



**SOIL TESTING MORE** 

IMPORTANT THAN EVER Getting your soil tested has always been important, but now this proven practice is more important than ever, emphasizes Stanley Young, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Ser-

Fertilizer is getting more and more expensive, so it's crucial for producers to get the most from their fertilizer dollar. Getting a profitable return from fertilizer depends on the supply of available nutrients already in the soil. A soil test can provide an estimate of this

which nutrients are deficient in the soil for a particular crop so that a producer can fertilize to supplement the soil supply. It's not profitable to supply nutrients already available in the soil in sufficient quantities for a particular crop or to supply added nutrients that the crop does not need or cannot use.

Stanley Young emphasizes that now is an excellent time to take soil samples since soil test results can be obtained more quickly this time of the year due to a smaller volume than in the spring. And, once producers have their test results, they can order the fertilizer they need for the

#### Nation's Economy Discussed

Three phases of the nation's current economic situation and President Reagan's efforts to improve conditions were discussed in a talk at Rotary last Thursday by Dr. Robert Rouse, head of the Department of Economics at Texas Tech.

He said there are likely to be little reduction in actual expenditure by our government except that proposals initiated by the Pres. Carter administration are being cut, but defense spending will be increased.

Reducing taxes is difficult when one considers a gov. ernment debt of one trillion dollars. He pointed out that just one percent interest on this borrowed trillion dollars is 10 billion dollars.

Deregulation of government controls on almost every phase of American life, he said, should be a help in business community, as well as the individual citizen. Business has been hampered by strict and sometimes unnecessary restrictions imposed bureaucratic regulations. He also decried the failure of Wall street to fall in line

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



## Dogs Bomb Ballinger, Await Unbeaten Dalhart

The Tahoka Bulldogs exploded for eight touchdowns last Friday night in burying the visiting Ballinger Bearcats 55-7 to the delight of large homecoming crowd, as halfback Danny Thompson ran for two touchdowns and scored two more on long pass plays from Quarterback Mark Hudlin.

With the lopsided victory--it was 41-0 at halftime--the Dogs remained undefeated. But a pack of Wolves from the frozen northland are due in here Friday and things are certain to get a lot tougher for the Bulldogs.

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

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
