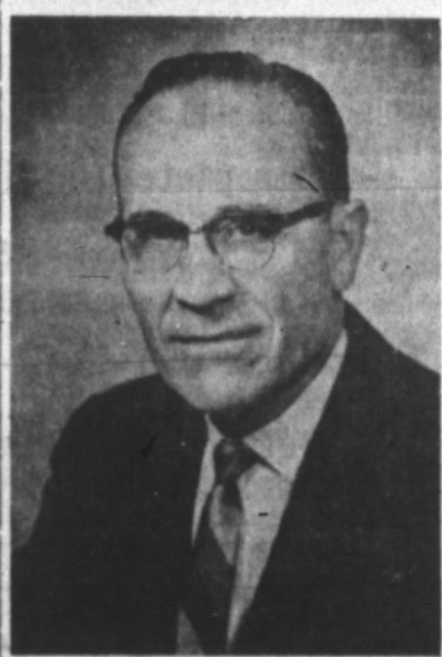
## New Methodist Pastor Here, White To Idalou

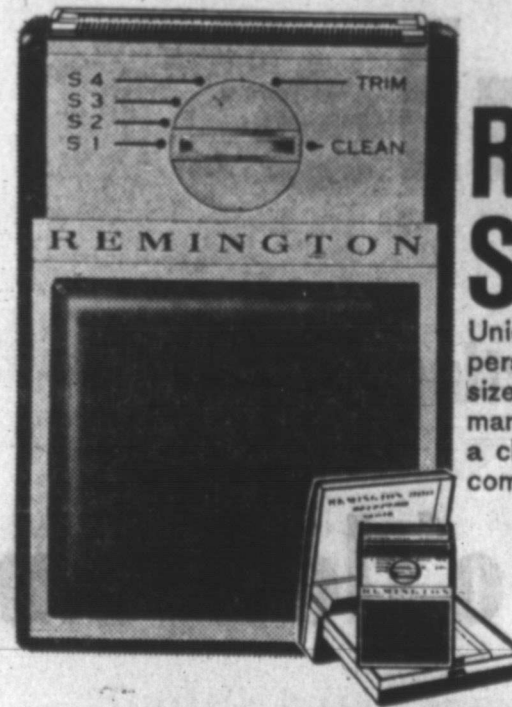

### Lynn County Soil Conservation District News

Melvin Wuensche has just completed land leveling seven acres of his farm. This year's work completes the entire system for Mr. Wuensche. He has now bench leveled and field leveled approximately 60 acres.

Land leveling is a very outstanding conservation practice on irrigated and dryland farms, says Fred Graff, soil conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service. More efficient use of irrigation water, and more efficient use of rainfall may be obtained from land that has been leveled. It also cuts soil erosion to a bare minimum.

All acreage on the Wuensche farm that did not exceed one percent slope was field leveled. Where the slope exceeded one percent, bench leveling was applied. Each bench was constructed to be level within itself. This gave a stair step effect down the slope with benches parallel and point rows taken up in upper benches. The fall from the upper side of

the bench to the lower side did not exceed one tenth foot.

Mr. Wuensche receives greater efficiency from his water than he could if he were using a graded furrow system of irrigation. He achieves this by cutting the length of runs and forcing the water on the level.

The SCS recommends that for each acre that is to be irrigated, a minimum of 3 gallons per minute water supply is available.

Land leveling in the Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District cost approximately \$80.00 per acre. Cost share assistance may be obtained through the Soil Conservation Service and the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office for farmers who have land that would be feasible to level. No cost-share may be drawn for dryland-land leveling.

### SCS Personnel At Lubbock Meeting

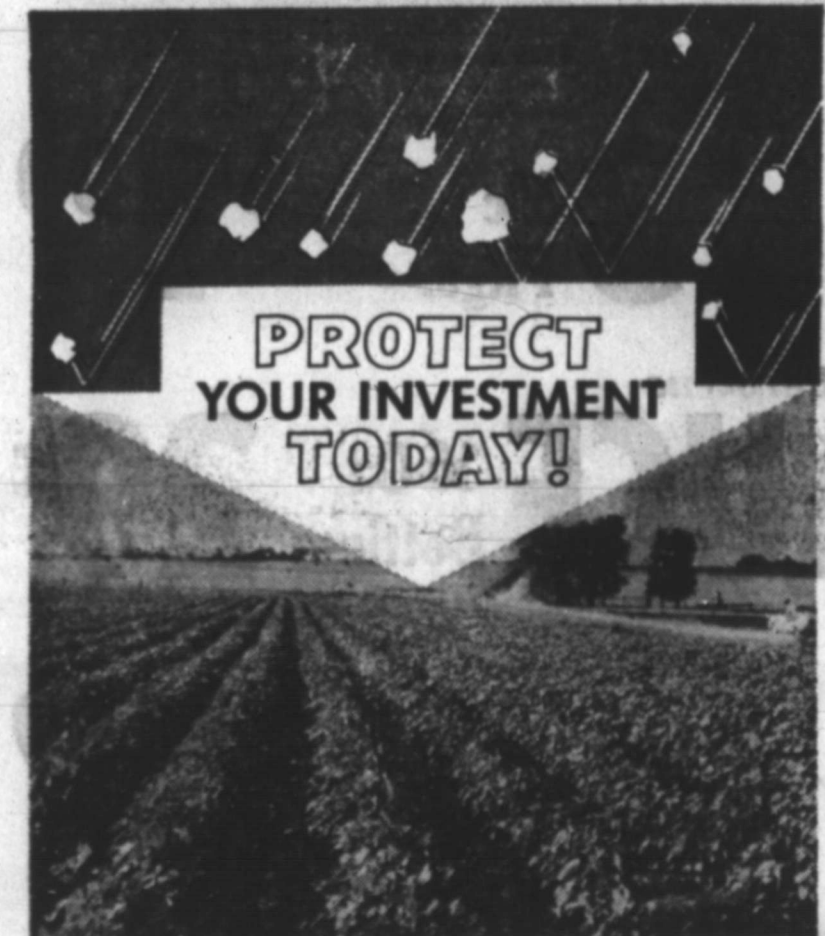

# Inflation Causes \$445,000 Loss To People Of County

(Special to The News)  
New York—The average Lynn County housewife is finding that she needs more money these days when she goes to the grocery store or the meat market. Her food bills are running nearly five percent higher than they were a year ago. After a long period of relative stability, the cost of living is increasing rapidly. Talk of inflation is in the air.

Locally in almost every other part of the country, the prices for consumer goods and services have been going up at an accelerated rate.

The problem has become one of major national importance as the Government considers ways and means to keep the lid on without putting too much of a brake on the economy.

Prices have been creeping upward for some time, but at a modest 1 to 1½ percent a year. In the past year, however, according to the Department of Labor and other Government sources, the rise has been considerably more than that—about 2 percent.

What does this amount to in dollars and cents for the average Lynn County family?

For households with spendable incomes of \$6,179, which is the latest average figure reported by Sales Management, the 2 percent represents a loss of \$124 a year in purchasing power.

In local families where earnings were above or below this average, the losses were proportionately higher or lower. Those with net incomes of \$5,000 were deprived of approximately \$100, those with \$7,500 lost \$150 and those with \$10,000, about \$200.

For the population of Lynn County as a whole, the cost of inflation in the past year was an estimated \$445,000.

Fortunately, the rise in living costs has been more than balanced by higher incomes. Thus, despite inflation, the average working man, locally, has been able to absorb the rise and improve his standard of living as well.

As a result, there has not been

too much concern over the upward trend in the cost of goods. Now, however, the threat of inflation is more serious.

Present Washington opinion is that, if the trend continues, the Administration will call for a tax hike to ease the situation.
