Instead of the usual yellow flame from wood, the flames can be green, red, blue, orange, or purple in color depending upon the chemicals used to treat the material to be burned.

Griffin explains that calcium chloride can be used to produce orange colored flames, copper chloride-blue, potassium chloride-purple, strontium nitratered, lithium chloride-carmine, copper sulfate-emerald green. Dry pine cones or small blocks or chips of wood can be soaked in solutions of these chemicals to produce the multi-colored flames when burned. Most of the chemicals can be purchased from chemical suppliers or local drug-

To treat cones or wood, a plastic pail and onion sack are needed. The cones or chips are placed in the sack and immersed in a solution containing 1 pound of the desired chemical dissolved thoroughly in one gallon of water. The bag must be weighted down so
