to the very favorable develop. ments in demand. Supplies of agricultural commodities are expected to be large again in 1960. In this same period there

have been upward trends in mon-agricultural prices, in consumer incomes, in business investments and in other factors that contribute to a growing demand. The results of the large supplies of agricultural commodities have been lower prices to farmers, larger government stocks of farm products and lower retail food prices to the consumer than otherwise would have occur-

Total agricultural output of farm and ranch products in 1959 probably set a new record, slightly above the 1958 output and about 25 percent above the 1947-49 average. McHaney said agricultural output in 1959 might have been larger except for the Conservation Reserve, which cretired 22.4 million acres from farm production.

Crop Yields Up

The trend in crop yields has been upward in recent years, with increases of leading farm crops in the last decade ranging from 20 to 75 percent. In 1960 agricultural yields will probably again be large, said the economist.

Domestic demand for agri-Cultural products is expected to again be strong in 1960, and maybe even stronger than

First Federal in 1959 increased in assets by \$3,527,237.41, or 16.36 per cent, total assets climbing from \$21,557,012 at the beginning of the year to \$25,084,249.86 on December 31, 1959. 

NOTICE! **TO PARENTS** of School Age Children

The school census is being taken during the month of January this year. All children who are six years old on or before Sept. 1, 1960, but will not be 18 or older on or before that same date should be counted in this census. It is very important that all children six to 18 years be counted in this census. The child should be counted even though he may not be in school and even though he or she may be married.

If you, as a parent, have not received and filled out a school census blank on or before January 21 you are being overlooked and should do one of the following:


1. Phone Supt. Jerry Kirk at No. 3890 or the School Tax Office No. 5100 and ask for a census blank

2 Call in person at the School Tax Office and get a census blank and fill it out.

Remember, if your child will be six years old next Sept. 1st, he should be counted in the census now, even though he is not in school now. If he is six but not 18 or older on next Sept. I he should be counted now. All children from six to 18 should be counted. The six years old who start next September to school are the ones most often overlooked in the census. Failure to count them costs the school and taxpayers extra money. Please help us not to overlook anyone.

Please read the census blank carefully, fill it out completely, and return it by your child next day to the teacher. Thank you.


