

## Rains Bring Big Smiles In Area

General rains Friday night and Saturday, followed by four days of misty weather, brought big smiles on the faces of people in this farming country.

Tahoka's National Weather Service observer recorded 1.43 inches of rain by 7:30 a.m. Saturday, traces on Sunday and Monday, .05 on Tuesday, and .06 on Wednesday, for a week's total of 1.54 inches.

All the county received from 1.00 to 2.00-plus inches, according to reports received by The News. Rain was heaviest in the southern portion, where many areas reported near to or more than two inches.

Farmers report beds of listed land are soaked. Land farmed flat to date is now in perfect shape for listing.

The farming country was growing apprehensive that

1981 may be another dry one. Of course, this wet spell does not insure a crop, but it makes prospects a lot brighter. Another year like 1980, when we had only 16.67 inches and most of this coming at inopportune times, would put many farmers in financial trouble.

So far, Lynn County rainfall is well above average, 2.72 inches against an average of 1.78 for the last three months. Tahoka recorded .82 inch in early December, 1980, compared to an average of .52; .37 inch in January less than the .60 average, but 1.53 inches in February against an average of .63 inches; and now has .11 to start off windy March.

Fortunately, so far, there has been no major blowing sand, but some sandy days are sure to come.

## Bonds Voted; Council Airs Phone Hangups

With about a tenth of the qualified voters in the city going to the polls last Saturday, a proposed \$175,000 bond issue for street repairs and re-surfacing was approved. The vote was 77 for and 39 against.

The money will be spent over a three-year period to put all the paved streets in good shape, it was reported. Next step will be to sell the bonds, after which bids on the work itself will be sought, it was reported at Monday night's meeting of the Tahoka City Council.

With a franchise for General Telephone Co. to operate the telephone system in Tahoka coming up for renewal next month, councilmen discussed a new contract with the company at length Tuesday, with three representatives of the company present to answer questions and explain their position on various points.

**Reports Plans**  
O.D. Hearn, manager of the Brownfield office of GTE, which includes Tahoka, reported on various steps which have been taken and which are still planned to improve the quality of service to Tahoka.

Councilmen reported to Hearn that there still are many problems with the phones in Tahoka, particularly regarding long

distance calls, but admitted that the problems do not appear to be as frequent as in the past. Several months ago, Hearn visited with the council and promised to improve service.

He observed that GTE now has four service employees living in Tahoka, including Danny Stancell, maintenance cable splicer, Larry Phillips and Kirby Shearer, customer service specialists, and Steve Key, switching technician.

Mayor Mel Leslie and councilmen David Midkiff

and James Roberts were absent, H.B. McCord Jr. presided, and others present included councilmen Jim Solomon and Richard White and City Manager Carl Reynolds.

No action was taken on the renewing of franchise, but it was indicated that it would be considered at a meeting later this month. Reynolds said some special meetings will be needed anyway in regard to budget planning.

"We want to serve the community of Tahoka well

and do a good job for everyone," Hearn said. He noted that the company last year paid a total of \$17,434 in taxes to the city, county and Tahoka school district.

A bid by Lydick Roofing Co. to repair the leaking city hall roof for \$2,976 was accepted by the council. There was one higher bid.

Reynolds told the council he anticipates no deficit in city finances at the end of the current fiscal year, March 31, but said the surplus "may be about \$1.98."

### Congressman Charles W. Stenholm

President Ronald Reagan's proposed budget cuts, outlined to Congress are "a strong move in the right direction and represent an approach that I have advocated since first coming to Congress," Charles W. Stenholm said today.

"I certainly agree with the general direction the President's budget takes," Stenholm said, commenting on the Reagan speech. "even though I have some unanswered questions."

Stenholm singled out the projected \$122.4 billion deficit outlined in the proposal. "It seems to me that if deficit spending has caused inflation for the past four years, then it stands to reason that it will continue to cause inflation," he said.

Stenholm said the President had presented a challenge to Congress for an alternative plan "which offers a greater chance of balancing the budget." The 17th District Congressman said he would respond to that challenge by looking at other areas in the federal budget "that could stand further cuts and at some of the President's proposed cuts."

"The budget that Congress finally passes must be as fair

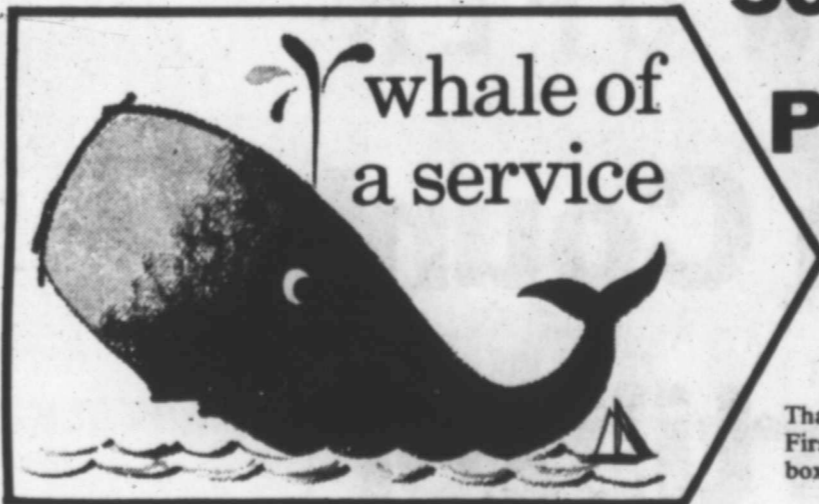

### DOOR-TO-DOOR SALES-- YOUR RIGHTS UNDER THE LAW

Ever had second thoughts about something you bought through door-to-door sales? Did you keep the item or cancel the contract agreement?

You have certain rights when it comes to door-to-door sales -- under both a federal regulation and Texas law.

Federal Trade Commission regulations and the Texas Home Solicitation Sales Act define the rights of consumers regarding door-to-door sales.

### 'COOLING-OFF' TIME

According to law, you have an absolute right to cancel the sales agreement until midnight of the third business day after signing the contract -- in cases involving door-to-door sales, lease or rental of goods or services costing \$25 or more, when both the sales promotion and your agreement to buy are made somewhere other than the seller's place of business.

To cancel, simply mail a written notice of cancellation to the company within the three-day period.

### 'Anytime-Cancel' Rule

There's another section of the law that allows you to cancel at any time.

Sales contracts you sign are required to tell you of your right to cancel under the three-day circumstances, and you must be given a

### Cancel 'Musis'

After you cancel a contract, you must return the goods if the seller requests you to.

If you are not requested to return the goods within 20 days, you are under no further obligation.

The seller must refund all money you have paid within 10 days from the date of cancellation.

### Protect Yourself

Of course consumers can take two steps to protect themselves from unsatisfactory situations in door-to-door sales in the first place.

Make sure you're dealing with a legitimate, authorized sales representative who conducts business fairly and ethically.

Also, decide whether purchasing the product meets a real need or if you are acting impulsively.

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## COTTON TODAY

**COTTON LEADERS MEET**  
**VEEP:** A delegation of National Cotton Council officers, top officials of interest groups, and key NCC staff met recently with Vice President George Bush to discuss the cotton industry's regulatory problems. The vice president serves as chairman of President Reagan's Task Force for Regulatory Relief.

NCC President Frank Mitchener commended the new Administration for its goal of reducing the regulatory burden on American industry and pointed to OSHA's cotton dust standard as a prime example of regulatory excess. The Council's executive committee also met with key government officials to lay out the cotton industry's proposals for "fine tuning" and extending the 1977 agricultural act.

**FILL UP WITH COTTON:** Alcohol Fuels, a Vicksburg, Miss., firm, plans to build a plant that will convert waste from cotton gins and saw mills into alcohol fuel. The company expects to market synthetic fuel that is competitively priced with gasoline, according to Chem-

ical Week, a trade magazine. **EXPORTS Continue:** Exports of 89,400 running bales of upland cotton during the week ended Feb. 19 brought the season's total to 3,218,300. Japan received 25,800 bales and South Korea, 24,000. New sales for current marketing year delivery were 59,300 running bales. The largest buyer was South Korea with 30,700.

**MAID IN CANADA:** Maid of Cotton Karie Ross, Clinton, Okla., began a two-week schedule of activities on behalf of U.S. cotton in Canada March 1. Arranged by the Canadian Cotton Council, the activities will include retail promotions with leading department stores and media appearances in Vancouver, Victoria, Edmonton, Calgary, Toronto, and Montreal.

In addition to the Canadian Cotton Council, the Maid's visit is sponsored by the Foreign Agricultural Service and Cotton Council International, overseas arm of the National Cotton Council.

## A Visit With Your County Agent

### SOIL INSECT CONTROL IN VEGETABLE GARDENS

As vegetable gardeners in Lynn County prepare for spring planting, their first step should be to control soil insects.

Soil insects can reduce vegetable quality and yields if left uncontrolled, points out Young, county agent.

For effective control, mix insecticides to a depth of 4-6 inches at least two weeks before the garden plot is planted.

Among destructive soil insects are wireworms, white grubs, seed corn maggots, cabbage maggots, mole crickets, sowbugs, slugs, snails and cutworms. Some destroy plant seeds, roots, tubers and underground stem parts while others cut off young plants at or near the soil surface.

Most soil insects can be controlled with diazinon 25 percent liquid concentration or Spectracide 6000 applied as a 5 percent granule.

Granules usually give the best control. If cutworms or sowbugs become a problem after the garden has been planted, broadcast 5 percent Sevin bait over the soil surface. This bait containing metaldehyde will also control slugs and snails. However, it is not formulated to be mixed into soil.

Garden sites planted for the first time or those previously in grass or weeds are more likely to harbor damaging numbers of soil pests. Before treating with an insecticide, inspect the garden site by taking soil samples at several locations to a depth of 5 to 6 inches. Remove one square foot section of soil from each location and record the number of soil insect pests present. As a general rule, an average of one or more soil insects per sample suggests the need for insecticide treatment.

Before applying any pesticide always read and follow label instructions.

**4-H AND AGRICULTURE HAVE STRONG TIES:** A natural partnership exists between the agricultural industry of Texas and the state's 4-H Clubs, says Preston D. Sides, 4-H and youth specialist.

Ties between young people enrolled in 4-H Clubs and agricultural production and marketing segments have been strong since the start of 4-H work shortly after the turn of the century. In fact, the enabling legislation which created 4-H as a part of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service specifically mentions agriculture as a relevant part of the program.

When Tom Marks founded the Boys Corn Clubs--the forerunner of today's 4-H--he stressed the teaching of proven techniques of increasing agricultural production and the application of these techniques to growing corn. The result demonstrations begun by Marks and his group of 25 boys near Jacksboro, Texas, proved to be successful in out-producing other corn crops grown in the area, according to early production records.

Later, in 1912, girls became a part of the program with the forming of Girls Tomato

I've heard that an annuity is one of the best investments in terms of a guaranteed lifetime income, but I'm a little vague on the details. What's so good about an annuity?

The major benefit in an immediate life annuity is the assurance of a specified amount of money for as long you're alive to collect it. An additional benefit is if you receive a lump-sum payout from a qualified employer's pension, profit-sharing or stock bonus plan, and use it within 60 days, to purchase an annuity approved by the Internal Revenue Service, you are not liable for taxes on that money. Some plans stop payment upon the owner's death, while others continue payments to beneficiaries for a specified period of time after death.

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

**Postal Service Work Defended In Program**

During a second Rotary program this month on the U.S. Postal Service, Tahoka Postmaster Jim Lummus answered some of the popular criticisms of the service.

A major reason the Postal Service is operating on a deficit, he said, is because of the "franking privilege" or carrying mail postage free Federal government agencies, including that of congressmen, bureaucrats, Department of Agriculture, Soil Conservation Service, etc., as well as church bulletins and a reduced rate for newspapers and magazines.

In addition, the local postoffices have had to take on the job of registering people for Selective Service and the issuing of food stamps.

Tahoka postal employees handle an average of 10,000 pieces of mail daily, he said. Last year, nationally, the Postal Service handled 106.3 billion pieces of mail, an increase of 5.5 percent over the previous year, and has registered 34 percent gross productivity in the last ten years. Lubbock postal center works a quarter million pieces of mail each night, he said.

The U.S. has the lowest postal rate of any nation in the world except for Canada, which is entirely government subsidized. Most other nations have an 80 cent postal rate for letter mail. Lummus also showed two short movie clips of the new automatic sorting machines
