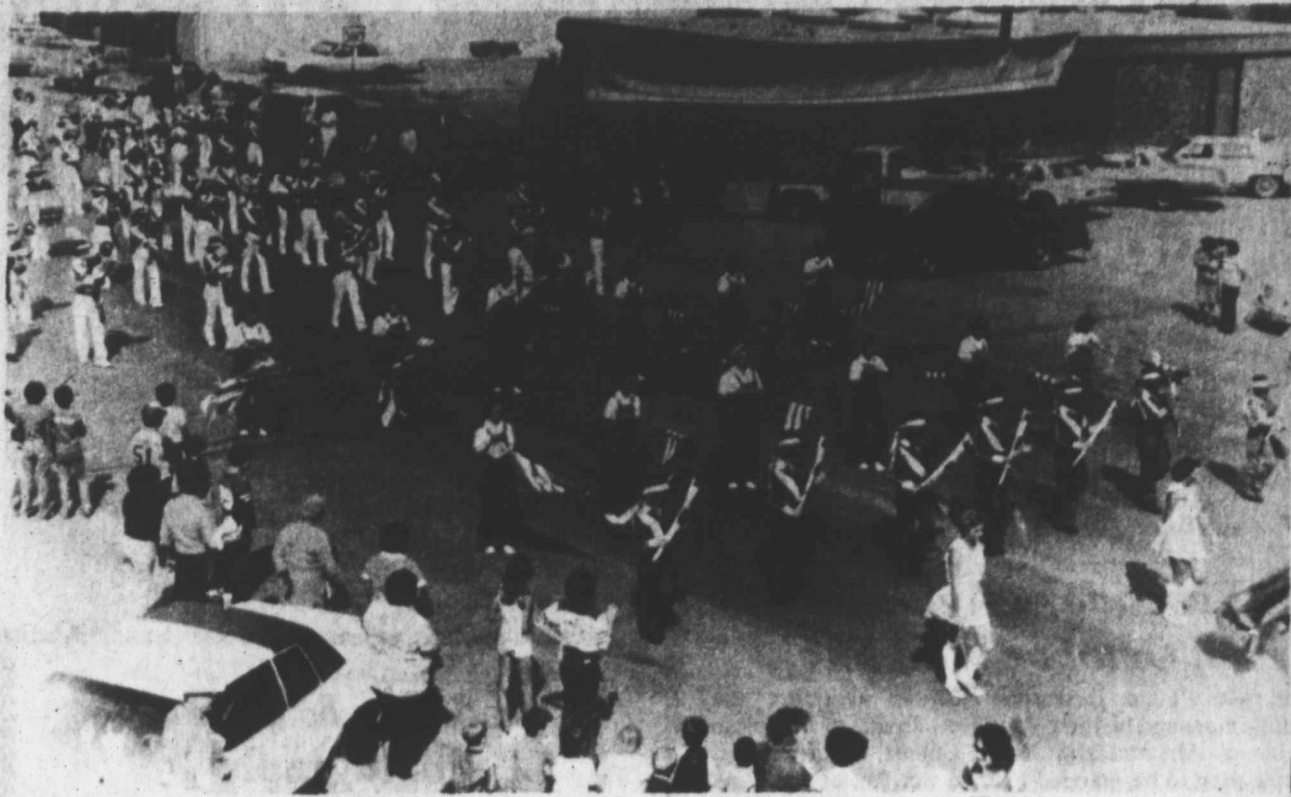

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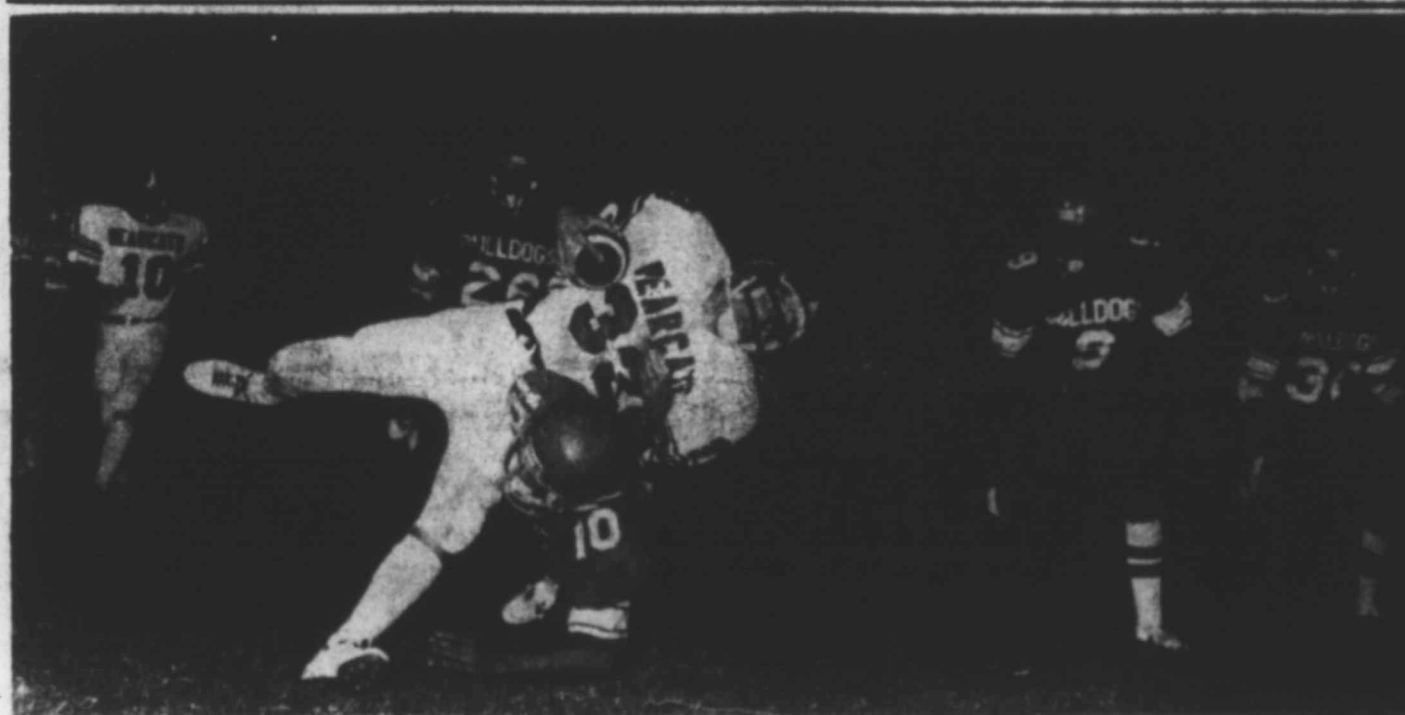

Denise Ehlers, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Milton Ehlers of Tahoka, was named Harvest Festival Queen Saturday as one of the highlights of a full weekend of Harvest Festival and Homecoming activities in Tahoka, with both events considered outstanding successes by sponsors and participants.

Perry Dunlap was first runner-up and Andra Draper was second runner-up. Other finalists in order were Barbara Owen and Denise White. Queen candidates sold 2,952 tickets for a Dallas Cowboy weekend for two contests, won by Rance House of Tahoka. Miss Dunlap sold 355 tickets to lead sales. Miss Draper was voted "Miss Congeniality" by the other contestants.

Good crowds were on hand all day for the many contests and events and to listen to music by Rex Thomas and band, who also played for the street dance Saturday night. Sales were reported good at booths on the courthouse square and at businesses which ran special sales for the Harvest Festival weekend.

Among school floats in the homecoming-festival parade, the winner was a "cemetery float" entered by the sophomore class, showing graves of teams buried by the Bulldogs so far this season. Floats by the junior high pep squad and the junior class placed second and third. Hall decoration winners were seniors, first, followed by juniors.

Fisher Fabrics had the first place business float in the parade, with Dayton Parker Pharmacy second. Best harvest window was by Lyntegar Electric Co-Op and best spirit window was by the Clint Walker Agency.

Christy Huffaker had the best decorated bicycle, with Tiffany Huffaker second and Cara Etheredge third.

The Class of 1961 was the honor class at homecoming, and the group heard music and an address by class member Buddy Chestnut at the homecoming assembly Friday afternoon at the school. There were 69 registered exes and guests, including 39 from Tahoka and 30 from out of town.

The parade included 28 entries and Mrs. Jody Roberson and the Student Council thanked all who took part. Also, the seniors, juniors and junior high pep squad expressed appreciation to West Texas Industries, Inc., for use of the compress warehouse to decorate floats.

Petition Asks Repair Of Country Club Road

A petition carrying more than 100 signatures was presented to Tahoka City Council Monday night requesting that the city and county get together and put Country Club Lane in good repair and keep it that way.

In the past there has been some question as to whose responsibility it was to keep the road repaired, as some of it is in the city and some in the county. City officials told

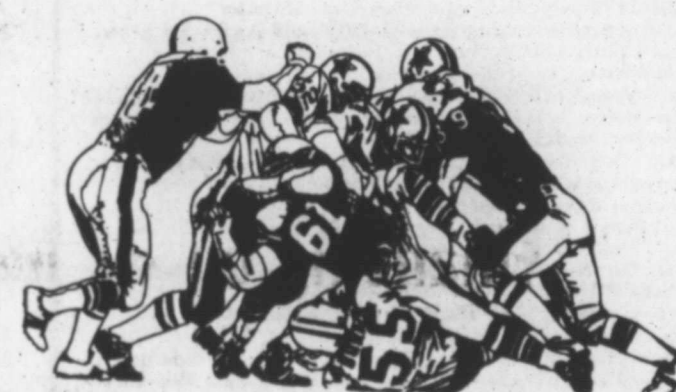

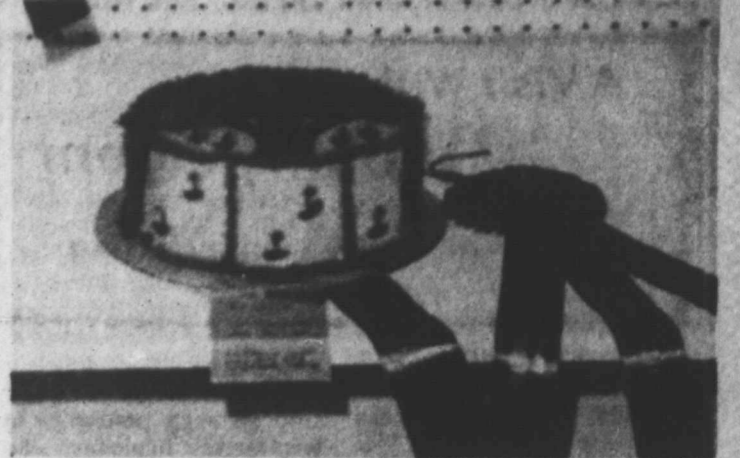
To celebrate the weeklong event, 4-H'ers will be conducting the annual Lynn County 4-H Achievement Banquet.

COTTON TODAY

QUOTA REQUEST DENIED: National Cotton Council President Frank Mitchener has received letters from Departments of State, Agriculture, and Commerce, and from Special Trade Representative Brock stating that the U.S. government does not favor an increase in the Mexican raw cotton import quota.

Assistant Secretary of State Robert Hormats said that during a recent meeting with the Mexican government, "The U.S. delegation explained the limitations of its Section 22 import program and its inability to enlarge the quotas at a time of record U.S. production and declining prices."

EXPORT SALES CLIMB: Net new cotton sales for the 1981-82 marketing year totaled 189,100 running bales during the week ended Sept. 24. This brought the season's total commitments to 3,333,400 bales. The week's top buyer was South Korea, 72,700 bales, with Canada, 30,000, and Japan, 25,200.

CCI HEAD TO TRAVEL: Robert Squires, Lubbock, Texas, Cotton Council International president, will leave Oct. 10 to attend the International Textile Manufacturers Federation meeting in Montreal. From Canada, Squires will go to Europe for an overview of CCI activities, arriving in Lisbon for a meeting of the International Cotton Advisory Committee. CCI is the overseas arm of the National Cotton Council.

A Visit With Your County Agent

SOIL TESTING MORE IMPORTANT THAN EVER
Getting your soil tested has always been important, but now this proven practice is more important than ever, emphasizes Stanley Young, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Fertilizer is getting more and more expensive, so it's crucial for producers to get the most from their fertilizer dollar. Getting a profitable return from fertilizer depends on the supply of available nutrients already in the soil. A soil test can provide an estimate of this supply.

A soil test will determine

which nutrients are deficient in the soil for a particular crop so that a producer can fertilize to supplement the soil supply. It's not profitable to supply nutrients already available in the soil in sufficient quantities for a particular crop or to supply added nutrients that the crop does not need or cannot use.

Stanley Young emphasizes that now is an excellent time to take soil samples since soil test results can be obtained more quickly this time of the year due to a smaller volume than in the spring. And, once producers have their test results, they can order the fertilizer they need for the

Nation's Economy Discussed

He said there are likely to be little reduction in actual expenditure by our government except that proposals initiated by the Pres. Carter administration are being cut, but defense spending will be increased.

Reducing taxes is difficult when one considers a government debt of one trillion dollars. He pointed out that just one percent interest on this borrowed trillion dollars is 10 billion dollars.

Deregulation of government controls on almost every phase of American life, he said, should be a help in business community, as well as the individual citizen. Business has been hampered by strict and sometimes unnecessary restrictions imposed by bureaucratic regulations.

He also decried the failure of Wall street to fall in line

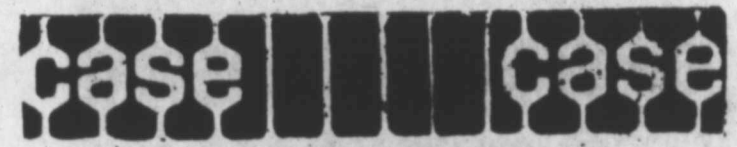

SOIL TESTING MORE IMPORTANT THAN EVER

Getting your soil tested has always been important, but now this proven practice is more important than ever, emphasizes Stanley Young, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Fertilizer is getting more and more expensive, so it's crucial for producers to get the most from their fertilizer dollar. Getting a profitable return from fertilizer depends on the supply of available nutrients already in the soil. A soil test can provide an estimate of this supply. A soil test will determine

which nutrients are deficient in the soil for a particular crop so that a producer can fertilize to supplement the soil supply. It's not profitable to supply nutrients already available in the soil in sufficient quantities for a particular crop or to supply added nutrients that the crop does not need or cannot use.

Stanley Young emphasizes that now is an excellent time to take soil samples since soil test results can be obtained more quickly this time of the year due to a smaller volume than in the spring. And, once producers have their test results, they can order the fertilizer they need for the

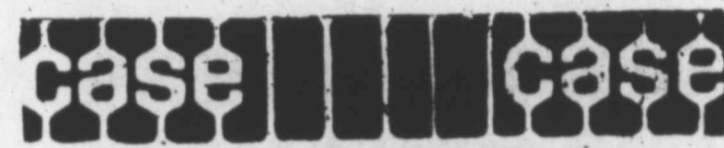

Dogs Bomb Ballinger, Await Unbeaten Dalhart

The Tahoka Bulldogs exploded for eight touchdowns last Friday night in burying the visiting Ballinger Bearcats 55-7 to the delight of large homecoming crowd, as halfback Danny Thompson ran for two touchdowns and scored two more on long pass plays from Quarterback Mark Hudlin.

Dalhart will come into Tahoka with its own unblemished record, having defeated four opponents, including a 13-12 victory over Class AAAA Dumas three weeks ago.
Dumas is the only team to score on the defense minded Wolves this season. Dalhart has beaten Guyman, Okla. 12-0, Tucumcari, N.M. 59-0, Dumas 13-12 and last Saturday blanked Frederick, Okla. 21-0.
One of Dalhart's defensive leaders who certainly has the right name for the position is tackle Randy White, a 5-10, 170-pound sophomore. Left

side linebacker Michael David is the leading tackler on the team, and cornerback Jeff Lloyd has four interceptions so far this season. He also has scored three TDs as a flanker.
Big Tackle
On offense, the blocking is led by senior tackle David Williams, 6-2, 240 pounds.
Thompson Friday night gained 179 yards rushing on just 14 carries and caught touchdown passes of 65 and 69 yards. Halfback James Wells gained 47 yards in 9 carries and Hudlin had 39 yards in 5 tries. Bob Mimms gained 35 yards in 6 carries.

And the Tahoka defense limited Ballinger to just 67 yards total offense, with Wells in the secondary and Steve Pierce, Mimms, Jeff Jennings and Daniel Garcia among the leaders on defense.
In the first period, Fullback Johnny Alvarado crashed 3 yards for a TD after a 42-yard run by Thompson moved it down close. Hudlin kicked

and it was 7-0. Halfback Willie Ray Mitchell ran 6 yards for the second Tahoka tally, with the big play in that drive being a 32-yard by Wells. This made it 13-0 after one quarter.
Long Passes
Thompson scored the next two touchdowns on the long pass plays, but they were different. On the first play of the second quarter, Hudlin

found Thompson behind everybody and hit him with a good long pass and he outran the field for the rest of the 65 yards. A running try for points failed and it was 19-0. Then after Daniel Garcia recovered a Ballinger fumble, Hudlin tossed a screen to Thompson and he simply broke loose and ran the distance, 69 yards, cutting all the way across the field to escape tacklers. Wells ran for two points to make it 27-0.

The Bearcats scored after a Tahoka fumble gave them the ball at the 20 in the third quarter. Quarterback David Elliott got in from about 6 inches after a pass interference call gave Ballinger a first at the 1. Johnny Islas kicked point to make it 48-7.
Tahoka added a final score in the fourth as Hudlin, running from halfback after Tony Garcia went in at quarterback, scooted 23 yards, then kicked the point.
