Voter Registration Interest Increases

A total of 1,077 Lynn county citizens had registered to vote in 1967 up until Wednesday morning, George McCracken, county tax assessor and collector, reports.

At the same time a year ago, 913 voters had qualified. Therefore, this represents a substantial step-up of 165 over the same period last year, but this is still very short of the potential.

Citizens 21 to 60 are reminded again that they must have to register in order to have a vote under the new voter registration law.

Mr. McCracken has placed application blanks for voter registration certificates at the following additional places: Grassland Butane, Draw Store, and Newmoore Store. Registration is also possible at Moore Insurance in O'Donnell, New Home Co-Op gin, Wilson Co-Op gin and school tax office.

Attorney General Crawford C. Martin assures Mr. McCracken over-age voters do not have to register in Lynn county. Some confusion in regard to registration of over-age voters has been caused by a news story carried in daily papers a few days ago which declared over-age people should register because of the law suit filed to nullify the poll tax amendment.

She was born here on May 20, 1948, and graduated from Wilson High School in May, 1966. Her parents farm on Route 1, Tahoka, and also operate Tahoka Cafe.

Survivors include her parents; two sisters, Mrs. Joe Draper of Brownfield, and Miss Janie Lee Young of the home; two brothers, Lonan and Alag Mac, also of the home; grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Young of Post and Ms. and Mrs. D. A. Dobbins of Winters; and a great grandmother, Mrs. Helen Richards of Post; and one nephew, Troy Dan Draper.

Cache Of Money Found In Home Of Deceased Negro

Sheriff's officers report that a considerable amount of money was found in the house of "Rock" Williams, 90, O'Donnell Negro, who was found dead in his home at about 6:30 p.m. Christmas Day. He is presumed to have died of a heart attack.

Since none of his relatives have been located, the money has been deposited in a "Rock Williams Estate" fund in the O'Donnell bank.

About an hour after Williams' body was removed from his home, Deputy Harmon Watts told The News, he received a call to come to the house since several persons were trying to break in it.

Accompanied by "Pete" McMillan, formerly of O'Donnell and now of Wolfthorpe, went to the house and found a "very large amount of money."

Watts said they found silver and small bills hidden in closets, a trunk, under a bed, all over the bedroom in sacks, tin cans, and boxes. In fact there was so much, the officers had to carry the money away in a tub.

Although the officers would not set an amount, rumor has it the total of about \$3,500 was found in the house.

"Rock" was in trouble with the "law" many times, as was reputed to have engaged in bootlegging. He claimed to be half negro and half Indian, and to have once been a deputy sheriff down near Abilene.

H. C. Story Shows Slow Improvement

H. C. Story of Austin is slowly improving after having been seriously ill for four months, Mrs. Story informs The News.

He is a former county clerk here and later worked in the State Comptroller's office many years before retiring last year. Mrs. Story formerly taught in Tahoka schools a number of years, and is a sister of Weldon and Buck Martin.

Bankers Declare County In Sound Financial Condition

In spite of acreage reduction, an early freeze, dry weather, hail damage, and a lower price for cotton, Lynn county bank deposits were at an all-time high for a December 31st call date when report from the third Lynn county bank, Wilson State, was revealed this week.

Total deposits of the three banks on December 31, 1966, were \$16,628,093.44, surprisingly an increase of nearly \$350,000 over the same time a year before.

Wilson State Bank this week reports deposits on that date were \$4,036,819.14, a decrease from this time last year. Wilson area was hardest hit by hail storms which destroyed a large area of crops

last summer, followed by the unprecedented early freeze. Except for these factors, this bank would have shown an increase, also.

First National of Tahoka had previously reported \$9,948,965.60 on deposit on December 31, an increase of about half a million over the previous year.

O'Donnell First National reported deposits of \$2,642,309.30, an increase of one-third million for the same period a year before.

A few days following January 1st, total deposits at one time in the three banks is believed to have reached almost \$20 million.

However, property and income taxes, land payments and other debt payments are expected to reduce the total considerably the next few weeks.

Bankers report many farmers are in excellent financial condition to face the coming year, although many individuals have been hit hard. Very few will be forced out of business except by choice.

Business men as a whole possibly are feeling the squeeze worse than almost anyone else, as those who have money are reluctant to spend freely in face of the troubled times, tight money, and uncertainty of farm programs and the national and world situation.

Farmers and businessmen both declare a good soaking rain or snow would change the outlook considerably in Lynn county.

10 Lynn Wrecks In December

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 10 accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of December according to Sergeant A. E. Roberts, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in 6 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$17,645.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the calendar year 1966, shows a total of 93 crashes resulting in 2 persons killed, 44 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$59,850.00.

"When the final reports are tabulated, we will find that more people were killed in Texas traffic accidents during 1966 than in any prior year in the history of this state," the Sergeant stated. The fatal count is expected to be about 15 percent more than the 3,028 traffic deaths in 1965. This increase should be a challenge for every individual to put forth his best defensive efforts to prevent accidents during 1967.

The veteran Patrol Supervisor cautions all motorists to beware of ice spots at bridges, underpasses and in shadows. Reduce speed before you reach these slippery areas.

Born in East Texas, December 9, 1907, he moved from Mount Vernon to O'Donnell and later moved to California, about 26 years ago.

For several years, he had spent the summers here with his daughter, Mrs. J. D. (Joyce) Davis and family, and in 1963 operated Pop & Jerry's Cafe south of the square on Sweet Street.

He had suffered a light stroke about two months ago, but was believed to have recovered and expected to return to work this Monday when fatally stricken.

New Teachers In Tahoka Schools

Tahoka School Board at a meeting last Thursday night took action on a number of matters, including setting of tuition for certain out-of-district children.

Supt. Harold Reynolds reported a slight drop in enrollment since Christmas, from 1,095 to 1,060, of which 224 are in Senior High School, 168 in Junior High, 306 in North Elementary, and 362 in South Elementary.

Following a report from the tax assessor-collector, Robert Abbe, an attorney, Jack McCreary, was engaged to work on delinquent taxes.

Resignations of two teachers, Lewis Mier, chemistry instructor, and Mrs. Janet Owens, junior high teacher, were approved. Glen Amerson, who has a B. S. degree from Texas Tech, was elected to teach chemistry in high school and science in junior high.

Construction of three trash incinerators by Higginbotham-Bartlett was authorized.

At the December meeting the Board instructed the Superintendent to prepare for consideration a proposed policy for tuition aid to parents of certain physically and mentally handicapped pupils who reside in the Tahoka ISD. After investigation of the policies of some area schools the following suggested policy was offered and accepted.

"The Board of Education of the Tahoka ISD will consider parental requests for out-of-district tuition aid for physically handicapped and mentally retarded pupils for whom programs are not provided within the Tahoka ISD. Such out-of-district tuition aid shall be granted only in cases where a special Texas Education Agency approved program is in operation in a public school of practical proximity to the Tahoka ISD. As a prerequisite for such consideration, the pupil must be eligible by Texas Education Agency standards of eligibility for the special program for the physically handicapped or the mentally retarded. To be eligible for consideration of such tuition aid a pupil shall have resided in the Tahoka ISD for a period of two years immediately preceding the request."

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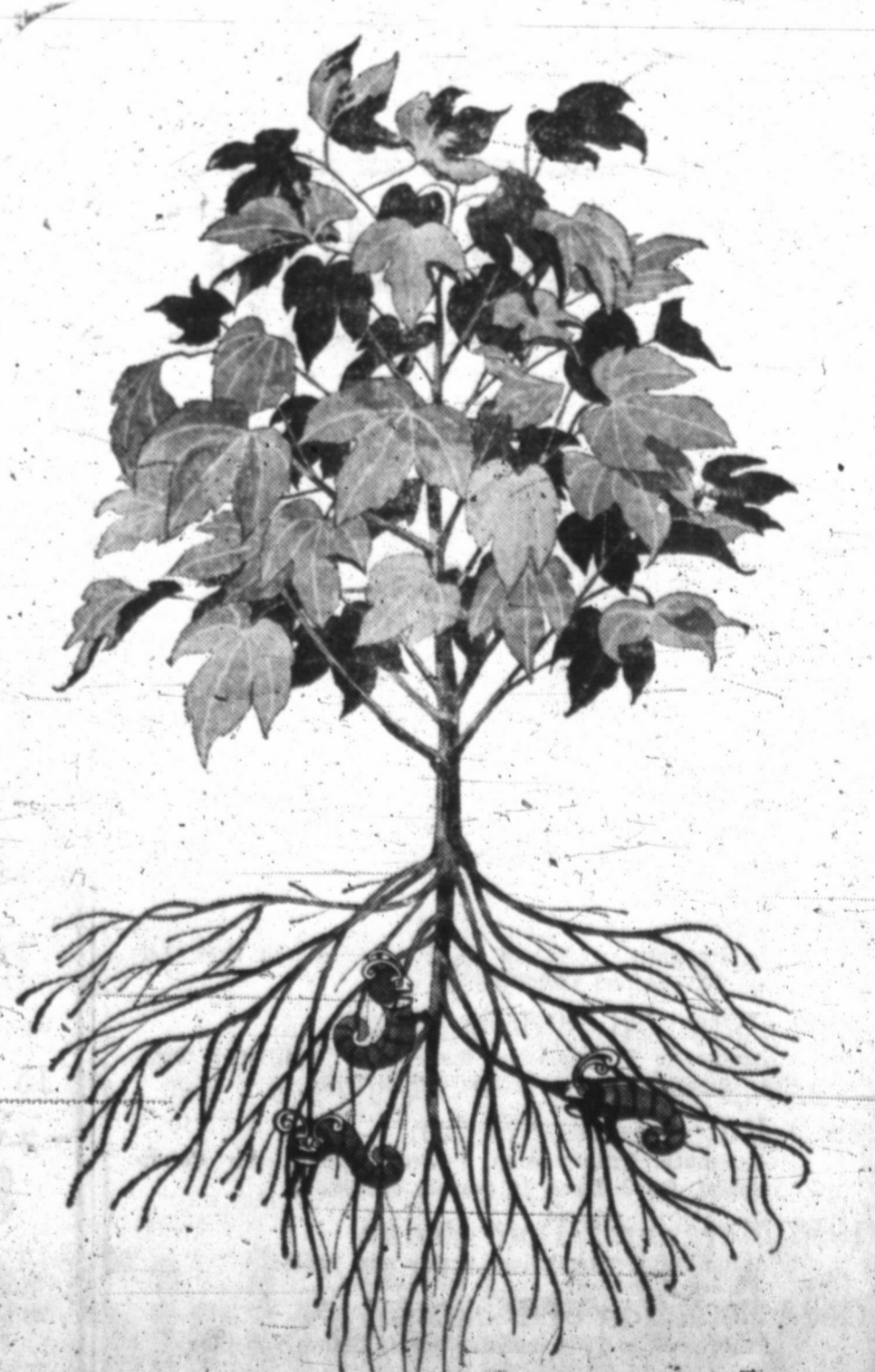

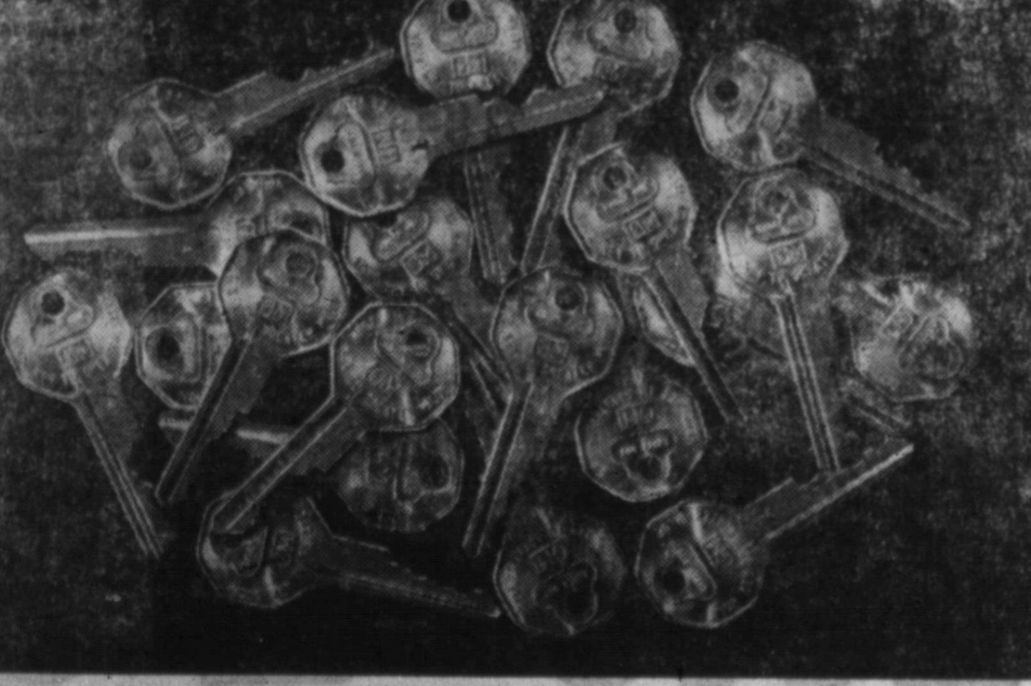
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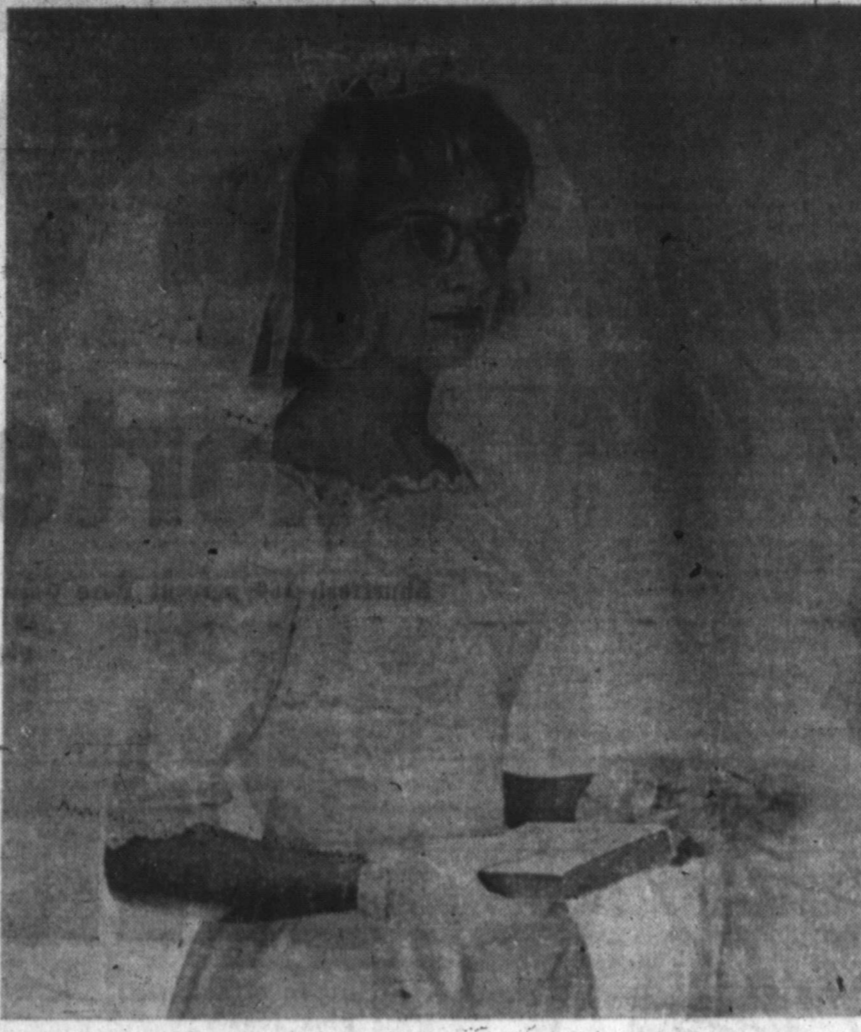

TO THE RESIDENTS OF LYNN COUNTY, TEXAS AND ALL OTHER INTERESTED PARTIES:

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that after due publication hereof, the undersigned intend to apply to the Texas Legislature at its regular session in 1967 for the passage of an Act authorizing the creation of a Hospital District over all of Lynn County, Texas, under the authority granted by Article IX, Section 9, of the Texas Constitution, the general purposes and nature of such Act being expressed as follows:

"AN ACT providing for the creation of the Lynn County Hospital District comprising all of Lynn County, in accordance with the provisions of Section 9, Article IX of the Constitution of Texas; prescribing a procedure for an election on the creation of such district and the levy of a tax not to exceed 75c on the \$100 valuation for its maintenance, support and the payment of indebtedness; providing said district with the power to issue bonds; providing for the administration, operation and financing of said district; including the procedures it is to follow providing a severability clause; and declaring an emergency."

SECRETARY FREEMAN CITES CHIEF'S COMMENDATION FOR COST REDUCTION IN SCS

A commendation from President Lyndon B. Johnson for "outstanding performance" of the Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service in reducing costs by \$9,972,000 in fiscal year 1966 was announced today by Secretary Orville L. Freeman.

"We are grateful to President Johnson for this citation," Secretary Freeman said. "This is another notable achievement in our war on waste which the President recognized last April when he personally presented individual awards for cost reductions to 37 of our employees."

Secretary Freeman recalled that President Johnson, at the April ceremony, said "controlling waste is like bailing a boat; you have to keep at it." "We intend to keep at it," Mr. Freeman said.

In releasing a letter of commendation from the President, Secretary Freeman said today that the cost reduction accomplishment of the Soil Conservation Service resulted from increased employee productivity, donated time of farmers, ranchers and contractors, improved technical and administrative procedures, using surplus property lists in lieu of new purchases, using computers, combining or eliminating field offices, and combining or re-arranging functions so as to reduce the number of positions.
