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## \$2.25 Million Grant To City Given Tentative Approval

The City of Tahoka has been given a virtual commitment to receive a whopping \$2,250,000 federal grant to be used over the next three years for further improvements in the south and east sections of the city.

The Department of Housing and Urban Development notified the city this week that Tahoka's preliminary application for the grant money--the most which can be granted over a three-year period to a city of this size--has been approved, and that the city now is invited to submit a full application for the money, or at least the first portion of \$750,000 to be used this year.

**Letter Quoted**  
HUD's letter to Mayor Mel Leslie said:

"We are pleased to invite you to submit a full application for Community Development Block Grant assistance in the amount of \$750,000 for your first-year comprehensive program. Subject to the availability of subsequent years' appropriations and subject to your adequate performance in providing housing assistance and in carrying out your first-year program and any previous grants, our commitment is extended for full applications in 1982 and 1983, if appropriate, \$750,000 in 1982 and \$750,000 in 1983.

"You will not have to compete in the selection process for funding during the subsequent years. The 1982 and 1983 applications shall be due in this office between

May 13 and June 13 of each subsequent year. All preapplications received were grouped according to the competition category of funds and rated in accordance with HUD's National Rating System as published in the Federal Register dated August 21, 1980. The minimum rating required for funding was 672. Your preapplication rating was 684."

### Chances Good

What all this means, according to city officials, is that the money, although not definitely approved yet, has been designated for Tahoka's use on the basis of what the city said it would use it for, and that approval of the grants in three \$750,000 segments is almost certain unless the grants are not

funded in the next two years.

Tahoka received a 1979 CDB grant of \$500,000 which was used in paving and resurfacing roads in the area judged as a 90 per cent low-income area in the city. This time, the money is to be used over a three-year period for housing rehabilitation, sewer and water improvements and more paving and street improvements. A portion is set aside for clearance and demolition of abandoned and dilapidated houses and buildings.

### Use Restricted

The money may not be used in any parts of Tahoka other than the area south of S. 1st St

on the west side of U.S. 87 and all of the area of town on the east side of U.S. 87. However, City Manager Carl Reynolds said, there would be benefit to the entire city in that property in the affected areas would increase in value, giving the city more taxes. Also, he said, "it will be good to get some of the sewer and water line problems in those parts of town remedied."

There will be a public meeting at the Tahoka Community Center Thursday, April 9, at 7 p.m. to get feedback from citizens in the target areas about what needs to be done first. Another public hearing on the program is planned at a special meeting of the city council in the city hall at 7 p.m. April 13.

## Wreck Kills Tahoka Man

Billy Bert Stevens, 47, of Tahoka, was fatally injured early Friday afternoon in a two-car smashup at U.S. 87 access road and U.S. 380 in Tahoka.

Stevens was pronounced dead at the scene about 2 p.m. by Justice of the Peace Ed Hamilton.

According to investigating officers, Thomas Calvin Parks, 54, of Slaton, was traveling north on the access road. There is a stop sign on the access road at the U.S. 380 intersection. Parks' 1976 Buick struck Stevens' 1980 Ford on the passenger side as Stevens was headed east on 380, just crossing the bridge.

The impact knocked Stevens' car on top of highway signs at the northeast corner of the intersection near Jolly Texaco.

Parks was kept overnight for treatment of injuries at Lynn County Hospital and

then was taken to Lynn County jail after being arraigned on charges of involuntary manslaughter. Judge Hamilton set his bond at \$10,000 and Parks remained in jail at press time.

Stevens had been employed by Lyntegar Electric Co-Op since May 28, 1950, receiving his 30-year service award last December.

### INSUR-MATION

**Q.** In looking for every legitimate income deduction possible, I am wondering: Can I deduct any portion of my life insurance premiums in addition to my health insurance premiums?

**A.** Fifty percent of your premiums for hospitalization insurance are deductible when you itemize. A corporation may deduct the premiums for group insurance. This "benefit" is not taxable to employees unless the amount of life insurance exceeds \$50,000 on any individual. Plans such as "split dollar", "minimum deposit", and "IRS Section 79", when properly used, following specific IRS rules and regulations, will permit legitimate life insurance premiums. Use considerable caution, however. Generally speaking, these plans require the advice of a qualified life underwriter and accountant.

### OHS Students Seek Stock Market Profits

Students of O'Donnell High School will be dabbling in the investment market for the next 10 weeks on the New York Stock Exchange and the American Exchange. And they've got \$100,000 to help them find that pot of gold on the Big Board.

The money won't be burning a hole in the student's pockets, however. It's purely a hypothetical amount, available to them to invest during Baylor University's annual Stockmarket Game.

The game was first developed in New York as a method of teaching students about the operations of the American economy and financial markets. Schools in 10 states throughout the country now participate each year, vying for state and regional cash prizes and trophies.

Sponsor teacher of the team from O'Donnell High School is Donna Hopkins.

Baylor and the Securities Industry Foundation of Texas launched the competition in Texas last year, attracting "investments" from more than 100 schools statewide. This year, nearly 200 schools in Texas are participating.

The students start out with their imaginary investment of \$100,000 and try to turn a profit by playing the stock market. They are responsible for buying or selling shares each day based on previous day's closing prices in the newspaper.

Their "transactions" on the stock exchanges are reported daily to a teacher sponsor who sends them weekly to Baylor. The transactions are analyzed by the Baylor Computation Center and a weekly statement is issued to each school, giving the status of their teams after brokerage fees and interest charges are calculated.

The team which has made the biggest "killing" on its original investment at the end of the 10-week game will win the regional prize. Prizes also are awarded for the team with the best record across Texas.

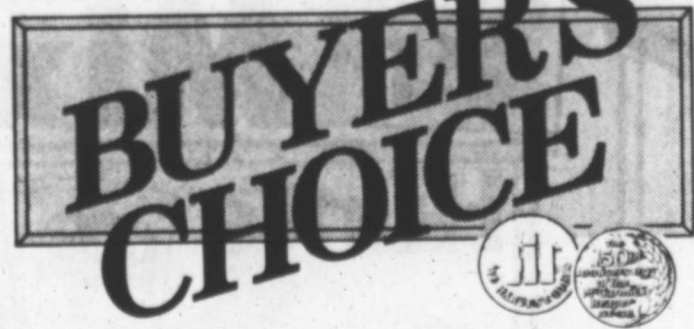

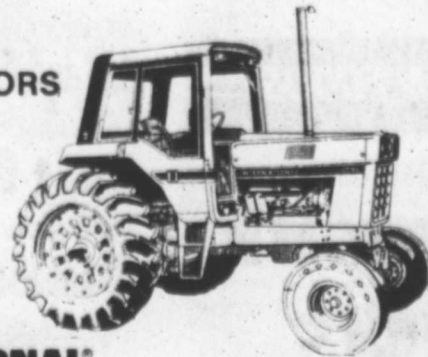

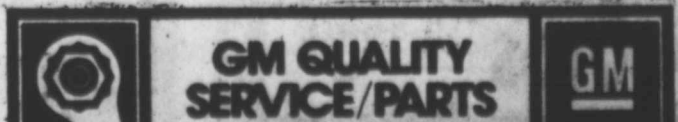

### Public Notice Of Tax Exemptions Available To Homeowners

The Wilson Independent School District tax office is currently accepting applications for residence homestead exemptions. The deadline for filing is April 1, 1981. Applications should be filed as early as possible to avoid inconvenience to the homeowner.

Two types of homestead exemptions from school taxes are available to taxpayers who owned their residence homesteads in this school district on January 1 of this year. First, the general homestead exemption is available to all homeowners and exempts \$5,000 from the market value of the homestead.

Second, any person who is 65 years of age or older can be exempted an additional \$10,000 from the market value of the homestead. Proof of age or disability may be necessary. Homeowners age 65 or older who apply for their exemption will be granted a tax freeze. If application is not made, the tax freeze will be lost for this year.

Application forms were mailed earlier to all homeowners who qualified for a homestead exemption in 1980. If you did not receive an application, or if you have questions about qualifying for exemptions or filing application forms, contact the school tax office at 628-2671.

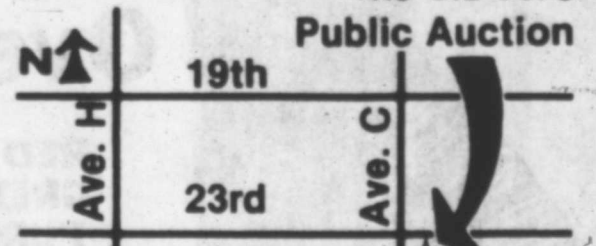

### Public Notice Of Tax Exemptions Available To Homeowners

The Wilson Independent School District tax office is currently accepting applications for residence homestead exemptions. The deadline for filing is April 1, 1981. Applications should be filed as early as possible to avoid inconvenience to the homeowner.

Two types of homestead exemptions from school taxes are available to taxpayers who owned their residence homesteads in this school district on January 1 of this year. First, the general homestead exemption is available to all homeowners and exempts \$5,000 from the market value of the homestead.

Second, any person who is 65 years of age or older can be exempted an additional \$10,000 from the market value of the homestead. Proof of age or disability may be necessary.

Homeowners age 65 or older who apply for their exemption will be granted a tax freeze. If application is not made, the tax freeze will be lost for this year.

Application forms were mailed earlier to all homeowners who qualified for a homestead exemption in 1980. If you did not receive an application, or if you have questions about qualifying for exemptions or filing application forms, contact the school tax office at 628-2671.

Application forms may also be picked up at the tax office in Wilson Elementary Building.

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## A Visit With Your County Agent

### MONEY SAVING TIPS ON GARDENING

Garden centers, nurseries and feed stores across the county will soon be having sales on garden equipment and various gardening supplies. If your vegetable garden is going to be economical and enjoyable, you will have to make many important decisions in the next few weeks. Be a smart shopper and remember -- so-called bargains may not really be bargains at all. Believe it or not, bargain seed is oftentimes not a good buy. Packets of seed which normally sell for 39 to 79 cents each may be offered for as little as three packages for \$1. Whether or not this is a real bargain will depend on whether or not the seed is of high quality and will produce

a good crop of vegetables. Check the seed packet to see when it was processed. Most seed packets are dated and indicate the year seed was produced. Also, make sure that sale seed are varieties recommended for this county. Saving a little money by purchasing seed of the wrong variety will certainly be reflected by lower yields come harvest-time. If you have a large garden, consider buying bulk seed. Bulk seed can be purchased in small quantities and, in general, is higher quality and has a higher percent germination. Also, it's usually less expensive since the cost of packaging and the packet is not included in the price. In buying plants, again buy recommended varieties.

When selecting your plants, remember the biggest plant is not always the best buy. Ideally, transplants should be about as tall as they are wide. They should be dark green in color, vigorous looking and certainly without spots, lesions or damage to the foliage. Purchase only the exact number of plants you will need according to your garden plan. When buying fertilizer, questions always come up as to what type to buy and how much. Garden fertilizer comes in different grades and sizes. In general, most garden fertilizers come in 50-pound bags. If this is your first garden, it might be a good idea to have your soil tested to help you determine which fertilizer is best and how much you'll need to apply. Soil test kits are available from my office and if you will give me a call, I'll be glad to send you a kit along with necessary instructions. In the absence of a soil test or if insufficient time is the problem, the best fertilizer for a garden in Lynn County is 16-20-0. With regard to saving money when buying fertilizers, it's easy to determine which is the best buy. Nitrogen, which is the first number in the analysis, is the most expensive item in the bag. These analysis numbers are percentages -- in other words, a 50-pound bag of 10-20-10 contains 10 percent or 5 pounds of nitrogen. Divide the price of the bag of fertilizer by the pounds of nitrogen in the bag to determine the price per pound of nitrogen. Use this price per pound of nitrogen in making your decision on which is the best buy for your garden. When buying garden chemicals, purchase only those that you feel will be needed for this year's garden. Many garden chemicals, when stored from one year to the next, lose their effectiveness. Thus, you may actually be better off buying small quantities of garden chemicals. Of course, with a large garden, larger quantities will be more economical. Home gardening can be compared to fishing. You can have an expensive boat, fancy rod and reel, and electronic fish finder and all the other fancy equipment, or you can get by with a cane pole, piece of string and a fishhook. Fancy equipment

## COTTON TODAY

**Maid Meets President:** "It was one of the most exciting moments of my life." That's the way Maid of Cotton Karie Ross, Clinton, Okla., described her meeting with President Reagan in Washington last week. She presented the President with a miniature bale of cotton on behalf of the National Cotton Council and the U.S. cotton industry. Karie reported that the President "was very interested in my upcoming overseas tour, especially since we are going to China for the first time." The Maid's other activities during the week included courtesy calls on the ambassadors of countries she will visit on her overseas tour March 24-May 20. **CPSC Rules Questioned:** The National Cotton Council has expressed serious reservations about the reauthorization of the Consumer Product Safety Commission unless restraints are put on its regulatory authority. In a statement submitted to the House Subcommittee on Health and Environment, the Council cited instances where the CPSC has gone beyond its congressional mandate to protect consumers against unreasonable risks, not all risks. CPSC's flammability standard for children's sleepwear was cited as an example. The Council stated that CPSC's insistence on extending the standard's coverage to tight-fitting knit garments eliminated safe cotton sleepwear from the market. At the same time, children with allergies to synthetics and/or chemicals were denied access to non-allergenic cotton sleepwear.

## ASCS News

**Small Grain Certification:** We have not been notified of the final date to certify wheat, oats, barley, or rye for harvest or grazing. Normally the date is May 1. Failure to certify these crops by the final date will result in the farm being ineligible for program benefits. You should review your farm and if you have planted small grain on terraces, turnrows, ditches, around equipment or other areas and are going to allow it to mature, it needs to be certified. Small grain that will be grazed out and voluntary wheat you intend to harvest needs to be certified. Wheat that you are not going to allow to mature should be kept shredded or plowed. An accurate certification is very important. The tolerance is the larger of 1.0 acre or 5 per cent of the reported acres. Acres determined in excess of the tolerance make that farm ineligible for program benefits on all crops. A wheat acreage reported above the tolerance could make you ineligible for loan and disaster payments for the cotton on the same farm. **Measurement Service:** Measurement service will again be offered. These acreages will be guaranteed for the 1981 year only. If you have an acreage with a small tolerance or one that is hard to measure, you may want to sign up for this service. We are taking requests for small grain measurement now. The cost is \$16.00 per farm and .20 per acre. **Final Date To Graze Wheat** April 1, 1981, has been set as the final date to graze wheat that is intended to be harvested for grain. The deadlines are for low interest loan based on 1980 crop losses. **1980 Crop Loans:** The last day to put 1980 crop wheat in the loan is March 31, 1981. 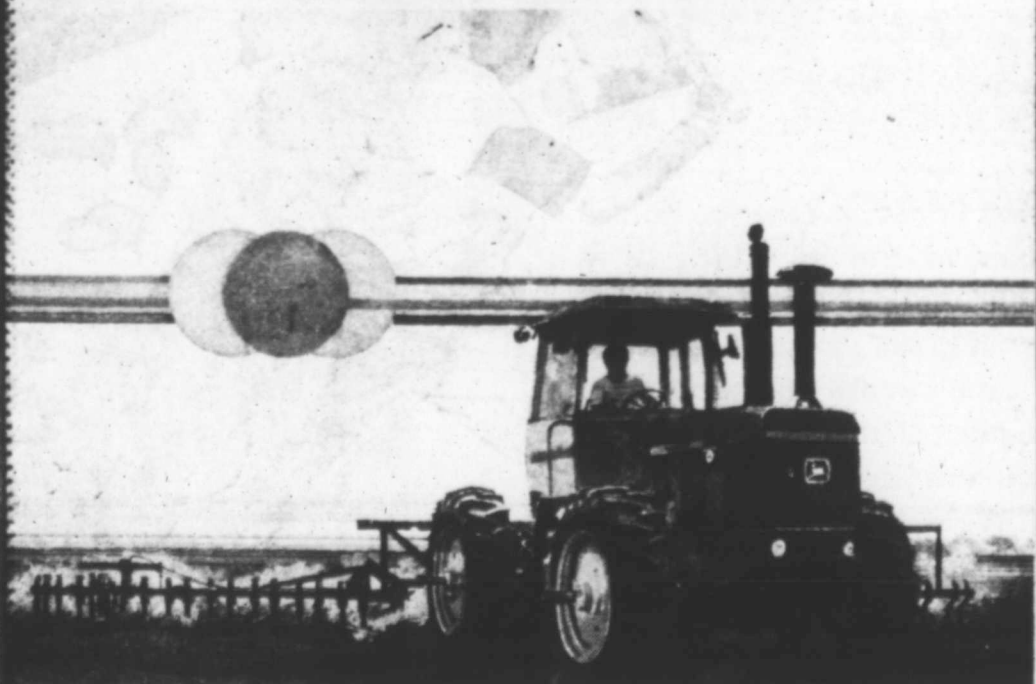
