Mother, Daughter Signed Up For-SS Benefits At Same RTime

It's a rare occasion when a social security reporesentative signs up a mother and daughter at the same time. Gerald L Schantz, Social Security Representative from the Lubbock office recently had this pleasure with an O'Donnell mother and daughter.

Mrs. Hellon Vaughn who became 94 on July 2nd and her daughter, Miss Effie Vaughn who became 73 on July a6th became eligible for the "special" \$35 monthly benefits in July, 1967. These \$35 payments were

made possible by a change in the Social Security law which provides monthly Social Security payments to persons who couldn't qualify for benefits under the regular work requirements. This "special" paymont is made to anyone who reaches the age of 72 before 1968 and is not eligible for a benefit as high or higher from

some other federal, state or local government retirement program,

Mrs. Hellon Vaughn is one of the oldest persons in Lynn County, residing here since 906 when she and her husband moved from Leon County, Texas to Lynn County. She and George Vaughn were married in Leon County when she was 17 years old. He died in 1958. Her husband never obtained social security coverage because The Peace Corps uses the he was a farmer and retired before farmers were covered

Vaughn has 3 living children, 5 grandchildren, 11 great grandchildren and 6 great-great grandchildren.

Effie was 11 years of age when the family moved to Lynn County. She has been living alone since her mother entered a nursing home in Lamesa about a year ago,

Ordinarily information regarding a person's entitlement to benefits is confidential, but special consent was given to the Social Security Administration so that their experience may encourage others to contact the Social Security office, There may be other persons in Lynn County who are eligible for these benefits.

The representative from Lubbock is in Tahoka at the Courthouse each first and hird Mondays from 9 a.m. until noon to assist anyone who wants to apply. His next trip will be on Monday, September 18th.




He went on to say "Many of our producers for the past few years have found themselves dangerously close to a breakeven situation, and breaking even for three years in a row is equal to going broke."
