WHEN WE WERE kids, we sometimes would stand by the light switch, tense ourselves to move rapidly and flip the switch, trying to jump into bed before the light would go out.

We never made it, except once, when the switch didn't work. But we tried this often, never realizing that light travels 186,000 miles a second (I think—I'm relying on memory, and it gets more unreliable every day.)

The only thing faster than the speed of light is the time it takes the driver behind you to hit his horn when the traffic light changes to green.

There was another thing we used to do often when we were kids that I was reminded of this week. We used to sit for long periods of time (or lie down on our backs) and gaze at the clouds and try to see shapes of people and animals and houses and dragons and such in them. (We weren't reared in this country. Around here when a kid sees a cloud, he runs terrified to mama wanting to know what that thing is in the sky.)

What reminded me of the speed of light and seeing shapes in the clouds and watching the sky was a visit to the Texas Tech planetarium Sunday afternoon, to view a show on the stars and how scientists figured out ways to measure their distances from earth. The most distant clusters of objects in space which have been measured are quasars, said to be 9 billion light-years away. That means it would take a flash of light 9 billion years to be seen on earth, zipping along at 186,000 miles a second. Far out, as the young people used to say.

Also included in the 30-minute show and lecture (it costs a dollar) was information on some of the more familiar stars and groups of stars, none of which I could remember 30 minutes later.

Sometime ago I wrote about intending to visit the planetarium ever since the early 50s and how I finally went one day last year and the blame thing was closed for repairs. Anyway, this time it was open and although the show was interesting, the anticipation of 30 years' length was greater than the fulfillment, as most goals are when finally realized.

Still it was kind of neat to lean back in the seat and look up at the stars projected on the darkened dome ceiling. So often adults are too busy to stop and look around at what nature has to offer, much less look up and recall the magic of childhood fantasy, when all sorts of interesting things appeared in the sky.

SOME FOLKS around here go to Lubbock to buy groceries, but we know of at least one Lubbock housewife who last week read her copy of the News and decided to drive to Tahoka to buy groceries because, she said, the prices were better here than in Lubbock.

\$175,000 Bond Vote Is Saturday

Conservation Award Winners Announced

The Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District Tuesday night had its first awards banquet and named Shelia Fillingim of New Home and W.H. Cook of the Wells community as conservation homemaker and farmer of the year.

The awards have been given in the past at the annual Tahoka Chamber of Commerce banquet. This year the SWCD decided to have its own banquet, and W.Q. Richards of Paducah, secretary-treasurer of the Texas Assn. of SWCDs, spoke to a crowd which filled the banquet room of Tahoka Cafeteria.

Richards said the common thread linking any conservation farmer and a conservation homemaker "is a demonstrated care—his care for the land and hers for the home."

Longtime Resident
J.H. Sanders of O'Donnell presented the award to Cook, describing him as "truly a steward of the land God has given to him." Cook, called "Punk" by his friends, has lived in Lynn County since he was 2 years old. He served in the military forces in World War II. He and his wife, Geneva, have been married for 38 years, living in the Wells community, where they reared four daughters

and a son.
"As the children grew up they were all active in 4-H and FFA, and Punk can still be seen around almost any show in the county."

He has been a cooper with SWCD since 1946 and in 1974 installed a complete program on the 993 acres of cropland controlled. His terraced land is farmed on the contour and he has built and maintained about 32 miles of terraces.

Church Members
The Cooks are members of the Church of Christ in O'Donnell, and Sanders said

Cook has been an inspiration to many others to practice conservation farming.

The award to Mrs. Mike Fillingim was announced by director Lit Moore of New Home, who said "she's not only a homemaker, but a fine and attractive young lady who deserves this honor for the effort she is putting forth."

The Fillingims live on a farm eight miles west of New Home and have two children, age 6 and 7½. She grew up in Tahoka where she was active in school and

Residents of the City of Tahoka this Saturday will go to the polls to ballot on a proposed bond issue of \$175,000 to fix up the holes and cracks in the city's paved streets.

The bonds would pay for a citywide sealcoat program which city officials say is badly needed, and for which there are no funds in the city's operating budget. The \$175,000 would be spent over a three-year period, and the

project should put every paved street in the city in good shape, say city officials.

Voting will be at the Tahoka School Cafeteria Saturday from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Passage of the bond issue would mean an increase in taxes of 7 cents per \$100 valuation, according to City Manager Carl Reynolds and Joe Smith of Abilene, a representative of the First Southwest Bonding Com-

pany.
To a person whose property is valued at \$10,000, this would mean an increase of \$7 per year.

Present tax rate in the city is 42 cents per \$100 valuation, and the 7-cent increase would put money into interest and sinking funds to pay off the bond issue in 10 years. The city presently has no bonded indebtedness.

County Rejects Change In Accounting System

Lynn County commissioners Monday discussed at length a number of proposals related to accounting procedures used by the county, agreed that the county needs to keep better track of where the money goes, but decided to stay with an updated form of the current bookkeeping system rather than change over to a new system favored by the state comptroller's office.

Some other items were considered at the day-long meeting in the district courtroom, but most of the session related to several items on the agenda regarding spending and accounting.

Virginia Black of Austin, representing the comptroller's office, presented a recommendation that the county adopt what she called the "redbook accounting system." Commissioner Eldon Gattis gave support to her recommendation, voicing the belief that the new system and a purchase order buying plan would give the county better control over spending, buying and inventory of equipment.

Questions Raised

Other commissioners said they had no objection to a purchase order system and favored any reasonable method of keeping track of money and equipment, but questioned whether the purchase order plan would be workable. Commissioner Bart Anderson pointed out that he is "14 miles away from the courthouse and I can see problems in getting a purchase order every time we need to buy something." Other commissioners also voiced similar concerns.

Mrs. Black said a purchase order plan is not really any good unless only one or two persons is responsible for issuing the orders.

Mrs. Black went into the present accounting system with county treasurer Mrs. Jessie Stevens and reported

back in the afternoon that "your posting system is outdated." When questioned, she admitted the present system could be improved and noted that the county already has taken some steps to insure better budget control.

The commissioners this year have started getting a monthly report of how much is budgeted in specific areas, how much of the budgeted amount has been spent to date and how much remains.

Too Many Funds

Mrs. Black recommended consolidating several funds set up in the county, such as putting "officer's salary" and voter registration funds into the general funds and putting road and bridge funds into the precinct funds. Since all paid-outs are coded as to purpose, these extra fund designations are not needed, she said. Commissioners and Mrs. Stevens appeared to agree on the practicality of consolidating the new funds.

When asked about changing over to an entire new system of bookkeeping, however, Mrs. Stevens said she is satisfied with the system the way it is and "I don't see any need to change."

Neither did the commissioners, for after hours of discussion, they voted unanimously to leave the accounting system as it is for the present time. On a proposal to use purchase orders for buying, the vote was 3-1 "not to use purchase orders." The commissioners took the rather unusual action of voting on these two proposals not to do something. Gattis, who maintained that "we're not accounting for spending the taxpayers' money as we should be," voted against the measure.

Anderson, J.C. Gandy and E.R. Blakney voted for, meaning they were against using the PO's. They all expressed the belief that using purchase orders would

cost the taxpayers extra time and money in the form of mileage and delays in getting a number every time a purchase is needed.

Accounting Plans

During a discussion including Mrs. Black in which it was noted that auditors and accountants prefer various methods and also suggesting a reserve fund for emergencies and non-budgeted expenses, Judge Melvin Burks commented that "auditors and bookkeepers don't speak English—I have to work with real facts, like money and no money."

Among other items taken up, the commissioners approved paying the O'Donnell Fire Dept. \$15,000 from revenue sharing funds in a lump sum for the year's operations and included this in a written contract which O'Donnell Mayor Truett Hodnett had requested.

It was voted to seek bids on a new car for the sheriff's department and on an air conditioning system for the county jail, another item which took considerable time, with Sheriff Krause present to explain the urgency of the matter.

The Sheriff said the state Jail Standards Commission has told him that "the jail will have to be air-conditioned by this summer or we'll close it down." He also said that the state jail watchdog group wants the county to put in a chiller system using present heating pipes for cooling, eliminating the need to put in ducts through thick concrete. It also is a system which would raise no new security problems Krause said.

Advance Approval

Others matters of money management came up, and the commissioners voted that they should give prior review and approval for any out-of-town trips by county employees for which reimbursement is expected.

A vacation policy for county employees establishing a one-week vacation after the first year and two weeks thereafter was passed. It also was voted that no department have two persons on vacation at the same time, a proposal which drew some criticism, and which was passed by votes of three commissioners, with Blakney abstaining.

County Atty. Jimmy Wright explained to the commissioners' satisfaction why the county attorney's office is being operated from Wright's law offices at Harper and Main. The group agreed that this is the most practical plan, noting that the listed number for the county attorney rings at Wright's office, and authorizing him to put up a sign on his office to make it easier for people to find the county attorney.

Several visitors attended the meeting, including three Wilson area citizens.

J.E. Nance Jr. of Tahoka told sheriff's deputies that his shop 3 1/2 miles north of the city on U.S. 87 had been burglarized and a large quantity of items stolen. Missing were tools, tires, farm equipment, fishing gear, an outboard motor and other articles which took three pages to list on the complaint. No dollar total was immediately available.

The sheriff's department arrested two O'Donnell men and charged them last week with the Jan. 26 burglary of O'Donnell Gin & Grain Co. office, in which \$130 cash and some other things valued at \$80 were taken. Charged were Benjamin Lopez, 19,

and Jesse Ray Gutierrez, 18. Shirley Williams of O'Donnell told officers her car left by the side of the highway north of Tahoka had been burglarized, with some checks missing. The checks later were found nearby.

Sales Tax Rebates

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said 960 Texas cities shared nearly \$100 million in city sales tax rebates in February.

Bullock said his office sent a total of \$91.5 million to cities levying the optional one percent city sales tax.

The city sales tax is collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and businesses and rebated monthly to the cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller.

O'Donnell net payment this period-\$2,798.74.

A friend was bragging about how well his new insurance plan for his employees works, without costing an arm and leg. He said it was a RLR which stood for Retired Lives Reserve. Please explain.

An RLR plan is really a combination term policy and savings plan with amounts confirming to a group plan. The term policy belongs to the employee and is paid for by the employer who deducts the premiums. The employee is not charged with any taxable income for the first \$50,000 of coverage. The savings plan belongs to the employer with funds used to operate the plan. Contributions are made and deducted by the employer and the employee has no taxable income from it. If the employee remains with the company until retirement, the savings plan pays the premiums for the term coverage... freeing both employer and employee from maintaining postretirement coverage.

DEBT is a Special Education Program aimed toward cultivating and nurturing little lives from their beginning. DEBT is a program for parents and their children that is

designed to add to parental skills in teaching children within the home. The program provides for early identification and intervention of all children having the following disabilities: speech or language deficit, physical disability, hearing impairment, mental retardation, visual impairment, emotional disturbance, developmental delay, premature birth, culturally disadvantaged or any other condition that may be viewed as high risk.

Volunteers spend twenty-four hours in preservice training. Denise Pillans and Dianne Garner from DEBT Outreach Training Staff in Lubbock supervise training. Susan Duncan from Tahoka and Linda Mensch from O'Donnell are Lynn County's volunteers. Many more are needed to properly serve the ten referred to DEBT from Lynn County.

The first play group was held Feb. 18 in the activity building of the Church of Christ. Parents and children were from O'Donnell, Tahoka and Wilson. Assessment and evaluation of the tots were made to plan individual programs for their physical, social and mental development.

Refreshments were provided by Alta Patterson and Jewel Parker. Baptist young women represented by Diana Hawthorne and Lynn Lankford supervised sibling activity during the morning.

DEBT is a totally volunteer program that is supported by interested individuals and organizations in each county.

Developmental toys and equipment are furnished by the DEBT Outreach office in Lubbock but support is needed for transportation and specialist services. Volunteers are needed to bring refreshments and to supervise siblings during the morning play group.

Referrals are welcome from parents, doctors, neighbors, ministers, teachers, or anyone in the community.

The Science Fair will consist of two divisions, the junior division (7th and 8th grades; and the senior division (9th-12th grades).

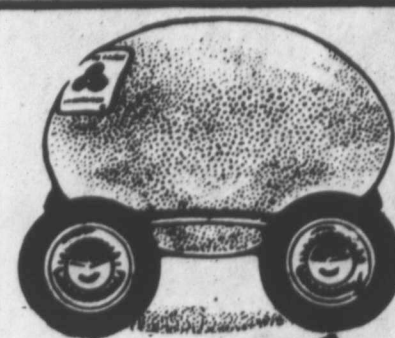
The junior division will be held in room 306 and will contain approximately 100 projects in all fields of science. These students are under the direction of Mrs. Pam Vaughan.

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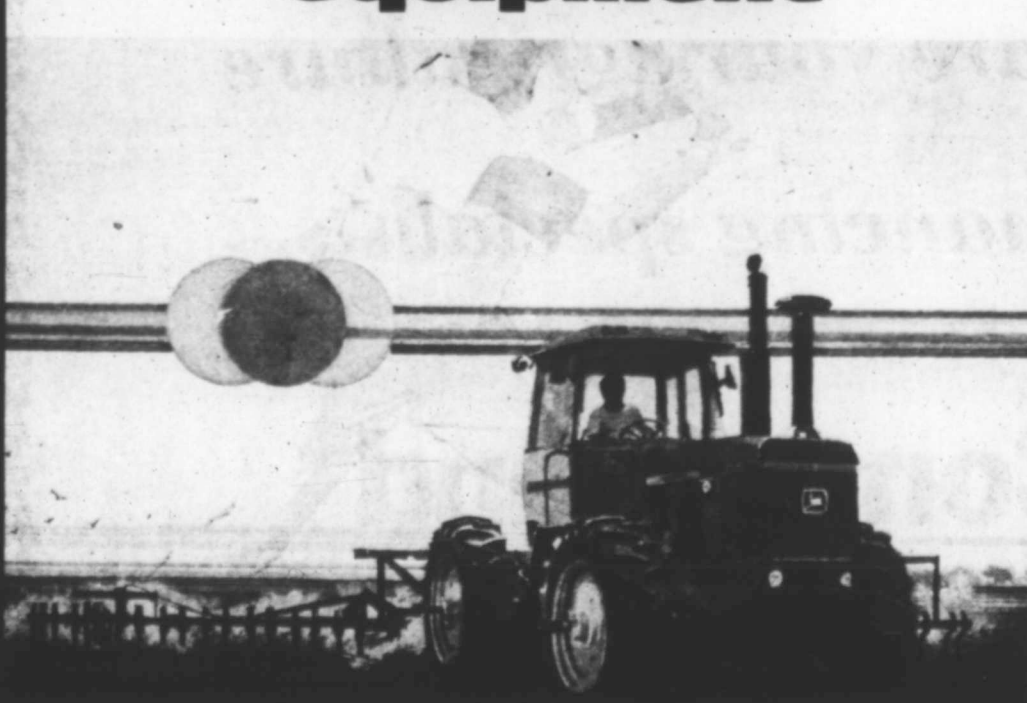
