# Banks Reflect Gains Over Last Year

bank deposits in Lynn County are at what is thought to be an "all-time high" for this time of year according to reports of condition prepared by all three county banks as of October 4.

According to the quarterly reports from the First National Bank of Tahoka, Wilson State Bank and First National Bank of O'Donnell, total county bank deposits stood at \$16,518,923.75 on the call date, up almost three million dollars from the respective 1966 report.

Last year, call for the third quarter report came on September 20, county bank de-

posits at that time standing at \$13,640,100.65.

According to officers at all three of the banks, major reason for the deposit increase now reflected is due to early government subsidy payments on cotton and feed grain.

Many county farmers received their subsidy payments as early as August this year while last year, the payments ran as late as October and November.

Largest gain over last year is reflected at the First National Bank of Tahoka which shows a total deposit figure of \$10,439,759.50 as of the call date, up almost \$1,800,000 from last year's \$8,645,725.81.

Loans at the Tahoka bank are also up over \$500,000 to a \$5,118,845.57 mark. Total assets now stand at \$11,431,557.72 compared to \$9,743,049.17.

Wilson State Bank shows a gain of over \$650,000 to a present deposit total of \$4,021,625.79, compared to a \$3,357,916.02 figure a year ago.

Wilson loans are down slightly to a \$2,661,422.55 figure from \$2,962,266.39, but total assets are up, now standing at \$4,473,692.81. Last year's total at this time of year was \$3,808,744.24.

At O'Donnell, the First National Bank is up \$421,000 in deposits to a \$2,057,538.46 total. Last year's figure was \$1,636,458.82.

Loans are also down at O'Donnell, from \$1,106,653.37 to the present \$725,750.16. Total assets show a healthy gain to a mark of \$2,481,446.95 compared to last year's \$2,015,163.94.

# Local School Enrollment Continues Upward Trend

Enrollment continues to climb slightly at local schools, according to a report heard last Thursday at the regular monthly meeting of the Tahoka School Board.

According to the report, enrollment in all twelve grades and special school as of October 12, stood at a 1,137 figure, up 32 from the corresponding report last year.

Last year, on October 7, there were 1,105 pupils enrolled at the schools.

Due to a reorganization at the school since last year, which moved the sixth grade into junior high and swapped another grade from one elementary building to the other, it is difficult to pinpoint the increase exactly, although the majority is definitely in grades 1-8.

Twenty-nine more students (895 instead of 866) are presently enrolled in the first 8 grades and the major part of that increase is probably to be found in the primary grades.

High school enrollment now is at 234, only four more than the October report last year. And, although the high school figure is over the 225 breaking point between A and AA classification, school officials noted that a school's average membership must hold at over the 225 for two consecutive years before changes in classification are made. With this in mind, THS would have to hold over the cutoff figure in both 1967-68 and 1968-69 school years to change classification and, in terms of a year's average, may yet be below the 225 mark by May of this year.

According to the current report, 352 students are enrolled in South Elementary, 257 in North Elementary, 286 in Junior High, 234 in high school and eight in the special school.

In other action, the board approved the sale of a 1959, 48-passenger Chevrolet school bus which will be sold at public auction October 28, at 10 a.m. at the bus parking lot.

Also approved was permission for the school attorney to file suits on certain delinquent tax cases.

In addition to okaying several reports, the board also amended the travel allowance policy of the school district to provide 10c per mile rather than 8c for reimbursement for travel where personal automobiles are used for school business.

# Questions Answered About November 11 Hospital Election

Since the announcement last week of the election November 11 to decide whether or not to form a Lynn County Hospital District and vote a \$305,000 bond issue to build a hospital, several questions needing additional clarification have been asked.

In an attempt to see that all qualified voters are fully informed as to all aspects of the proposed hospital and district, the Lynn County News interviewed Garland Thornton, president of the temporary Board of Directors of the Lynn County Hospital District.

Printed below are explanations of various factors concerning the hospital election as compiled by Thornton, the hospital district board and the News staff. Each question is in bold face type with the answer immediately following.

\*\*\*\*\*

**How do you determine how much in hospital district taxes an individual will pay if the district and bond issue is approved?**

Hospital district taxes will be based on present Lynn County assessed property values. Studies in detail show that a 35c tax rate per \$100 assessed valuation, based on the county tax roll, would be sufficient to build and maintain the hospital.

So, a person should examine his county tax statement which was mailed the first week in October, determine the ASSESSED value of his property and then apply the 35c per \$100 rate.

For example, a home with an actual value of \$15,000 would be listed on the tax roll with an assessed value of \$8,000 (20 percent of the actual value determines the assessed value).

Diying \$3,000 by \$100, then multiplying that figure (30) by 35c gives the yearly cost in taxes which would be \$10.50. This formula will work in all cases once the assessed value is determined from the tax statement.

**What doctors would be allowed to practice at the hospital when it is opened?**

Any properly licensed physician may become a member of the hospital's staff and may use the hospital facilities if so desired.

This would apply even to doctors who would come here. SEE HOSPITAL PG. 6

When the registration slips are filled out, they may be mailed to McCracken's office in Tahoka, or may be brought in person. "The important thing says McCracken, "is that everyone register so he will have a vote."

Farm trailer tags have also been distributed throughout the county. Places these may be obtained are New Home Co-op Gin, Wilson Co-op Gin, Moore Insurance Agency in O'Donnell, Grassland Butane, and C & W Auto Supply in Tahoka, as well as at the Tax Office.

## '68 Cotton Program

Essentials of the 1968 cotton program, as announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture October 11, are these:

1. National allotment of 16.1 million acres (same as in 1967);
2. Domestic allotment at 65 per cent of total allotment (same as in 1967);
3. Price support loan at 20.25 cents per pound, basis middling inch (same as 1967);
4. Price support payment of 12.24 cents per pound (compared to 11.53 cents this year);
5. Mandatory diversion of five per cent of allotments (12.5 per cent in 1967), with a payment of 10.76 cents per pound, times projected yield (10.78 cent payment in 1967);
6. Option to voluntarily divert an additional 30 per cent with a payment of six cents per pound times projected yield (compared to 10.78 cents in 1967), and
7. Skip-row rules as they were in the years 1962-65, permitting two in, one out and two in, two out plantings without penalty.

Other major program provisions remain the same as this year.

After a "scary" start which saw a 90-yard Kress touchdown on the opening kickoff, Friday the 13th turned out lucky for the Tahoka Bulldogs as they racked up victory number five by bombing the Kangaroos, 40-22.

But, it was late in the second quarter before Tahoka could take control of the game, down 10-7 at the close of the first stanza following a Kress field goal.

Scoring twice in the last five minutes of the second quarter, on an 84-yard punt return by John Tyler, and then adding another TD early in the third stanza, the Bulldogs ran the score to 27-10 before a final quarter which saw each team put two markers on the scoreboard.

Figuratively speaking, the game was somewhat of a "field day" for long kickoff and punt returns, Tahoka picking up 194 yards, including the 84-yard touchdown, on five returns, while Kress traveled 167 steps on the same number of returns, including the 90-yard tally which opened the game.

With only 14 seconds gone from the scoreboard, the machine read 6-0 in favor of the Kangaroos after Kenneth Sjogren hauled in the kickoff which started the game and proceeded "straight up the middle" to the Bulldog end zone, traveling the 90-yard seemingly "untouched." Phil Bohner kicked the extra point.

Stunned somewhat by the swiftness of Kress' first touchdown, Tahoka's initial possession of the game failed to produce a first down, but their second chance added a touchdown in only three plays.

Starting from their own 41-yard line, after receiving a five-yard penalty, the Bulldogs tested the left side of the Kress defensive line twice for a total of 13 yards, then sent Cliff Thomas on a sweep to the opposite side.

With Doyle Schneider providing the one necessary block, Thomas raced the remaining 46 yards to paydirt without a hand laid on him. His kick was good and tied the score at 7-all with 6:40 remaining in the first quarter.

Starting from their own 28 after the kick and a short return, Kress added their second "shock" of the game on their first play with Charles Harris passing to Joe Reed at the Tahoka 45, Reed traveling

on to the Bulldog 23 yard line before finally being hauled down after a 49-yard pickup.

Moving to the Tahoka 17 on the next two plays, the Kangaroos' third down effort produced one of the game's most spectacular plays.

Rolling to the right on a sweep, Harris was met by on-rushing Bulldog defenders and pitched back to Bohner who bobbed the ball, allowing Chris Roberts, Tahoka defensive half-back, to race between the two Kangaroos, grabbing the pigskin in mid-air.

With a clear field in front of him, Roberts sped 80 yards for an apparent touchdown, only to have the play called back and five yards paced off against Tahoka for offsides.

Besides wiping out the scoring play, the penalty gave Kress a first down from the Bulldog 12.

Harris' pass on first down was incomplete, a running play was stopped cold by Jody Edwards and Larry Arnold and a third down play picked up only four yards, to force the Kangaroos to settle for a field goal.

With the line of scrimmage at the Tahoka eight, setdown point for the attempt was the 12-yard line, Bohner's kick barely edging Kress a 10-7 lead with 3:30 remaining in the quarter.

Starting from their own 33 after a 25-yard kickoff return by Tyler, the Bulldogs marched to within six yards of the Kress goal line on the next series, paced by Schneider who contributed efforts of five, seven, 15 and 20 yards.

With first down from the six, Thomas had four of the remaining yards before a Kress defender jarred the ball loose on the tackle, Roosevelt Jackson covering the fumble at the Kangaroos two-yard line to put the lid on the drive.

After allowing Kress one chance just as the second quarter opened, the Bulldogs took control of the game with a 55-yard march for their go-ahead touchdown, never to trail again in the tilt.

On second down from the Tahoka 40, Thomas sliced into Kangaroo country for 40 yards, breaking at least three tackles before finally being hauled down.

Seconds later, Schneider added the touchdown on a sweep around right end from slightly less than three yards away with Thomas clearing the last two defenders from his team mate's path. The kick split the uprights to make it 14-10 with 4:56 left in the first half.

After grinding out two first downs, Kress was halted by the determined Bulldog defense play shy of the mid-field stripe, setting up a punting situation.

Hauling in the pigskin at his own 16-yard line, Tyler avenged the Bulldogs' opening kickoff humiliation in equal style, racing 84 yards down the east sidelines for a quick touchdown.

On the play, Tyler first had to evade several Kress defenders who appeared to have him bottled up at about the Tahoka 20, then broke free to find a clear passage down the sidelines. Apparently being overwhelmed by a speedy Kangaroo, Thomas again applied a crucial block, taking out the defender just before he ran up on Tyler. His extra point kick split the uprights to close out the first half scoring at 21-10 with 2:39 left.

Opening the second half where they left off, the Bulldogs scored on their first possession, marching 36 yards in seven

plays after a 28-yard Tyler kickoff return.

Schneider added the touchdown on a 19-yard gallop through a gaping hole in the left side of the Bulldog line cleared by Jody Edwards and Richard White. A kick attempt for the extra point was fumbled and failed to get off the ground, leaving the tally at 27-10 with 8:37 left in the quarter.

Except for a fumble recovery by Thomas at the Kress 21, the remainder of the third quarter was somewhat "tame", when compared to the rest of the game. Despite the good field position after the fumble, the drive fizzled at the Kress 12, the Kangaroos taking over on downs.

After taking over, the Kangaroos mounted an 88-yard scoring drive which carried over into the fourth quarter, traveling the distance in 19 plays with Harris crashing over from two yards away to add the touchdown. The kick attempt was fumbled, leaving the tally at 27-16 with 9:24 remaining.

Bouncing back to swap touchdowns with the Kangaroos, Tahoka scored on their first possession after the kickoff, starting from the Bulldog 32.

Beginning the drive with ten yard efforts from Thomas and Charlie Brown, big play in the march was a 23-yard pickup on a pass from Tyler to Thomas carrying to the Kress 19. After three plays, the Bulldogs still needed five yards for a first, but the fourth down try produced 14 yards and the touchdown as Tyler faked a pitch-out, keeping instead of sweep right end for the tally. Thomas' kick was true, leaving the score at 34-16 with six minutes to play.

Continuing the "swapout" pattern, Kress rebounded to score again following the kickoff, traveling 69 yards in four plays as Harris edged over from less than a yard out for the six-pointed which made it 34-22 after a run failed to net the extra points. Time remaining was 4:36.

Setting up the tally was a 14-yard pass from Harris to Kenneth Sjogren, a 17-yard run by Gary Morgan and a 38-yard effort from Sjogren.

Taking possession from their 31 after the kick, the Bulldogs drove to one yard shy of mid-field before being stopped, forcing a punt from Thomas which rolled into the Kress end zone. With the touchback to the 20 and time running out, Kress first tried a reverse which went for only a yard due to the efforts of Joel Inklebarger, Gary Brooks and Charlie Brown, then went to the airways with disastrous results.

Harris sailed a short pass towards the east sidelines on his first attempt, only to have Thomas break in front of the intended receiver, snatching the ball from the Kress players outstretched arms and then fighting into the end zone for 25 yards and the touchdown, leaving a string of broken tackles behind him. Thomas' kick was wide, scoring in the game finally at an end with 1:11 to play.

Kress fumbled on the ensuing kickoff, Gregg Thomas grabbing the ball at the Kangaroo 28 to put the lid on the game. Cliff Thomas led the Bulldog rushers for the game, picking up 149 yards on 17 carries, followed by Doyle Schneider with 87 yards on 10 totes and John Tyler with 45 yards on eight rushes. Tyler added an additional 194 yards on four kickoff returns and a punt return.

Pacing Kress was Kenneth Sjogren with 92 steps on 12 carries, Phil Bohner with 53 on 12, and James Jackson with 41 on 11.

Reserve halfback Doug Taylor, a Tahoka junior received a knee injury in the tilt and may be lost for the year.

Commenting on the game, Head Coach Jerry Taylor said, "We were real pleased with overall team effort, especially when the Bulldogs fought back to go ahead after getting behind. I was proud of our offense and offensive blocking seemed to pickup both from the line of scrimmage and on punt and kickoff returns."

#### AN ORDER FOR HOSPITAL DISTRICT AND BOND ELECTION

WHEREAS, the law providing for proceedings to create and establish the LYNN COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT provides the Temporary Board of Directors may call an election on the proposition of whether the District shall be created and established and this Board now deems it necessary and advisable to call an election for the creation of the LYNN COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT and the levy of a tax as hereinafter provided, and

WHEREAS, this Board has determined that a separate proposition should be submitted at the aforesaid election as to whether the Board of Directors of the District, in the event the same is created, should be authorized to issue bonds for the purposes hereinafter specified, therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE TEMPORARY BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF LYNN COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT:

THAT an election be held on the 11th day of November, 1967, which date is not less than thirty-five (35) nor more than sixty (60) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpayers electors of the proposed District, who own taxable property in said proposed District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

**PROPOSITION NUMBER ONE**  
"SHALL THE LYNN COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT (with boundaries co-extensive with the boundaries of Lynn County, Texas) be created and established with authority to levy annual taxes at a rate not to exceed SEVENTY-FIVE CENTS (75¢) on the one hundred dollars' valuation of taxable property in said District for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the District's bonds, and its maintenance and operation expenses?"

**PROPOSITION NUMBER TWO**  
"SHALL the Board of Directors of LYNN COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT (in the event same is created) be authorized to issue THREE HUNDRED SIXTY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$365,000) of bonds, to become due and payable serially or otherwise in such installments as may be fixed by the Board of Directors of said District, but not to exceed TWENTY-FIVE (25) YEARS from the date thereof; and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed SIX PER CENTUM (6%) per annum, payable annually, or semi-annually, for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements, and equipping the same for hospital purposes; and for any or all of these purposes; and shall there be annually levied and collected on all taxable property in said District for the current year and each year thereafter, while said bonds or any of them or any interest thereon are outstanding, a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal thereof at maturity, within the taxing limits authorized under Proposition Number One above?"

THAT SAID ELECTION shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 9, Article IX of the Constitution and the Act providing for the creation of the LYNN COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT and all persons who are qualified property taxpayers electors of the area of the proposed Hospital District, who own taxable property in said proposed District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

THE CREATION OF LYNN COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT PROVIDING FOR THE LEVY OF A TAX NOT TO EXCEED 75¢ ON THE \$100 VALUATION

**PROPOSITION NUMBER TWO**  
THE ISSUANCE OF \$365,000 BONDS

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear to the left of each proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST" and each voter shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

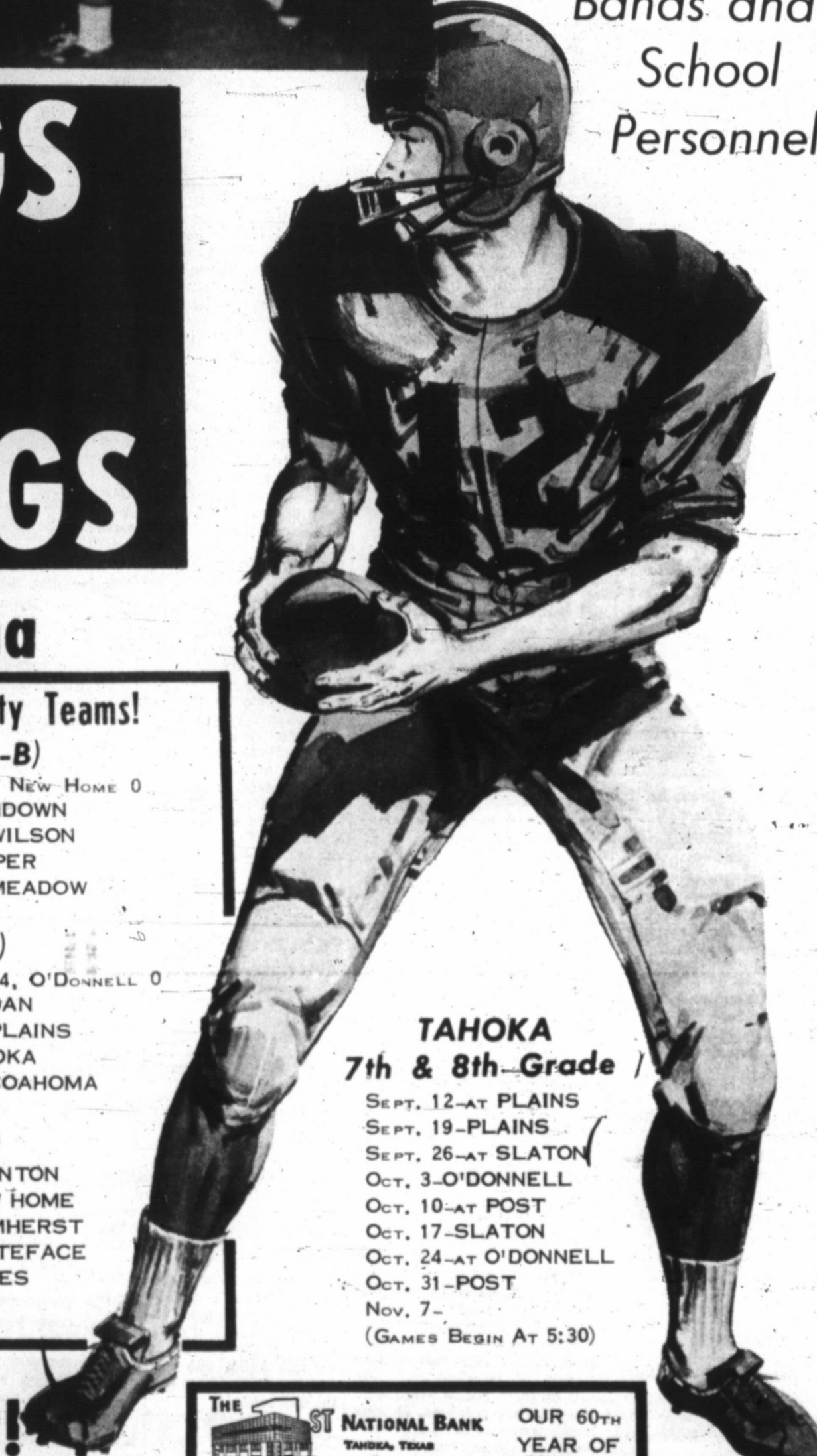

QUALITY CARPET  
A rug for a heavy traffic area of your home should be thick with dense construction, whether the pile is cut or uncut. Press your fingers down in the pile. Does it spring back in place when you release the pressure?

The amount of yarn in close-ness of weaving, tufting or knitting and the type and quality of the yard affect the resilience of the pile.

To judge compactness of construction, bend the corner of the rug back diagonally on the top side, if the pile is skimpily and loosely constructed, you will see the backing. This indicates poor quality. Pile of good quality in heavy-duty carpet stands erect and is sufficiently dense to hide the backing.

Resilient floor coverings may be made of asphalt, linoleum, rubber, cork, vinyl asbestos and vinyl cork. They differ in cost, ease of maintenance, resilience, resistance to wear, resistance to soil and grease, quietness, comfort under foot, ease of cleaning and place of use. Each material is also available in a variety of colors, textures, patterns and shapes.

Since there is such a wide variety of resilient floor coverings from which to choose, be familiar with the characteristics of each to determine which is best for your particular use. For more information, contact your county Extension office during Consumer Education Week, November 6-10.

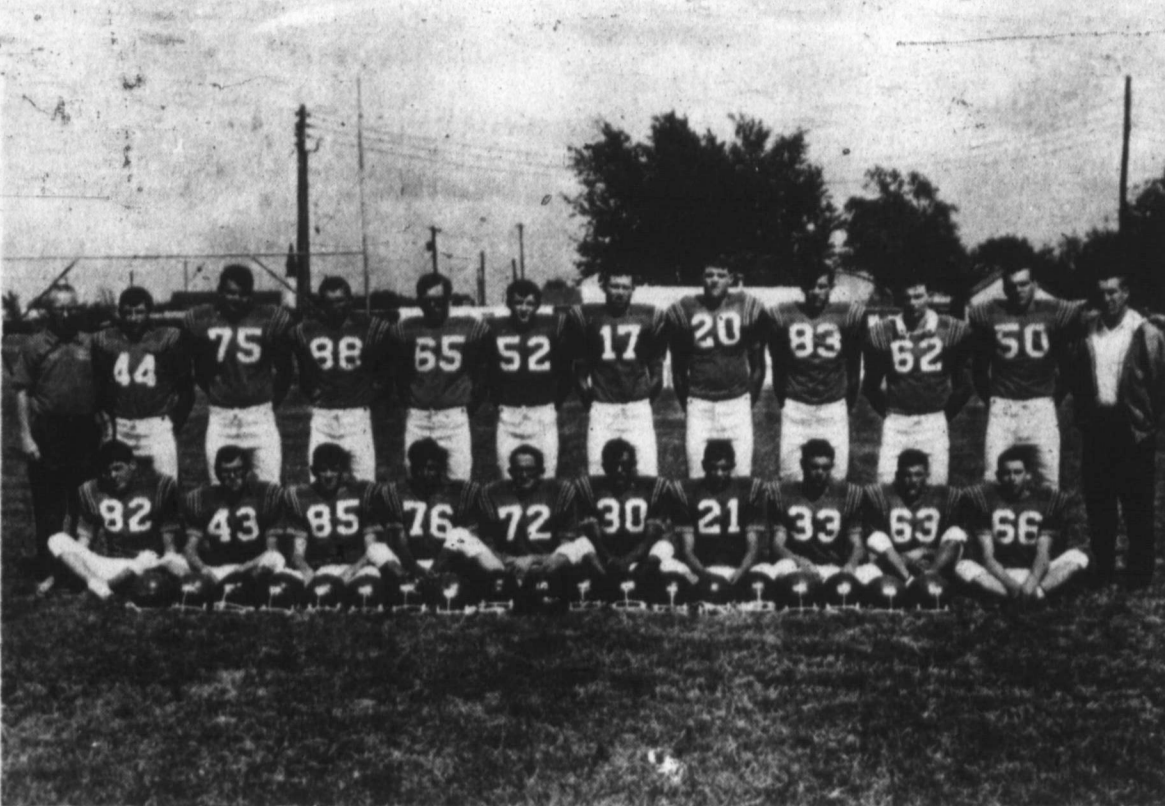

### Carmack Tells Of Recent Farm Trip To Russia

Some impressions of Soviet Russia were given by C. G. (Condy) Carmack Wednesday night of last week at the monthly meeting of Methodist Men, attended by 41 members and guests.

Carmack was recently a member of a 32-person delegation from the U. S. visiting that country.

He was highly impressed by the progress being made in Russia, but said many of the ways of life are somewhat shocking to people reared in America under Christian influence and the democratic way.


People in the cities seem sober and unhappy, but the further one gets from Moscow and into the rural areas, the friendlier and more carefree the people seem to be. But still, the people have little conception of real freedom and life seems to be very monotonous.

In spite of the regimented life, he thinks the Soviet Union is undergoing changes a bit toward our ways in spite of the domination of Communism. He doubts that the Soviets want a nuclear war because their few major centers could be wiped out quickly in retaliation.

In making comparisons, Carmack said he was led to wonder what is happening to many of our own ways, our morality and religion. This Communist country seems to be moving toward Capitalism, while our nation is moving toward more regimentation and more centralization of power.
