'68 Cotton Program

Essentials of the 1968 cotton program, as announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture October 11, are these:

1. National allotment of 16.1 million acres (same as in 1967); 2. Domestic allotment at 65 per cent of total allotment (Same as in 1967);

3. Price support loan at 20,25 cents per pound, basis middling inch (same as 1967);

4. Price support payment of 12,24 cents per pound (compared to 11,53 cents this year);

5. Mandatory diversion of five per cent of allotments (12,5 per cent in 1967), with a payment of 10.76 cents per pound. times projected yield (10,78 cent payment in 1967);

6. Option to voluntarily divert an additional 30 per cent with a payment of six cents per pound times projected yield (compared to 10,78 cents in 1967), and
