South Plains Fair Will Be Filmed For Documentary

LUBBOCK - Portions of the 50th annual Panhandle South Plains Fair and the featured Eddy Arnold all-star show will be filmed for use in a documentary on country music, according to an announcement by R. E. (Bob) Gee, president of the fair association.

The documentary, to be narrated by the television and recording star, will be televised nationwide at 9 p.m. on Feb. 9, 1968, according to Chet Hagan, producer-director of NBC News, a division of the National Broadcasting Co. Inc., New York City.

The country music documentary will be an hour-long special. Appropriately, the new honor will come as the fair celebrates its golden anniversary which officials hope will attract record attendance.

Arnold, "The Kids Next Door," who appeared here last year as the Young American Singers, and ventriloquist Jimmy Nelson, will be appearing twice daily in Fair Park Coliseum throughout the weeklong fair run.

Tickets for 13 p.m. matinees are priced at \$1.50, \$2, \$2.50 and \$3 and children 12 years and under will be admitted for one-half price. Tickets for the evening performance, slated at 7:30 p.m., are priced at \$2, \$2.50, \$3 and \$3.50. All tickets purchased prior to the fair opening will be accompanied by free gate admission passes.

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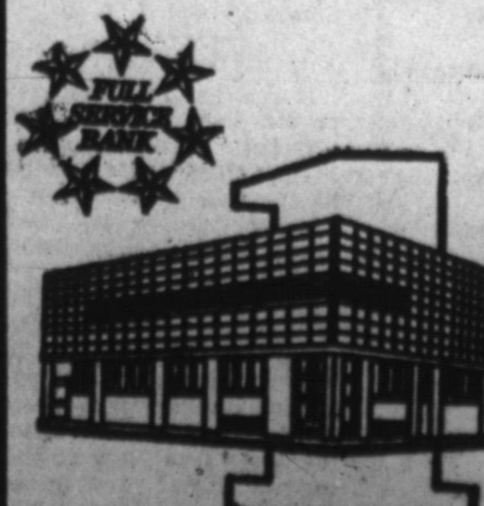

The Bulldogs and a nine-yard loss while trying to pick up a first with a pass while facing long yardage.

Taking over on their own 13 after the first punt of the night, Lorenzo put together perhaps their best offensive drive of the game, to start the second quarter, advancing to the Bulldog 15 yard line mainly on the basis of a 44-yard run by Halfback George DeLeon, the long est offensive effort for the Hornets.

With a first down from the Bulldog 15, Tahoka defenders closed all gaps, stopping two running plays cold, one for a two-yard loss, then covering receivers on two pass attempts to take over on downs at their own 17.

After a short running gain, a penalty pushed Tahoka back to the 11, but the next play produced a score on perhaps the single most outstanding offensive play of the game.

Facing second down and 16 yards for a first, Schneider took the patented Bulldog pitchout to begin a sweep around his right end, cleared the line in quick strides, cut back to the left, dodged several members of the Hornet secondary and then ran away from all remaining defenders, "faking the britches" of the Hornet safetyman and racing in for the score.

Capping the 89-yard scoring run was Thomas' kick for the extra point to move the score 28-0 with 7:17 left in the half. Minutes later, Mike McDonald grabbed a Lorenzofumble at the Hornet 49 to return the ball to the Bulldogs.

A 49-yard pass completion from Quarterback Charlie Brown to Thomas on the first play appeared to produce another tally for the Bulldogs, but was nullified by a clipping penalty downfield.

Moved back to the Hornet 35 from the point of the foul, a wild fumble exchange occurred, Brown losing the ball to the Hornet's Tommy Morrison and then taking it back via a Lorenzo fumble on the next play.

Neither team could produce a score throughout the remainder of the half, further highlights being Tyler's second leaping interception and a 28-yard run from Thomas.

Lorenzo failed to earn a first down after taking the second half's kickoff, turning over the ball to Tahoka's first string offense for their only series of downs for the remainder of the game, the Bulldogs advancing to the Hornet 24 where Thomas tried a field goal which was wide to the left.

Only other third quarter highlights were fumble recoveries, one by Schneider and another by Richard White which set up the first Bulldog touchdown of the fourth quarter.

Taking possession on the recovery at the Hornet 12, Sophomore Quarterback Martin Warren directed his crew in for a score three plays later just as the final quarter began, halfback Tim Walker over for two yards and the score. Point after kick by Schneider failed, leaving the score at 34-0 with 11:21 on the clock.

One play after the kickoff, Billy Curry snatched his second Hornet fumble of the night, again stopping a Lorenzo chance at a sustained drive.

Scoring in the tilt was concluded at the 1:45 point of the fourth stanza with halfback Doug Taylor smashing a yard for the score to cap a 34-yard drive, all on the ground, with gainers by Walker, McDonald and Taylor eating up the yardage. Jimmy McCord's extra point kick was wide to end the scoring at 40-0.

Rushing yardage honors for the game went jointly to the "Dangerous Duo," Thomas and Schneider, each totaling 156 yards. Schneider got his yardage on nine carries including the 89-yarder, while Thomas was the "workhorse" of the Tahoka backfield with 14 carries. Over 140 yards of each back's yardage came in the first half, neither seeing offensive action after the first series of downs in the third quarter.

Number three man on the rushing list was Tim Walker with 38 yards on 12 carries, followed by Arnold with 19 on four, and McDonald with 15 on six.

For Lorenzo, George DeLeon tallied 65 yards on nine carries followed by Kelly Hurst with 43 on four.

Mustangs Beaten By Ralls, 33-14 Three 5-A Teams

Wilson's Mustangs were downed Friday night in their first game of the season, 33-14, by the Class A Ralls Jackrabbits in a tilt played at Wilson.

Although falling far behind, 21-0 in the first half, the Mustangs came alive in the final half, outscoring their opponents by two extra points in the last two quarters.

An 11-yard run by Ralls Halfback Bobby Binder, plus runs of 22 yards by Fullback Danny Johnson and three yards by Quarterback Mark Wideman accounted for the three Ralls first half touchdowns. Larry Bates kicked the extra point after each.

Wideman added a two-yard score in the third quarter and Bruce Johnson raced 70 yards

to in the fourth to end the Ralls scoring.

Wilson countered the two second half Jackrabbit scores with touchdown passes from Quarterback Johnny Scott to Gary Moore for 25 yards and to Gary Crews for 19 yards.

A pass from Scott to Moore added the two extra points on the first touchdown, but a kick failed after the second score.

Coach Bob Davis stated that he was "fairly well pleased with the second half of the game," naming Leland Zant, Lenro Brieger and Delton Moore as standout defensive layers for the Mustangs in the tilt.

Wilson travels to Jayton Friday night for their second game of the year, meeting the Jaybirds at 8 p.m.

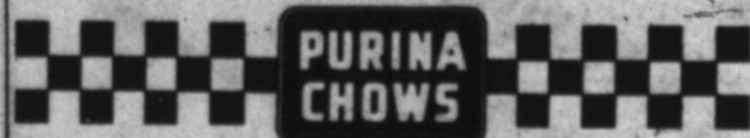

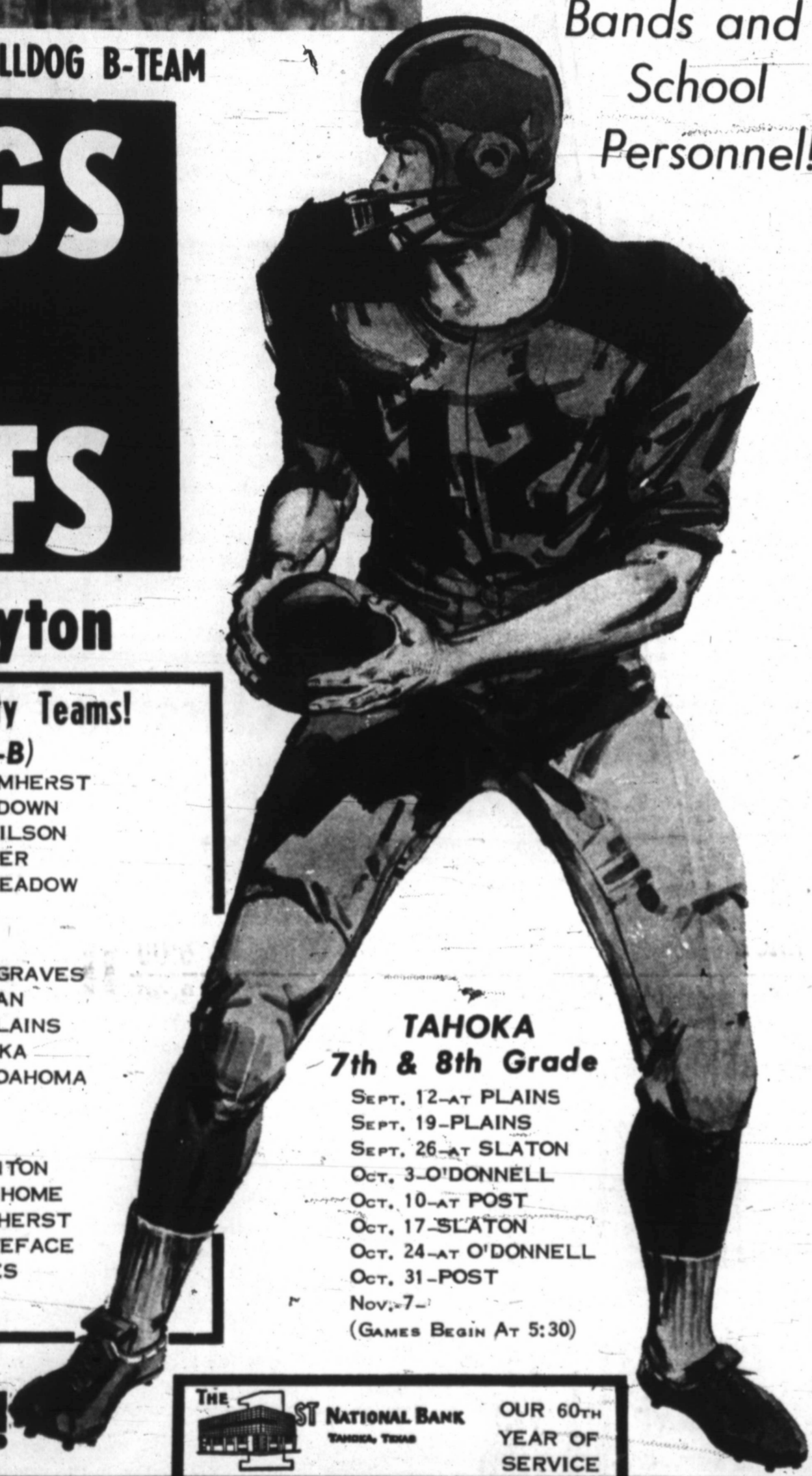

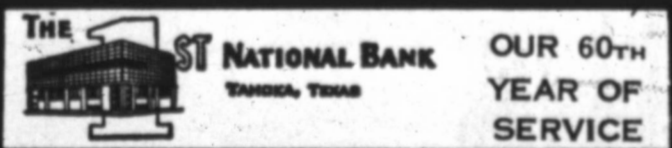

Leopards Drop Opener, 28-12

New Home's Leopards dropped their first tilt of the 1967 season to the Class A New Deal Lions, 28-12, but scored first in the tilt held at New Home. The score came after a scoreless first quarter with Junior Fullback Stanley Gill racing 66 yards for the tally. Try for extra points failed.

New Deal countered the touchdown just before the half, as Fullback Kelly Sherman smashed over from the one, also booting the extra point, to give the Lions a 7-6 intermission bulge. The New Deal squad came

back to tally twice in the third quarter. Quarterback Wayne Price going seven yards and six yards for the touchdowns and Sherman kicking one of the extra points to give the Lions a 20-6 advantage.

A four-yard run by Gill early in the fourth quarter brought the Leopards to within eight points, 12-20, but Sherman added another touchdown later in the quarter on an eight yard run, to put the game out of reach.

This Friday night's foe for the Leopards is Nazareth. The game will begin in New Home at 8 p.m.



"Cotton producer income must be increased, not decreased, in whatever cotton program is finally decided on for 1968, because any other course would strike down the very foundation of the industry-- the man who plants the seed."

This is a quote from a statement made at a USDA called "shirteevee" cotton meeting in Lubbock August 28 by Donald A. Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

An increase in the income of cotton growers was one of four major objectives listed by Johnson as musts for next year. He said that unless producer income is protected, any discussion of cotton programs after 1968 might be purely academic for many farmers.

The other three objectives were set forth as (1) a carry-over of cotton on August 1, 1968 no larger than seven million bales, (2) an adequate supply of cotton to meet both domestic and export requirements and (3) cotton exports above 5 million bales.

USDA officials attending the meeting were Joe Moss, Director, Cotton Policy Staff, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service; Charles Bragg, Cotton Program Specialist, Farmer Program Division, and F. W. Blease, Director of the ASCS South-Central Division. Referring to his four objec-

tives, Johnson told USDA he hoped they would come to realize "that for many producers, ginners, and many, many others whose livelihood stems from COTTON TALKS, PG. 7

Cotton Crop Estimate Is Up Slightly

The September 1 estimate of the 1967 High Plains cotton crop, jointly compiled by the Lubbock Cotton Exchange and Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., came out to 1,175,000 bales, up only 1,500 from the August 1 estimate.

Standing acreage in the estimate declined from 1,250,000 on August 1 to 1,238,000. Estimates were increased by from 500 to 2,000 bales in Bailey, Crosby, Floyd, Castro and Hale counties for a combined increase of 6,500 bales. But these increases were almost cancelled out by Howard County where lack of moisture to advance early prospects dropped the estimate down to 10,000 bales, one-third below the August 1 guess of 15,000.

Much of the Plains crop is late planted cotton and both the quantity and quality of the crop this year is greatly dependent on temperatures and rainfall for the remainder of the season and on the frost date.

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Mother, Daughter Signed Up For SS Benefits At Same Time

It's a rare occasion when a social security representative signs up a mother and daughter at the same time, Gerald L. Schantz, Social Security Representative from the Lubbock office recently had this pleasure with an O'Donnell mother and daughter.

Mrs. Helion Vaughn who became 94 on July 2nd and her daughter, Miss Effie Vaughn who became 73 on July 6th became eligible for the "special" \$35 monthly benefits in July, 1967.

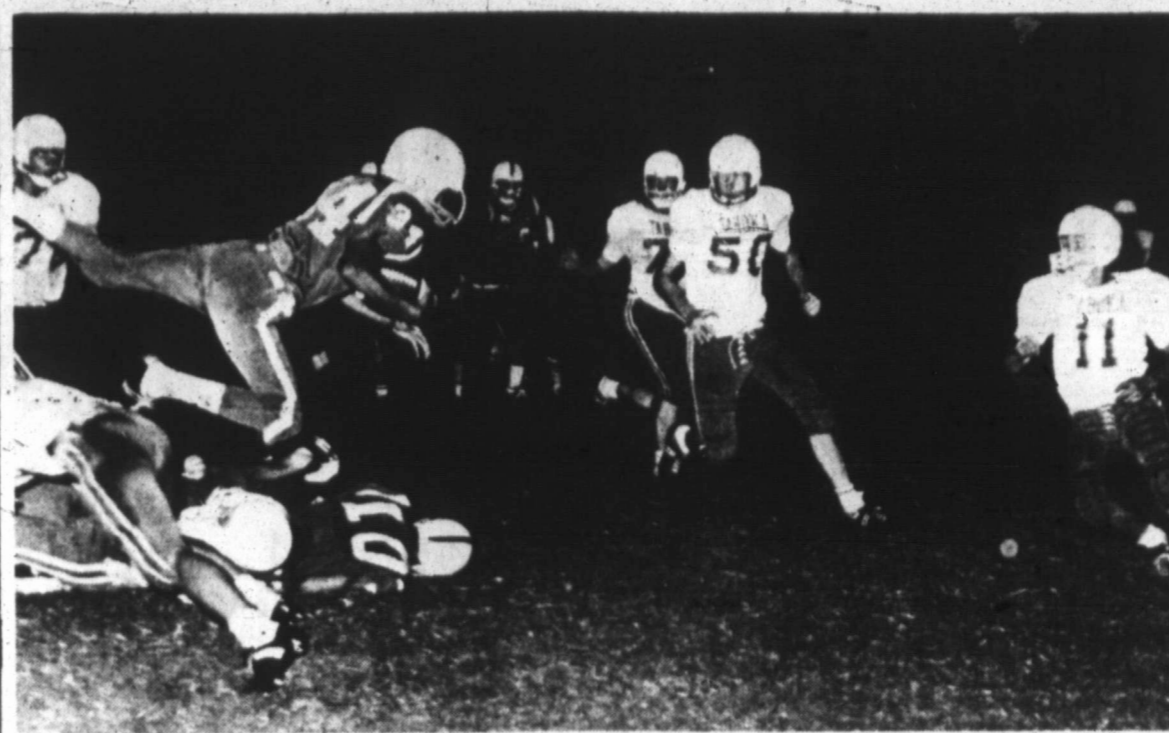
These \$35 payments were made possible by a change in the Social Security law which provides monthly Social Security payments to persons who couldn't qualify for benefits under the regular work requirements. This "special" payment is made to anyone who reaches the age of 72 before 1968 and is not eligible for a benefit as high or higher from some other federal, state or local government retirement program.

Mrs. Helion Vaughn is one of the oldest persons in Lynn County, residing here since 1906 when she and her husband moved from Leon County, Texas to Lynn County. She and George Vaughn were married in Leon County when she was 17 years old. He died in 1958. Her husband never obtained social security coverage because he was a farmer and retired before farmers were covered under the law in 1955. Mrs. Vaughn has 3 living children, 5 grandchildren, 11 great grandchildren and 6 great-great grandchildren.

Effie was 11 years of age when the family moved to Lynn County. She has been living alone since her mother entered a nursing home in Lamesa about a year ago.

Ordinarily information regarding a person's entitlement to benefits is confidential, but special consent was given to the Social Security Administration so that their experience may encourage others to contact the Social Security office. There may be other persons in Lynn County who are eligible for these benefits.

The representative from Lubbock is in Tahoka at the Courthouse each first and third Mondays from 9 a.m. until noon to assist anyone who wants to apply. His next trip will be on Monday, September 18th.

ences in school systems here and there.

Beginning by saying, "This is a day of mixed emotions all over the world," Mrs. Long later gave examples of differences in Austrian and U. S. schools.

According to the speaker, children there usually begin public school at the age of six, but have from September until December to reach the required age with grades one through four as primary grades. At the end of the fourth grade, the children are given an exam which determines their future schooling and their lives.

Students not passing go to the "peoples' school" and learn a trade while those passing the exam go on to a middle school, high school and the university, all based strictly on ability.

Noting that universities there are "very good", Mrs. Long added that university students are not absolutely required to attend classes, receiving their study assignments on days of exams, but she noted that it was "better" if they attended the classes.

As a first grade example, Mrs. Long noted that stud-

ents must be at school at 8 p.m. with no public school busses to transport them there. When they arrive, students remove their coats and shoes and put on house shoes, making it quieter and saving on shoe wear.

She continued by adding that students are not allowed to leave the room for drinks of water, but at 10 a.m. there is a snack time consisting of whatever the student has brought home plus milk which the parents have previously paid for, classes dismissing at 1 p.m. or sometimes even as early as 11 p.m. Separate classes are usually maintained for boys and girls.

Children have the same teacher from first through fourth grades, studying basically the same as children here, plus religious classes, with one to two hours homework per day for first graders. Austrian children also learn to use pens and write in script, with no ruled paper for them to depend upon.

She also noted that children may begin government provided kindergarten between the age of two and three, the classes provided mainly because so many mothers work at outside jobs, older children allowed to go there after their school to study until their parents return from work.

Speaking briefly about Ireland schools, Mrs. Long noted that students may start there between the ages of four and five, that the superintendent is called the "headmaster" and that classes are very large. Girls and boys all wear uniforms, there are religious classes and foreign languages which begin in the fifth grade.

cotton, there will be no tomorrow so far as cotton is concerned unless these goals are reached in 1968."

He went on to say "Many of our producers for the past few years have found themselves dangerously close to a breaking even situation, and breaking even for three years in a row is equal to going broke."

In his concluding remarks, Johnson said he thought it would be unwise to decide on changes in the 1968 program until final figures are available on the makeup of this year's carry over and until a better estimate can be made of production from the 1967 crop.

"But, if an increase in production is needed, we would like to see the penalties removed from strip-row planting. We have farmers who are using this legitimate production tool before there was a government cotton program, and we do not feel they should be penalized for using it now."

"This move," he continued, "would increase cotton production, it would improve the quality of the cotton produced, and it would do both with only a small additional cost to the government."

As a result of Farm Bureau's 1965 and 1966 European Tours, markets have been opened for such Texas products as fresh beef, grapefruit, turkeys, feed grains, carrots, pecans and onions.

Ann Davis, CHDA Says:

You can increase consumer competence and save money and trouble. Dr. Melvin D. Small of Georgetown Medical School in Washington, D. C., suggested the following in a recent Senate hearing. 1) Encourage your doctor to prescribe drugs by their generic (chemical) name rather than by brand name. It may be 3,000 percent cheaper and yield exactly the same product. 2) Ask your doctor to write the word "label" after the word "Sig." This will order the druggist to put the generic name on the label of the container you get. 3) If you have time, shop around for the best price. An American Medical Association survey in Chicago recently showed that a drug by one brand name may be as much as 1,200 percent more expensive than by another brand name. 4) Consult a doctor before you invest in vitamins or minerals. He may be able to save you money and some possible bad reactions from excesses of certain vitamins and minerals.
