Resolutions Honor Stone, Huffaker

Resolutions paying tribute to retiring Lynn County Commissioner W.E. (Ed) Stone and to retiring County Attorney Gerald Huffaker were adopted by Lynn County Commissioners last week.

The resolution pointed to him as "a home town boy who 'made good' and is a real asset to the county."

CROWD APPLAUDS RETIRING SHERIFF

A crowd of more than 150 persons turned out at Tahoka School Cafeteria Monday night to pay tribute to retiring Lynn County Sheriff

Norvell (Booger) Redwine, who was to end his 40 years of service as a law enforcement officer Wednesday, retiring after 24

years as a sheriff. Rev. Newton Starnes gave the invocation and Gerald Huffaker welcomed the crowd which included many

law officers from the area. Praising Redwine for his record as an officer were Bert Sinclair of the Department of Public Safety, sheriff-elect Stanley Krause, who has been a deputy under Redwine, and Truett Smith, former district judge.

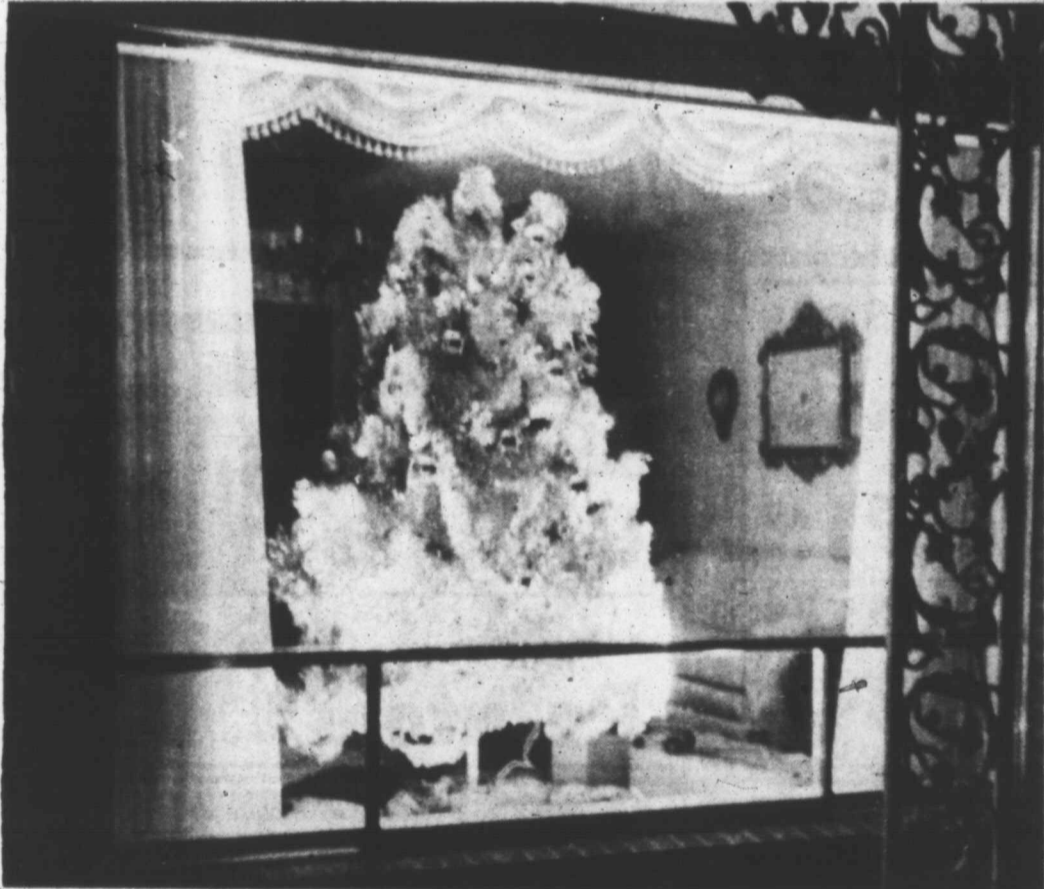
Redwine was presented a Texas-shaped plaque from the present staff and workers at the sheriff's office. Also shown was a plaque given him in appreciation by the Lynn County Commissioners, who presented it at Christmas.

After the speakers related incidents and examples of Redwine's accomplishments over the years and noted the high regard in which he is held by area officers and citizens, the sheriff rose to thank the crowd for their display of appreciation.

"It's a good thing I'm quitting," he said, "because I couldn't live up to the things that have been said about me here tonight." He added that he has had a satisfying 40 years in law enforcement and said "I appreciate all my friends in Lynn County... and I'm figuring on staying around here if you'll let me."

Christmas Presents All Are Stolen

Some incidents of vandalism and break-ins of homes both in the city and country were investigated by police and sheriff's departments during the last 10 days. Biggest loss was in burglary of a home northwest of New Home, where more than \$2,000 worth of items were stolen.

Burglars broke a glass out of a door to gain entry to the Terry Brown home near New Home, and took all the Christmas presents, plus major items including two television sets and a microwave oven.

On Friday Tommy Gardentire of Tahoka reported a tractor burglarized northwest of O'Donnell. Missing were a stereo tape player, speaker, John Deere tool box and tools.

In Tahoka, Pete Todd, 1822 S. 1st, reported that residence burglarized of food and savings stamps. And there was an unsuccessful attempt made to break into the apartment of Stephen Key, 2123 N. 7th Sunday or Monday. A window was broken out.

The window of the Tahoka Co-Op Gin office and some headlights at Bray Chevrolet lot were reported shot by vandals, and a bullet hole also was reported in the county library building. All happened over the weekend. Four persons were in jail here over the weekend, all on liquor charges.

White Named A-J Player Of Year In 3A

Tracy White, Tahoka's super running back who gained almost 1,900 yards last football season, was named Player of the Year in Class AAA by Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

The A-J noted that White scored 30 touchdowns last season and averaged 6.8 yards per carry. He did this in just nine games, missing the Ballinger contest.

In addition to being on the first team all-South Plains, White was honorable mention as a defensive back. Also mentioned on defense were Bulldogs Jacky Jolly, line-backer, and down lineman Luchion Thompson.

On offense, tackle Marty Lindsey was among those given honorable mention.

Sales Tax Payments

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said December city sales tax payments to Texas cities will bring 1980 totals to more than \$560 million.

Bullock said his office is sending \$33.5 million in payments to cities who levy the one-percent optional city sales tax this month.

The rebates to Texas cities is \$93.5 million more than was distributed among Texas cities during 1979, an average increase of more than 20 percent.

City sales taxes are collected along with the state's four percent sales tax by merchants and businesses and rebated monthly by the Comptroller to the cities where the tax is levied. Tahoka net payment this period \$1,526.01. Payments to date \$52,763.76.

On Dec. 23, Lynn County commissioners court adopted a resolution of appreciation to Redwine, noting that he served as a deputy in 1936 and 1937, with the highway patrol from 1937 to 1941, Rangers from 1941 to 1948, and as sheriff 1952-64 and 1969-80. The resolution said, in part:

"Whereas, the said Booger Redwine has...put his life in jeopardy on many occasions to protect the property and lives of the citizens of Lynn County...is known and respected by his fellow officers throughout the state...his professional conduct and integrity is recognized by all citizens of Lynn County to be beyond reproach...and whereas it is impossible for the citizens of Lynn County to ever repay Booger Redwine for the many hours of dedicated service he has given...we do hereby proclaim the 29th day of December, 1980, as 'Booger Redwine Day' and call upon the citizens to give appropriate recognition..."

The resolution also said the proclamation should forever remain in the county minutes to remind future generations how fortunate the citizens were to have been served "by the greatest sheriff in the State of Texas."

Signing the resolution were County Judge Melvin Burks and commissioners Ed Stone, J.C. Gandy, E.R. Blakney and Bart Anderson.

Three New Home Stars Make Team

Robert Estrada of New Home, a 200-pound junior who rushed for 1,197 yards on 168 carries during the past football season, and linemen Stony Gill and Randy Bell of the Leopards were all named to the All-South Plains Class 1A football team by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal this week.

Gill is a 165-pound senior guard and Bell is a 205-pound senior tackle. All three New Home players made the offensive first team. Gill and Randy Hall of Wilson were also given honorable mention on defense.

Area Educators Attend ATPE

Four educators from Lynn County attended the state convention of the Association of Texas Professional Educators in Austin recently.

A full day of in-service programs was provided on Friday, Dec. 12 ranging in scope from a workshop entitled "My Students Can't Read; What Can I Do?" to a session on practical help for teachers who have gifted students in their classes.

Dr. Willis Tate, president emeritus of Southern Methodist University and currently the chairman of the Governor's Advisory Committee on Public Education, delivered the keynote address to more than 800 delegates from across the state.

In his remarks Dr. Tate emphasized the need for the return to more local control of public education in Texas. He also called for an end to social promotion but pointed out that if this practice is terminated then the remedial programs will have to be expanded.

Other highlights of the two-day meeting included the election of new state officers and the discussion of legislative goals pertinent to education.

In your dealings with any government agency of the federal government, keep in mind that laws and regulations govern the agency from which you need help or services. Each agency is mandated by congress to provide specific services to the people.

For instance, if you receive a Veteran's Administration loan, a check because of military service, or some other service, you would want to contact the V.A. if you had questions about their programs. In this area, you can receive assistance with problems by calling 747-5256, and you will be in direct touch with the Regional Office of the Veterans Administration at Waco, Texas.

If you have a question about income tax or any of the programs administered by the Internal Revenue Service, you can obtain answers by calling a toll free number. The IRS toll free number is: 1-800-492-4830, for Texas.

Almost any question about Social Security can be handled by telephone. If you have problems or questions about your Social Security, call a toll-free number for answers. The number to call is: 1-800-392-1603.

If you applied for social security checks and have questions before you get your first check, call the number of the representative who assisted you. General inquiries can also be handled by calling 806-762-7381 in Lubbock.

**CITY OF TAHOKA
CITY OF TAHOKA ENFORCES
LOCAL FAIR HOUSING ORDINANCE**

The City of Tahoka has enacted and is currently enforcing a Local Fair Housing Ordinance. The City encourages all citizens to be aware of the provisions of this Ordinance and to report all violations to the City.

Major provisions of the City of Tahoka's Fair Housing Ordinance are as follows:

1. Prohibits discrimination in the sale, rental, financing and brokerage of housing.
2. Excludes multi-family, owner-occupied units of four units or less from coverage.
3. Sets up a position of Fair Housing Administrator in the City government to handle administration and enforcement.
4. Provides specific procedures for the receipt, investigation and conciliation of complaints alleging housing discrimination.
5. Authorizes the City Attorney to institute legal proceedings in cases of violations.
6. Provides for specific penalties (\$200 per day after the 75th day after filing a complaint).

PUBLIC NOTICE CITY OF TAHOKA FAIR HOUSING ORDINANCE ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM

On December 1, 1980, the City of Tahoka passed a comprehensive Fair Housing Ordinance which defines specific discriminatory housing practices prohibited by the City of Tahoka and provides for investigation of discrimination complaints and penalties for violations of the Ordinance.

Copies of the City's Fair Housing Ordinance have been distributed to local realtors, builders, developers and lending institutions and to public agency personnel handling housing programs in the City. Copies of this Ordinance are available free of charge to any interested persons or groups at the office of the City Administrator, Tahoka City Hall, 1612 Lockwood, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

To further promote effective enforcement of Tahoka's Fair Housing Ordinance, the City has developed a set of specific procedures for handling all formal complaints of discriminatory housing practices filed with the City. These procedures are based on the provisions of the Ordinance enacted by your City Council. Copies of these procedures may also be obtained at the Office of the City Administrator during the hours stated above by any interested persons or groups.

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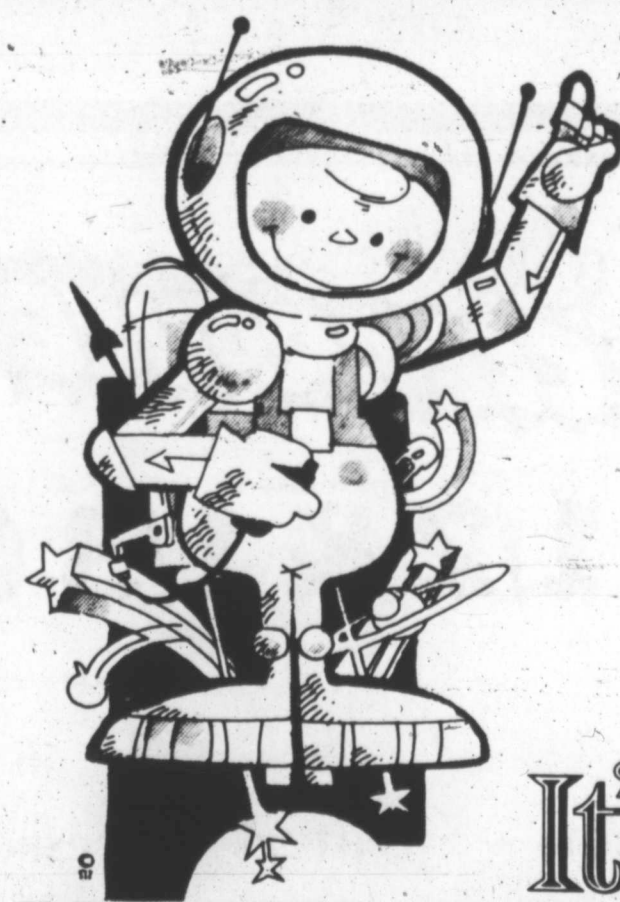

High Plains cotton harvest remained in high gear despite light snow in northern counties Christmas Eve. Classings at Lubbock neared the million bale mark the day before

Christmas, according to Mack Bennett, Area Director for USDA's Marketing Services Office at Lubbock. "We will reach the one-million-mark sometime Friday," Bennett continued.

Harvesting expanded rapidly and is estimated 85 to 95 percent complete. Sample receipts increased sharply at area offices.

COTTON TODAY

Speakers Announced: Two Congressional leaders will be featured speakers at the National Cotton Council's 43rd annual meeting in Atlanta Jan. 25-27. One is Sen. Thad Cochran (R-Miss.), newly named chairman of the Senate Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee.

In the upcoming Congress, Cochran also will chair the subcommittee on agricultural production, marketing, and price stabilization.

House Majority Leader Jim Wright (D-Tex.) is scheduled to address the Tuesday, Jan. 27, session of the

Lubbock's office classed 73,000 samples during the week ended Dec. 24. The season's total at Lubbock totaled 989,000. This compares with 946,000 classed by the same date last year.

Predominant grades during the week were grade 42 at 46 percent, grade 52 - 18 percent and grade 43 - 10 percent. About 12 percent were reeuced one grade because of bark, according to USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service.

Micronaire readings of 35-49 accounted for 66 percent. One percent miked higher while 33 percent miked lower. Lubbock's miked average for the week was 37, unchanged from a week ago.

High Plains growers sold mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and 52, staples 30 and 31 base miked around 75.90 cents per pound, up 220 points from last week. Mixed lots from last week. Mixed lots of mostly grades 41 and 42, staples 32 and 33, miked 35-49 brought about 82.10, up 225 from a week earlier.

Gins paid growers \$110 to \$125 per ton for cottonseed, mostly \$115 to \$120.

Money Bill Signed: The President has signed the 1981 appropriations bill for the Department of Agriculture and related agencies. The measure includes \$975,000 for cotton dust research, as well as a provision eliminating the Normal Crop Acreage (NCA) restriction on crop production.

This cotton producers who exceed their NCA in 1981 will remain eligible for program benefits on all crops.

Try these soup recipes during the holiday season. Thanks to Lady Stewart for giving these to me.

Turkey Chili
1 medium onion, chopped
1/2 c. chopped green pepper
2 T. vegetable oil
2 c. cooked and diced turkey
1 20-oz. can red kidney beans
2 c. canned or fresh tomatoes, chopped
2 T. chili powder
2 c. water or beef broth
Salt and pepper to taste
Cooked rice

Saute onion and green pepper in oil until tender. Stir in remaining ingredients, except rice. Heat to boiling. Reduce heat and simmer for 15 minutes stirring occasionally. Serve over rice. Serves 6

Chicken And Noodle Soup
1 3 to 3 1/2-lb. broiler cut up
4 c. water (or more)
1 onion, diced
1 stalk celery, diced
1 T. salt
1/2 t. pepper
Homemade noodles
Place broiler in stewing kettle. Add water to cover.

Add onion, celery, salt and pepper. Bring to boil; skim off froth. Turn down heat and simmer for 1 hour or until well done. Strain broth from chicken. Allow chicken to cool and take meat from bones. Put broth back in kettle. Bring to boil. Drop in noodles, stirring so that they separate. Simmer for 20 minutes. Add meat from chicken. Heat.

Homemade Noodles
2 eggs
1 T. salt
3 T. water
2 c. flour
Beat eggs, water and salt. Mix in flour until it is a stiff dough. Place on floured board. Roll out with rolling pin into large oval. Roll up like jelly roll after flouring top to keep from sticking. Slice with knife into narrow strips. Unroll and add to broth.

Cream Of Broccoli Soup
8 c. water
3 cubes chicken bouillon
2 10-oz. pkgs. frozen broccoli, chopped
2 T. onion flakes

1 t. salt
1/2 t. pepper
1/4 c. powdered milk
1 T. sherry

In a saucepan, combine water and bouillon cubes. Bring to a boil. Add frozen broccoli, onion flakes and seasonings. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat. Simmer for 15 minutes or until broccoli is tender. Cool slightly. Put a

third of the broccoli mixture into blender with 1/4 cup of the powdered milk. Blend until smooth. Pour into clean pan. Repeat until all broccoli and powdered milk is blended. Just before serving, heat, stirring in sherry. Serves 6 to 8.
