## Farm Program Is Explained

About one hundred farmers attended the meeting Thursday night of last week, when Wallace Dove, ASCS office manager, explained some vital rules of the new farm program as handed down to him.

For those who failed to attend, the following brief review is given:

### Cotton Allotments

Lynn county has 1,449 farm units with effective allotment of 181,961 acres, with all but 10 signed up to divert 61,754 acres, or 34 of the 35 percent allowed, leaving 120,207 acres to plant under the new program.

### Feed Grain

A total of 1288 farms have a feed grain base total of 243,109, with 113,801 intending for planting and 68,513 diverted. He said 46.8 percent of the acreage is signed in the program.

The F.H.A. Mother-Daughter Banquet was held April 19 in the school cafeteria with about 100 attending the annual affair.

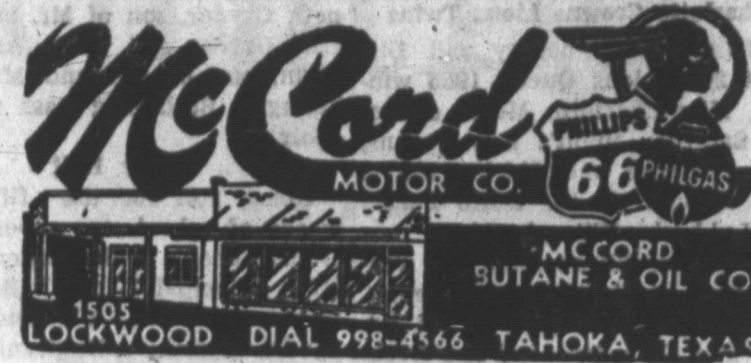

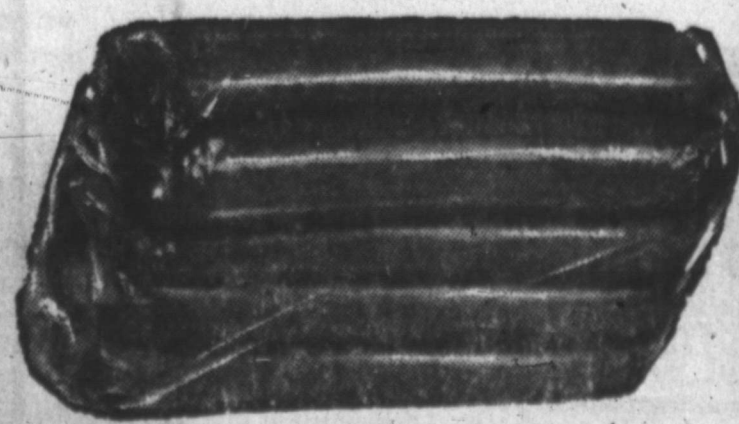

### Col. Truett Cooper Writes About Visits In Near East

Colonel George Truett Cooper, career Army man from Tahoka, stationed in Izmir, Turkey, two and a half years, is coming back to the states, accompanied by his family, he has written in a personal letter to The News editor. Col. Cooper, son of Mrs. E. J. Cooper, is a Tahoka High and Texas A&M graduate who went from college into the service and has had a somewhat remarkable career. During World War II, he was "the eyes" for General Douglas MacArthur as he flew in a Piper Cub to scout out the area for the Leyte landing in the Philippines and later in the drive on Manila. Later, he was food administrator

for Korea. Still later, on his first mission to Turkey, he was U. S. military advisor to that nation. The News is taking the liberty of publishing the following from Truett's letter because of the interesting information it contains: This has been an enjoyable, as well as sometimes frustrating, tour at a NATO Headquarters. The peacetime mission of the headquarters (Allied Land Forces Southeast Europe) is to insure that the Greek and Turkish armies are combat ready and prepared to carry out their wartime roles.

During our stay, there has been considerable political differences between Greece and Turkey over Cyprus; thus the frustration. As the guardian of NATO's right flank, the headquarters is staffed by Turkish, Greek, Italian, United Kingdom and United States personnel and it has been a distinct pleasure to work with these nationalities.

Izmir, a city of 400,000 located on the Bay of Izmir jutting east from the Aegean Sea, is the third largest city in Turkey. It has a beautiful natural harbor and its economy rests on its exports, which include tobacco, cotton, figs, raisins, olive oil and licorice. The main boulevards of Izmir, once known as Smyrna, are lined with palms and pines and the water-front is one of the world's most scenic. It is a city of contrasts whose history goes back 5,000 years. The ancient city of Smyrna was founded by the Acolians in the Eleventh Century, B.C.

During our stay here we have visited many places of interest when the time could be spared. The city of Ephesus is located 50 miles from Izmir and many of the ruins are still being uncovered. The name Ephesus will always be connected with the beginning of Christianity. St. Paul preached there a number of times and stayed in the town from 55 to 58; St. John, it is believed, stayed there in 95 and wrote his gospel. According to other sources St. John visited the town with the Virgin Mary before the arrival of St. Paul. Mary was said to have lived here until her death and a small church now stands over the place where she was supposed to have lived.

Last Easter we drove in our car to the Holy Land. Some of the more noted places we visited were Tarsus, Antioch, Damascus, Jerusalem, Bethlehem, the Dead Sea, Jericho and Beirut. Easter morning we attended sunrise services at the Garden Tomb in Jerusalem and it was an experience that the entire family will never forget. We are departing here on the 14th of May, will spend three days in London and then fly on to New York. We will pick up a car in New York and head in the direction of Texas where we hope to stay.

My next duty station is Dallas, after which I plan to retire and go fishing. I have served from Australia to Japan, two years in Korea, three years in Germany and two separate tours in Turkey and I believe the state of Texas is a good place to terminate my service. Please give our regards to all and we hope to see you next month.

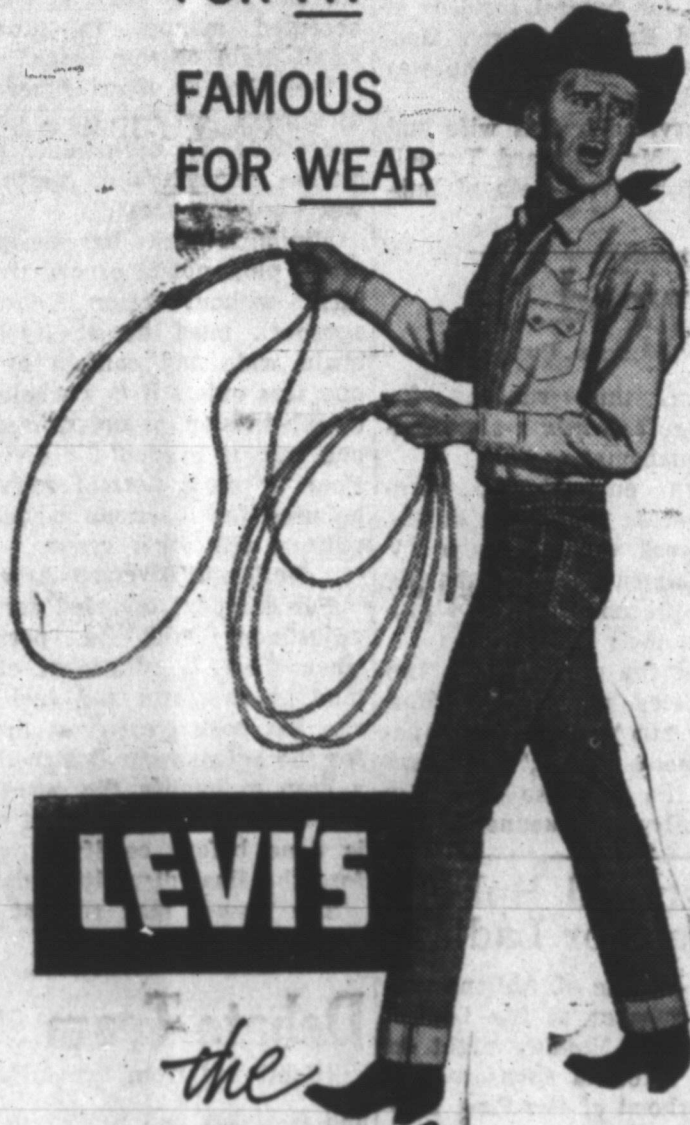

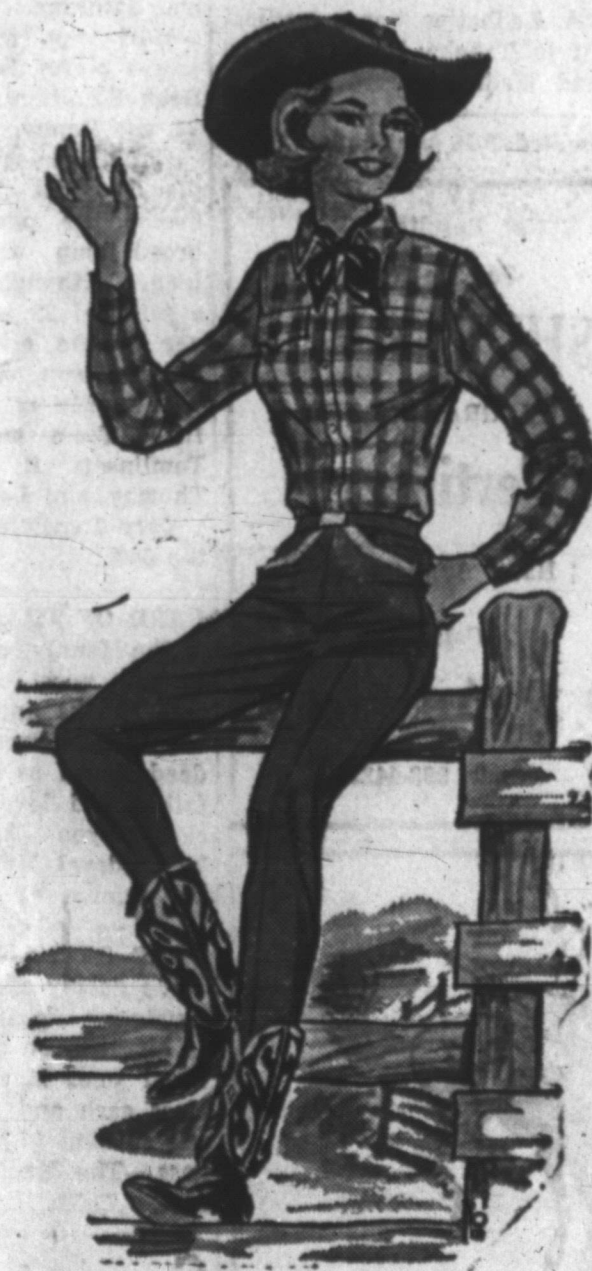

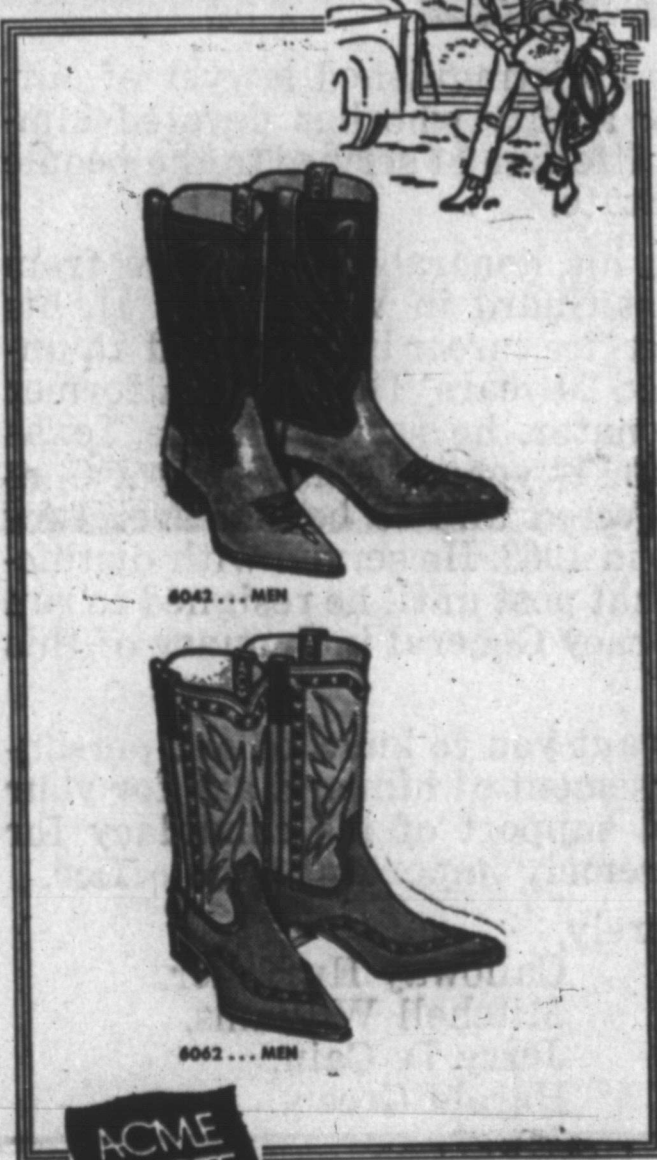

Final date for Lynn county farmers to take advantage of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation's program of investment protection for cotton is April 30, according to Ben A. Jordan, Jr., State Director for the FCIC.

Federal Crop Insurance has provided almost \$7,600,000 in guaranteed income protection for Lynn county farmers against loss of crops from unavoidable natural hazards since its inception in the county. During this same period, Lynn county farmers have received direct payments in excess of \$1,900,000 for damage to cotton crops.

allow farmers to measure their own acres, but 25 percent will be checked. Farms of all ASCS personnel will be checked.

A farmer may certify his own acres, he may pre-measure, or he may take advantage of the more practical method of having ASCS officer personnel measure his acres. He may also check with ASCS office maps. To avoid liability of penalty, he can apply for measuring service, but should do this early as ASCS can not guarantee personnel will be available to get around to all.

Tolerances are (1) to 9 of an acre based on 40 acres, or (2) the larger of 2 acres or 5 percent, not to exceed a total of 15 acres.

The farmer should make certain he has his full diverted acres laid out.

**Designated Diverted Acres**  
Only land intensively cultivated during at least one of the four years immediately preceding the current year is eligible, tilled in accepted manner in producing small grain or row crops.

Ineligible as diverted acres are two rows, or end rows used in operations of equipment; w-type ditches regardless of width; and wet low-lying areas.

Minimum size for designated crops, plots not to exceed five per farm without prior Committee approval, must be at least one chain wide and contain at least one acre unless it is a whole field or sub-division, or unless less than one acre is needed for diversion. Four or more normal rows may be used for diversion when in a pattern with other crops.

**Deficient Diverted Acres**  
For deficient diverted acres, an adjustment will be permitted when there is additional eligible land on the farm and such acreage has been treated as diverted for the entire year. Destruction of a crop to qualify the acreage as diverted may be permitted if this is done before certifying or before the final disposition date.

The farmer may request a re-measurement.

Mrs. J. T. Williams Sr., 92, a long time Lynn county resident, was buried Tuesday in Green Memorial Park at Wilson. She died Saturday in Lauderdale-By-The-Sea, Florida.

Mrs. Williams was a native of Lavaca county, but lived most of her early life in Wilson county.
