two presentations to his son, Scott, were the Combat Infantry Badge and the Purple Heart award.

Don's brother, Parker Blair of Dallas, and his other sister, Mrs. T. M. Lambert of Hawley were also present for the ceremony.

(Continued from Page One) special equipment for this type work.

The 322-mile aqueduct system begins at Sanford Dam on the Canadian River, 35 miles northeast of Amarillo and 10 miles west of Borger, where water will be taken from Lake Meredith, now filling and 72 feet deep at the dam. A branch pipeline takes water to Borger and Pampa.

The 78-inch main line carries water pumped uphill to the Amarillo reservoir, which is a 790 foot lift, the water then flows by gravity south to Lubbock.

Pipe 96-inches in size is required in the Canyon area, where altitude drops then rises again on the head of the Palo Duro. At Lubbock, there is another regulating reservoir, and City of Lubbock is building a treatment plant to purify and soften water for itself, Slaton, Tahoka, O'Donnell, and Lamesa and also for Levelland and Brownfield. Pumping stations will raise the water uphill to Levelland, but water otherwise will flow by gravity southward.

The CRMWA regulating tank under construction here will control flow of water from here to O'Donnell and Lamesa. Adjoining this reservoir, Tahoka will build a 150,000 gallon take-point reservoir, from which water will be pumped to the overhead reservoirs. City of Tahoka already has the money saved and set aside for this purpose.

Fulton is now building the line from Plainview to Canyon. The line from Canyon to damsite is complete. All are expected to be complete by 1967, when first water will be turned into the lines.

Studies on the Canadian River project started in the late 1940's, was given Congressional approval in 1950, and after years of wrangling among the cities in the Authority work was finally started.

Originally estimated by Bureau of Reclamation to cost \$103 million, the final cost is now expected to be about \$85 million.

Eleven member cities will repay most of this sum as water is used on a quota basis. Tahoka contracted for 153 million gallons a year, but will sell at cost some water to Wilson area farmers. Anyway, not more than 60 percent will be available the first few years unless an unexpected flood fills the lake earlier than it would fill normally.

The CRMWA is the biggest repayment project ever authorized by the Government. Except for flood control and recreation, a major portion will be repaid with interest.

Lake Meredith, now 72-feet deep, will be 110 feet deep when full, have a flood-stage capacity of 1 million acre feet and cover 21,600 acres.

The earthfill dam contains 14.4 million cubic yards of earthfill and 400,000 cubic yards of riprap and rockfill, is 228 feet high, is 6,410 feet long across the river, 40 feet wide at the crest and 1,900 feet thick at the base.

The Official Texas Historical Marker for "Garza County's First Officials" has arrived from the foundry and will be erected Sunday, April 17, 2:30 p. m. on the court house lawn in Post, Mrs. A. C. Surman, chairman of the Garza County Historical Survey Committee, announces.

On the program, Mrs. Tom Wood of Lamesa, daughter of the first Garza county judge, will give the history of the marker. District Judge Truett Smith of Tahoka will dedicate the marker.

Wording on the marker reads: "Created 1876. Attached to Borden County 1891-1907. Organization came at the OS Ranch. According to legend even the horses 'voted' to gain the required 75 ballots. First court was held under a tent. First courthouse built in 1908. It is to the memory of these pioneer men who became the first county officials that this marker is dedicated in sincere appreciation for the part they played in the organization and development of Garza County: J. M. Boren, County Judge; O. B. Kelly, Sheriff; H. B. Murray, Clerk; B. F. Wilks, Treasurer; D. W. Stiles, Tax Assessor."

envisions the erection of 5,000 historic markers under the sponsorship of the state, counties, cities, civic groups and individuals.

All state erected markers will appear in official tourist guides and directories to help stimulate tourist trade and historical appreciation as well as to acquaint the citizens of the county with their own unique historical heritage.

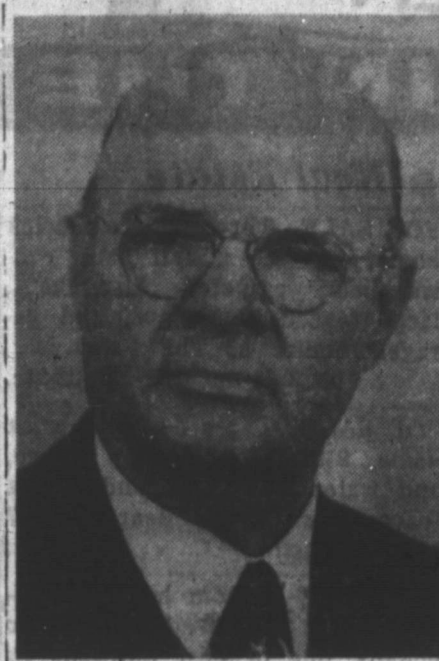
Track Team In District Meet

W. E. Suddarth Is Buried Here

Graveside services were held for W. E. Suddarth, 89, in Tahoka Cemetery Friday morning with Rev. Aubrey White, local Methodist pastor, officiating. Mr. Suddarth, a former local rural mail carrier, died in his sleep Wednesday morning at Wesleyan Home in Georgetown, where he had lived since September, 1962.

Further details on his life were furnished The News by his daughters, Mrs. Prentiss (Ruth) Windsor of San Angelo, who was here for burial rites, and Mrs. Richard I. (Betty) DeAgular, who lives in Hilo, Hawaii, but was unable to come for the services.

Walter Ernest Suddarth was born at Brownsville, Tenn., Aug. 10, 1876, but was reared in Fort Worth, went into the Postal service, and while postal inspector at St. Louis was married to Rubie Ross Davis at Schell City, Mo., on July 26, 1916. He served as postal inspector in Chicago, Pennsylvania, Washington, D. C. and other places before returning to Fort Worth.

With two daughters, he came to Tahoka in 1927 as a rural carrier on Route 4 so he could spend more time with his family. He retired about 1935 or 1936, was out a year, then became carrier at O'Donnell for a while.

Mrs. Suddarth passed away in February, 1937, following surgery at Lubbock and was buried here.

Mr. Suddarth left Tahoka in the early 1940's and entered Government service a third time to work about six months during the war with the Censorship Bureau in San Antonio.

He moved to San Angelo in 1946, where his daughter Ruth was living.

In 1962, he became one of the first residents in the new Wesleyan Home at Georgetown, a plush hotel for the elderly built by the Methodists and of which he was one of the founders.

He entered the infirmary there in January, but was bedfast only about a month when death came early Wednesday.

Funeral services were conducted at Georgetown Thursday at 10:00 a. m. by his closest friend, Dr. Glenn Flinn, retired Methodist district superintendent from Houston District and also a resident of the home, and his pastor, Rev. Morgan Garrett of Georgetown.

During their residence here, Mr. and Mrs. Suddarth and girls were very active in Tahoka Methodist Church, she being active in music and young peoples work, and he serving as Sunday School superintendent, etc.

He was known nationally in Postal circles, and while here was editor of The Texas Carrier several years. Also at San Angelo he (Continued on Back Page)

Speaker Tells Of Visit In Finland

Color pictures of Finland and a talk on the land were shown Tahoka Rotarians Thursday by Tom Bird, member of a pioneer Garza county ranching family and a pharmacist at Bob Collier Drug in Post.

Bird spent two-and a half years in Finland from 1958 until 1960 as a missionary for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints (Mormon). He attended Brigham Young University in Salt Lake City, and his travelogue began with pictures of the school, the Mormon Temple, New York City, and Stockholm, Sweden, but most of his talk and pictures dealt with Helsinki and Tampere, Finland, where he spent most of his time.

Helsinki is a city of a half million and surprisingly modern, although there are not too many cars, street cars are in use, and many citizens ride bicycles. Food and clothing are cheaper than in the U. S., but automobiles are high.

Principal products are from timber, farming, and fishing. Textile industry is also important, cotton being imported from the U. S.

About 98 percent of the population is literate, speak two or more languages, mostly Finnish and German. He and his fellow

missionaries had to learn to speak their language to a degree, and he declared Finnish is said to be the hardest language to master, next to Japanese.

Lutheran is the national religion, and a person is a Lutheran from birth. However, he may leave the Lutheran Church to join any other faith. All faiths are given permission in the country. There were about 100 Mormon missionaries in the country.

He said the winters are surprisingly mild in South Finland. The people despise the Russians and Communism, are friendly toward Americans.
