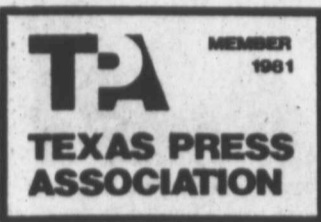

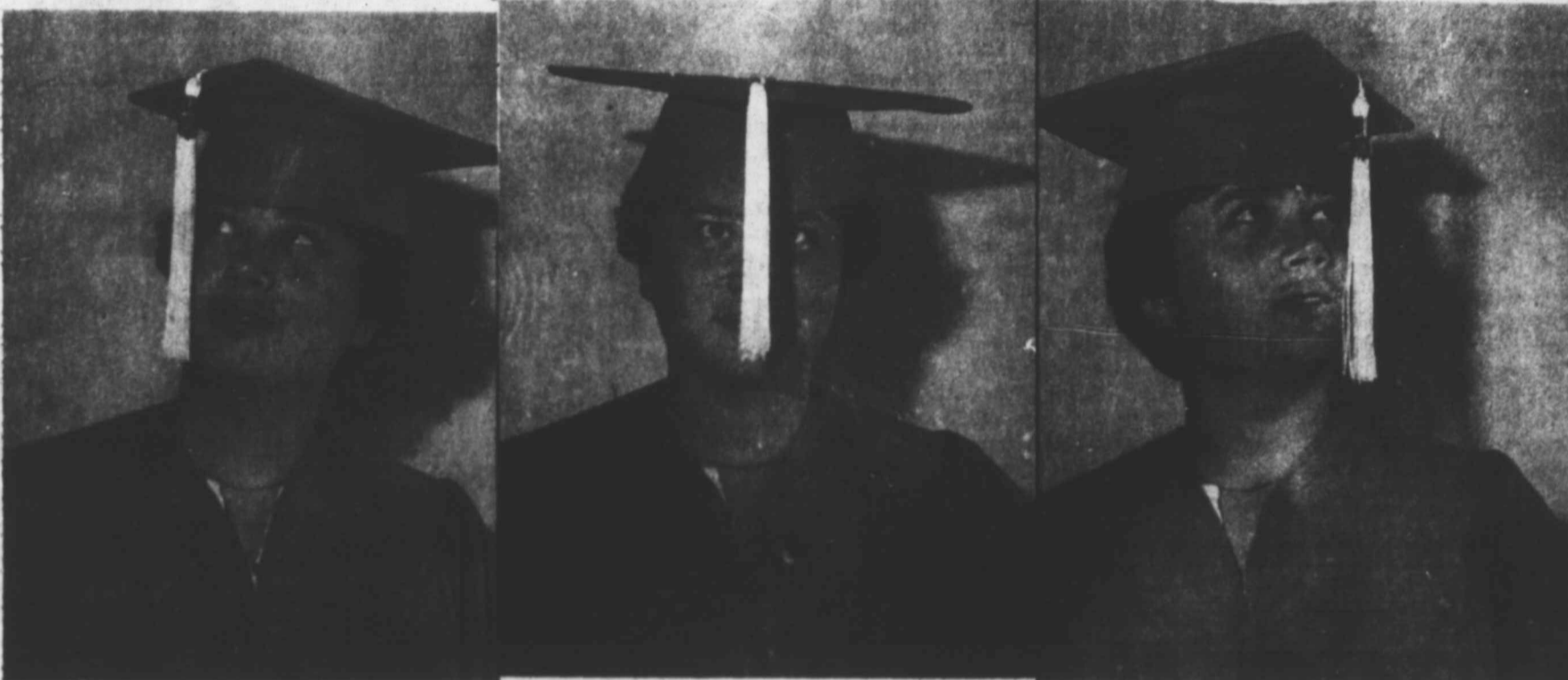

School Employs New Ag Teacher

Tahoka school trustees last Thursday hired a new agriculture teacher, voted to tax vehicles for 1981 and considered budget requests by principals and the athletic director for the coming year.

Hired as vocational agriculture teacher at \$3,000 above state schedule was Lee Roy McDaniel, formerly vo-ag teacher at Roscoe for the last six years, and at Robert Lee High School for 11 years before that. A graduate of Abilene Christian College with a masters from Sam Houston State, he is certified in general ag mechanics from Texas Tech.

students. A list of transfer students was approved and the board voted to rehire 10 cafeteria employes, subject to need and funding.

Coach Gary Roan's resignation was accepted, as was that of teacher Donna Green. Mrs. Elaine Thomas was granted a leave of absence. It was voted to change the time of the monthly meeting to 8

p.m. instead of 7:30. Supt. Jim Coulston reported that total enrollment was at 872 in all schools, compared to 886 a year ago.

It was voted to buy a Canon copier for \$4,900 and a mower for \$1,780. Business manager David Roberson reported the balance of all funds on May 1 at \$219,213, with almost \$100,000 in taxes still to be collected.

149 To Graduate In Lynn County

One hundred forty-nine seniors are scheduled to graduate from the four high schools in Lynn County.

Tahoka High School will send up 67 for diplomas as the commencement exercises are held starting at 8 p.m. Friday at Kelley Field, when the Bulldog Band will play the processional.

Principal Jim Marcus will introduce Salutatorian Melanie McNeely and Valedictorian Sheri Tomlinson. After these two speak Supt. Jim Coulston will speak, and then diplomas will be presented by School Board President Bob Haney.

Gold tassels will designate honor students and white sashes will be worn by National Honor Society members.

Graduation exercises for 23 Wilson High School seniors will be at 8 p.m. next Friday, May 29, at the Wilson High School auditorium. Bacca-

laureate services will be Sunday at the high school auditorium. Donald Freitag is valedictorian and Kerrie Lee salutatorian.

New Home will graduate 31 seniors at 8 p.m. Friday, May 29, in the gymnasium. Gloria Hernandez is valedictorian and Nora Caballero salutatorian. It is the largest graduating class ever at New Home.

O'Donnell commencement will be at 8 p.m. next Tuesday in the high school auditorium, with the commencement address by Rev. Norman Patton, minister of First United Methodist Church. The FHA choir will sing twice and taking part in the ceremonies also will be Principal Kenneth Crouch, Supt. Dale Read and school board president Shag Garrett. Doris Franklin is salutatorian and Melissa Patton is valedictorian.

COTTON TODAY

A NATIONAL COTTON COUNCIL SERVICE

SOLONS HEAR NCC PRESIDENT: National Cotton Council President Frank M. Mitchener recently told the South Carolina General Assembly the cotton industry is making an all-out drive to solve the cotton dust problem.

Addressing a joint session, Mitchener said more than \$8 million worth dust research is now underway largely as a result of funding by USDA and cotton farmers through Cotton Incorporated.

The Council president said over the next five years world consumption of cotton is expected to increase by 7 million bales or more, necessitating an average yearly increase in world cotton production of 1.25 million bales. He added American cotton growers probably will be called on to supply part of this.

EXPORTS IMPROVE: Exports of 105,000 running bales of upland cotton were reported for the week ended May 7 to bring the season's total to 4,735,100. New sales for the season reached 33,700 running bales, of which South Korea purchased 7,800.

TRADE BALANCE IMPROVES: The U.S. textile trade balance improved during March as the annual rate deficit of 972,000 bale equivalents moved to about 500,000 bales. The cotton textile trade balance also showed signs of improvement with the March deficit of 947,000 bales, about 250,000 bales lower than the February rate.

Insect Scouting Workshop Set

Tahoka-Cotton, corn and sorghum producers in Lynn County are receiving a special invitation this year to take part in the annual High Plains Scout Training Workshop to increase the effectiveness of their pest management programs.

The workshop will be held Tuesday and Wednesday, June 2-3, at the Hale County Agricultural Center in Plainview, Stanley Young, county Extension agent, said. The center is on U.S. 87 Business Route south of the city.

The workshop, conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, was first held in 1973 to train scouts in the pest management programs conducted by Extension. In subsequent years, it was expanded to include scouts employed by consultants and those administered by the Texas Pest Management Assn.

Young said producers are being invited this year to help them perfect their skills in identifying crop pests and making timely pest management decisions which can protect their investments and yield and hold down production costs.

The June session opens at 8:30 a.m. with Leser outlining the scope of the workshop and explaining pest management concepts. Also on the morning program are Dr. H. Dale Pennington, Extension soil chemist; Dr. James R. Supak, Extension cotton agronomist; and Dr. Robert Berry, Extension plant pathologist.

The afternoon program will include Dr. Kirby W. Huffman, Extension agronomist; Dr. Carl D. Patrick, Extension entomologist; and Allen E. Knutson, Castro County Extension agent-entomologist.

The June 3 session, beginning at 9 a.m., will focus on scouting procedures and reports. Instructors will be county Extension agents-entomology Gregory B. Cronholm of Hale County and Paul W. Treptow of Crosby and Floyd counties.

During the afternoon, participants will receive practical training on insect identification and scouting procedures during a field session.

Producers interested in participating in the workshop should advise him at the county Extension office, Young said.

FERTILITY, WATER MANAGEMENT CRITICAL FOR PECANS

Growing a good crop of pecans means good nitrogen management in combination with soil, water, zinc and weed management.

Pecan trees store a large percentage of the food they manufacture each year. As this stored food accumulates, the tree can then begin to bear relatively regular crops. So nitrogen needs to be applied every year and not just when a deficiency is seen. Using nitrogen fertilizer such as 21-0-0 or 33-0-0 is recommended.

Orchards which have been out of production but have adequate space and well-drained soil should receive a large initial application of nitrogen, such as 1,000 pounds of nitrogen for bearing pecan orchards are as follows; natives, 60 pounds per acre; bottomland orchards, 90 pounds per acre; and upland orchards, 120 pounds per acre.

Apply nitrogen fertilizer in late February immediately before pecan tree growth begins. Put on a second application of 1/2 the standard rate in late May if trees have set a heavy crop.

To keep grass and weeds from stealing a large volume of nitrogen, disk the fertilizer into the soil to a 1-to 2-inch depth immediately after application. A second disking is usually needed a month later. Disking also helps prevent volatilization loss of nitrogen.

The best index for determining nitrogen, zinc, soil, weed control and water

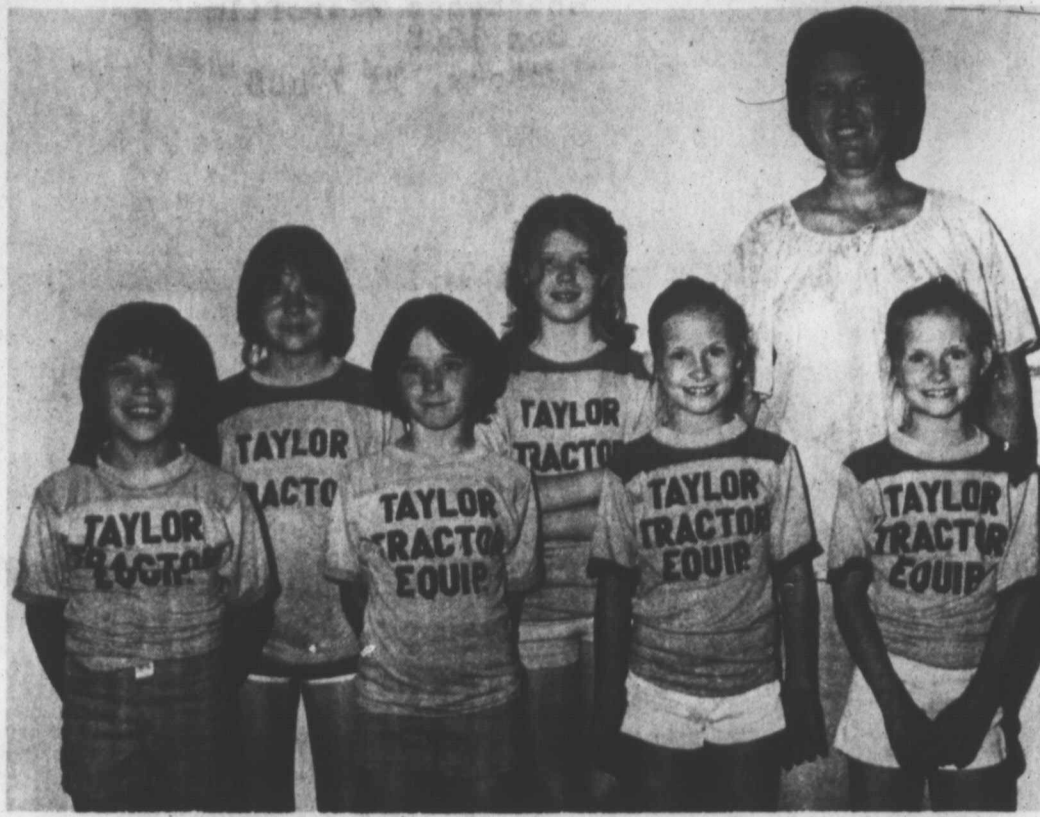
needs is terminal growth of non-bearing shoots. If all other management practices are in order, low nitrogen can seriously limit shoot growth. All non-bearing shoots on mature trees (over 12 years of age) should be more than 4 inches but less than 12 inches. If growth is less, add more nitrogen. If growth is more, cut back.

As far as water management is concerned, pecans on good soil can bear with only 32 inches of rainfall from April to October. However, more water can enhance tree health and regular production. Pecans require about an inch of water each week from April to October but the optimum would be 2 inches per week.

Critical periods are when weeks pass without a rain. However, the tree and crop have their greatest water needs in March immediately before growth begins, in June as nuts begin to size, in late July as kernels begin to fill, and in early September as kernels continue to develop. Severe droughts at these four periods can result in complete crop failure or serious crop loss. The last period can also result in a poor crop the following year.

Pecan roots can dry out and die if no rains occur from September to April. Therefore, a mid-winter irrigation may be needed to insure good tree health and regular production.

4-H COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIPS

Present and former 4-H members may be eligible for \$5,750 in college scholarship grants if they meet requirements set by the Cooperative Extension Service.

All but one of the grants are valued at \$1,000 each, and primarily are for young

people planning careers in agriculture, or such related fields as forestry, veterinary medicine or animal science, points out Brent Drennan, county agent. The other scholarship, valued at \$750, has no limits placed on choice of study. These scholarships are provided by private sector donors and arranged by the National 4-H Council, a non-profit organization serving the 4-H program.

The Warren Scholarship, established this year in memory of Gertrude L. Warren, a pioneer 4-H leader often described as the "Mother of 4-H," is a \$750 grant awarded to one present or former 4-H member matriculating this fall at an accredited college, university technical or trade school. The recipient can major in any recognized field of study and must have been influenced by 4-H in selecting a future career.

A \$1,000 scholarship, donated by Educational Foundation of Alpha Gamma Rho, goes to a current 4-H member who will be enrolled as a college freshman this fall. The recipient must be planning to major in agriculture, forestry, veterinary

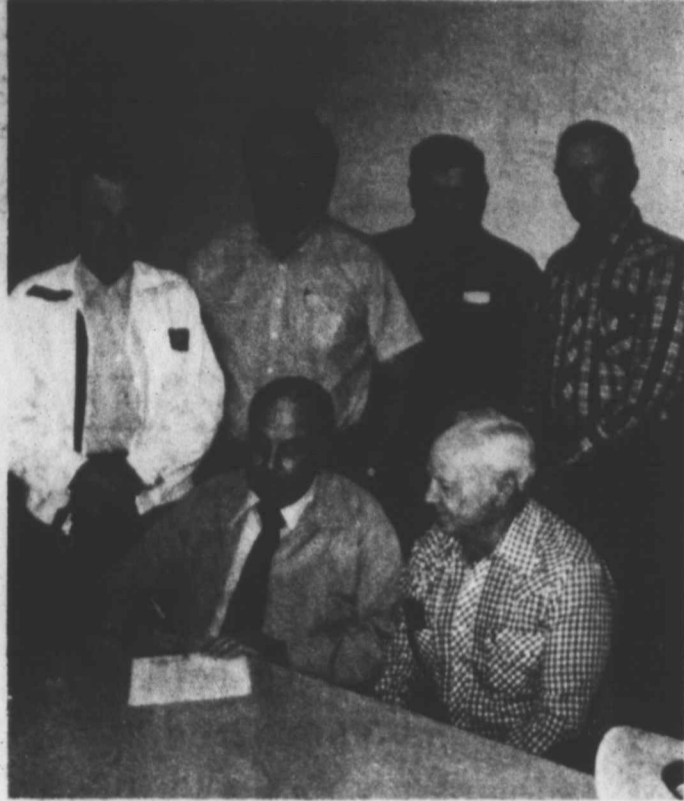

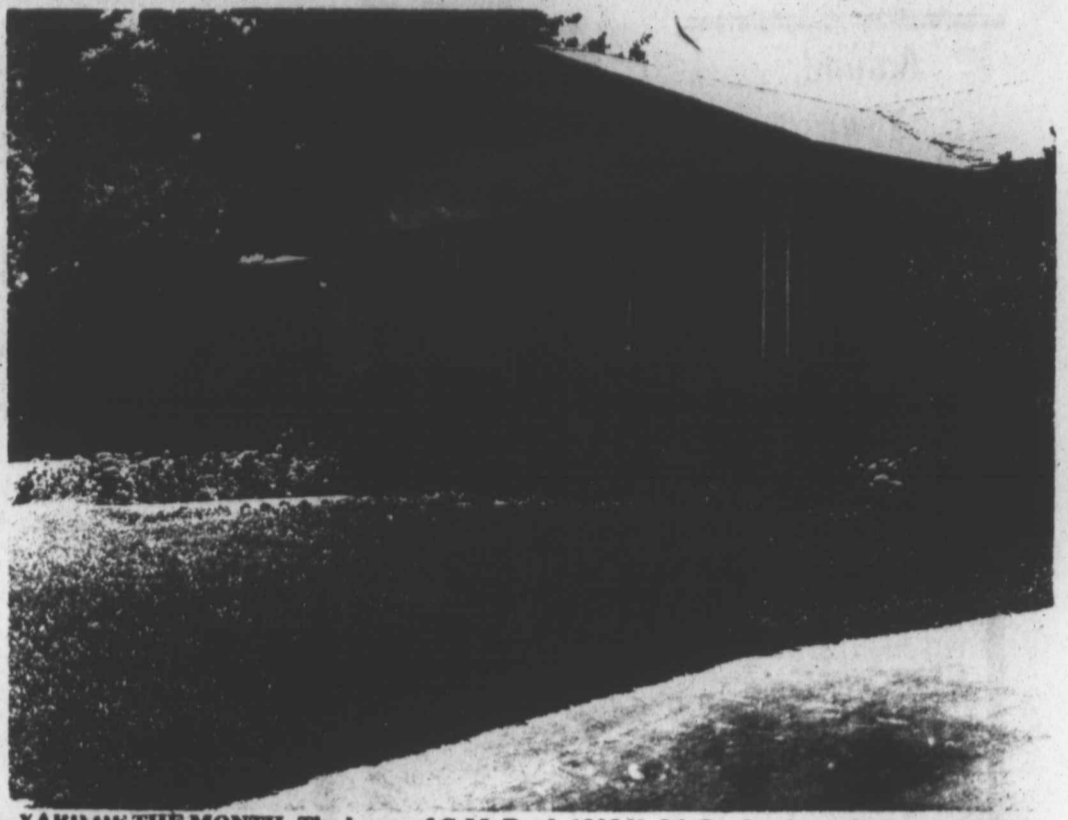

Wayla Buermann of Tahoka registered guests.

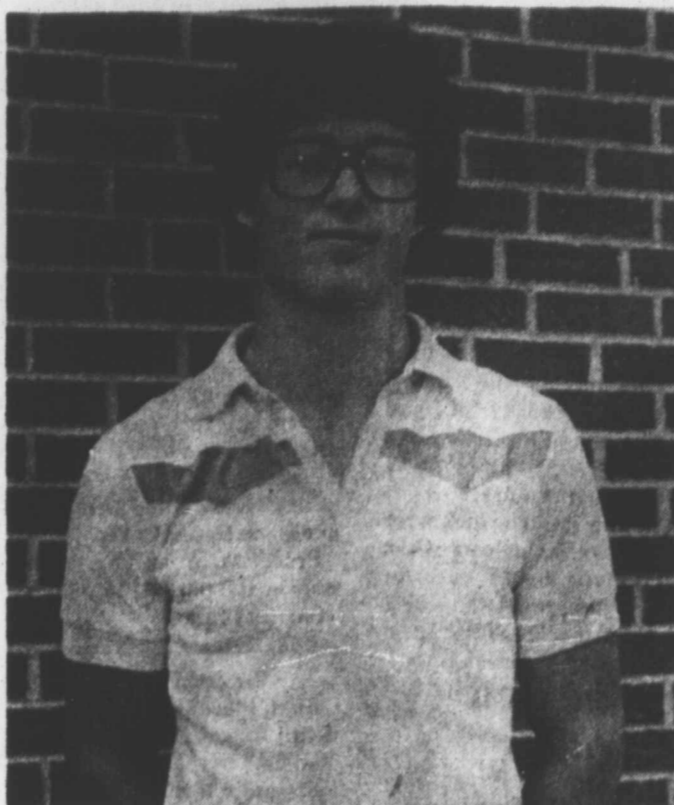

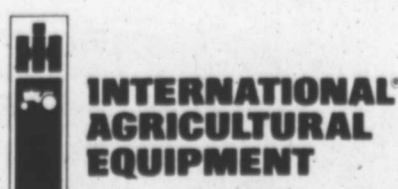

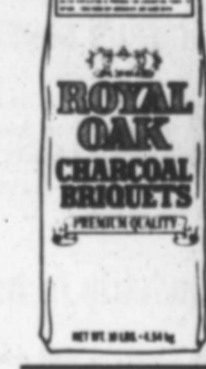

INSUR-MATION

By PAT GREEN
Lynn County Farm Bureau

Here's my problem. I want my son to be able to carry on the family tradition of operating his own farm after I'm gone. At the same time I must be fair to other members of the family. Friends have told me insurance can help, if so, how?

This could be arranged by having an attorney draw up an agreement in which your son will be able to buy the farm at an agreed upon purchase price. Your son should then insure you with enough permanent life insurance to meet the agreed price of the farm. When the insurance is collected, your son can own the farm by buying it from the rest of the family with the insurance proceeds. Used as specific bequests, the proceeds will assure equality of benefits. Prior to collection of the insurance, your son can borrow on or cash in the insurance and buy the farm directly from you.

COTTON TALKS

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC.

Those in the cotton industry who are advocating greater loan program discounts on the lower grade, staple and micronaire cottons are saying they believe such decisions should be made strictly on the basis of average market quotations.

"Which sounds all right," say officials of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., "until you find out that these people also appear to believe that if one cow sells for \$100 and 30 cows sell for \$300 each, the average market price of cows is \$200."

Or, in cotton terms they hold that if one bale of cotton sells in Montgomery, Alabama at a 30-cent per pound discount and 30 bales of the same quality sell in Lubbock at a discount of only 10 cents, then the average U.S. market discount for cotton of that quality is 20 cents per pound.

But at PCG it isn't figured that way. PCG figures the average discount on this example is 10.6 cents per pound — the result of giving Lubbock's 10-cent discount 30 times as much weight in the average as Montgomery's 30-cent discount.

All of which is another way of saying that spot market discount quotations on a given cotton quality from each market should be weighted by the volume of that cotton traded in the quoting market.

The 30 bales against one bale example was not chosen at random, but because it most nearly approximates one of the many examples that can be drawn from voluminous figures PCG has called to Washington's attention recently.

Montgomery, one of the nine official Spot Markets, through mid-April of 1980 had reported trading an estimated 728 bales of cotton in the 2.6 and below micronaire category, just over 1/30th of the 21,396 bales reported by Lubbock, also an official Spot Market.

And, the August through March average discount quoted by Montgomery on 2.6 and below cotton was 2637 points, almost triple the 913 point average quoted from Lubbock on the same quality for the same period. Nor is this an extreme example. Other micronaire groupings and other markets show volume disparities and/or discount differences as great or greater when compared with the Lubbock market.

Yet each of USDA's three proposed alternative methods for setting 1981 loan program discounts gives equal weight to quotes from all markets.

PCG figures show that the Lubbock market, for the years 1978, 1979 and 1980 averaged reporting over 77 percent of all spot purchases of cotton miking below 3.5. Of the 1980 crop, over 82 percent of the purchases were reported from Lubbock.

"The volume of low-mike cotton traded in the Lubbock market so overwhelms that of other markets that equal weighting of all market quotes can't possibly reflect true commercial values," Johnson stated in a letter to USDA.

The month of May has been designated national Barbecue Month and now is the time to ready the grill and lay in a goodly supply of Briquettes. You can turn out a delicious meal on a simple portable hibachi or brazier-type grill or you can don a chef's bonnet and barbecue with great flourish on deluxe electric spits or gas-fired outdoor grills. Whatever method you choose, everything tastes great cooked outdoors.

Peach Barbecue Sauce is an ideal accompaniment for either chicken or short ribs and can be prepared in advance and refrigerated until you're ready to use it. Drain one 8 1/2 oz. can sliced peaches, reserving syrup. Combine peach syrup with 1/2 cup Open Pit barbecue sauce --original flavor, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1 teaspoon melted butter and 1/4 teaspoon salt. The smooth peach flavor blended with the zesty barbecue sauce brings out the best in chicken and is enough for about 2 1/2 pounds cut-up chicken. After the chicken has grilled slowly for 35 to 40 minutes, baste with the sauce, turning frequently to achieve just the right degree of browning.

Have ready inexpensive small baskets or paper plates. Place a square of aluminum foil on each and, as chicken finishes cooking, place servings on aluminum foil; top with reserved peach slices; bring corners of foil together over chicken and twist to make a loose poke.

If you're planning a meal of grilled chicken, pork or ribs, make the grill do double duty and have it prepare a side

dish of Barbecue Rice to complement whatever meat or poultry you're serving.

First prepare your cooking pouch. Place two 18-inch square sheets of heavy duty aluminum foil on top of one another in a medium-size bowl. Press down to form a pouch. Next combine 2 1/4 cups Minute rice, 2 1/4 cups water, 1 tablespoon butter or margarine and 1/4 teaspoon salt in pouch. Stir gently to moisten all rice, then fold foil to close tightly and remove pouch from bowl. Bring to a boil on grill over hot coals. Move to side of grill and let stand at least 5 minutes. Open foil and fluff rice with fork before serving. Fast,

State Subcommittee Backs Alcohol Fuel Legislation

AUSTIN--"We have the capacity and the technology now to produce gasohol for consumers here in our state, but unless government lends a helping hand so the new industry can get a foothold, gasohol producers have indicated they will start in other states," Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown reported recently in a meeting of the Agriculturally-Derived Fuel subcommittee of the Texas Energy and Natural Resources Advisory Council (TENRAC).

Brown is chairman of the subcommittee.

Carl King, committee member, farmer, and representative of the Texas Corn Growers Association, said, "Most of the industry has notified us that if legislation doesn't get passed this session, they will be setting up in other states that already have favorable laws on gasohol production."

King cited New Mexico, Oklahoma and Louisiana as examples. "New Mexico has legislation recently passed that would give producers an 8 cent exemption until 1990 while our legislature is trimming Rep. Dan Kubiak's original bill (HB 24) down from 5 cents until 1986," King said.

"Over 50% of our automobiles run on imported gasoline," Brown noted. "If the Middle East imposed an embargo or if the Soviets decided to move into the Persian Gulf, we would have long lines at our pumps overnight. We need to pave the way for alternative fuel production in this state."

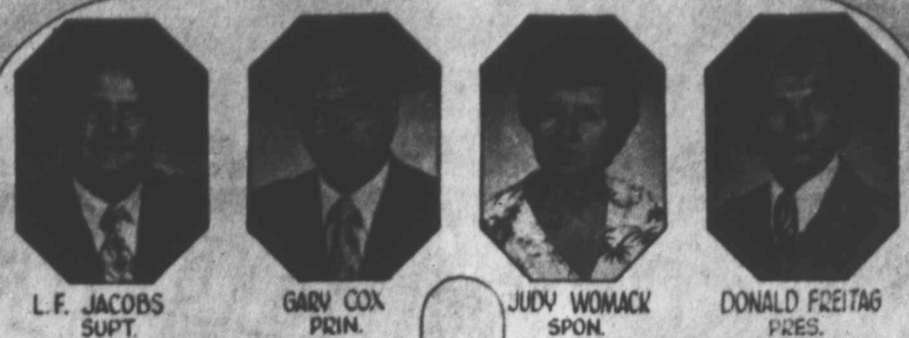
"If we encourage our farmers and ranchers to produce, and our scientists to develop gasohol, we can start on the road to self-sufficiency and less dependence on matters half-way around the world," said Brown.

Most of the members of the subcommittee agreed that if favorable legislation was not passed this session, the fledgling but promising industry would not be established in Texas.

"Private industry cannot get into production with uncertainties, like high inflation, high cost of money, and pending legislation," said Dr. Spencer Baen, with the Center for Energy & Mineral Resources at Texas A&M University. "If we can't give them a bill in Texas that gives them some certainty instead of uncertainty, they can't get into any of it."

At meeting's end, members motioned to endorse the original version of Rep. Kubiak's HB 24.

Following the meeting, members visited the offices of House Speaker Billy Clayton and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby.

Farmer's Prices, Costs Increase in April

AUSTIN--A 14 percent increase in April in the Index of Prices that farmers and ranchers receive for their products is not necessarily an

accurate profit picture, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has reported.

Brown was quick to note

that production costs for agriculture had also increased. "Fuel costs alone have gone up 39 percent," Brown said. "Fertilizers are up 23 percent and other expenses like interest rates have also increased. The profit picture for most farmers and ranchers is not

good." According to the April 15 report by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Upland cotton was at an average of 66.7 cents per pound, up 12 cents from 1980. Wheat decreased 6 cents to \$3.84 per bushel and grain sorghum stood at \$5.56 per hundredweight (cwt.), virtually unchanged from last year.

The April Livestock and Livestock Products Index remained unchanged from 1980. Lower prices for beef cattle, calves, and lambs were offset by higher prices for hogs, sheep, broilers, eggs, and turkeys.

Beef cattle sold for an average \$61.00 cwt., down \$2.81 from 1980 and calves

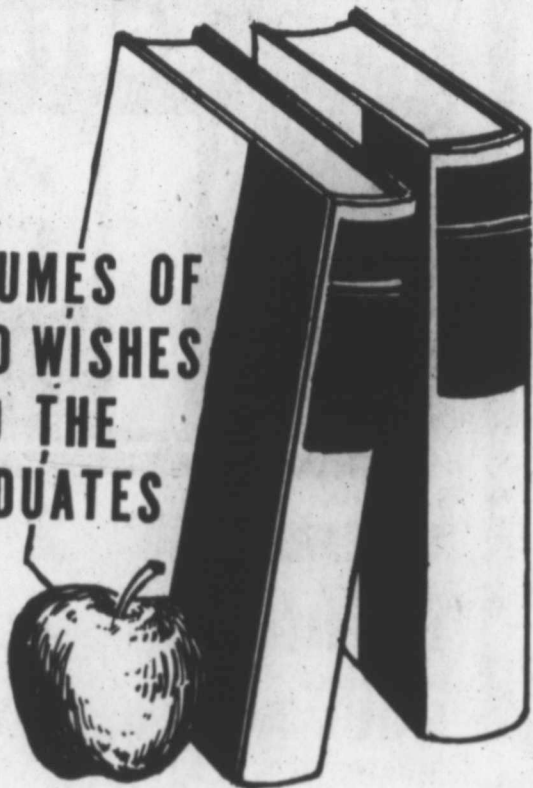
dropped \$3.80 to \$68.70. Hogs were \$37.70 per cwt., up \$9.90 from last year.

"Although agricultural prices may have increased slightly from 1980," explained Brown, "let's not forget that last year was not a particularly good year for farmers either. In reality, prices have only recently begun to reach an equitable level for our state's producers."

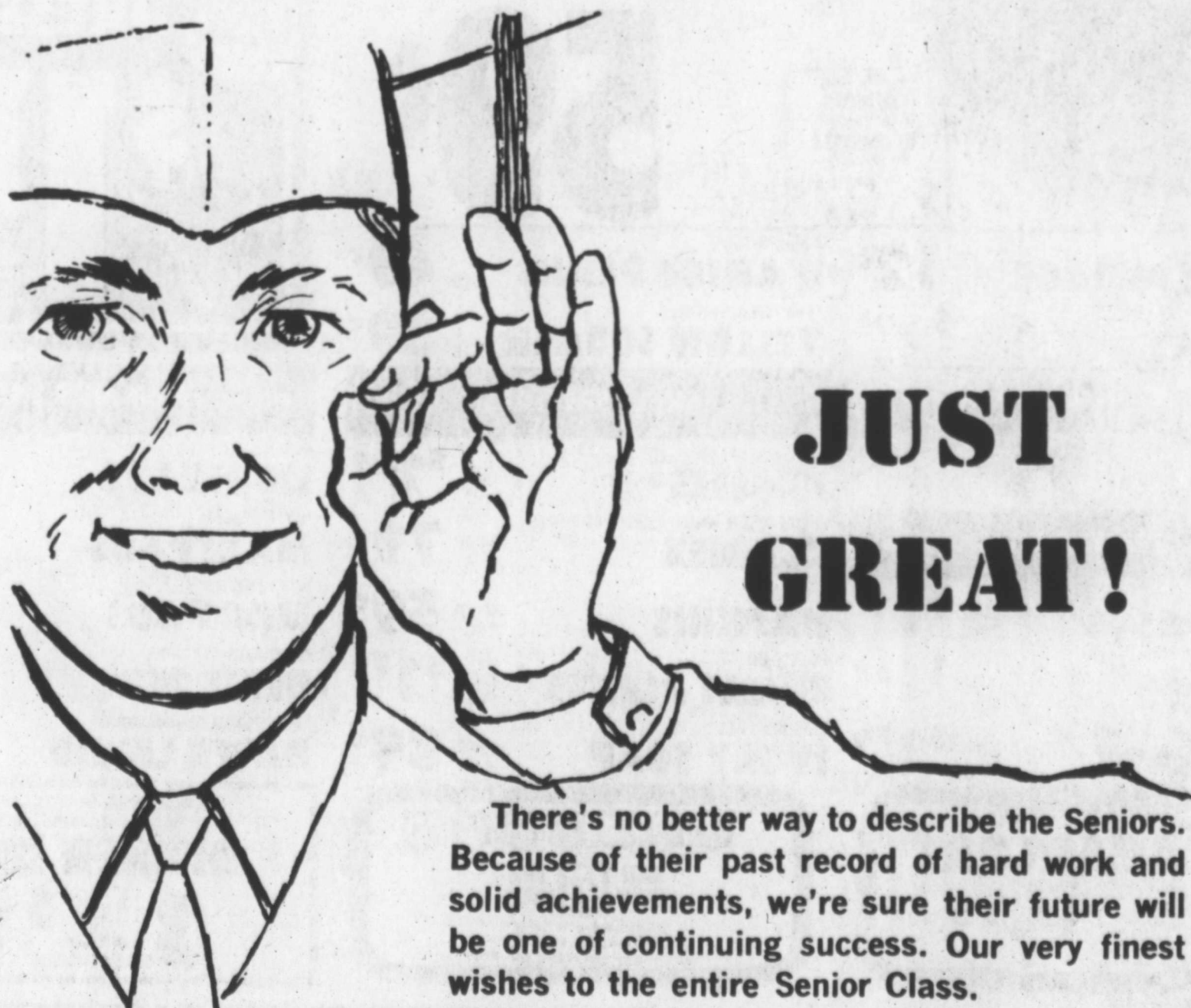
