The amended regulation defines "an official vaccinate as a female bovine animal vaccinated against brucellosis at the age of three through eight months." If the heifer calf is a beef breed on a range or semirange area, she may be vaccinated from three to eleven

The vaccination of heifer calves past the age of eight months is discouraged by the USDA because of the possibility of persistent reactors.

"Producers in Texas counties yet to enter the brucellosis eradication program should continue on this vaccinationprogram," Dr. C. M. Patterson, Texas Agricultural Extension Service veterinarian advises. "Eliminating as much infection as possible will speed up certification when the county enters the eradication program."
