Basketball will take over the local scene starting Monday with Tahoka high school and junior high school teams kicking off their season that night.

To start the season, the high school teams, with the exception of the B-Boys will travel to Klondike and all junior high teams will meet O'Donnell at the local gym.

First high school game that night will begin at 5:30 p.m. the same hour that junior high games will get underway locally. A complete

schedule for the year's high school and junior high games is printed elsewhere in this edition.

VARSITY BULLDOGS
The Tahoka Bulldogs, under the direction of Head Coach Dean Andrews will seek to defend their Conference 5-A championship and have two starters back from last year's team.

Last season, the Bulldogs went 19-11, winning the district crown and losing the bi-district tilt one point to Aspermont.

Returning starters include

Cliff Thomas (6-0) and Doyle Schneider (5-10), both Seniors. But, with the exception of Thomas, Schneider, and John Tyler, 5-8 Senior who saw considerable action, the ranks of the Bulldogs are somewhat thin, the three being the only lettermen on the squad.

Andrews, who is in his first season as head coach of the Bulldogs, lists lack of height and experience as main problems, but expects quickness to be a strong point of the Tahoka team.

Probable starters for the

Bulldogs include Thomas, Schneider and Tyler, in addition to Buz Owens, (6-1) a Senior and Charlie Brown, (5-9) a Junior.

Other varsity members include Juniors Jody Edwards (6-1) and Greg Thomas (5-6); Sophomores Martin Warren (5-10), Tim Walker (5-9), and Mitchell Thurman (5-10); Freshmen Robert Montemayor (5-8), and Gene Walker (5-11).

Andrews plans a multiple offense, with a "fast break" hoped to be one of the strong points. On defense, the Bulldogs will run man-to-man and zone press to contain opponents' scoring.

Members of the 5-A basketball district are the same as in football, Seagraves, Coahoma, O'Donnell and Plains.

VARSITY GIRLS

Only one returning starter and five letter winners grace the Tahoka High School varsity girls basketball team which finished second in district standings despite a rather poor overall season.

Returning starter is Brenda Foster, a 5-7 Senior guard. Letter winners include forwards Connie Gardner (5-7), Cindy Carroll (5-5) and Nellene Chandler (5-7), in addition to guard Lana Grogan (5-2), all Juniors.

Pounding out the varsity girls squad are forwards Jane Cox (5-6), Carla Hancock (5-5), and Sherry Schneider (5-8), all Sophomores; Junior guards Alta Hale (5-7) and Judy Gossett (5-3); and Sophomore guards Betty Trammell (5-5) and Yolanda Chapa (5-8).

Andrews also serves as head coach and lists lack of experience as his main problem, but names "hustle" as a strong point.

Members of the girls district are Coahoma, O'Donnell and Tahoka Coahoma is the defending champ.

Annual Tahoka Tourney Starts Next Thursday

The annual Tahoka Invitational Basketball Tournament is slated for November 30, December 1-2 (next Thursday, Friday and Saturday) with Lynn County boys and girls championships to be decided Friday night and tourney championships Saturday night.

Eight high schools are represented in the tournament with boys and girls teams, including Lynn County teams from Tahoka, New Home, Wilson and O'Donnell.

Other schools in the tourney are Coahoma, Southland, Klondike and Flowergrove near (Ackerly).

The Lynn County teams are in the upper bracket and will compete for the county championship. Out-of-county teams

are in the lower bracket and will join them in play for the overall championship.

Tahoka boys and girls are defending county champions, with the Bulldogs retiring the traveling trophy last year after winning the title for the third straight year. A new boys trophy will be furnished this year by the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce.

Stanton won both brackets of the overall play last year, but are not entered in this year's tournament.

First, second and consolation team trophies will be awarded in both boys and girls brackets.

Highlights of the tourney will be crowning of the Tahoka basketball queen as selected by the Bulldogs. Nominees for the honor will be announced next week. Coronation of the queen is planned after the finals game Friday night of the Lynn County championship.

Admission for the tournament is 50¢ for adults and 25¢ for students. A concession stand will be operated by the Bulldog Band Parents.

Area Harvest Near Peak

The South Plains cotton harvest approached peak activity over the week-end and the USDA Classing Offices at Lubbock, Brownfield, and Lamesa received samples from approximately 32,000 bales on Saturday, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock office.

The Lubbock Office had 32 classes on duty Saturday the Brownfield Office five and the Lamesa Office two. Palmer indicated that more classes would be brought into the three South Plains Offices Monday.

The USDA Cotton Classing Offices at Lubbock, Brownfield and Lamesa classed approximately 50,000 samples during the week ending Friday, Nov. 17th. This brought the total classed at the three offices this season to 151,000. Through November 17 last

year 394,000 samples of the 1966 crop had been classed. Middling made up 24 per cent of the total classed at Lubbock last week. Strict Low Middling 46 per cent, Low Middling 1 per cent, Middling Light Spotted 22 per cent and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 7 per cent.

Forty-four per cent of the cotton classed at Lubbock last week stapled 1-inch and longer, compared to 46 per cent the previous week, 12 per cent of all cotton received at Lubbock last week stapled 1-1/16 and longer.

Micronaire continued the seasonal decline. Fifty-two per cent of the cotton "miked" in the Lubbock Office was in the 3.5 and better micronaire category, 15 per cent "miked" 3.3 and 3.4, 22 per cent was 3.0 through 3.2, 9 per cent 2.7 through 2.9 and 2 per cent 2.6 and below.

Forty-eight per cent of the cotton classed at Lubbock last week had Pressley reading of 80,000 pounds and higher, compared to 56 per cent the previous week. Pressley is an indication of fiber strength and the most desirable Pressley reading is 80,000 pounds and above.

Trading increased in the new crop cotton on the Lubbock market and prices were generally \$5.00 to \$15.00 per bale higher.

SCS Presented Certificate Of Merit

The Tahoka Work Unit of the Soil Conservation Service was presented a certificate of merit and cash awards last Thursday by Area Conservationist, W. S. Goodlett, Jr. as the outstanding unit in the Big Spring Area during the past year.

The certificate read, "For Superior Performance in Providing Technical Assistance to Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District in the Planning and Application of Soil, Water, and Plant Conservation Practices."

More parallel terraces were constructed in the Tahoka Work Unit than in any other unit in the State of Texas.

Farmers were given assistance to construct 1,676,449 feet during the past year. This practice is somewhat different in plan and layout than standard Terraces.

Fifty-three landowners were assisted in the development or revision of a soil and water conservation plan on their land.

The Tahoka Work Unit staff includes Bake Loveless, Donald Reed, Fred Graff, Orin Russell, Lomah O. Harston, Arvel Woolsley, Joe Brooks and Bobby Hanna.

Football Is Big Business

Football is big business throughout the nation and in Tahoka it is no different.

During the past season, \$5,555.88 was realized by the local school in net gate receipts.

Largest revenue of the season was from the Tahoka-Seagraves game with Tahoka's receipts amounting to \$1,899.38 after expenses had been

paid. Runnerup was the Plains game with a \$851.20 Tahoka share.

Several different methods are used in setting up the division of the gate receipts, some going on a home-and-home basis with a \$50 guarantee for the visiting team each year, usually on a two-year contract.

On games which are scheduled on a one-year basis and

on other arrangements, receipts are split evenly between the two teams.

Comprising the combined total receipts for this year's operation was Lorenzo—\$585; Crosbyton—\$562.63; Idalou—\$533.48; Hamlin—\$600.00; Springlake—\$75.24; Kress—\$350.95; Coahoma—\$50.00; Seagraves—\$1,899.38; O'Donnell—\$50.00; and Plains—\$851.20.

Garden Club

Finish planting bulbs for spring bloom.

Perennials - Daisies - Transplant now. They like humus and food. Perennials - Phlox and asters can be reset now.

Caladiums - dig and store in peatmoss, put in dark room.

Dahlias - Dig divide, label and store in peatmoss or sand. Be sure and divide with a piece of old stalk left on each tuber and one or more eyes. Do not let freeze.

Mums - Clean beds, cut off tops to two inches of ground and hill up.

Burn all tops as they harbor disease.

Do not hurry to prune.

Spray your berried shrubs with good spray. Spray roses, stop cutting.

Clean-up iris beds, feed bone meal.

Water at intervals if dry.

Pot late mums for blooming in house. Repot house plants if they need it.

Compost - Save all plants not diseased and add to heap.

Wilson School Hears Program On Petroleum

At a general assembly meeting November 13 at Wilson High School, Jim Kent, Denver City, representative of the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association who is employed by The Western Company, presented the "Magic Barrel" program.

Some people may have never heard the word "Petrochemicals," chemicals made from crude oil and natural gas. Texas now has a \$5 billion petrochemical industry which accounts for an estimated 85% of the nation's petrochemical facilities.

Price to 1940, absolutely no organic chemicals were produced in Texas. It all began during World War II when the war effort called for increased

amounts of chemicals from hydrocarbons. We needed a plentiful source of economical raw materials -- oil and gas.

Added up, it meant we needed Texas oil and gas for our vital chemical supplies as well as for fuels.

Kent said nationwide, annual petrochemical production is currently about 60 billion. By 1971, petrochemical production is expected to reach 150 billion lbs. and account for more than half of all chemical outputs. Chemicals from oil and gas currently account for 30% of total U.S. Chemical output, but the \$10 billion makes up 65% of the dollar value.

He pointed out some of the products made from petrochemicals including fertilizers for farm and garden use, polyethylene bags for vegetables and milk cartons are now made leak-proof with polyethylene and several other products from the polyolefins family.

Refrigeration Freon-12 has replaced old style, flammable refrigerants for home use and is widely used in air conditioning units.

Even the newspaper is printed with a petroleum product, carbon black, used in making inks.

Dacron curtain for inside the home paints, vinyl floor tile and plastic, cosmetics, perfume, lucite, toothbrush lucite and nylon, detergents, sponges, clothing of dacron, orlon, nylon, and many other products also come from petroleum products.

Other plastics, urethane foam is used for insulating coats, also for furniture cushions and car seats. In the American car there are over 300 different parts made from this hydrocarbon, and, for the home there is nylon carpeting, and teflon for cooking utensils.

Several thousand different products are made from petrochemicals, but the modern housewife may never have heard the word. But, she could

hardly live with out it, and neither the nation.

The speaker was introduced by Gary Moore.

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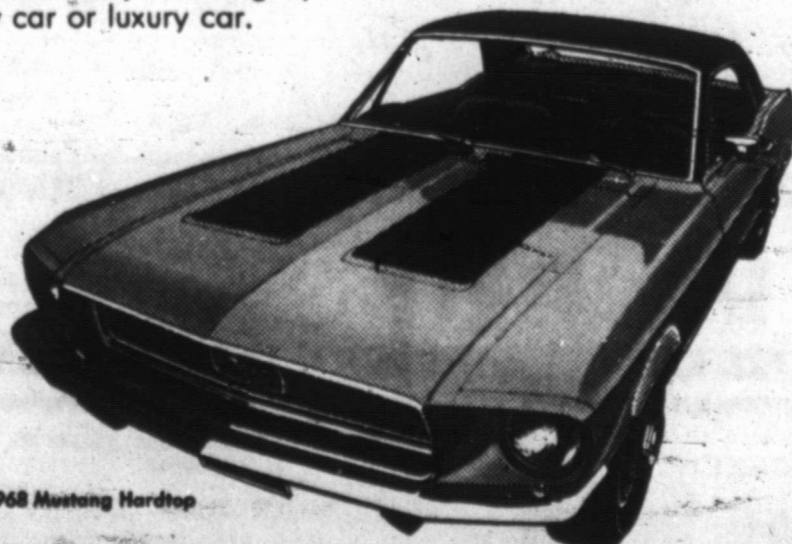

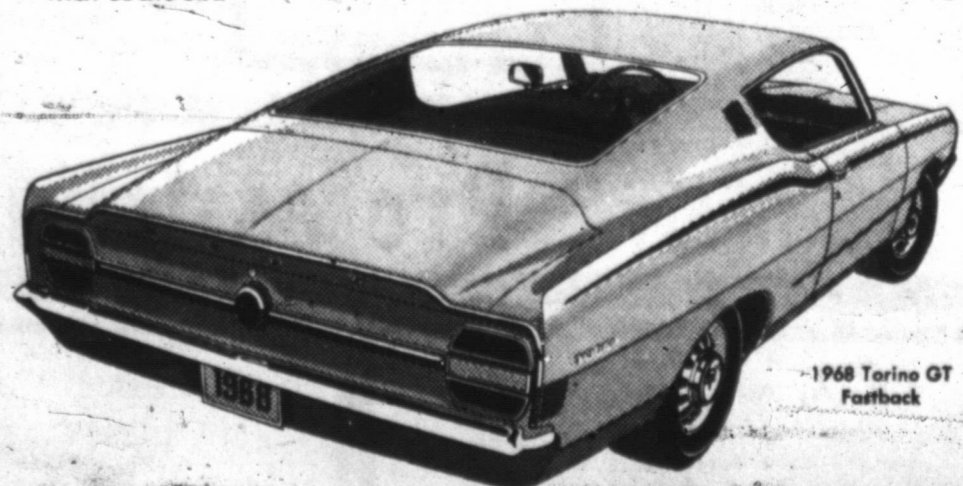

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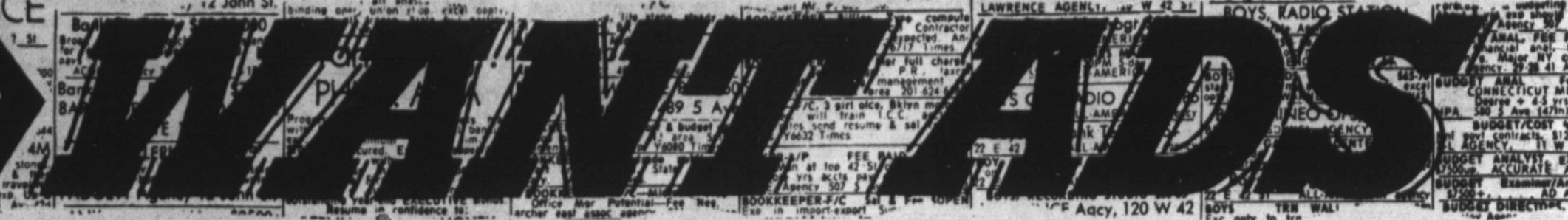

PHILOSOPHER
Fair Labeling

(Editor's note: The Sandhills Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm is having trouble figuring out the scope of a new law Congress has passed, his letter this week indicates.)

Dear editor:
 According to an article in a newspaper which was wrapped around a bundle of magazines a well-meaning woman in town sent out here to me because she heard I like to read, which I do but I'm not sure when I'll get around to the copies of the Literary Digest and Woman's Home Companion she included, a new commission in Washington has just made a ruling on potatoes.

Under the new Fair Labeling Act Congress has passed to protect housewives who can't seem to catch on that a giant quart is no bigger than a regular quart and the large economy size may be only the medium size, food processors and packagers have to label things like they are, no confusing words allowed, and so the commission has declared that if a sack of potatoes is marked "Idaho potatoes," the potatoes have to come from Idaho. I got to thinking about this and while I'm sure the commissioners know what they're doing, what I'd like to see is how they're going to rule on French fried potatoes.

You see, and this is for the benefit of the housewives who have trouble catching on, unless the potatoes were fried in France, or at least by a Frenchman, an order of "French fries" is bound to be illegal and there'll have to be an F.B.I. agent in every hamburger joint in America.

This fair labeling law may run into more trouble than Congress intends.

For example, say a candidate is making a stirring speech on television and throwing in a lot of words that might confuse a housewife, shouldn't a line of type be run across the bottom of the screen while he's speaking saying: "This speech written by John Galbraith, or whoever did?"

And for the further benefit of the housewives, shouldn't a second line explain who John Galbraith is? After all, just by the name alone, how's the consumer going to tell whether he's a giant size or a regular quart size writer? Fair labeling is fair labeling.

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WILSON IS 2-B CO-CHAMP

Mustangs Romp Over Ropes Eagles, 28-0

Wilson's Mustangs stamped over the Ropesville Eagles, 28-0, Friday night before a hometown crowd, earning the Ponies a chunk of the District 2-B championship and the right to represent the conference in bi-district action.

Hiding the strong passing arm of Senior Quarterback Johnny Scott who fired four touchdown aeriels, the Mustangs scored twice in both the second and fourth quarters while limiting the Eagles to only one penetration in the game.

The win extended Wilson's record to 7-1 in conference action, the same mark held by the Meadow Bronchos, meaning the two will share the 2-B crown.

But, Meadow's blemish was at the hands of the Mustangs, 6-0, on October 13, establishing Wilson's claim to the playoff berth.

Even though Friday's game statistics were lopsided in their favor, it took the Mustangs a quarter to get a firm grasp on the game after failing to score on their first possession despite advancing to the Ropes 12-yard line.

Starting from their own 29 after the opening kick, Fullback Delton Moore ripped off 15 yards on the Mustangs first play from scrimmage, followed by a 20-yard "razzle-dazzle" pass play which saw Scott on the receiving end of an aerial from Halfback Gary Crews after a double handoff.

After the back-to-back first downs, six plays were required for the Wilson ground attack to chew their way to the Ropes 13, the longest play in the series an eight-yarder from Crews.

With first-and-ten from that point, Crews gained one to the 12 before Wilson was called for illegal motion and penalized back to the Eagles' 17-yard line.

With second and third down passes going incomplete to set up a fourth-and-14 situation, Scott faded back to try another aerial, only to be nailed for a 14-yard loss after falling over a referee who was slow getting out of his way.

From then on in the initial stanza, it was "run three and punt," neither team able to move the ball on the others' defense.

Taking over via a Ropes punt

shortly after the quarters changed, only one play was required for Wilson to light the scoreboard.

With first down at the Mustang 43, Scott dropped back, firing a screen pass over the heads of the onrushing Ropes defenders to Crews who tucked the ball in and raced 57-yards for the tally.

A running attempt by Halfback Don Steen failed to net the extra points, leaving Wilson a 6-0 bulge with 9:19 remaining in the half.

Successfully executing an on-sides kick, Wilson found themselves back-in possession after Tackle Ronnie Anders fell on the ball at Ropes 48.

Unable to move, Wilson returned the ball on a punt to the Eagles' 18, then took it back two plays later on an interception, Scott stealing the ball at the Ropes 28 and returning to the 15 before being nailed.

Enraged over the theft, Ropes held to avert the score, dropping Wilson runners for three and five yard losses, then taking over on a fourth down incompletion.

Running for one first down on

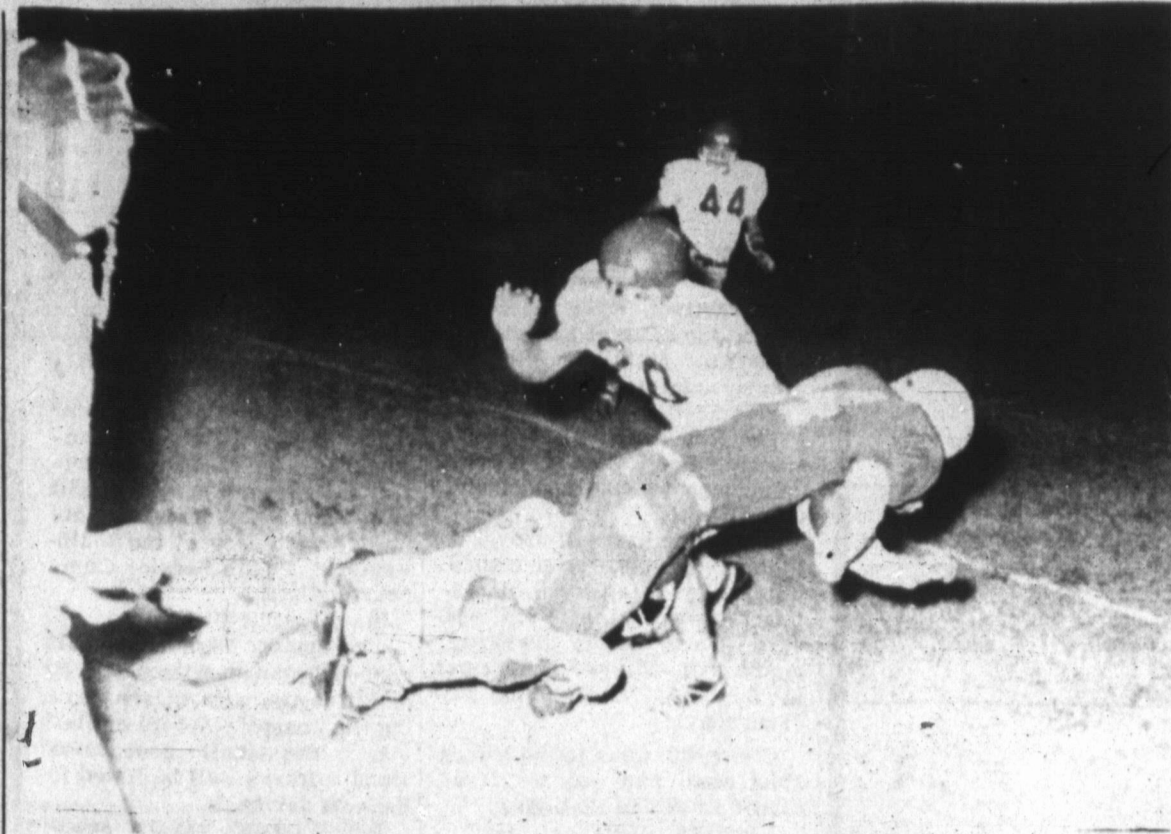
a 12-yard effort from Ted Lowrie, the Eagles were forced to give up the ball on a punt after their second series found them lacing a yard at their own 44-yard line.

Beginning their second scoring drive of the game at their own 28, Wilson marched the 72 yards in 15 plays, twice picking up first downs on fourth down passes.

Steen started the ball rolling in the drive with a 15-yard running effort over the right side of the Mustang line, Crews passing seven yards to Scott four plays later on the same "Quarterback eligible" play to keep the drive alive.

Then, Scott found End Gary Moore open for a 17-yard strike, followed by a 15-yard toss on fourth down which went for a completion due to a pass interference penalty against Ropes at the Eagles' four-yard line.

After a fumble cost one yard and a penalty five more, Scott flipped the ball 10 yards to End Kieth Wied for the touchdown with four seconds left in the half. Crews exploded off right tackle to add the two extra points for a 14-0 Wilson advantage.

Again surprising Ropes with an on-sides kickoff, the Mustangs took control with Tackle Lenro Brieger's recovery at the Eagles' 49, giving Wilson time to try one pass before the half-time gun.

The third stanza featured two long drives, one by each team, with both efforts stopped within their respective 20-yard stripes.

Ropes began their drive after taking the opening kickoff, moving from their 33 to the Wilson 14 before running out of downs. Wilson started their march at that point, grinding out yardage to the Ropes 11, before losing

seven yards on a fourth and one situation.

Taking over at their 18-yard line, the Eagles closed out the quarter with a pass from Lowrie to David Bradshaw good for 23 - yards, their longest offensive production of the game.

Opening the final 12 minutes of play from their own 39, Halfback Russell Arp dug out three yards for the Eagles before Lowrie had his second pass of the game swiped by Scott.

Hauling in the ball on the Eagles' 48, Scott raced 22-yards to the Ropes 26 before being hauled down. From that point, Wilson's

ground attack clicked to inside the Ropes 10-yard line before Scott utilized his third touchdown receiver, Delton Moore, for nine yards and the tally. Kieth Wied split the uprights with his kick for the extra point, giving Wilson a 21-0 lead with 7:54 left to play.

Holding Ropes shy of a first down on the series following the kickoff, the Mustangs again took possession, following an Eagle punt.

With the ball rolling dead at the Ropes 44, Wilson scored in four plays, including a 25-yard running gem from Steen who hit off right tackle, cut back

to the left, spun out of the grasp of tacklers and raced down the eastsidelines before being forced out of bounds.

Capping the drive was Scott's 11-yard pass to Gary Moore who had eluded defenders and was all alone in the end zone. Wied kicked the extra point to close out the scoring with 9:35 left in the game.

For the night, Scott hit on nine of 20 passes for 143 yards and all four touchdowns to pace Wilson's offense attack.

Rushing leader for the Mustangs was Steen with 74 yards on seven carries, followed by Delton Moore with 59 on 15 and Crews with 34 on 14.

Crews led pass receivers with 68 yards on three receptions, followed by Gary Moore with 56 on four.

For Ropes, Russell Arp rushed 13 times for 67 yards, followed by Lowrie with 43 on 11. Lowrie passed 11 times for 63 yards, hitting David Bradshaw on two for 34 yards to pace Eagle receivers.

Wilson defenders, led by Delton Moore, Lenro Brieger, Leland Zant, Johnny Scott, and Gary Moore, effectively contained the Ropes offense, allowing only 65 total yards in the first half.

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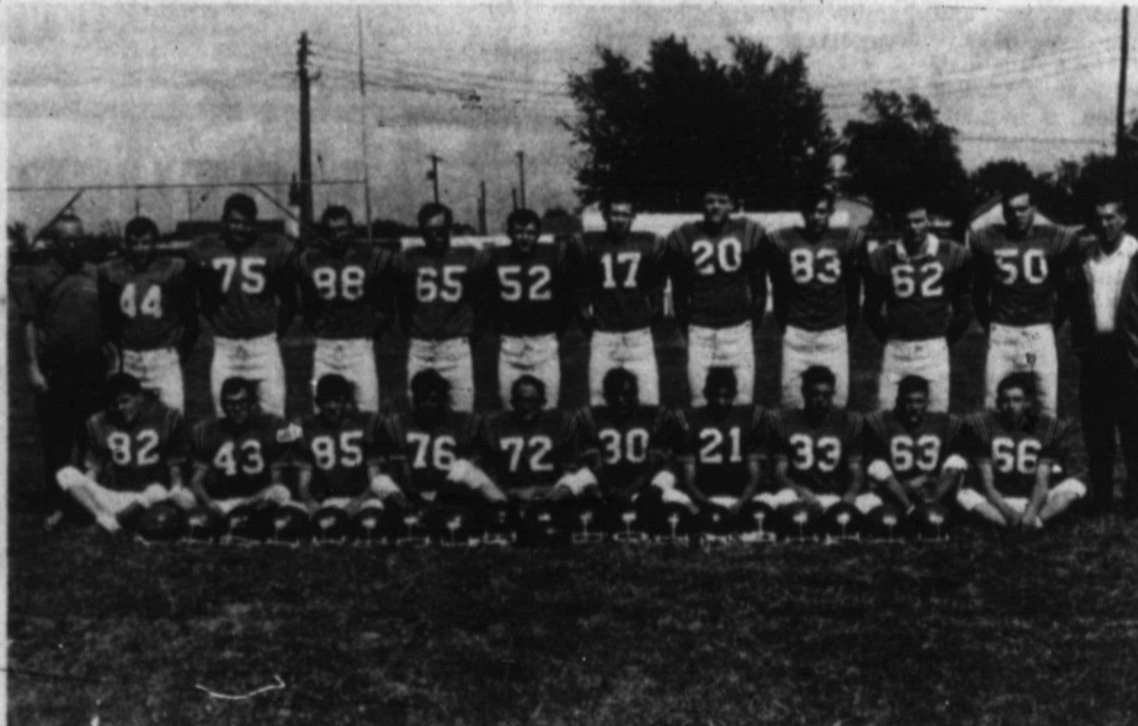
