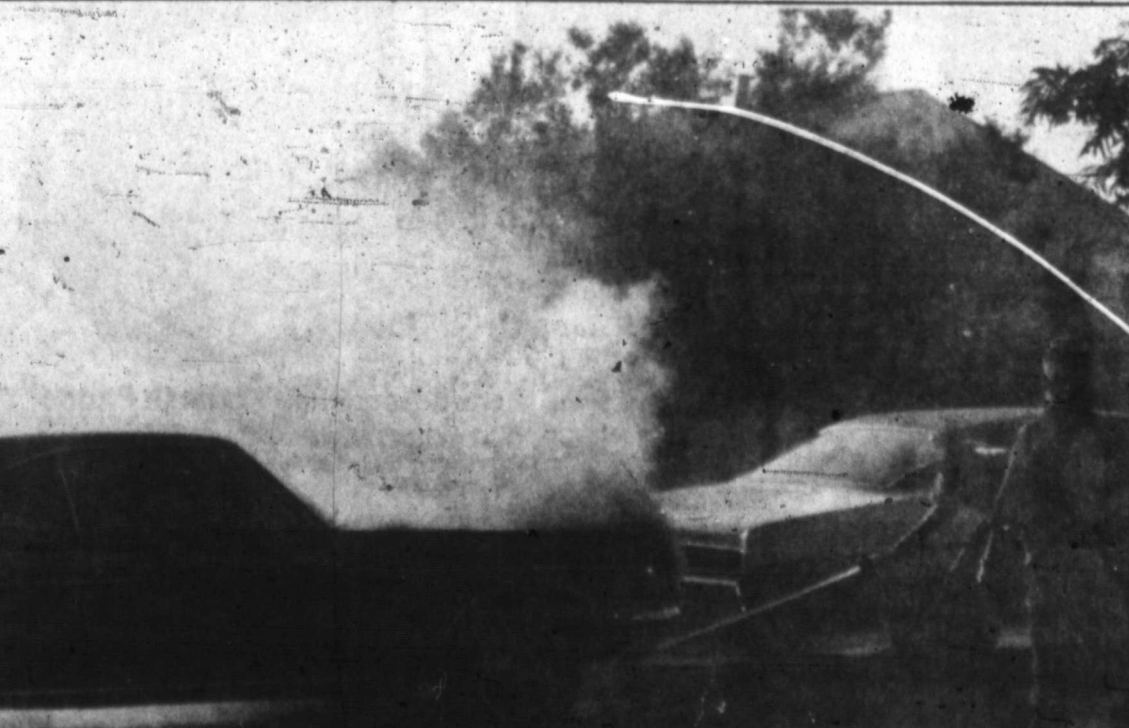

Billy Dockery

Wounded In Viet Nam

Marine 2nd Lt. Billy W. Dockery, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ted L. Dockery of Lubbock, former Grassland residents, has been evacuated to the U. S. Naval Hospital at St. Albans, New York, following his injury in combat on May 2nd in the Quang Tri area of Vietnam.

Mr. and Mrs. Dockery were notified last Saturday by the Defense Department that their son had been wounded and was being evacuated to the United States.

Lt. Dockery, a platoon leader in the 2nd Battalion, 4th Marines, was hit by shrapnel from an artillery round while leading a patrol in the Quang Tri area.

He received injuries to the left side of the body, including severe injury to his left arm just below the shoulder.

The Dockerys were told that he would be hospitalized for three or four months. They have talked with him three times on the telephone and he was to undergo surgery on his arm on May 12th.

Lt. Dockery, 34, received a direct commission as a Marine second lieutenant last July before leaving for Vietnam in August.

He has been in the Marines since 1950 following his graduation from Blossom High School in East Texas.

A veteran of the Korean war, he received the Purple Heart for combat injuries suffered there. He also holds thirteen other medals and ribbons.

Lt. Dockery's wife and three sons live in Flushing, New York.

Approximately twenty guests attended. Special guests were the seniors, their sponsor, Miss Garene Harris, and Mrs. B. L. Ernest and Carol.

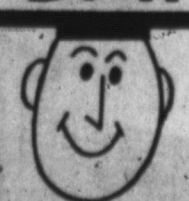

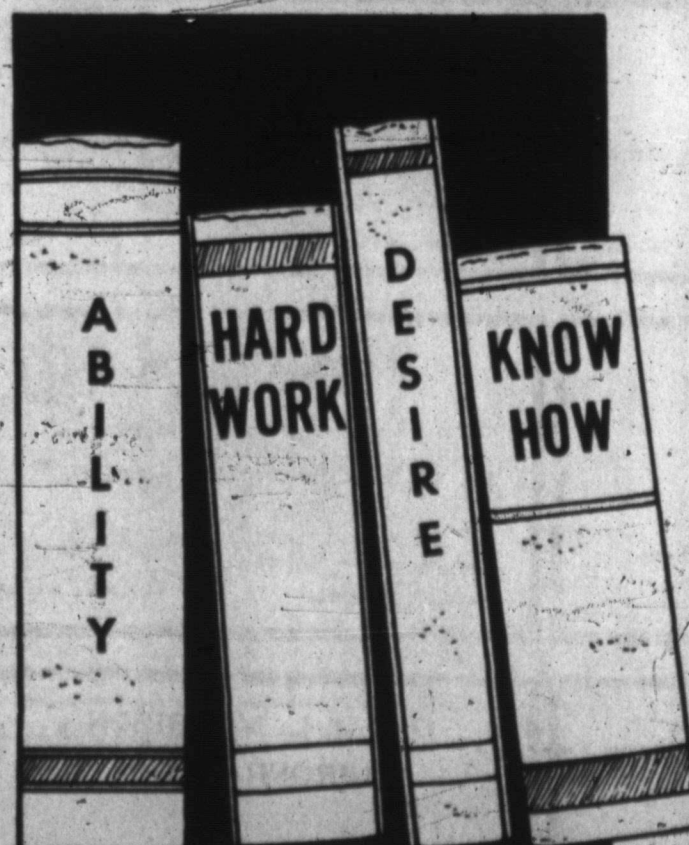

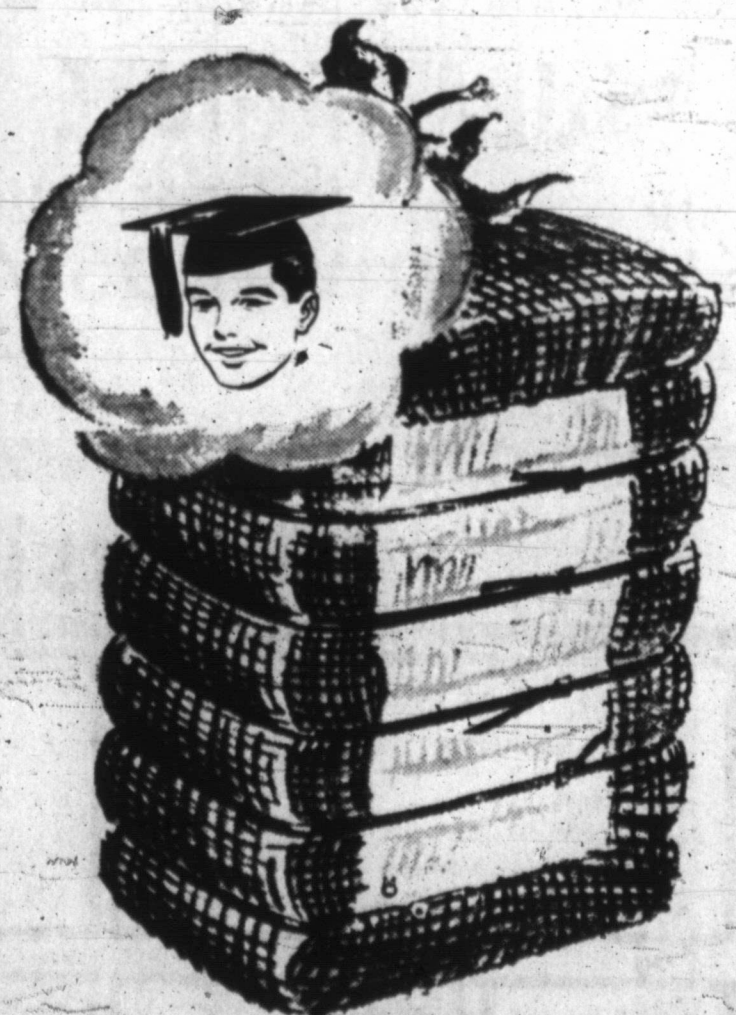

Surface Water Importation Discussed At Rotary

Proposals for importation of surface water to the Plains were discussed at Tahoka Rotary Club Thursday noon by Bill Waddel of the High Plains Under-

ground Water District. "Putting a man on the moon is not as important to us as more water for the Plains," Waddel stated. "And is not nearly so big a problem."

He told how Governor Connally's Texas Water Plan at first left the Plains out of the picture, but how pressure had caused new studies to be instituted on feasibility of transporting water to the Plains.

Briefly he told of the several plans: The NAWAPA plan to bring water from Alaska and Canada is at least 30 or 40 years away. The Plains will need more irrigation water before that time.

Another plan advanced is for transportation of water from the Mississippi through Oklahoma and to the Plains, moving from the proposed Cooper Reservoir of Northeast Texas by aqueduct up to the Plains between the Red and Brazos watersheds, and a third

is transportation of water from the same reservoir up the Colorado watershed from the South Texas aqueduct from a point at about Austin.

At this time the No. 2 plan seems most feasible, Waddel said, and would permit sale of water at \$30 per acre foot.

Of course, he explained, there are many "ifs" in the proposed program.

But, he showed slide pictures on a recent trip of Plains water people to California, where a much more ambitious water transportation program is near completion where water is being moved by aqueduct from Oroville Lake in northern California 450 miles south over mountains to the Los Angeles area. The aqueduct is 50 feet deep and 150 feet wide, and water transported is being used to recharge river beds and sand-informa-

tions to be pumped out for irrigation and domestic use. Wayne Waters arranged the program and introduced the speaker.

On proposal by Harild Green, the club voted to sponsor as the club's foreign summer guest a young lady school teacher from West Germany.

President Harold Reberts announced Debbie Wright, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bryan Wright, and Bill Brock, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Brock, have been selected as the club's delegates to the Youth Conference in Austin this summer.

Ralph Beistle, president of Friends of the Library, called on Rotarians for help in support as members of the organization to help improve Lynn County Library.

Student guests for the month, Milton Edwards and Cliff Thimas, were introduced by the club sweetheart, Marla Bray.

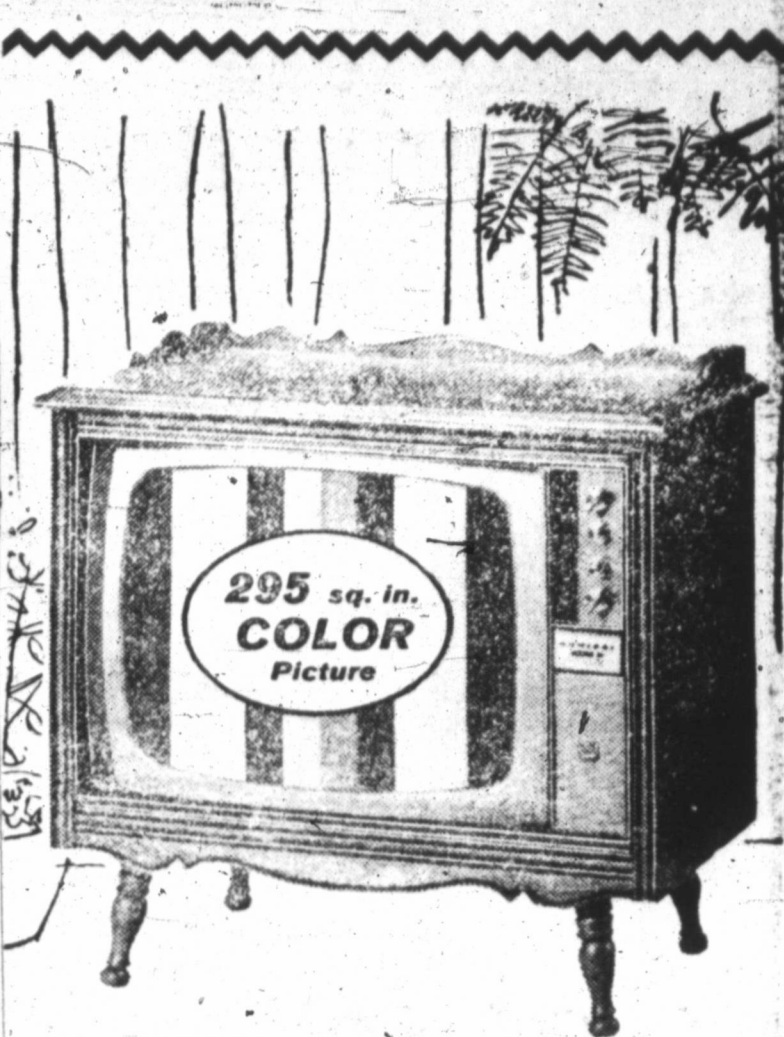
To Be Held

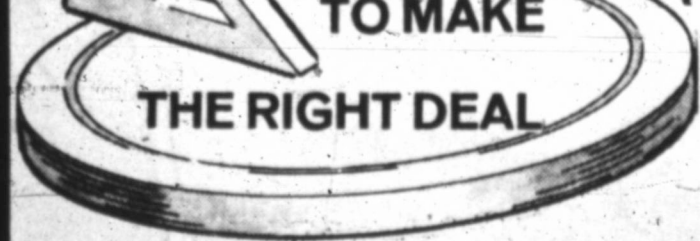
