> While the state of the economy, nationally, is of great importance to all Americans, what is happening at the local level is of overriding interest in any community.

> According to figures covering the past year's business activity, the county turned in its full quota toward the nation's gross national product, which broke into new high ground with a \$629 bilion performance.

The story is told in Government statistics released by the Office of | Busigess Economics and in marketing studies made by other agen-

The measurement used is the ross national product (GNP), which is the total value of all goods and services produced in the country.

Lynn County's contribution to the GNP was a healthy \$15,578,-000, a market gain over the amount it contributed three years before, \$15,195,000.

It consisted of \$12,914,000 spent for merchandise in local stores and an estimated \$2,664,000 for services of all sorts.

The major credit for the breakthrough to \$629 billion goes to personal income spending on the part of the public. Their purchases of goods and services amounted to nearly \$400 billion, which was 62 percent of the total.
