

The Tahoka City Council met this Monday and opened bids on the city street repairs. The council voted to award the contract to W.D. Turner Construction Co. of Lubbock. They submitted the low bid of \$53,800 and completion date of no later than Sept. 1, 1981.

Also on the agenda for the Monday evening meeting was considering the proposed rate increase for Beta Communications, operator of the cable television system in Tahoka. The council asked Jim Strange of Beta Communications if they approved

Tenants Moving Into New Housing Project Tahoka's newest 24-unit housing project has been

completed and tenants are now moving in, according to John Fisher, executive director of the Housing Authority of the City of Tahoka. This brings to 74 the number of public housing units in town. Federal-financed

\$870,000 housing project is designed principally for low-families, but the brick buildings will compare with many of the better homes in Tahoka.

Actually the project is built in two locations, a 16-unit group named Windham Heights near the west end of South First Street, and Pioneer Plaza, consisting of eight units, located on west South Third Street.

Construction of this latest project is designed to ease the demand for rent houses in Tahoka. As with previous similar housing projects here, this one is designed to pay out in time on low-interest Federal loan.

The Windham Heights ranges from two bedroom apartments to four-bedroom

Pioneer Plaza has six onebedroom units, and two "no bedroom" units. Two of the apartments are designed for handicapped people.

There have been a total of 65 applicants seeking approval for rent, but some have failed to qualify and some have withdrawn their applications. Several units are yet to be rented. Fisher says the street adjacent to the Windham group project has been paved.

Members of the Housing Authority are Horace Rogers, chairman, Eldon Gattis, W.H. Eudy, Attorney Harold Green, and Mrs. Mabel Gur-

First projects of Authority were the 14-unit brick houses erected in the 1960s, and more recently remodeled. These are the 6-unit Parkview Terrace on west South Seventh Street. the 4-unit Monterey Pffiza in Southeast Tahoka, and the 4-unit Dunbar Homes in

Northeast Tahoka. Another, built later in the 1960s Golden Age Manor, consists of 12 units for people age 62 or older and permanantly disabled, located on South Second west of the

An entirely different project, available to anyone at moderate rent prices, is the 24-unit rent house project on North Seventh Street

Northwest Tahoka, which originally was of 12 units and to which 12 more units were completed last year. This project was built, on a loan from Farmers Home Administration, by Tahoka Industrial Housing Association, of which Dwain Lusk is chairman and Jim Solomon is the manager.

Fisher says applications still are desired for rental of several units in the Windham Heights and Pioneer Plaza project.

Heavy Rains, Hail

Two burglaries were reported in the city of Tahoka

Storms which have persisted over the Lynn County region for the last several days continued to provide both moisture and misery Tuesday as heavy rains accompanied by golfball-size hail put U.S. 87 south of O'Donnell under nearly four feet of water and also did some flood damage in that

More crops were destroyed in the O'Donnell area, and others in the county have been hailed out in recent days, adding to the expense of the upcoming crop year as some will have to replant.

The highway south of O'Donnell was closed for a time Tuesday, leaving about 25 motorists stranded until the water subsided about 8

Lynn County Sheriff Stanley Krause who worked the flooded highway near O'Donnell said his five officers were aided by Dawson County officials in directing traffic around the flooded areas of U.S. 87.

Krause said there were no injuries but tow trucks from Tahoka and Lamesa as well as several private four-wheel drive vehicles were needed

give young people 14-16 intensive instruction in all aspects of driving except actual behind-the-wheel training. The course now reaches 43,000 youths annually.

'Wheels" participants learn about their responsibilities as drivers, how using the family car will affect their parents' insurance rates, and what makes an automobile run. Their instructors are community volunteers--businessmen, safety officials and mechanics. "Classrooms" may be garages, auto dealerships, tire centers, police stations or anywhere there is automotive action. Several states offer 4-H "Wheels" in the schools.

Practical and technical know-how are stressed in all 4-H automotive projects and activities. 4-H members learn-by-doing about highway safety, traffic and motor laws, basic auto maintenance, and the economics of buying and operating a car.

They also explore vocational opportunities in automotive engineering, design, assembly and sales.

Automotive program members can earn awards donated by Firestone and arranged by the National 4-H Council. Recognition includes eight national scholarships of \$1,000 each, an expense-paid trip to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago for one member per state, and four medals of honor in each county.

Up to 10 certificates per state are awarded to clubs or counties that report outstanding overall 4-H automotive programs. As many as two clubs or counties per state can win plaques of honor for outstanding automotive driving events. Winning clubs, counties and individuals are chosen by the Cooperative Extension Ser-

The Texas 4-H and youth program reports that more

than 22,000 teen and adult volunteers served as 4-H group leaders last year. Based on the minimum wage, their three hours of volunteered time per week amounted to more than 14 million, points out Drennan, county 4-H program coordinator for the Extension Ser-

HURRY UPS FOR BUSY

BAKED POTATOES IN A HURRY--Boil them in salted water for about 10 minutes before popping into a very hot oven; Cut a thin slice from each end before popping into the oven; Insert a nail to shorten the baking time by 15 minutes.

ONIONS CHOPPING WITHOUT TEARS--You will shed less tears if you cut the root end of the onion off last; Freeze or refrigerate before chopping; Peel under cold running water; Or, periodically rinse hands under cold water while chopping.

PLEASE BE CAREFUL WITH PILLS

The elderly --people over 65-- make up 11 percent of the U.S. population, but they buy and take 25 percent of all prescription drugs. Tuberculosis, which

found more often in older than in younger poeple, is a disease that can be cured by medicine, according to the American Lung Association of Texas. Constancy and cinsistency are required for proper drug-taking. Tuberculosis treatment demands the taking of medicine for months, sometimes years and this is where the prob-

One reason older people take more drugs is that they tend to have long-term illnesses. Rules for proper drug-taking, however, apply equally to the young and the elderly:

-- Follow presisely the amount and time schedule of drugs prescribed by your physician.

Never take drugs prescribed for a friend.

-- If you are seeing several physicians for different diseases, inform each one of all the drugs you are taking. Sometimes drugs fight one another and should not be taken together.

-- Promptly tell your doctor of any side effects.

-- You may find keeping a daily schedule of drugs prescribed and taken is helpful. The American Lung Association of Texas, the Christmas Seal people can help with information about treatment for lung diseases of both the young and the elderly.





It has been determined that such request for release of funds will not constitute an action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment and accordingly the above-named City of Tahoka has decided not to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (PL 91-190).

The Reasons for such decision not to prepare such Statement

VOLUNTARY RELOCATION- Low/ moderate income owneroccupants whose applications for housing rehabilitation grants are turned down due to the lack of feasibility to rehabilitate their homes will be offered a relocation housing payment. The housing payments will be utilized by the homeowners to acquire a safe, sanitary, standard dwelling. This activity will provide decent housing and a suitable living environment for these relocated families. The effective benefits of a well developed relocation program far outweigh any temporary inconvenience to the relocated families.

WATER AND SEWER FACILITIES- Health and safety hazards currently exist due to inadequate fire protection and improper sewage disposal. The proposed project should eliminate those health and safety hazards. Construction activities will produce certain amounts of air and noise

CLEARANCE ACTIVITIES- Unoccupied and dilapidated structures, abandoned vehicles and uncleared overgrown lots in the project are creating serious threats to public health and safety and contribute to overall neighborhood blight. The project will seriously reduce this problem through a comprehensive program in the community. No major effects on environmental pollution or neighborhood development are expected.

PAVING/DRAINAGE- It is the major intent of the City of Tahoka to improve access for area residents within the neighborhood and into and out of their neighborhoods. Unpaved streets in the Target Areas create safety hazards and air pollution. The project will eliminate these problems. Minor grading and clearing will occur in regard to street improvements, but no long-term change in land characteristics will occur. Construction acivities will produce certain amounts of very limited air and noise pollution over a short term. No major increases in traffic or auto exhaust pollution are expected.

An Environmental Review Record for the Multi-Year Program (1981-1983) respecting the within projects has been made by the above-named City of Tahoka which documents the environmental review of the projects and more fully sets forth the reasons why such Statement is not required. This Environmental Review Record is on file at the above address and is available for public examination and copying upon request in the office of the City Secretary between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

No further environmental review of such projects is proposed to be conducted prior to the request for release of Federal funds.

All interested agencies, groups and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the City of Tahoka, to the office of the undersigned. Such written comments should be received at 1012 Lockwood, Tahoka, Texas 79373 on or before July 13, 1981. All such comments so received will be considered and the City of Tahoka, will not request the release of Federal funds or take any administrative action on the within projects prior to the date specified in the preceding sentence.

The City of Tahoka will undertake the projects described above with Block Grant funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The City of Tahoka is certifying to HUD that the City of Tahoka and Meldon Leslie in his offical capacity as Mayor consent toaccept the jurisdiction of the Federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental reviews, decision making and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval the City of Tahoka may use the Block Grant funds and HUD will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. HUD will accept an objection to its approval only if it is on one of the following bases: (a) that the certification was not in fact executed by the certifying officer or other officer of applicant approved by HUD; or (b) that applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision finding or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR Part 58) and may be addressed to Community Development Department of Housing & Urban Development, 2001 Bryan Tower, Dallas, Texas 75201.

If you are prevented from planting for the full 30 days prior to the final date because of conditions beyond your control you should file your prevented planting. You have 15 days following each final date to make application here at this office. To be eligible for payment you must also be prevented from planting a later non-conserving crop.

Failed Cotton, Grain Sorghum, and Wheat crops that fail and will not be planted back to that crop must be reported to this office before destroying evidence of the crop. Payments are figured as in past years at the



The secret of good disease control with either of the pesticide formulations early detection of the disease, thorough pesticide coverage, and continual applications as long as weather conditions favor disease development. When using dusts, apply them in the evening to get better distribution of the pesticide over the leaf. Dusting when leav-es are wet with dew can result in an uneven distribution since dust will be attracted to water droplets. Sprays can be applied at any time. I often get questions in the office about the effect of rainfall on a spray or dust application. If leaves have dried for two or three hours after the application, little pesticide will be removed by rain. However, of foliage has not dried, then repeat spraying or dusting.

For a pesticide to be effective against a disease, it has to be on the leaf during the time when the pest is present and developing. For most diseases, that is during and immediately after rainfall or heavy dews. During periods when diseases are severe, it may be best to apply the pesticide before a predicted period of wet weather. This will protect foliage and fruit during this critical period.

The secret to disease control is to use the proper pesticide, apply it at the proper time, and continue applications as long as the weather favors disease develop-
