So far, Lynn Countys rainfall is well above average, 2.72 inches against an average of 1.78 for the last three months. Tahoka recorded .82 inch in early December, 1980, compared to an average of .52; .37 inch in January less than the .60 average, but 1.53 inches in February against an average of .63 inches; and now has .11 to start off windy March.

President Ronald Reagan's proposed budget cuts, outlined to Congress are "a strong move in the right direction and represent an approach that I have advocated since first coming to Congress, Charles W. Stenholm said today.

"I certainly agree with the general direction the President's budget takes," Stenholm said, commenting on though I have some unanswered questions."

Stenholm singled out the projected \$122.4 billion deficit outlined in the proposal. "It seems to me that if deficit spending has caused inflation for the past four years, then it stands to reason that it will continue to cause inflation." he said.

Stenholm said the President had presented a challenge to Congress for an alternative plan "which offers a greater chance of balancing the budget." The 17th District Congressman said he would respond to that challenge by looking at other areas in the federal budget "that could stand further cuts and at some of the President's proposed cuts.



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

Ever had second thoughts about something you bought through door-to-door sales? Did you keep the item or cancel the contract agreement?

You have certain rights when it comes to door-todoor sales -- under both a federal regulation and Texas

Federal Trade Commission regulations and the Texas Home Solicitation Sales Act define the rights of consumers regarding door-to-door

'COOLING-OFF' TIME According to law, you have an absolute right to cancel the sales agreement until midnight of the third business day after signing the contract -- in cases involving door-to-door sales, lease or rental of goods or services costing \$25 or more, when both the sales promotion and your agreement to buy are made somewhere other than the

seller's place of business. To cancel, simply mail a written notice of cancellation to the company within the three-day period.

'Anytime-Cancel' Rule There's another section of the law that allows you to cancel at any time.

Sales contracts you sign are required to tell you of your right to cancel under the three-day circumstances, and you must be given a

SOIL INSECT CONTROL IN VEGETABLE GARDENS

As vegetable gardeners in Lynn County prepare for spring planting, their first step should be to control soil insects.

Soil insects can reduce vegetable quality and yields if left uncontrolled, points out Young, county agent.

For effective control, mix insecticides at a depth of 4-6 inches at least two weeks before the garden plot is planted.

Among destructive soil insects are wireworms, white grubs, seed corn maggots, cabbage maggots, mole crickets, sowbugs, slugs, snails and cutworms. Some destroy plant seeds, roots, tubers and underground stem parts while others cut off young plants at or near the soil surface.

4-H AND AGRICULTURE HAVE STRONG TIES: A natural partnership exists between the agricultural industry of Texas and the state's 4-H Clubs, says Preston D. Sides, 4-H and youth specialist.

Ties between young people enrolled in 4-H Clubs and agricultural production and marketing segments have been strong since the start of 4-H work shortly after the turn of the century. In fact, the enabling legislation which created 4-H as a part of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service specifically mentions agriculture as a relevant part of the

When Tom Marks founded the Boys Corn Clubs--the forerunner of today's 4-H--he stressed the teaching of proven techniques of increasing agricultural production and the application of these techniques to growing corn. The result demonstrations begun by Marks and his group of 25 boys near Jacksboro, Texas, proved to be successful in out-producing other corn crops grown in the area, according to early production records.

culture is evident in all these projects as most stress the production, marketing or utilization of agricultural products," Sides says.

vestments in terms of a guaranteed lifetime income, but I'm a little vague on the details. What's so good about an annuity? The major benefit in an immediate life annuity is the

assurance of a specified amount of money for as long you're alive to collect it. An additional benefit is if you receive a lump-sum payout from a qualified employer's pension, profit-sharing or stock bonus plan, and use it within 60 days, to purchase an annuity approved by the Internal Revenue Service, you are not liable for taxes on that money. Some plans stop payment upon the owner's death, while others continue payments to beneficiaries for a specified period of time after death.

Postal Service Work Defended In Program

During a second Rotary program this month on the U.S. Postal Service, Tahoka Postmaster Jim Lummus answered some of the popular criticisms of the service. A major reason the Postal

Service is operating on a deficit, he said, is because of the "franking privilege" or carrying mail postage free Federal government agencies, including that of congressmen, bureaucrats, Department of Agriculture, Soil Conservation Service, etc., as well as church bulletins and a reduced rate for newspapers and maga-

In addition, the local postoffices have had to take on the job of registering people for Selective Service and the issuing of food

Tahoka postal employees handle an average of 10,000 pieces of mail daily, he said. Last year, nationally, the Postal Service handled 106.3 billion pieces of mail, an increase of 5.5 percent over the previous year, and has registered 34 percent gross productivity in the last ten years. Lubbock postal center works a quarter million pieces of mail each night, he

said. The U.S. has the lowest postal rate of any nation in the world except for Canada, which is entirely government sudsidized. Most other nations have an 80 cent postal rate for letter mail. Lummus also showed two short movie clips of the new automatic sorting machines
