City tax payments were lagging a bit early this week when J. M. Uzzle, city administrator, reported \$38,000.00 collected for the total roll of \$50,129.92. But, Mr. Uzzle said, a number of the larger city tax payers usually delay payment until the last day or two.



explosion with a new form of the housing development idea.

Way back in World War I, Goodyear purchased 13,000 acres of arable property on which to grow long staple cotton for tires. In the course of advanced chemical research, synthetic fibres replaced cotton for tire components, and the company was stuck with a lot of leftover land.

Not willing to let any sage grow under his shoes, the rub-ber giant decided to make the property pay off by constructing homes and buildings on it.

Patrick Cusick, Goodyear general manager, stresses the creativity and pioneering of the corporate project which already houses 600. Cusick claims that city construction is just catching on and won't really be a corporate pattern for another 5 to 10 years.

While city structuring may appear to be a benevolent sideline, and a trend of the corporate-giant times, the action impels some alarming questions, Paramount among these quali-fications is whether or not existing home builders and con-tractors will be hurt or demolished by the corporate bulldozing? Secondly, how much power will the corporate master wield in the community? Will city building by the giants be a boon to the economy, or merely another economic en-




