## Christmas Cantata This Sunday Night

The Christmas Cantata, "Glory to God," by J. T. Adams will be presented Sunday night, December 11, at 7:00 p.m. in the First Methodist Church. The composer, J. T. Adams, has been a music professor at East Texas College. He was the founder and director of the Men of Texas, an outstanding group of men singers whose recording of "My God is Real" was a nation-wide hit. More recently he went to Tokyo for the Japan Baptist New Life Movement and was well received by the Japanese. He arranged much of the music for the Nippon philharmonic orchestra and choir.

J. T. Adams is presently Minister of Music at the Baptist Church in Sulphur Springs, Texas, but devotes much of his time to the composing of sacred songs and cantatas. He is in great demand as a revival song leader and is noted for his style of singing from his heart, and as he feels the music within his own soul.

Mr. Adams tells the story that one night while driving from his home in Sulphur Springs, Texas, to keep an appointment in southern Louisiana, he had the strongest kind of impulse to sing Christmas music. He began to sing these words: "The Messiah's birth—greatest gift on earth—Born a King in old Bethlehem—let us sing our praises to Him. Long has the world awaited a King and looked for the promised one. 'Glory to God' did the angels sing—praising His glorious Son. The Messiah's birth, greatest gift on earth. Glory be to God in the highest for our Messiah's birth." With these few beginning strains the melodies began to form in his mind and heart—like a mighty whirlwind and the idea for this Christmas Cantata, "Glory to God" was born.

## A. M. Bray Is Murdered By Burglar Thursday Morning

A. M. (Maurice) Bray, 57, one of Tahoka's most prominent citizens, was found dead early Thursday in Bray Chevrolet Co. building, evidently murdered by one or more burglars some time between 9:30 p.m. Wednesday and 2:30 a.m. Thursday. A sawed-off shotgun was found on the floor at the rear of the parts department several feet from his body.

Funeral rites are pending. The body is at White Funeral Home.

Examination at Tahoka Clinic revealed Mr. Bray had been shot from close range in the chest with the shot ranging downward in his body. Unofficially, the theory is he surprised his assailant and was

leaning forward toward the gunmen at the time of the shotgun blast.

He was found about 2:30 a.m. by Policeman Joe Raindl, after Mrs. Bray had awakened at about 2:00 a.m., found Mr. Bray had not come home, called Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Chestnutt for the keys to the automobile agency building, Mr. Raindl joined them there, and found the body.

Mr. Bray and Mrs. Frances Chestnutt, business manager of the firm, and Lionel Miller, service department manager, were working on books at the office Wednesday night. Mrs. Chestnutt went home about 9:00 p.m. and

Mr. Miller a short time later. Mr. Bray remained to work a while longer in his enclosed office near the front of the building.

When Mrs. Bray awakened later in the night and not finding him in bed became alarmed and called for help. His car was parked in front of the building.

Theory is that someone had gained entrance to the rear of the building with burglary in mind. A rear window pane was broken out, the window raised, and a rear door was left open probably by the burglar on leaving the building because it could not be opened except from the inside.

The assailant is then believed to have pried open a bolted door to the parts department. Mr. Bray in his office about 50 feet away, is then believed to have heard the noise, went to the rear of the parts department, and as he rounded a corner was shot from close range.

One shell had been fired from the sawed-off shotgun found nearby.

Parts, supplies, radios and first aid kits from the parts department were found scattered on the floor of the shop and in the lot at the rear of the building.

Mrs. Chestnutt said they frequently worked at night, and Mr. Bray always cautioned others about not being in the building alone.

She said that when in the enclosed office, even if a noisy heater were not running, one would not likely hear the breaking of a window glass at the rear of the building 100 or more feet away and through two partitions.

Shortly before noon Thursday, Justice of the Peace Horace Brunette of O'Donnell, acting in absence of Judge H. L. Roddy, indicated he would rule "Mr. Bray was shot and killed by an unknown gunman or assailant."

Immediately on finding the body, Mr. Raindl notified other officers, and Texas Ranger Razz Renfrow from Lubbock was leading investigation. Among others helping were Police Chief Jack Miller, Deputy Sheriffs Bill Wilkinson of Tahoka and Doyle Woody of Wilson, and possibly others.

Footprints and fingerprints were found on the premises, and officers indicated there was other possible evidence available.

Andrew Maurice Bray was born at Paducah August 27, 1909, and lived successively with his parents at Amarillo, Hedley and Clarendon. His last two years in high school were at Abilene, where he played football, and graduated in 1927.

He attended Southern Methodist University, Dallas, where he was an All-Southwest Conference tackle for the Mustangs, and graduated with a B. A. degree in 1932.

While attending college, he met LaNeyl Brown of Ennis, whom he

## County's Ginnings Are Past 90,000

Lynn county ginnings are nearing the 95,000 bale mark. The News estimates following a survey of most of the county gins Wednesday and guesses on a few not contacted.

Ginners contacted varied in their estimates of cotton yet to be ginned, but a total of their guesses indicate at least 5,000 to 7,000 bales are yet unginned.

Tahoka has ginned 16,388 bales at about 5:00 p.m. Wednesday, Wilson and Wayside nearly 10,000, New Home and Lakeview 12,250, Petty, 5,574, and Grassland, 6,244.

Production seems much better in the south half of the county, O'Donnell reporting 24,000 bales ginned, and about 35,000 including Wells, Newmore, and Draw.

Actually, The News count ran the total to 32,850 bales, but some reports were not from the ginners themselves.

This year's crop was cut away short by the 35 percent cut allowed by the Government program, dry weather in spots, hail in other areas, then the unprecedented early October 15 freeze.

Even then, the county's final production will run above the guesses of many.

Delayed by the weather from last Saturday, another attempt will be made this Saturday beginning at about noon for the mass parachute jumps near Petty and New Home by about 40 men of Army Reserve Special Forces "Green Beret" units from Lubbock and Amarillo, according to 1st Lt. Larry Edwards of New Home.

Army Aircraft from Fort Wolters will be used in the airborne troop drop.

This part of the exercises was postponed from last Saturday because of the wind and mist.

However, the Special Forces group did carry out patrol exercises during last Saturday night in the Short ranch area south of Petty, and Lt. Edwards says this part of the training program was a success.

The exercises in cold, dark and damp weather over the rugged mesquite pastures lasted from dark until 3 or 4 a. m. and were designed to give experience in navigation and patrol techniques. Some of the patrol covered as much as eight miles.

By the time this is in print, most cotton farmers will have voted on the Cotton Research and Promotion Act proposal which would raise up to \$15 million to aid cotton. If passed, farm organizations and farm leaders who have recommended approval will now have to be on the alert to make sure the Secretary of Agriculture and his Cotton Board carry out the real intentions of the Act in a manner that will be of real benefit to cotton producers. We are somewhat skeptical that he will, in spite of the fact we have favored the act—anything that might promote cotton.

Even if the program is carried out as planned, this is not enough. While we twiddled our thumbs and were happy that we had high price support programs, our State Department and our Department of Agriculture have for 30 years been busy helping other nations get into the cotton business. Once the U.S. was the leading cotton producer. Today, we produce about the same amount as Russia, to which country the Department of Agriculture has sent cotton experts to help them produce more and better cotton. Today, the U.S. produces less than 15 million bales, world production for 1965-66 is estimated by USDA at 53 million bales, total world supply is 81.3 million bales, and total world consumption of cotton is 51.2 million bales.

To date, Mr. Freeman and Mr. Rusk, especially the latter, have not seemed too interested in pushing American cotton into world trade for fear such entry into the foreign market would be unpopular and "hurt our image and relations" with our foreign "friends." Now, with these reduced prices, we believe our Government should push more cotton into world trade whether it hurts Mexico or Brazil or Turkey or Egypt or Russia or not. We've got to quit coddling our foreign "friends" and start looking out for ourselves.

When Congressman George Mahon was here recently, we asked him, "Do you think Mr. Freeman and Mr. Rusk are really interested in pushing American cotton into world trade?" If we got a clear answer, we still don't understand what it was.

Here's a quote from the Wall Street Journal of Nov. 30: "The Government's own cotton program largely has been instrumental in costing the growers, over the past five years, about 13 million bales in exports. Strange subsidy ventures have kept cotton's price out of touch with its market and, at times, impaired its quality. So, the Federal farm planners hardly seem eminently qualified to spend effectively \$15 million on cotton-promoting programs."

J. Edgar Hoover reports crime in the U.S. increased 10 percent the first nine months of 1966 over the corresponding period in 1965.

Somewhere along the line we're going to have to quit coddling law violators, marchers, protestors, sit-inners, strikers, and others who take the law into their own hands. When 6,000 students at a University riot in an effort to overthrow authority and secure imagined "rights", some of us wonder whether these kids deserve the right to stay in school? But, what's the matter? Are we missing something in our homes? In our churches? In our schools? In law enforcement? In Federal government programs, Supreme Court rulings? In the TV programs? In books, magazines, newspapers? There must be something wrong with our society.

One in every 11 persons in the U.S. is 65 or older. There are twice as many in the over-65 bracket as there were at the end of World War I. The number today exceeds the total population of our 20 smallest states.

Times have certainly changed in the last 30 to 40 years. We remember when Saturday was the one big day for shopping and for visiting in town. Everyone, almost, came to town on Saturday afternoon, loaded up with supplies for the week. Parking spaces in down town Tahoka were at a premium, some double-parked, others would park a block or two from down town. The picture shows were crowded to capacity. The women folk, shopping completed, sat in cars, visited with friends, and watched the passing crowds. The men gathered in bunches, talked farming, politics, and whatever came to mind. Children not in the shows, played on the court house lawn. The bank opened at about 7:00 a.m. and stayed open 'til dark. Most stores stayed open until people quit buying at 10 or 11 or even 12 o'clock. We don't have to tell you the situation today.

The air force unit was at an overseas base when the medics decided to give the airmen their annual immunization injections. They set up a regular assembly line and even pressed the veterinary surgeon into helping them. One of the first men in line got his injection from the "vet."

"Gosh," the young airman said, "you did that so gently I hardly felt it. How did you get so good at it?"

"I have to be gentle," the doctor replied. "My patients can bite!"

### Kidney Transplant Success, Martin Will Be Home Christmas

Jimmy Martin, a Levelland farmer and the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Martin of Tahoka, is a very lucky young man who went through a kidney transplant successfully in the University Research Clinic at Salt Lake City, Utah.

According to his doctors, Jimmy will be home for Christmas. He is a 1962 graduate of Levelland High School and attended South Plains College.

Martin was taken to the clinic on Oct. 6 prior to spending some time in Lubbock's Methodist Hospital. Both his kidneys were removed on Oct. 24. Following the removal of his kidneys, doctors used a dialysis, a process to rid the body of poison and infection. Doctors prefer this new treatment to the kidney machine which was popular two years ago. He received the dialysis before the removal of the kidneys and after the operation, and used the kidney machine once.

Two weeks later on Nov. 7, with the help of his father, Gordon Martin, and kidney donor, also of Levelland, Jimmy received the new kidney. Gordon Martin was hospitalized one week and was doing fine. He had planned to fly home Monday but was rehospitalized later Friday afternoon. Doctors say both father and son went through the operation very satisfactorily.

Reports from Jimmy's family are that he rejected the new kidney but there was nothing to worry about. It is the hope of his doctors, Dr. Keith Reenstma and Dr. Larry Stevens, who were responsible for the successful operation that the rejection will not happen again. This can happen as few as four times or as many as 10 times in the next two years. They do have medication to aid in this situation.

One of the doctors performing the operation, Dr. Reenstma, is considered the best and top kidney specialist in the United States. Since the kidney transplant is relatively new, with only seven being performed successfully in Chicago and another seven in Dallas, it is considered that Jimmy is a pretty lucky young man. The oldest transplant in the United States was performed four years ago.

Jummy, wife Laverne, and nine-month-old daughter, Angiee have a farm 3 1/2 miles northwest of Levelland. Friends of Jimmy and Gordon Martin have harvested their cotton crops. Farmers manded cotton strippers and lined up in cars and pickups to haul cotton to gins.

He played professional football with the old Pittsburgh Pirates, later the Steelers, from about 1934 to 1936, and became acquainted with many of the old time football greats.

He then joined Chevrolet Motor Co. Dallas Division and became district commercial manager.

During World War II, he served as an officer in the Navy, and rose to the rank of Lieutenant Commander.

Following the war, he went back to Chevrolet, and soon became a partner in Morris-Bray Chevrolet agency at Coleman.

Mr. Bray sold his interest in this firm in 1948 and established Bray Chevrolet Agency in Tahoka.

Since coming here, Mr. Bray has become one of the town's most outstanding and best loved citizens, and has held about every position of honor and trust in the town's civic affairs.

Mr. Bray has served as president of the Rotary Club, the Chamber of Commerce, and the Tahoka school board. He was a Mason, a Shriner, had worked with Rainbow Girls, and was a district Boy Scout officer. He was chairman of the board of First Methodist Church, had served as Sunday School superintendent, a teacher and in other church lay work.
