## Most Stores To Close On Thanksgiving

Next Thursday, November 23, will be observed as the most American of all holidays, Thanksgiving Day.

And, in Tahoka, the holiday will provide an opportunity for most, but not all, local business to close their doors and take a one-day holiday.

But, necessities of life, mainly food for the stomach and gasoline for the family auto will be available locally. And, due to the harvest under-

way, gins and grain elevators are expected to be in operation providing weather conditions are suitable.

As a public service, the Lynn County News contacted many Tahoka businesses this week concerning their closing plans.

Among service stations planning to remain open were Chaney and Son Humble, Renfro Conoco, Profit Gulf, and SEE THANKSGIVING PG. 2

Lynn County voters turned out in somewhat larger numbers than expected Saturday, giving approval to both the creation of Lynn County Hospital District and the issuance of \$305,000 in bonds.

In all, a total of 1,204 ballots were cast in the eleven voting precincts and absentee box,

with six of the 12 boxes approving both propositions on the ballot and the other six exactly reversing that trend.

Speaking of the county as a whole, 765 ballots were cast for Proposition No. 1 and 439 against. Proposition 1 allows the creation of the Lynn County Hospital District and prov-

ides for the levy of a tax not to exceed 75c on the \$100 valuation.

On Proposition No. 2, the vote was 744 for to 435 against. Proposition 2 allows the issuance of \$365,000 in bonds, a little more than half the cost of the proposed \$700,000 hospital.

Now that both issues have been approved, the Lynn County Hospital District Board has until May 31, 1968, to submit an application for a \$335,000 Hill Burton grant to finance the remaining cost of the proposed 24 bed facility.

The government funds are administered by the State Department of Health with grants made once yearly, and when issued, do not have to be repaid.

Providing the H.B. grant is made, the bonds would be issued in January or February of 1969, with "target date" for completion of the hospital as of January 1970.

## Lynn Voters Stray From State Amendment Trend

Lynn County voters strayed from the statewide trend of approving all six proposed amendments to the state constitution in General Election balloting last Saturday, endorsing three of the proposals while turning down the other three.

In all, a total of 1,019 votes were cast in the election, a fairly healthy turnout considering that no personalities were involved in the election.

Amendments carrying county approval were Numbers 1, 2, and 3 with 4, 5 and 6 failing.

County vote on each proposed amendment was as follows:

Amendment No. 1 carried, 498 to 478. Authorizes county commissioners to put all money in a single general fund.

Amendment No. 2 carried, 595 to 376. (Permits political subdivisions within a hospital district to participate in the establishment and operation of mental health, mental retardation and public health services.)

Amendment No. 3 carried, 659 to 342. (Proposes a revival of the veteran's land program and authorizes issuance of \$200 million in state bonds for loans to veterans.)

Amendment No. 4 failed, 314 to 672. (Authorizes Parks

and Wildlife Department to issue and sell general obligation bonds to finance acquisition and development of land for parks, and recreational areas.)

Amendment No. 6 failed, 437 to 524. (Permits non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective positions under state and Federal governments where no conflict of interest exists.)

All amendments carried in the statewide election and will become a part of the much-patched Texas State Constitution.

Smith, now Lt. Governor of the state, has been making a tour of towns in the South Plains area, and made five stops Tuesday before returning to Austin.

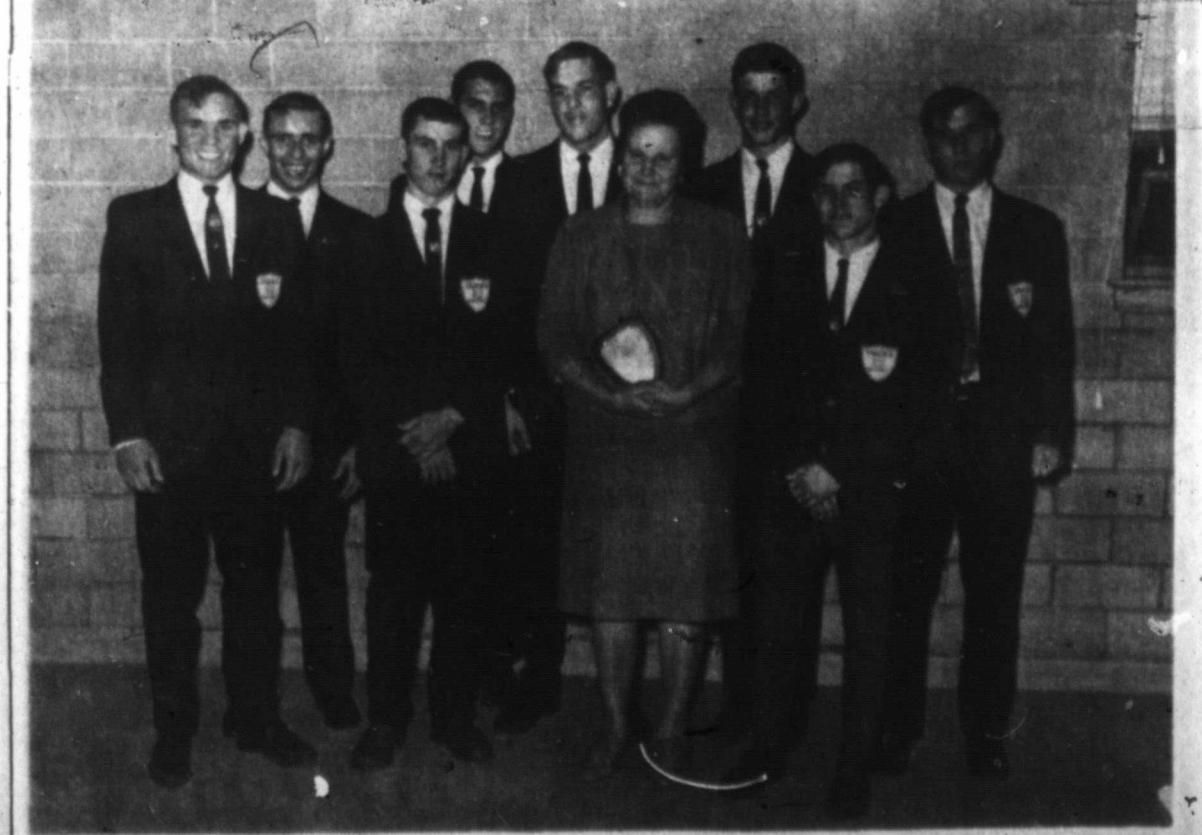
With Governor John Connally's decision not to seek a fourth term, Smith has become a forerunner for the 1968 election and is seeking SEE SMITH ON PG. 2

## School Enrollment Shows Slight Drop This Month

The Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees met in regular monthly session Thursday, November 9, approving the monthly bills and hearing several reports.

In the monthly enrollment report, total number of students attending all levels of the school was listed at 1,128.

Enrollment at the approximate time one month ago (October 12, 1967) was 1,137, a difference of nine students.

A year ago, (November 10, 1966) enrollment at the school was 1,131, perhaps indicating that the school hit their yearly "peak" a little earlier this year, and that the normal dropoff is occurring somewhat sooner.

Fluxuation the past two months has been at North Elementary where three less students are enrolled and in high school where six less are enrolled.

Average daily attendance (ADA) at the school for the first six weeks, ending Oct. 13, was 1,075.79. Of the ADA total, 327.48 are listed for South Elementary, 241.07 for

North Elementary, 270.69 for Junior High, 229.41 for High School, and 7.14 for the Special School.

In a report for the tax assessor-collector, 30.1 percent (\$80,501) of the school's tax roll was reported as collected to date.

In their monthly report, the cafeteria operation showed a total of 10,373 lunches served during the month of October and 17,648 half-pints of milk.

## Voter Registration Ahead Of Last Year

County Tax Assessor-Collector George McCracken reports voter registration in Lynn County thus far is ahead of last year's sign-up.

As of Monday, 1,249 prospective voters had registered, 992 of that total in October, the first month of the sign-up period which closes January 31, 1968. Last year, only 297 residents registered to vote during October.

A total of 2,429 voters were registered last year in the county, but persons over 60 years of age were not required to sign up.

This year, under the new Texas Election Code, all prospective voters must register, regardless of age.

Also under the code, persons may register immediately upon becoming 21 years of age, even if the registration period has already ended, but will not become eligible to vote in an election until 30 days after registration.

Registration certificates pre-

ently held entitle a person to vote in election held through February 28, 1968.

McCracken urges the registration of all eligible county residents stressing that the registration is completely "free." He also points out that federal positions, including the presidency, will be voted upon in the 1968 elections.

Voter registration application blanks are available at McCracken's office at the courthouse, and at New Home Co-op Gin, Wilson Co-op Gin, Lakeview Gin, Moore Insurance in O'Donnell, Grassland Butane and the New Moore Store.

The applications may be filled out and brought to McCracken's office or may be mailed. If the latter method is used, McCracken will return the registration certificate to the prospective voter by mail.

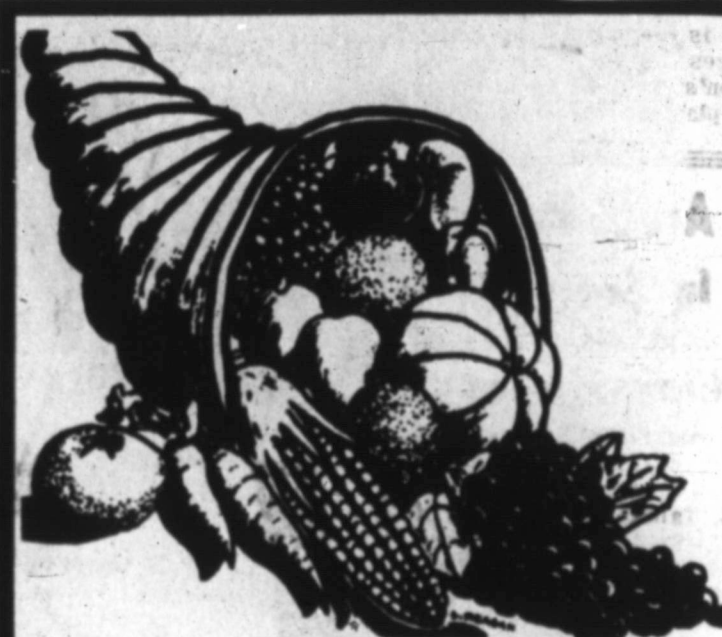

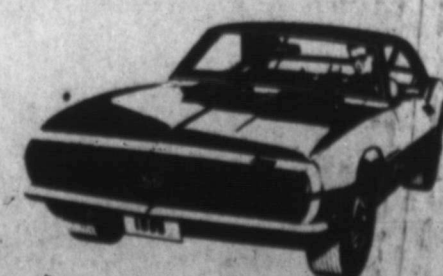

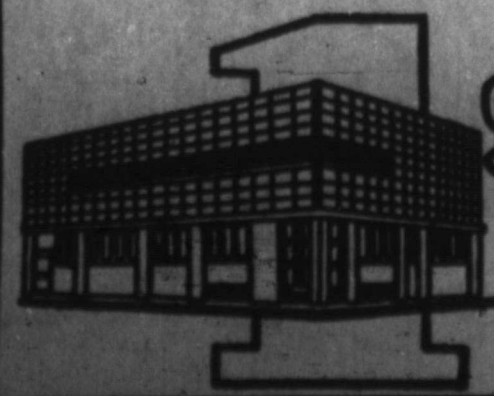

### Phil Adams Is Grid Starter For OMA Team

Phil Adams, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Adams, Tahoka, junior college student at Oklahoma Military Academy, has been on the starting lineup as flankerback in the pro-type offense team used by his college this season.

Adams has scored in several of the games and gained numerous yards in pass completions.

A number of Tahoka fans attended the game between OMA and NMCI at Roswell on Saturday and were impressed by Adams' speed and movements as he caught passes. His receptions accounted for more than half of OMA's 229 yards passing in the game. Adams scored on a 42-yard pass and again on a 45-yard pass from Quarterback Jim Richey of Delray, Florida. OMA was only able to push 36 yards rushing against powerful NMCI who, with one loss, is among the top junior colleges in the nation in the season's football ratings and will play in the Wool Bowl.

### Area Men In Service

#### William Kopecky

Airman First Class William J. Kopecky, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence J. Kopecky of Rt. 4, Tahoka, is a member of the U. S. Air Force defense organization that has been selected as best in the United States.

Airman Kopecky is assigned to the Air Defense Command's (ADC) 26th Air Division that has won the coveted General Frederic H. Smith Trophy. The trophy, which honors a former Air Force vice chief of staff now retired from active duty, was presented at division headquarters, Adair Air Force Station, Oreg., Nov. 7.

The 26th was chosen for the top ADC award for demonstrating through year-long evaluation the best ground capability to support ADC fighter-interceptors in identifying, intercepting and destroying enemy aircraft. The division, which has won the honor twice, operates 14 radar sites and five fighter squadrons to maintain air surveillance and guard a five-state, 800,000-square-mile area covering the Pacific Coast and Western United States.

The airman is a radar repairman with the 776th Radar Squadron at Point Arena Air Station, Calif.

A graduate of New Home High School, he attended Tarleton State College, Stephenville, Tex.

Tahoka's Bulldogs closed their 1967 grid season on a happy note last Friday night, losing their third district "heartbreaker," 14-20, to the Plains Cowboys.

But, at the end of the first half, there was nothing but happiness in the hometown stands as the Bulldogs led 14-0 going into the dressing room, never allowing the Cowboys closer than 35 yards to the Tahoka goal.

Boiling down in many ways to a battle between Tahoka's Cliff Thomas and Plains' Gregg Jones, the two senior halfbacks closed out their high school grid careers with sparkling performances, providing nearly all the offense shown by either team.

Thomas, trailing Jones by 10 points for the South Plains Class A scoring crown going into the game, scored all of Tahoka's points and had rushed for 147 yards at halftime, appearing to have things under control for the Bulldogs.

But, after being held to only 67 yards in the first half, Jones found the key to the Bulldog defense in the last two periods, rushing for 205 yards and scoring three touchdowns.

In the game, Tahoka shocked the Cowboys early in the first quarter, scoring with 9:20 left in the period on a 60-yard drive,

The tally came on a 32-yard sparkler from Thomas who raced around his left end, made two cuts and dodged the last man to cross the goal line standing up, then split the uprights for the post after.

The touchdown came after the opening kickoff, yardage from Doyle Schneider, John Tyler and Larry Arnold adding to the drive.

Kicking off to give Plains their first offensive opportunity, the Cowboys moved to their deepest penetration of the first half, the Bulldog 35, before running out of downs.

Outstanding defensive play in the series and throughout the game was by Robert Montemayor, a freshman who saw his first varsity action of the year in the tilt. Montemayor filled in at linebacker for Randy White, starter who missed the game due to an injury.

Following the first two exchanges, nothing happened until early in the second quarter with Tahoka in possession on their own 12 after a punt.

From that point, the Bulldogs scored in 18 plays despite 25 yards in penalties.

The score came on an off-tackle burst from Thomas over his right side from less than a yard away, followed by his extra point kick, to give the Bulldogs a 14-0 bulge with 2:54 left in the half.

In the 88-yard drive, Thomas picked up 75 of the steps on 11 carries, including runs of 19, 14 and 11 yards.

Kicking off to give the Cowboys possession on their own 23 following a short puntback, the Bulldogs jarred Jones loose from the ball three plays later after a five-yard penalty against Plains.

Grabbing the fumble at the Plains 28 were Tyler and Charlie Brown, each grasping a half of the ball.

On the first play after the recovery, Thomas ripped off 12 yards around left end to the 16, then added those remaining yards on what would have been another Bulldog touchdown barring a 15-yard holding penalty

which wiped out the play, and added the 80th yard penalized Tahoka in the first half.

With first down from the 31 after the penalty, Tahoka advanced to the 20 before a fourth down pass fell incomplete, to put an end to the scoring opportunity and all but ending the second quarter.

Starting after the intermission from their own 28 following a 23 yard kickoff return, Plains scored in 11 plays, 10 by Jones who carried over from eight yards out to climax the 72 yard drive. A wild triple pitchout running play from a faked kick failed to net the points, leaving the score 14-6 with 7:15 left in the third stanza.

Jones paced out all but two of the yards in the drive in his quick-hitting running style, including bursts of 14, 16 and 15 yards.

Starting from their own 33 after Plains' short kick, Thomas ripped off 37 yards on the first play for a first down, Tyler adding another three plays later on a seven-yard effort to advance the ball to the Plains 16.

With a first from that point, Schneider had picked up three yards around his left end before the tackle jarred him loose from the ball, covered at the 13 by the Cowboys' Alton McGinty.

Starting from there, Plains scored in seven plays, Jones carrying over from 49 yards away after bursting through the right side of his line, then cutting to the east sideline and turning on the speed. His run for the extra points was a stopped short by Joel Inklebarger and Schneider, leaving the tally at 14-12, still in Tahoka's favor, with 2:08 in the third quarter.

In the 87-yard drive, Jones carried five times out of the seven plays for 80 yards.

Tahoka could go nowhere with the ensuing kickoff, returning the ball via a punt after picking up one first down.

Starting the final quarter from their 19 after the punt, Plains added their winning touchdown in nine plays, Jones breaking three tackles to go over from eight yards away with 8:14 left in the game. Joe Pierce ran the extra points to close out the game at 20-14.

Setting up the drive was the "other" member of the Plains backfield, Fullback Bill Spencer, on a 27-yard run, Jones carried six times out of nine in the drive.

Needing a touchdown badly, Tahoka moved for one first down to the Plains 38 after the kickoff, a 13 yard runback by Arnold and a 15 yard penalty against the Cowboys.

Then, on the next series, could move only nine yards in four plays, coming up a yard shy and out of downs.

Holding without allowing a first down, Tahoka received the ball via a punt four plays later for their final chance in the game from the Bulldog 26.

A nine-yard and then a 10-yard effort by Thomas on the first two plays advanced the ball to the Plains 45 before a third down pass from Tyler was snatched out of the intended receiver's hands by Jones at the Plains 15-yard line, running it back to the 29.

Holding once again to force the punt, Tahoka was called for roughing the kicker on the punt, wiping out their opportunity for a last chance to score, giving Plains a first down at their 46 and needing only one play to run out the remaining time in

the game.

For Tahoka, Cliff Thomas closed his high school grid career with 237 yards on 33 carries for a 7.2 average in the game.

For the year, Thomas carried the ball 217 times for 1,518 rushing yards for a 7.0 yard-per-carry average and 156 points.

For the game, Doyle Schneider added 36 yards and Tyler 28, both on seven carries.

For Plains, Gregg Jones carried the ball on 42 of the Cowboys' 56 running plays for 272 yards and a 6.5 average. Jones ended the season with 170 yards.

The loss left Tahoka with a 6-4 season record and 1-3 district mark. Plains finished 9-1 and 3-1.

## B-Team Downs Plains, 27-0 For 7-2 Mark

Tahoka Junior High football teams ended their season last Thursday night, both losing to Plains in games played there.

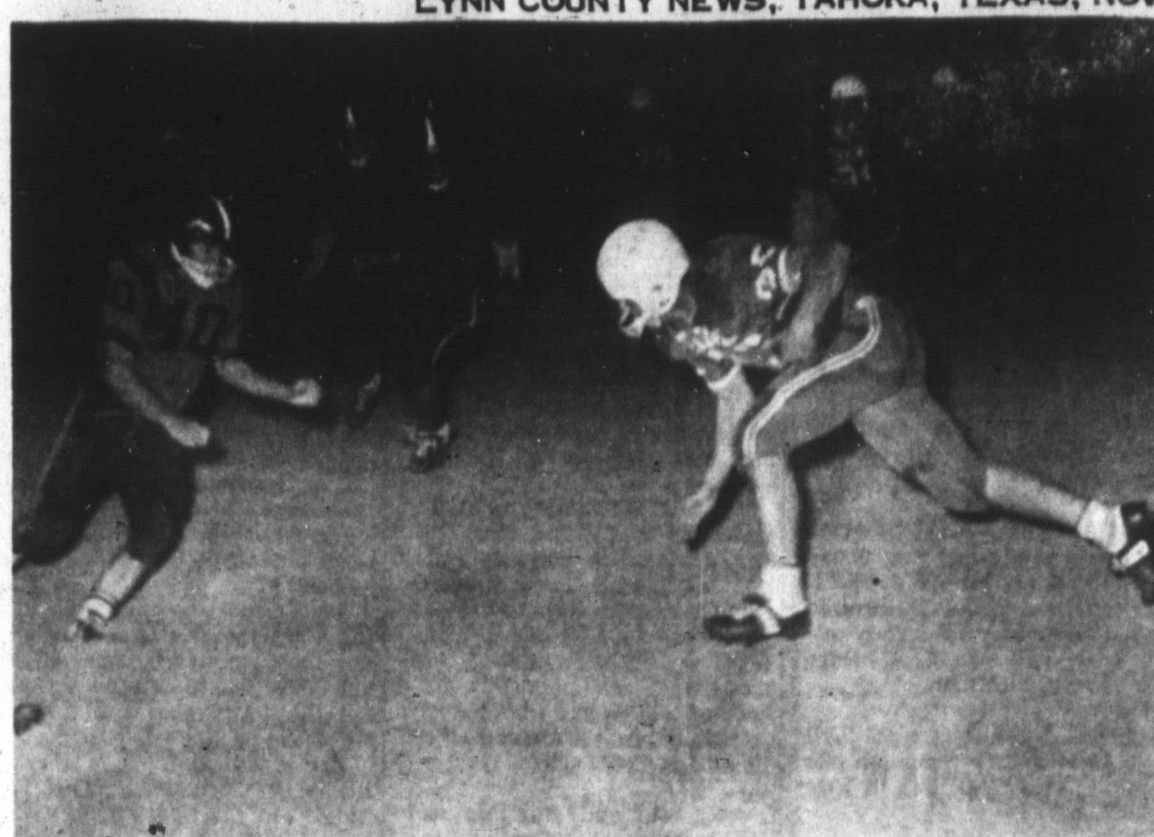

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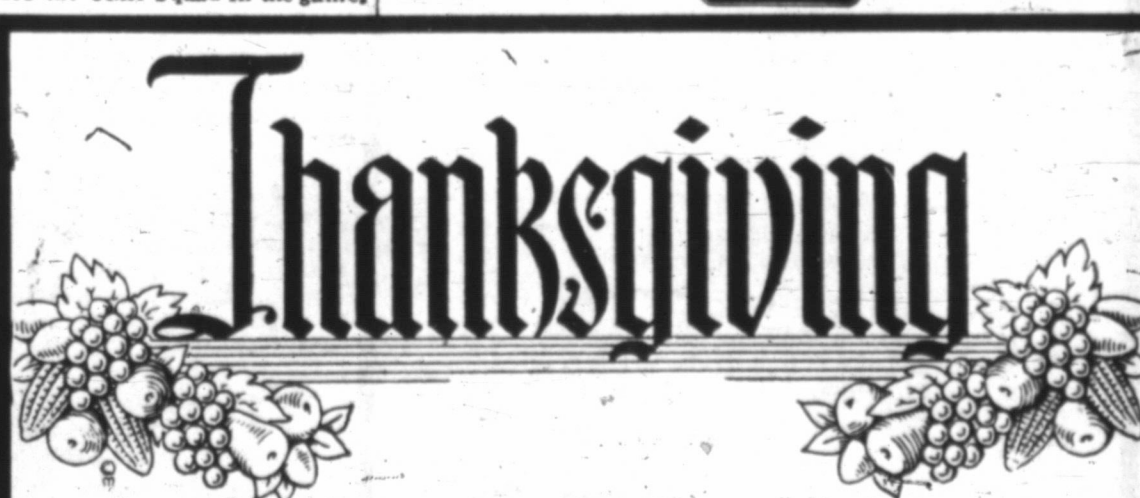

Hollars chose as his panel

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members, James Brookshire from the school board; Bill Brock and Elva Jo Edwards representing youth; Dean Bartley as a parent; Jim Burdette representing law enforcement.

The panel subject was "Youth Responsibilities for a Better Neighborhood (Community)." The program began by the following letter being read:

"We hear teen-agers complain, 'What can we do? Where can we go?' The answer is: Go home, paint the woodwork, rake the leaves, mow the lawn, sweep the walk. Wash the car, scrub the floors. Help the minister, the Red Cross, the Salvation Army. Visit the sick, the poor. Study your lessons. And when you are through if you are not too tired, read a book."

"Your parents do not owe you entertainment. Your city doesn't owe you a recreation center. The world doesn't owe you a living. You owe it your time and energy and your talent so that no one will be at war or in poverty or sick or lonely again. You're supposed to mature enough to accept some of the responsibilities your parents have carried for years. They have nursed, protected, excused and tolerated you. They have denied themselves comforts so that you could have luxuries. This they have done gladly, for you are their greatest treasure. Teenagers, grow up and go home."

(This open letter to a teenager first received public attention when it was quoted by Juvenile Judge Philip B. Gilliam, of Denver. More recently it appeared in Abigail Van Buren's syndicated newsletter column. The author of the letter is not known.)

Reactions to the letter: "Harsh orders, some may deserve this type punishment, others may not."

"Teenagers may rebel at being ordered like this."

"Teenagers are given too much, maybe if they were not, things would be better for all."

"Is there anything to go home to? Parents must take a part with young people and have something to do with them. Small children are provided with necessities and young people need this, too. Many times, they want to leave home just to be with those their own age. The man who wrote letter may have oversimplified the problem."

Then several questions were asked the panel including:

1. Do very many of the young people of our community drink or smoke? Is this bad? Is it a problem? Is it anyone else's business if they do?

ANSWERS:

-Some do, it is bad for them and those around them."

-You can overdo a lot of things, among those things, eating and dieting. Young people are tempted and dared and it takes lots of willpower to keep from smoking."

-The home as an example could be the biggest help in curbing smoking. Young people should be made aware of the hazards and discouraged. Less than one percent of Tahoka Junior High and High School students have been involved with the law because of drinking."

-Drinking by students is not so prevalent in Tahoka. Many are slow to do things in a small community because everyone will know about it."

-In a larger town, there are many groups and each group may take a lead in drinking or something else. In a small town, there is usually only one group."

2. Many adults are very disturbed about the growing tendency of young people to demonstrate if they do not like something. Is this a bad trend? Why or why not?

ANSWERS:

-Demonstrations shouldn't interfere with freedom and safety."

-There are no such things as "demonstrations" any more. They are "riots."

-Young people now are more interested in humanities may be demonstrations are an outgrowth of this."

-Demonstrations may be outgrowth of this, but most of these demonstrators aren't responsible people."

3. What contributions to the community do our young people in Tahoka already make? What further contributions could they make?

-Young people are doing a good job in our community in many things."

-Willing parents could contribute lots of help to our youth."

There were a few other questions discussed briefly. The panel did a fine job as did James Hollars in preparing the program.

Mrs. Mathis was presented the "Bulldog" after the room-count.

Gifts were given to panel members to show our appreciation to them.

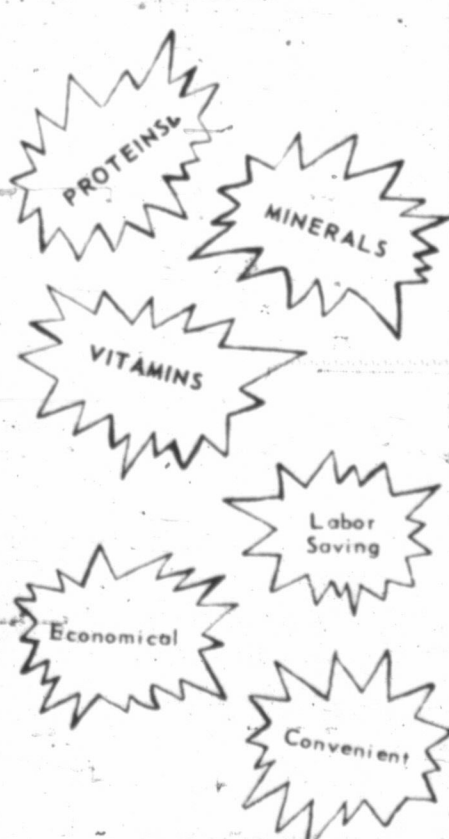

## Kidney Transplant Is Still Successful For Jimmy Martin

One year ago, (November 7, 1966) Jimmy Martin lay on his hospital bed in Salt Lake City, Utah, awaiting a kidney transplant that could mean life or death.

Today, Jimmy has returned to a normal life, farming west of Levelland and is home with his wife, the former Laverne Boudreaux, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Boudreaux, and daughter Angela.

The couple feel they owe a debt of gratitude not only to Jimmy's father, Gordon Martin who donated a kidney for his son's life, but also to Dr. Edward Downs, Lubbock, who diagnosed the disease and made arrangements for the transplant in University Research Clinic, Also to attending physicians, Dr. Lawrence Stevens and Keith Koenigsmann, Utah.

Hospitalized twice since the transplant last year, Martin reports that all chemistry results are normal at the present time, and surgeons told him the new kidney would last at least a million miles.

At the time of his transplant six other persons waited for the relatively new operation. Out of those six, only three survived and one remains on a "watch list" for results of a third transplant.

Physicians now give a 50-50 chance to all patients requiring kidney transplants and in five years it should be 100 percent, according to Mrs. Martin.

The year has been a long one for the Martin family as well as for their many friends who have stood by them. But they have passed the crucial stage and the days to come should be much brighter.

**Bill Griffin,  
County Agent,  
Says.....**

Producers in Lynn County should be wary of a new wheat variety, Red River 68, which has filtered its way into the High Plains of Texas, reports Bill Griffin, county agricultural agent.

Red River 68 is a dwarf spring-type wheat which will probably not survive the winter here, says Griffin. Drought, heat and disease will also keep this type of wheat from performing well if spring planted, he adds.

Furthermore, says Griffin, the Crop Quality Council headquartered at Minneapolis, Minnesota, which evaluates spring wheats has reported that Red River 68 is not acceptable in milling and baking quality.

The Council stated that 15 industry, state and federal laboratories had evaluated samples of the new wheat furnished through the cooperation of World Seeds, Inc. Economically important deficiencies in milling, processing and blending characteristics were uncovered in these tests.

Thus the Council believes that commercial bakeries will seek alternate sources of wheat supplies, points out Griffin.

Winter wheat varieties with excellent baking qualities and high yield potentials are available to producers in this county says Griffin. He does not recommend the use of Red River 68 as any other new varieties that are not adapted or have not been adequately tested in this area of the state.
