# Lynn County Bank Deposits Down

If West Texas and the Tahoka-Lynn County area is "going to the dogs" as some sidewalk philosophers seem to think, there's still going to be a reasonable period of waiting if the reports of conditions from county banks are any indication.

While all are down in deposits, there is still not the drastic drop one would expect when an area or a country is about to enter a depression or even a period of inflation, on the other hand.

In other words, everything is just about what could be considered "normal" in most respects, although there is an indication of a drop which would actually be considered

slight when based on a percentage scale of 100. In terms of deposits First National Bank of Tahoka is down \$231,551.49 from this time (April 25) last year while the First National Bank of O'Donnell is down \$231,479.79 and the biggest drop is one of \$495,430.23 at Wilson State Bank.

But, in reading these it is best to also note that in 1965, the estimated county population was about 11,200 while in some circles, it is thought we have only a little more than 10,000 at the present.

And, the drop in population also has a reasonable explanation. In 1965 more farm laborers were required, this requiring additional sales people, etc.

Even with the drop, it is thought overall income is about the same, although exact figures are not available. If this is a correct statement, it would indicate that fewer people are making more money, reflecting an overall increase of wages for the individual.

## Vote Is Upcoming To Decide Cotton Allotment Swaps

According to the Lynn County ASCS Office, a vote of cotton farmers will be held during the period of May 15-19 to decide whether or not they want to be able to sell or lease their upland cotton allotments for use on a farm in a different county, but within the state.

Ballots on the referendum may be returned by mail or delivered in person to the ASCS office during the four day period.

An affirmative vote by at least two-thirds of the county's farmers who vote will permit such transfers during the next two years, 1968 and 1969.

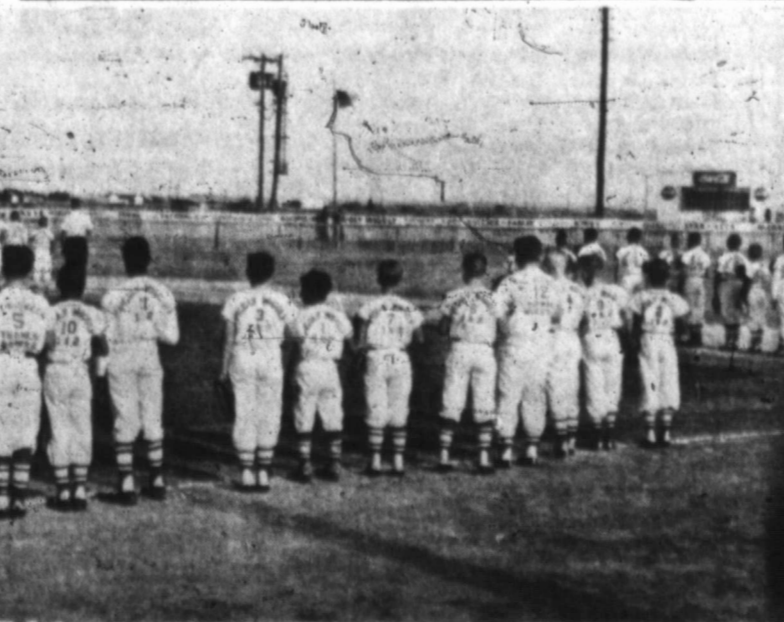

## Tahoka Auto Supply Now Has New Manager

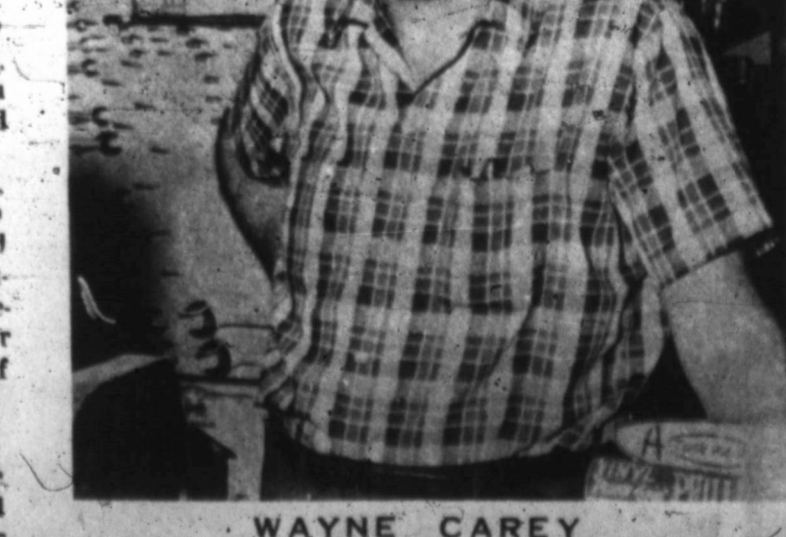

Their leaders through the years were Mrs. Joe D. Unfred, Mrs. L. H. Moore and Mrs. LeRoy Nettles.

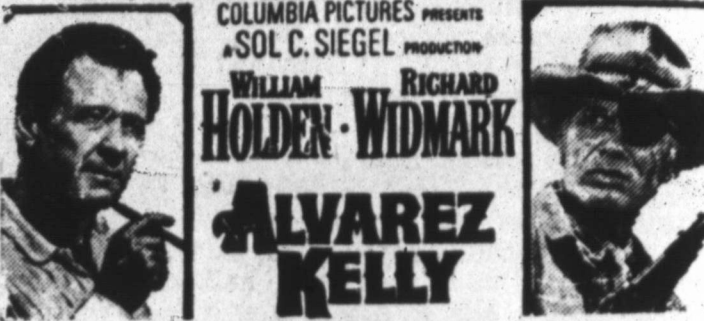

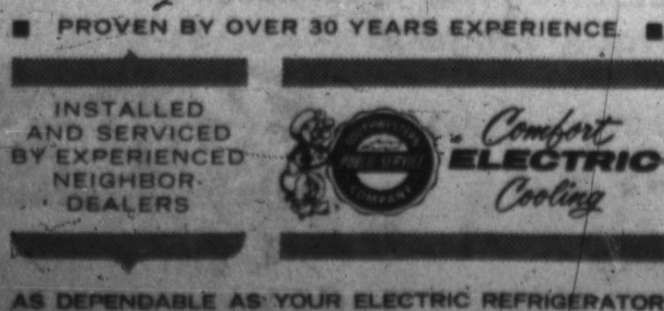

WOULD YOU ladies appreciate me telling you how to bake a cake? Well then, I'll tell you anyway!

1967 Vehicle Registration Completed

The 1967 vehicle registration for February and March in Lynn County were 5,477 vehicles registered compared to 4,832 for the same period in 1966, according to George McCracken, tax assessor-collector.

Total fees paid for the first two months of the registration year was approximately \$113,000.54. Of this amount, \$79,856.00 was divided between the four county precincts, and \$3,299.85, office commission and fees, was paid to the county officer's salary fund. The Texas Highway Department received \$29,844.69.

Beginning with each registration year, the first \$50 retained by the county. After the amount is reached the county deducts commission and fees, then the balance is divided equally between the county and the Texas Highway Department.

# FARM NEWS

## 185,067 Acres Of Allotment In County

Lynn County has 1,437 farms with an allotment of 185,067 acres, according to the Lynn County ASCS Office.

According to the statistics released, there are a total of 1,428 cotton farms signed up with an allotment of 184,553 acres. The farms will divert 64,493 acres, leaving 120,060 acres eligible to plant and draw price support.

Total cotton acreage which could be planted is 120,574 acres (change is due to nine nonparticipating farms for 1967).

Average yield for the county is 459 pounds per acre; 459 pounds times 11.53 cents per pound price support payment equals an average of \$52.92 per acre; 120,060 acres eligible for price support times \$52.92 per acre equals \$6,353,575.20. (Approximate as less than 10 farmers signed up to divert less than 35% of their cotton acreage.

With a diverted acre payment of 10.78 cents per pound times a 459 pound yield per acre the average

would be \$49.48 per acre; 64,493 acres to be diverted times \$49.48 per acre equals \$3,191,113.64.

Overall statistics show a total price support figure of \$6,353,575.20 and a total diversion payment of \$3,191,113.64, a total cotton for the county of \$9,544,688.84.

### FEED GRAIN

Also, there are 1,436 feed grain farms with a base of 242,789 acres, 1,257 are signed up with a base of 216,796 acres.

Maximum acres eligible for payment will be 50% of the base on the enrolled farms or 108,398 acres. The average price support rate is \$7.42 per acre, multiplied by 108,398 acres equals \$804,313.15, plus a few small farms that receive a diversion payment for not planting.

Approximate total feed grain income is \$821,000.00 in the county. Total cotton and feed will be \$10,365,688.84.

### Farm Income Discussed

The personal farm income received by the total farm population in 1966 from all sources was \$21.3 billion. Of this amount \$14.5 billion came from farm sources and \$6.8 billion from non farm sources. The total estimated realized gross income for 1967 which includes cash receipts from the sale of agricultural commodities plus government payments and the value of products and items used on the farm has been established at \$50.0 billion which is \$0.5 billion above the 1966 gross income. Production expenses for 1967 are estimated at \$34.8 billion compared to \$33.2 billion in 1966.

The net income to farm operators when the inventory changes are excluded is estimated for 1967 at \$15.2 billion compared to \$16.3 billion in 1966. When the inventory change is added or subtracted the 1967 estimate of net farm operator income is \$14.9 billion compared to \$16.1 billion last year.

The net income per farm including the net inventory change for 1967 expressed in 1966 prices is \$4,650 compared to \$4,955 last year.

### LYNN COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Grazing of pastures should not be started until after grasses are in the stage of growth, says John Graves, Conservationist.

During the grazing period grasses should not be grazed closer than to where only about 50 percent of the plant is used.

This is necessary as about 95 percent of the materials a plant uses for growth comes from air, and plant food is manufactured in the grass leaf. Where grasses are overgrazed, the plants do not have sufficient leaf area in which to manufacture food to produce its own growth, and to support animal grazing. Consequently, when overgrazing occurs, the grass plant slowly dies due to starvation.

Forage production from grasses can be greatly influenced by fertilizing and irrigation. Where grasses are properly fertilized it requires only about 4 inches of water to produce 1 ton of forage; where improper fertilizing it requires only about 4 inches of water to produce 1 ton of forage where improper fertilizing may require as much as 11 inches of water to produce 1 ton of forage that will have a low protein value.

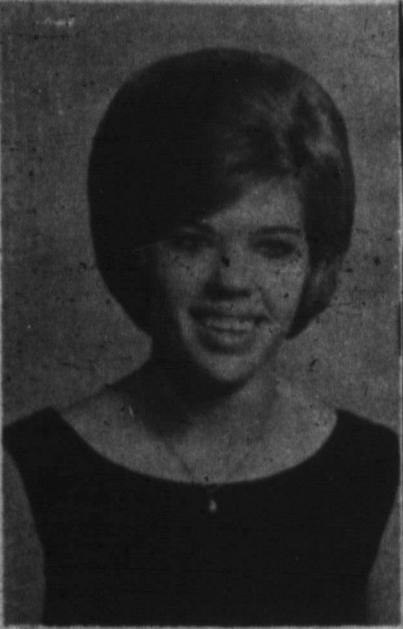

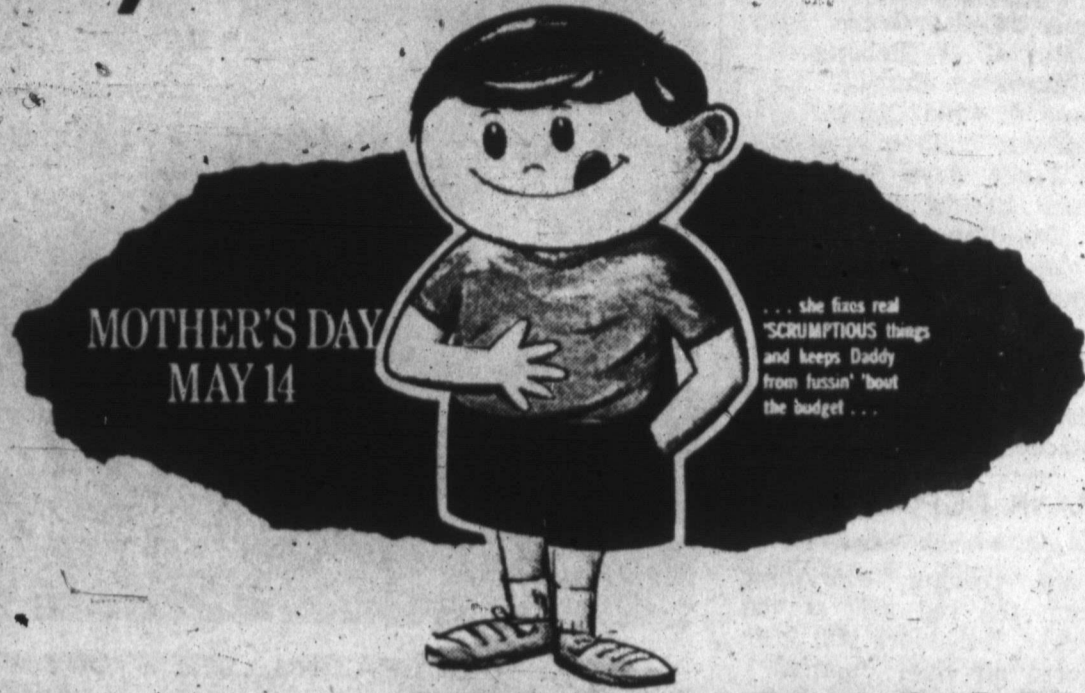
