MIXED-QUALITY COTTON BALE LOSSES

Well in advance of the beginning of another ginning season, it might be well for Texas cotton growers to consider and remember the results of a recent study on money losses resulting from mix-

ed - quality cotton bales. The study was made by the Agricultural Marketing Ser-Agriculture, and showed that in a single season cotton farmers lost an estimated \$2,400,-000 because of mixed quality

The AMS found the situation basically to be this: When cotton is sampled for grading, a small amount of lint is taken from each side of the bale, and both parts are classed. If the quality is different on the two sides, the farmer is paid on the basis of the lower qualityeven though most of the bale may be higher.
