## Parade Thursday Kicks Off Rodeo

Tahoka's sixth annual rodeo was being kicked off Thursday afternoon at 5:30 with a big street parade, followed by the first of three performances Thursday night at 8:00 o'clock.

Other performances will be Friday and Saturday nights featuring many of the top cowboys of the Southwest and the wild and woolly stock of Ratjin Rodeo Co., producers of Happy and Fort Worth.

"This year's show could be the best we have ever had," Jerry Church, who is serving as parade marshal again, told The News. "Ratjin has some of the roughest stock anywhere and they are pretty wild, having been in only two shows so far this spring."

Entry lists were being closed out Thursday noon, and Oran Short, president of the Rodeo Association, said many top contestants have paid their entry fees.

Ratjin is said to have one of the best announcers in the Southwest, who keeps the show rolling and describes events for spectators; and also a top clown to amuse the crowd but also to protect the cowboy riders from wild bulls.

Thursday's parade was featuring several floats, many riders, and six riding groups, including the Dawson County, Lamb County, Terry County, and Lynn County Sheriff's Poses, Denver City Riding Club, and the popular O'Donnell Junior Gauchos, Tahoka and Wilson bands.

Visiting riding clubs were being entertained with a dinner following the parade at Tahoka Cafeteria by the Lynn County Posse, headed by Theo Cook, and with Pat Swann as host.

Rodeo events include bareback bronc riding, bull riding, wild mare race, calf roping, junior and senior ribbon roping, barrel racing, and goat sacking.

Jimmy Mackey Orchestra will play for a dance each evening following the rodeo in Community Center.

Following the soaking rains, farmers are busy getting ready to plant crops. In fact, some are already planting. The News is informed, while many will wait another week or two for the ground to warm up.

Eleven days of damp and rainy weather the last of April and the first day of May produced a total of 3.23 inches by official U. S. Weather Bureau measurement in Tahoka.

Rainfall was even heavier, up to five inches, in many areas of the county, and everyone has plenty of moisture for planting.

There had been many months of dry weather since the rains last October, and South Plains people were beginning to fear this might be a dry year. The rains last week, however, came slow and easy and all the water soaked in the ground in most sections.

Heavy showers in some areas produced some lake water, especially near Draw, south of Tahoka, and north of Tahoka.

John Curry, president of the Lynn County Pioneer Reunion, has slated a meeting for Monday night, May 9, at 7:30 o'clock in Southwestern Public Service. Business to be discussed will include this year's reunion.

All interested persons and officers of the association are urged to attend.

Other officers include George McCracken, vice president, and Mrs. Peggy Elliott, secretary.

Mr. Morris was born Feb. 23, 1890, and was a son of the late M. L. Morris of Post.

He moved to Lynn county in 1913, and was married to the former Miss Mattie Dyer of Tahoka in 1914. The couple moved to their farm in eastern Lynn county, where they lived 48 years until retiring in 1963 and moving to Slaton. He was a member of Southland Methodist Church.

He was preceded in death by a son, Maurice of Houston, last October.

## Heavy Vote Is Expected In Primary Election Saturday

## Voting Strength Is Close To 3,500

Lynn county's voting strength in the upcoming Democratic Primary election on Saturday, May 7, is between 3,200 and 3,400, figures furnished The News by George McCracken, tax assessor-collector, indicate.

This would include 700 to 900 people over 60 years of age who are exempted, plus the 2,491 who have qualified by paying a poll tax or registering and under-age exemptions.

There were 2,163 who paid poll taxes, 61 under-age exemptions who qualified, and 267 who registered to vote under the conditional registration provision.

Although there are several state contests, principal interest locally is in three county-wide and four precinct races.

With County Judge Walter M. Mathis retiring from his office to run for district clerk, which office will be vacated in January by W. S. (Skip) Taylor, V. F. Jones and Woodrow (Ode) Brewer are candidates for county judge.

Mr. Brewer is a native of Lynn county, a farmer, served in World War II, and has been commissioner from Precinct 2 for 12 years.

Mr. Jones is also a farm product, a graduate of Texas A&M, taught school several years, served as county agent of Lynn and Lamb counties a total of 10 years, and returned to Tahoka in 1944 to enter the grain and seed business.

There are two candidates, also, for county clerk, the present incumbent, C. W. Roberts, who lived at Grassland many years before assuming the duties of the office, and Mrs. Billie Carr, a widow, who has been county home demonstration agent of Lynn county.

For county treasurer, there are five candidates, four ladies and a man. The man is L. A. Forsythe, who is a farmer, has lived here most of his life and has had experience as a bookkeeper. The ladies, in order of making their announcements, are: Mrs. H. W. (Margaret) Carter, formerly in the insurance and cotton business with her husband; Mrs. Teddie B. Mrs. Kahlich has been active in past years in home demonstration club work, and both have been active in their church, St. John's Lutheran.

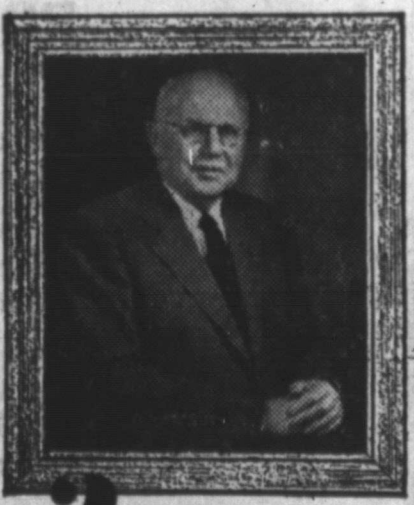

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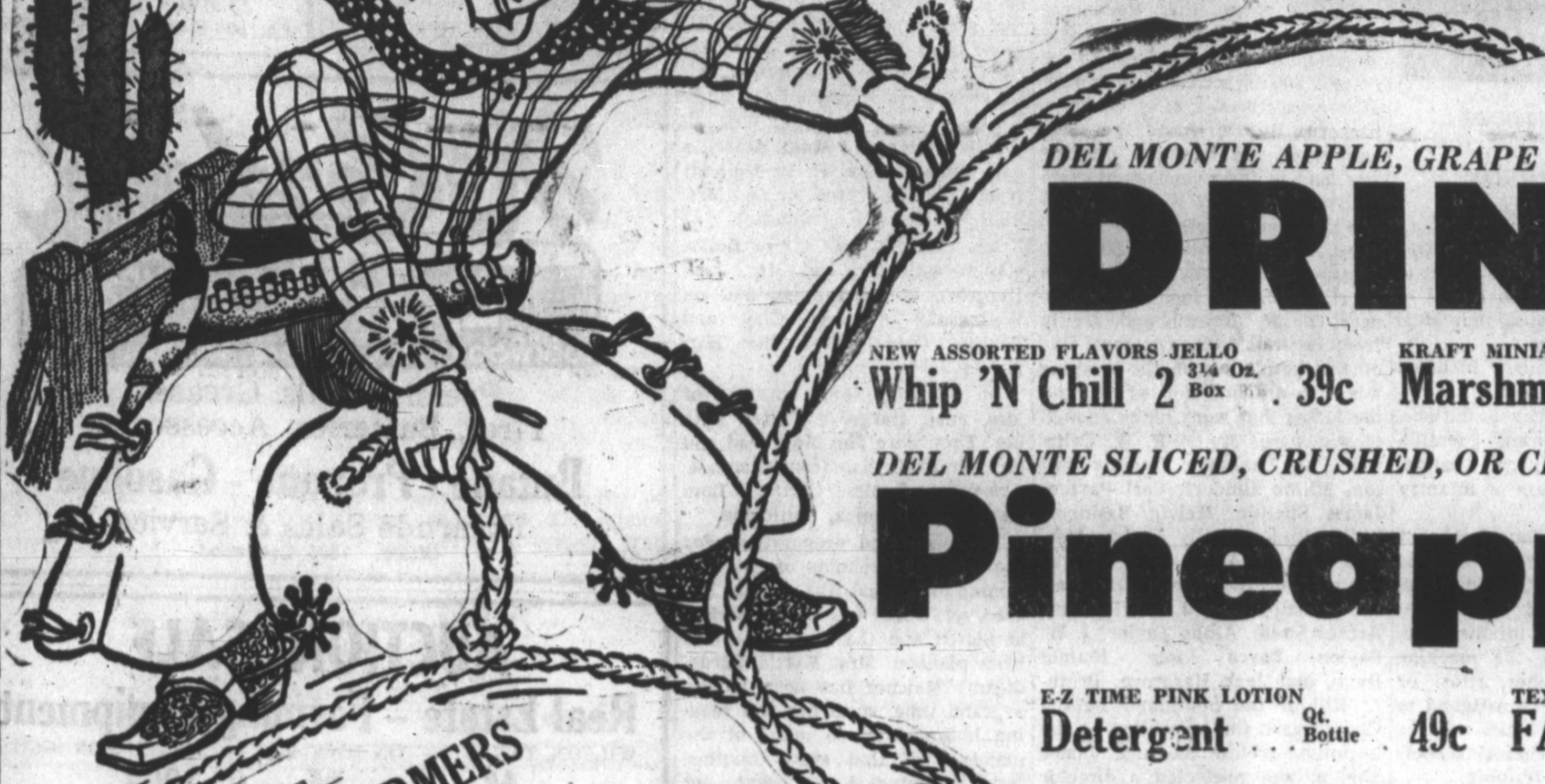

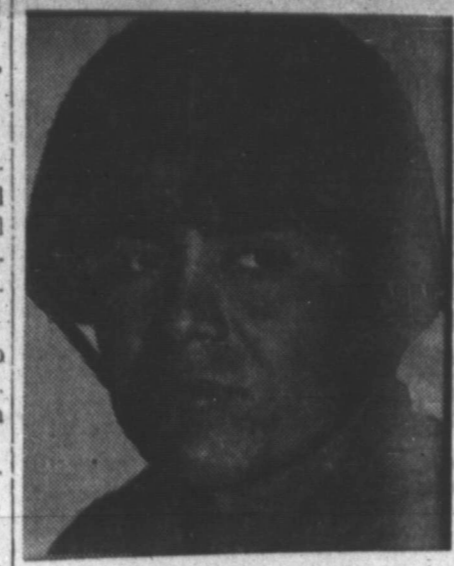

# Nation's New Highways Cost Us \$140,000 Year

(Special to The News)  
New York—As far as Lynn County car owners are concerned, how costly an undertaking has the nation's 41,000-mile highway project become?  
How much are they contributing toward the construction costs at the present time via gasoline and other auto taxes?  
In the past year, on the basis of data from the Bureau of Public Roads, they turned in no less than \$147,000.  
Not included in this amount are the auto-use taxes collected from them by the state.  
The money went into the government's Highway Trust Fund, which pays 90 percent of the cost of construction. The other 10 percent comes from the states.  
A new look is being taken at the progress of the interstate road

system because of a proposal by the Administration to increase the taxes by \$1.6 billion over an eight-year period. Most of this rise would fall on trucks and buses.

Since October 1, 1959, when the government boosted its tax on gasoline by one cent a gallon, Lynn County car owners have been paying an average of \$30 a year into the fund.

That is the amount of tax incurred for a car that travels 10,000 miles a year and gets 14 miles to the gallon.

For the number of cars in use locally, it adds up to the \$147,000 total per year.

The national highway system was begun in 1956 and was supposed to have been completed by 1972.

Delays have occurred along the way, however, moving the target date to March, 1973. Officials connected with the work now believe it will stretch out well beyond that.

The costs, too, have gone far beyond expectations. The original estimate was \$27.6 billion. That

### Postal Savings Is Discontinued

Acting Postmaster Charles Townes today urged depositors with postal savings certificates (issued by other offices) to withdraw their accounts as soon as possible or as soon as the anniversary dates on their certificates are reached.

The Postal Savings System was abolished March 27, 1966 by the signing of Public Law 89-377 by President Johnson. No deposits can be accepted and no new accounts can be opened. Interest will end on the anniversary date of each certificate.

For the convenience of all certificates held by a depositor they may be cashed at the same time and interest will be paid for each full month they have been outstanding beyond three months from the interest date.

The Postal Savings System was established January 1, 1911, to get money out of hiding and to attract savings of a large number of immigrants who were accustomed to saving at Post Office in their own country; also, it served as a safe depository for people who had lost confidence in private banks. Today, however with the growth of banking facilities paying much higher interest rates than the 2 percent interest per annum paid on Postal Savings, the system has out-lived its usefulness for the American people. As of June 30, 1965 there were 997,029 depositors holding certificates in 3,130 post offices throughout the nation. This number has been declining at a rate of about 6,500 per month.

Unpaid deposits remaining in the Post Office beyond June 30, 1967, would be transferred to the Treasury Department in a trust fund and would be available for payment without time limitation whenever proper claims are received.

Forms are available at the Tahoka Post Office for those depositors who wish to withdraw postal savings by mail.

age of 53,275, and Charlotte Warren, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Warren, with an average of 49.533.

Judy Reed has a high grade point average, and is ranked among the top in the class, but due to being in Tahoka High School only one year is not eligible for honors. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. O. Reed.

A new method was followed this year for determining the rank of the honor students. The basic steps in the procedure followed are:

(1) The students average for two years and five six weeks was figured by adding all semester grades; multiplying by three and adding the last two six weeks of the senior year, then dividing by the total number of six weeks grades.

(2) Next the grade point average per subject was determined by taking the total number of six weeks grades and dividing by six (the total number of semesters for three years.)

(3) Then the point average is multiplied by the grade points as outlined in the Student Handbook.

The school administration developed this procedure for determining honor students and encourage students to take a full load each semester and to take the more difficult subjects—chemistry, physics, trigonometry, and foreign languages.

### Outstanding Athletes

Gary (Butch) Tomlinson, senior halfback in football, was presented the "Fighting Heart Award," a new presentation this year which Coach Smith said is the highest honor in the athletics program. He praised "Butch" highly for his leadership, aggressiveness, cooperation, dedication, determination, for never having missed a practice, for the respect in which he was held by team-mates, and said "he would charge Hell if asked to do so for the team". His will be the first on a new plaque which will hang in the school trophy case.

### Star Pro Speaks

Bobby Joe Conrad jokingly referred to his alma mater, Texas A&M as "the horse and mule" college but quickly affirmed his Aggie loyalty to the school.

He said people like a winner and second place isn't good enough. To win, in addition to a coach, there must be boys with desire—desire to work with the team, desire to work hard, take coaching, and be a winner. Ability helps, but is not as important as desire.

This is a world of competition, he said, and if young people do not learn to compete in school they will not learn later. He also pointed to the vital importance of good grades, the need for education, and the fact that colleges are becoming so much more selective and do not want students who can not or will not do good work.

**Lynn County Soil Conservation District News**

This is the time of the year when cooperators throughout the district should be making plans as to how they are going to apply a conservation cropping on their farms, says Don Reed of the Soil Conservation Service. A cropping system should improve or maintain the soil in good physical condition, protect it during critical erosion periods, and provide economic returns.

Since there will be such a large percentage of land in diverted acres, this presents an excellent opportunity for cooperators to grow some high residue crops such as sweet sorghum to put organic material back into the land and protect it from erosion. All agricultural agencies are in agreement that diverted land should be protected.

Much of the land will be in some sort of skip-row pattern with cotton. A producer could come in in the summer and plant two rows to a forage sorghum. This residue would then give protection during the winter and at the same time put some organic matter back into

the soil. Another way would be to come in during the late summer or early fall and sow the blanks to small grain such as rye. Where the land is to be left diverted in blocks the best method is to plant some sort of forage sorghum and then leave the residues on the surface all winter to protect the soil from blowing.

Regardless of what method one decides upon, he must do something to maintain and protect his soil, says Reed.

Vegetated waterways are tailored to direct water into a low lying area without causing erosion in the Lynn County Soil & Water Conservation District.

The topography of each farm and its surrounding locality vary the requirements of managing its water, says Buddy Aaron, Soil Conservation Technician. Many farms have outside water problems where terraces alone will not handle the large volume of water. Such situations require a carefully planned system to divert the water where it will not be destructive to crops or land. Water in large volumes will eventually make its way to low lying areas or the lakes that are present here in the District. Since containing such large amounts of water is not practical, water must be directed into the lakes as harmlessly as possible. Diversion terraces to divert the excess water off the land and vegetated waterways directing water into lakes are very satisfactory in handling excess water.

Most systems are designed to spread the water out over the

land until excessive amounts of water build up. At this point the system must be designed to help in controlling the otherwise damage dealing waters. The natural land cover, grass, is a most important part of the waterway, counteracting the force of the water.

The waterway itself should be designated by size and shape according to the drainage area and the rate of slope involved. In order to let the grass become well established in the waterway, it is recommended to block off the opening of the waterway until the grass has formed a dense turf. This dense turf is the key to the success of the waterway. If irrigation is available, watering the grass to a good stand is very desirable. After the grass is well established the block at the opening of the waterway can be removed allowing water to flow into the waterway.
