Tremendous strides in understanding and treatment of emotional disorders have been made in the last decade. Releases from state and county hospitals have more than doubled in less than ten years. Unfortunately, because of inadequate follow-up and aftercare programs, many patients need to return to the hospital. Clearly, it is up to the communities to provide more help for early diagnosis, treatment and aftercare, to prevent the tragedy of chronic mental illness. Assistance in this area is the goal of the Lynn County Association for Mental Health. Much work is being done to provide essential prog-

It is hoped the community will increase its support to this year's campaign, so these services can be improved and to make it possible to start new ones. The same facilities should be availible for emotional disorders as for physical disorders.
