"The Board of Education of the Tahoka ISD will consider parental requests for out-ofdistrict tuition aid for physically handicapped and mentally retarded pupils for whom programs are not provided within the Tahoka ISD. Such out of district tuition aid shall be granted only in cases where a special Texas Education Agency approved program is in operation in a public school of practical proximity to the Tahoka ISD. As a prerequisite for such consideration, the pupil must be eligible by Texas Ed ucation Agency standards of eligibility for the special program for the physically handicapped or the mentally retarded. To be eligible for consideration of such tuition aid a pupil shall have resided in the Tahoka ISD for a period of two years immediately preceding the request."

### OLD STONE FORT **Nacogdoches**

The Old Stone Fort standing on the campus of the Stephen F. Austin State Teachers College at Nacogdoches is generally believed to have been built during 1779 or 1780.

It has been held and garrisoned at various times by Spain, Mexico, the Republic of Texas, the Confederacy and the United States.

It was truly an outpost in the wilderness!

Nacogdoches itself, one of the four oldest civilized settlements in Texas, was named for the Nacogdoches Indians. Here in 1716 the Spaniards established Mission Nuestra Senora de Guadalupe around whose deserted buildings Nacogdoches was permanently established in 1779.




