### **Green Murder Suspect Is** Charged

A suspect in the July 4 murder of Geneva Louise Green, 37, formerly of New Home, has been charged after Callahan County Sheriff Bill Skinner went to California where the man was held in another stabbing case.

Charged with murder in the slaying of Mrs. Green at a roadside rest stop near Abilene was Daivd Nichols, 28, a former Abilene resident. He was arrested on charges of attempted murder in Placerville, Calif., and became a suspect in the Texas murder. partly on the basis of testimony by an Army major under hypnosis. The major had already picked Nichol's photograph from a group of photos shown him before the hypnosis, identifying him as the man he had seen running from the restroom after he heard screams that July 4 morning.

According to Deputy Mac West the major, under hypnosis, came up with two numbers from four on the license plate of the suspect. On Wednesday of this week, Nichols was reported as charged in the Texas case. Extradition proceedings were anticipated.

Boundary lines for voting boxes have been drawn to conform to the Commissioners Precinct Boundary lines as per changes mandated by the Federal Court Order in 1980, county officials said this week.

No changes were made in Box No. 5 at Draw, Box No. 8 at Gordon, Box No. 7 at Grassland, or Box No. 11 at Lakeview.

Box No. 1, South Tahoka, is changed to include all voters residing in City Limits East of Highway 87 and East of South Ave. J, South of North 4th St., East of Ave. N and North of Highway 380. Box No. 1 also includes South of Highway 380 and North of South 4th St.

Box No. 6 votes at Production Credit with boundary lines as follows: West of Highway 87 and North of North 4th St.; East of Ave. P and South of North 8th St.; North of Highway 380, South of North 4th St.; East of Ave. P and West of Ave. N.

Box No. 9, West Tahoka, votes at Tahoka High School. Boundary lines are as follows: West of North Main St. and North of North 8th St.; North of Highway 380 West of Ave. P.

Box No. 12, Southwest Tahoka, votes at Show Barn. Lines are South of South 4th St. and West of Ave. J.

The new Box 13, North Lynn County, will vote at Cummings' farm following FM Road 400 one mile Southwest to a point East of FM Road 1317.

Any voter who lives in an area where the voting boxes have been changed should contact the Lynn County Tax Office in order that the voting box number may be corrected so that names will be listed on voting list, county officials said.





PEOPLE WHO live in this area who visit in other parts of the country, especially in states north of here, frequently find themselves on the defensive about the climate. Many times we have told some resident of northern Arkansas or Indiana or someplace up north where we live only to be bombarded immediately with:

"West Texas? Isn't that where they have all those tornadoes?" (or blistering hot weather, or sandstorms). "Why would anyone want to live there?"

So, often in the past I have tried to explain to someone about how the climate around here isn't so bad, and that the sand doesn't blow all the time, and that tornadoes don't blow people away every day in the spring. Later on I discovered I not only was wasting my breath, but also was doing this great area a disservice by trying to sell someone on its virtues.


Many oldtimers say--and I have come to agree with them--that we ought to be thankful for all the duststorms and tornadoes and hot weather, and certainly ought not to try to convince outsiders that this is a great place to live. "If we didn't have these things, we would be overrun with people from up north moving down here," they explain, usually adding "We don't need them."

It's true that the places with the most desirable weather climates are so crowded that people are stumbling over each other. We understand that native Hawaiians, while happy with the tourists' money, aren't too happy with everyone wanting to move there. Switzerland has strict rules about who can move into that country. California is full of all kinds of creatures, as is Florida, and the Rio Grande Valley towns are pretty crowded.

People are moving from up north to the south, west and southwest in droves, trying to get away from frigid winters, high prices and Tip O'Neill.

Well, of course we could stand a few more people right here in our town, but we wouldn't want to be outnumbered by folks who have different sets of values from ours.

We don't mean to say that people from up north are undesirable. There are some really fine folks from up north. We like you Yankees just fine, even if yawl do tawk funny.

Firemen will serve the fish, french fries and hush puppies from 7 to 9 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 15, in the park, and the \$3.50 ticket allows each person to refill as many times as he or she wishes.

Miller noted that the fish would be "the kind that everybody liked last year." commenting that one kind not so popular last year would not be used at all.

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# SCS NEWS

Aug. 7, 1981 marks the 25th anniversary of the Great Plains Conservation Program administered by the Soil Conservation Service. Farmers and ranchers in 10 states - from North Dakota to Texas - have used the program to reduce erosion and conserve moisture with conservation practices. In 1980 there had been 58,000 contracts signed covering 110 million acres.

**GPCP** farmers and ranchers solve problems of wind and water erosion, drought and other resource-related problems with technical and financial aid based on the needs

of the land. In Lynn County 266 contracts have been signed protecting 144,558 acres. The first Great Plains contract was signed by Glen Brewer of O'Donnell. The land is still owned and operated by him. The second contract was signed by Tommy Sterling. In 1980 Tommy signed a contract through the Agriculture Stabilization & Conservation Service (ASCS) to modernize the farming operation by replacing his standard terraces with parallel terraces and applying wind strips to control wind erosion.

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





### Auto Theft **Tops Report**
