

## If Johnny Can't Read, He May Not Graduate

Students who can't pass an established test on reading, writing and solving mathematics problems someday soon will not be allowed to graduate from Tahoka High School, under a planned program to set up minimum competency levels in the school system.

Tahoka School board last Thursday night directed the administration and faculty to begin developing a minimum competency program "with a goal that no student graduate from Tahoka High School who cannot meet the established levels."

The board voted on contract extensions for all teachers in the school system, with principals Clifford Gardner, Tom Cooper and Jim Marcus present to make recommendations.

Resignation of Sandy Oliver, girls basketball coach, was accepted. Her letter was read and accepted after she already had been voted an extension on her contract.

It was voted to rehire non-teaching school personnel and secretaries and all elementary school teachers. Contracts also were extended for the following high school teachers:

In a general comment on the faculty, Board President Bob Haney said "I hope they all continue to have a positive attitude. We're very proud of our faculty...We've hired the very best people we could find and the teachers need to know we are in full support of them."

Discussion on the establishment of a minimum competency program brought out the fact that many youngsters in the school system aren't learning satisfactorily and there also was some talk about the knotty problem of what to do with pupils who are incapable of learning.

One administrator estimated that only about half the students who go into the seventh grade, for example, are prepared and qualified to do seventh grade level work. "But you can't retain a youngster forever in the lower grades, outside his or

her social and age level," he commented.

Supt. Jim Coulston told the board that with federal budget cuts indicated and with uncertainty about what the current legislature will do regarding school financing, preparation of a local school budget for next year is almost impossible at this time. Business manager David Roberson reported that 84 per cent of the school's currently due taxes have been collected.

Coulston also reported that enrollment and average daily attendance figures have continued to decline in the schools. At this time last year, average daily attendance was about 890 and on Feb. 16 this year it was down to 808, total for all schools. Enrollment on March 12 was 888.

Tahoka High School is very near the point of dropped one classification in the University Interscholastic League's alignments for sports and academic events. At present the dividing line between Class AAA and Class AA is 265 and Tahoka High's present enrollment is 270. No change in classifications of schools will be made until 1982, however. The dividing lines may be changed by then, also, but presently Class AAA includes all high schools with average daily membership from 265 to 614.

### Lineup Set For Three Elections

Five persons are running for four places on the Lynn County Hospital District board of directors, it was reported this week. The April 4 election will be conducted at the Tahoka School cafeteria along with the city and school elections the same day.

Seeking the four directorships are Jesse Dorman, Leland White, Monte Dodson, Norma Thomas Wagner and Joy Bragg.

On the ballot for the city election are Meldon Leslie for mayor, unopposed, and for two council seats, incumbent David Midkiff, Barry Weaver, and W.O. (Cap) Wharton. Incumbent H.B. McCord is not seeking re-election.

Seeking the two places on the Tahoka school board are Jim Wells, Martin Warren, incumbent Tommy Lawson, Steve Greer and John Curry. Incumbent Marlin Hawthorne is not seeking re-election.

### Jail Project Contract Let

Lynn County Commissioners last Wednesday approved a contract with Bruce Thornton of Lubbock to install air conditioning in the county jail to meet requirements of the state jail standards commission. Thornton's bid, the only one received, was accepted at a called meeting.

The bid was for \$27,270. In addition the county agreed to post part of the performance bond for the company and agreed to a 5-year service contract. The first year is free and the next four will cost the county \$1200 per year.

That thing sticking 54 feet up in the air above the Kenneth Scott home east of Tahoka is not a windcharger, because it charges no batteries. But it does generate electricity and should considerably reduce the Scotts' electric bills.

Just how much it will help on the power bill remains to be seen, because the Scotts installed the wind-powered

generating system only last Saturday.

The federal government encourages use of such devices to create energy from natural sources in view of the well-publicized energy crisis faced by the nation, and although the wind-powered generators are not inexpensive, a person who installs one at his residence may take a tax credit up to 40 per cent of the original cost.

In the Scotts' case, this could be a tax credit of almost \$2,700, since the type generator they had installed costs \$6,700. This is a turnkey price, including pole, installation, and accessories for the brand and size

generator the Scotts chose, Enertech.

Whenever the wind blows, Scott explained, the rotors turn and if the wind is at least 8 mph, it starts feeding electricity into the regular utility company system. It is hooked into the system below the meter and therefore it doesn't go on your electric bill. It works in conjunction with the utility-supplied power; the power company electricity is only activated to the extent needed if the wind-generated power is not sufficient to provide all the power.

A switchbox includes gauges to show how hard the wind is blowing and how

many watts of power are being generated by the equipment.

Enertech, the company which manufactures the wind generator in Vermont, says the 1800 model such as the Scotts have can provide up to 60 per cent of the power needed for a home. Its maximum output is 1800 watts of power when the wind is blowing at 30 miles an hour or more.

The device starts operating at 8 mph winds and cuts off when the wind is below that, or when the wind is up to 40 mph, to prevent damage. It also is designed to cut off when the utility company power fails for any reason, so that workers on the utility lines will be in no danger from power feedback from the wind system. This means it cannot be used as an auxiliary power source when the regular power is out.

The wind generator is believed to be the only one in operation in Lynn County. Certainly it is the only one made by Enertech, although there are other companies which manufacture similar equipment.

The Scotts and their children, Tracey, 9, and Trent, 4, live in a three-bedroom home with refrigerated air conditioning two miles south of U.S. 380 on FM 2956 and then a mile east. Scott estimated the family electricity bill during the hot summer months runs \$100 per month or over, and expects to see this diminish

### Sales Tax Rebates Reported

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said rebates of the optional one-cent sales tax for this month total \$37.9 million.

Bullock said most cities received smaller payments this month compared to March of last year because of a change in the agency's accounting period and processing timetable but that generally 1981 payments to cities are running well ahead of the 1980 rebates for the first three months.

The city sales tax is collected along with the state tax by merchants and businesses and rebated monthly to the cities in which the tax is collected by the Comptroller.

Martin Liendo was reported in fair condition Tuesday at Lubbock General Hospital where he was taken after treatment here. His wife was treated and released for less serious injuries. Liendo underwent surgery on stab wounds on his side, back, arms and abdomen.

Carlton Jolly of Tahoka told police here Sunday that a man in a small foreign vehicle pointed a gun at him and his wife on Main Street as they pulled alongside. The vehicle was registered to a Big Spring man. Jolly said the man who showed the gun briefly was a white man, about 50.

A \$2,000 reward has been offered by Lubbock Crime Line for information in the theft of a John Deere tractor recently in Lynn County. The tractor is owned by Joy Spears.

Roy Stephens reported a 1977 Ford pickup stolen from a farm 12 miles west of Tahoka Friday. The pickup was recovered in Lubbock Monday, minus some tools and an air compressor which had been in it.

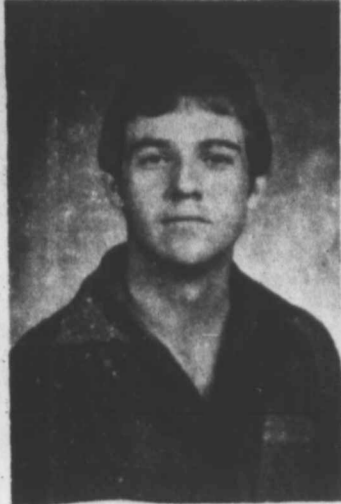

INSUR-MATION

Q. Tax shelters seem to be the province of the wealthy. Are there any options open to we "anything-but-wealthy" who would like at least a few of the advantages?

A. With an IRA, the eligible employee (one who is not a participant in a pension or profit sharing program) can set aside in a special retirement account 15 percent of total compensation or \$1,500 yearly, whichever is less - all of which is deductible on federal income tax returns. And, all interest earned is sheltered from any income tax until the fund is used at retirement. A bonus - if you are eligible for an IRA and have not done so - it's not too late. Before April 15, you may open an IRA account and have it treated as a 1980 deduction.

### Public Notice Of Tax Exemptions Available To Homeowners

The Wilson Independent School District tax office is currently accepting applications for residence homestead exemptions. The deadline for filing is April 1, 1981. Applications should be filed as early as possible to avoid inconvenience to the homeowner.

Two types of homestead exemptions from school taxes are available to taxpayers who owned their residence homesteads in this school district on January 1 of this year. First, the general homestead exemption is available to all homeowners and exempts \$5,000 from the market value of the homestead.

Second, any person who is 65 years of age or older can be exempted an additional \$10,000 from the market value of the homestead. Proof of age or disability may be necessary.

Homeowners age 65 or older who apply for their exemption will be granted a tax freeze. If application is not made, the tax freeze will be lost for this year.

Application forms were mailed earlier to all homeowners who qualified for a homestead exemption in 1980. If you did not receive an application, or if you have questions about qualifying for exemptions or filing application forms, contact the school tax office at 628-2671.

He advised each individual to take time to relax, and demonstrated several very simple exercises a person can use to relax.

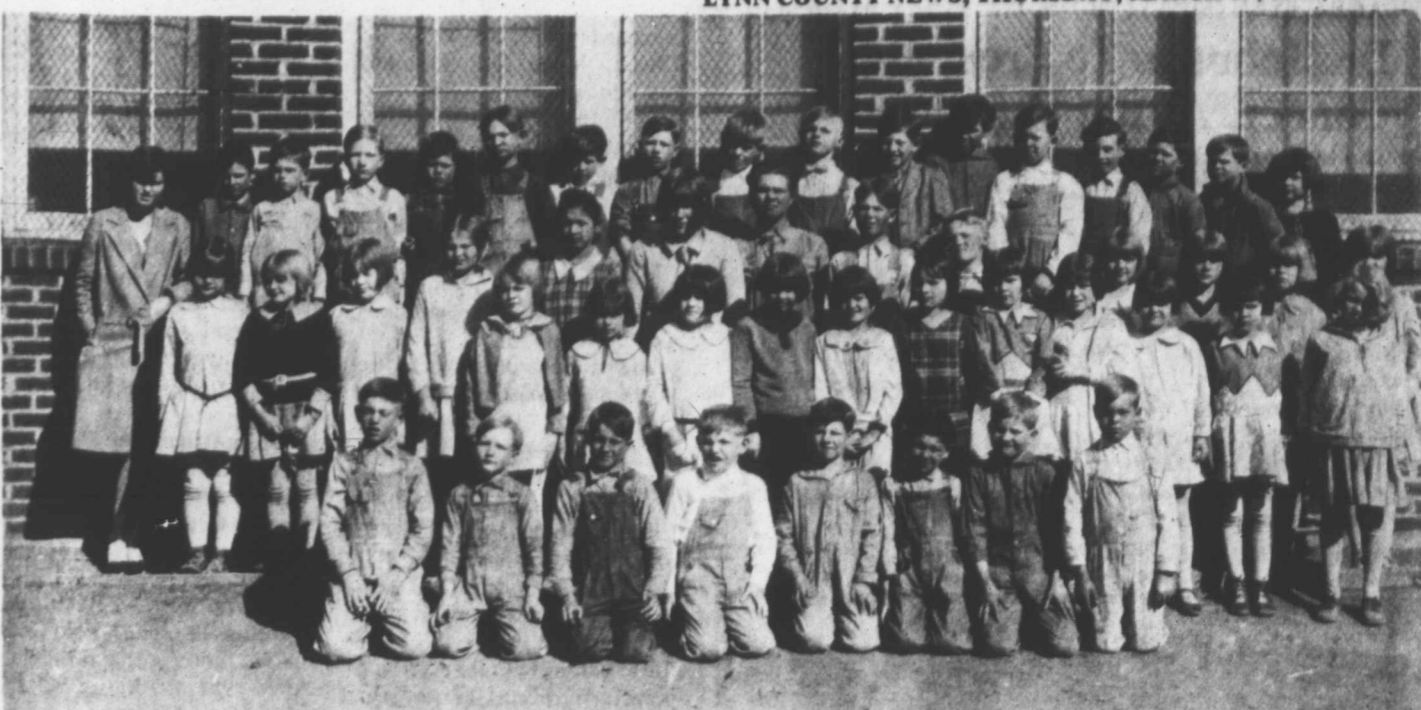

### A Visit With Your County Agent

By Stanley Young

**GARDENING SERIES TO START:** Plans are now underway for our gardens. A series of articles will be run and this is the first of the series. Hopefully this will help increase your success in your gardens.

#### PLAN GARDEN - THEN PLANT

You probably have a good reason for wanting to grow a garden. Maybe it's because you like to be outdoors next to the good earth and let the fertile soil run through your fingers. Maybe it's because you like the taste of fresh vegetables right out of the garden. Or maybe it's because you dropped \$100 on your last trip to the supermarket.

Regardless of the reason, you want to grow a garden. So, where do you start? Certainly not with your hands in your pockets looking at pretty seed packets at the local garden center or nursery. You've got to do it right. Think. Plan.

First, make sure you have room for a garden. You won't need a lot of space if you are a beginner with an average size family. Perhaps your garden might only be 20 feet by 20 feet, or maybe even less.

Whatever the size garden you have, think in terms of four basic requirements. First of all, you need sunlight because all vegetables need some sunlight. And, believe it or not, most vegetables must have full sunlight for highest yields of quality produce. Unless you are concentrating on leaf or bulb

crops like broccoli, collards, spinach or onions, your crops need every ray of sunshine that is available.

The next thing to consider is closeness of your garden. Put it as near to the back door as possible. Make bringing home the fruits of your labor a pleasant and enjoyable chore. The out-of-sight, out-of-mind principle applies here. A garden does not demand constant care and attention, but it will thrive

and do better if you visit it about once a day. If you do not check it regularly, many insects and diseases which are a problem in Lynn County or maybe even lack of water can destroy your garden in a short period of time. So put the garden close to the house where watching it will not be a hassle.

Next, consider the soil. Realistically, there is not much you can do about changing the type of soil you have in your yard. But, ideally, the soil should be fertile and easy to till, with just the right texture--a loose, well-drained, loamy soil. If your backyard soil does not meet these specifications 100 percent--and let's face it, not many soils in Lynn County do--don't panic. You can work it into shape without breaking your back.

Avoid areas heavily infested with Johnsongrass, nutgrass and other weeds. Don't put your garden on a rocky ledge or in a poorly drained area. All of these things make gardening more difficult.

The next thing to consider is availability of water. Your garden hose. It's no poor reflection on Mother Nature, but unfortunately, it doesn't always rain in Lynn County when it's needed. In a typical year, your garden will need watering about once a week.

After considering all of these things and you still want to grow a garden, now you are ready for the planning stage.

The first step in planning is selecting vegetables you want to grow. Plant vegetables you like to eat. Avoid those that your family doesn't usually buy on trips to the local grocery store. With a few exceptions, you can plant almost anything in your garden you want.

If you are undecided about what to grow, give our office a call. We'll be glad to help you with information on what vegetables grow best here.

After you have made the decisions in step one, then step two is the tough part, but it's worth it. Make a rough diagram or drawing of your garden. Indicate the number of rows and vegetables you wish to plant. Also show the desired location of each crop in your garden, number of plants or feet of row you want to plant, and the best time to plant. You will find the plan will

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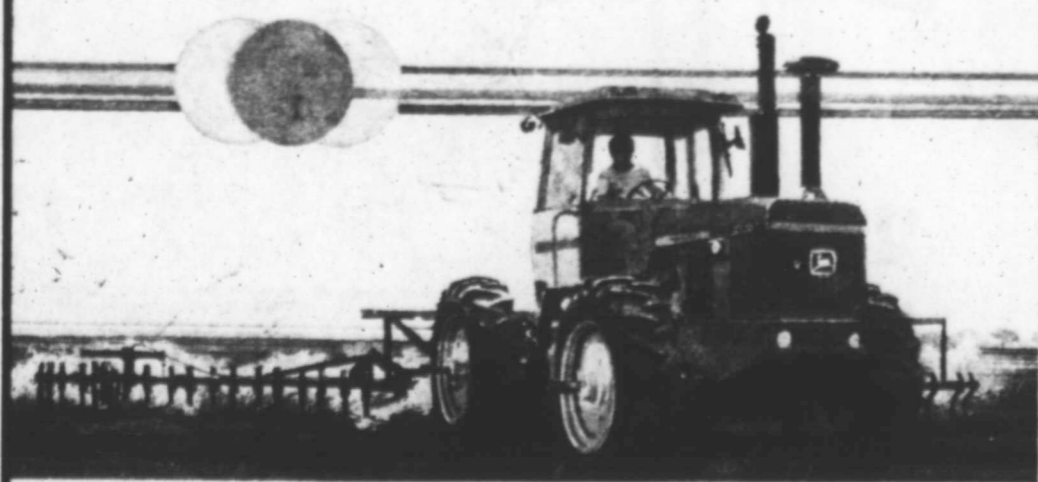
