## ASCS Reminds Farmers Of Deadline

August 15, 1967, is the last day to certify and get in compliance on feed grain and cotton, according to Wallace Doye, office manager for the Lynn County ASCS.

"Provided we can get 50% of our farmers to certify, we can start marking payments after August 7, 1967," Doye remarked.

Payments for cotton will represent the unpaid balance of diversion and all of the price support payments to growers who voluntarily signed up and then met applicable provisions of the program On feed grain, payments will be made on price support only.


Cotton diversion payments are figured at 10.78 cents per pound on the projected yield. The price support payments amount to 11.53 cents per pound on the projected yield of the acres planted within the farm's domestic allotment (65% of the effective allotment).

"Please make sure that by August 15, 1967, you have certified to your acres on cotton and feed grain. Make sure that you have not exceeded your permitted acres. Remember, your diverted acres cannot be acres where you have harvested wheat or any other crop. Weeds do not qualify as an acceptable cover on diverted acres," Doye continued.

**Weather Never Normal**



(Editor's note: The Sandhills Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm reacts to some weather experts, his letter this week reveals.)

Dear editor:  
Some practical joker in town, apparently having read in The LYNN COUNTY NEWS last week that I wasn't in the market for tin cans and bottles wrapped in a newspaper and thrown in a ditch by the road near my Johnson grass farm out here, has now left a batch of tin cans and bottles in the same place, with a rolled-up page of a newspaper stuck in each one. He didn't get the point.

Anyway, I pulled the pages out one by one and put them together and found I had a complete newspaper except for the front page, which didn't matter as one day's riots seem about like another's. There are times when the most predictable thing in a paper is the front page.

Speaking of predicting, I found on page 14 of the can-and-bottle-delivered paper (by the way, if the joker who did this will let me know his name, I have a few items I'll be glad to deposit on his front lawn in town to maintain a balance of trade) an item about the weather.

According to it, the odd weather we've had this summer such as unseasonably cool

days and too wet in some places and too dry in others has been blamed by a weather bureau expert on the jet streams, the upper air wind patterns above 10,000 feet.

One jet stream flows from Alaska and northwest Canada over the Great Lakes region and then toward the Northeast. The other comes in from the Gulf of Mexico, crosses the southwest, and turns east over Kansas, he said.

The weather expert went on to say the jet streams explain this summer's weather, but when asked about how to explain the jet streams, he said "We don't know the full answers. They're never normal."

I have thought this over and I believe what he's saying is that he doesn't understand the weather either and that it too is never normal. I get very little satisfaction out of knowing that when I need a rain and it stays dry, the fault lies with a jet stream. This is like always putting the answer one step out of reach.

So far weather experts are like economics experts, they're a lot better at telling you what happened yesterday than what's going to happen tomorrow. You don't find many economics experts getting rich in the stock market or many weather experts getting rich in farming.

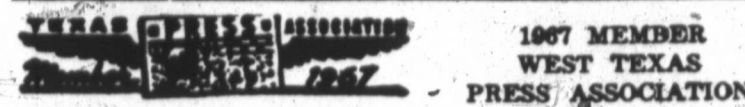

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often fit better with his regular management practices.

The amended regulation defines "an official vaccinee as a female bovine animal vaccinated against brucellosis at the age of three through eight months."

If the heifer calf is a beef breed on a range or semi-range area, she may be vaccinated from three to eleven months.

The vaccination of heifer calves past the age of eight months is discouraged by the USDA because of the possibility of persistent reactors. Producers in Texas counties yet to enter the brucellosis eradication program should continue on this vaccination program," Dr. C. M. Patterson, Texas Agricultural Extension Service veterinarian, advises.

"Eliminating as much infection as possible will speed up certification when the county enters the eradication program."

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**SCS NEWS**

The season for planting improved irrigated pasture grasses is almost over, says Don Reed, Soil Conservation Service technician. August 15th is considered the last date to plant grasses and expect them to

grow to a good stand. Grasses planted after this date may not have time to develop a root system which is capable of storing sufficient food to carry the grass through the winter until next spring. Also, they will not have time to grow to a sufficient height to protect the soil from blowing.

Dryland grasses should not be planted now and be expected to develop a stand that will survive the winter.

People establishing lawns in town can also run into the dangers, says Reed. Lawns planted after August 15th stand a chance of winter damage. Persons wishing to establish grass next year should begin to make plans now so they will be ready to plant next spring. Cotton burs, forshum residues, and other organic material on the land help keep land in condition to plant early. Grass should be planted on a firm seedbed whenever possible.

**Bill Griffin, County Agent Says.....**

The minimum age for calf vaccination against brucellosis has been lowered from four months to three months, according to a United States Department of Agriculture announcement. Research has indicated that acceptable resistance is induced with the strain 19 vaccine on three-month old calves. The early age vaccination also reduces the possibility of calves producing reactors that can confuse the brucellosis test.

The early age vaccination is also expected to help the cattle producer because it will
