

Sherry Etheredge Leaving County Job

Resignation of Sherry Etheredge as Lynn County Extension Agent, Home Economics, was submitted to Lynn County Commissioners Monday, effective Dec. 31. Mrs. Etheredge, who has been county agent for five years, will be moving to Stamford, where her husband will be employed by West Texas Utilities. Commissioners Monday also approved use of county tax appraisal cards by the new tax appraisal district office at Harper and Ave. J, with the condition that the

cards remain the property of the county in event they are needed.

Annual dues to the Texas Assn. of Counties and to the West Texas Judges and Commissioners Assn. were approved, as was workman's compensation coverage for the coming year for the county employees.

A state highway department order for paving a farm-to-market road west of the city of Tahoka was approved. The project which has received considerable attention in the county and in Lubbock news media would involve paving 8 miles of what is known as Petty Road, running north and south and joining U.S. 380 at the south end. The order specifies that the county will secure right of way on the project, and

THS Program Is Best In State

Tahoka High School's vocational education program to prepare students for today's business world, has been hailed as one of the very best in Texas.

Some of the work was demonstrated last Thursday at Rotary by Mrs. Barbara Jaquess, local teacher for 11 years, and two of her students, Windy Curry and Jana Hammonds.

Using two sets of computers, including TV screen, typewriter and printer, practical use of the modern device in the small businesses for bookkeeping, inventory records, letter writing, etc., was demonstrated.

This vocational education class is limited to 20 junior and senior students, with each member making a choice of type of program to study and thereby requiring the teacher to prepare 16 different lesson plans.

Rotarians expressed surprise that such an advanced modern-day program is available to local high school students.

Dogs' Hopes Dimmed By Loss To Slaton

Slaton did it to us again, but all is not lost. At least not yet, but the Tahoka Bulldogs' chances of representing District 4-AAA in the football playoffs this season now depend on the Post Antelope, the 106 District Court, and the Bulldog players themselves.

The court is supposed to rule this Thursday (today, at 10 a.m.) on whether to issue an injunction which would let Slaton and Tahoka count the victories they won earlier in the season while each played a supposedly ineligible player. Each team was ordered by the ULL to forfeit the first seven games of the season for using a player in fulltime special education classes in their junior years (both are now seniors).

A temporary restraining order was issued last week by Judge George Hansard to allow the teams to use the players in question during last Friday's game which Slaton won 21-16. The Tigers did not use their player involved, Tahoka did.

After tough loss at Slaton

last Friday, the Bulldogs now can win district only if Post beats Slaton and if Tahoka beats Roosevelt here Friday night. And, of course, if an injunction is issued allowing the earlier victories by Tahoka over Post and Frenship. If the injunction is not granted, then Frenship will represent district.

Slaton turned the area's top Class AAA passer, Kelly Cook, and a couple of gifted receivers--particularly Craig Wright--loose on the Bulldogs Friday and almost made a rout of the game before

Tahoka finally woke up and with their usual last-quarter surge. Only this time it fell just short and Slaton won the close district game for the second year in a row. They won't do it next year, because the two teams will be in different districts, although they play in a non-conference game.

Good Passing
Cook completed 6 of 13 passes for 175 yards and the Tigers built up a 21-0 lead early in the fourth period before Tahoka started. Fumbles hurt Tahoka, especially

in the first quarter.

On the first possession, the Dogs drove to a first down at the Slaton 27, but on third and short, the snap was bobbled and although recovered, the chance was lost for a first, and a fourth down run by Danny Thompson gained 2 before Lonnie Phenix stopped him short at the 18.

Slaton came out passing, a 20-yarder from Cook to Timmy Slay and then a 20-yard interference penalty set up the Tigers for a 5-yard TD run by Scott Gee near the

end of the first quarter. Johnny Gonzales kicked the first of his three extra points to make it 7-0.

After Russell Kitten recovered a fumble for Slaton at the Tahoka 44, the Tigers used a 30-yard pass to Wright and a half-the-distance penalty to set up at the Tahoka 7. Alex Reyes ran 2 for the score in the second quarter.

Defense Holds
Slaton twice drove to the Tahoka 12 before the half ended, but the Bulldog defense rose to the occasions, with Willie Ray Mitchell knocking down a fourth-down pass once, and the Tigers missing a field goal try the second time. It was 14-0 at halftime.

The third quarter was mostly a punting duel, but near the end of the period, Samuel Haynes, 121-pound Slaton senior, ran 20 yards to the Tahoka 22 and another penalty put it on the 11. On the first play of the fourth quarter Cook on a keeper walked into the end zone untouched from the 8.

Trailing 21-0 with 11:54 left in the game, Tahoka suddenly came to life, sparked by the kickoff runback of QB Tony Garcia, who ran it back to the Tahoka 49. Garcia then hit Thompson on a moonball pass all the way to the Slaton 12, and two plays later Thompson ran 5 yards to put Tahoka on the scoreboard. After a penalty, Garcia ran 7 yards for the extra points and it was 21-8 at 10:59.

Score Again
The Bulldogs stopped Slaton after the kickoff and got the ball back. After a short drive, Garcia hit Mitchell in deep left field with a nice pass of 35 yards for another touchdown. Thompson ran for 2 points and with 5:04 left Slaton began to worry and Tahoka began to hope.

Slaton tried to pass again and this time Garcia intercepted and returned to the Tahoka 40. Thompson ripped off a 25-yard run to the 35 of Slaton, but the drive bogged down, and on 4th and 3 at the 28, with 2:23 left, Garcia's pass was tipped and intercepted in the end zone by Randall Mosser of Slaton.

Tahoka got the ball back with 3 seconds left, and Garcia teamed with Thompson on a 20-yard screen pass play, but that was all and Slaton won 21-16.

Thompson rushed for 72 yards in 13 carries and Fullback Johnny Alvarado gained 68 yards in 13 carries.

Healty Welcomes Lynn, Other Counties Into His District

State Rep. W.S. (Bill) Healty of Paducah has pledged to represent residents in the new 78th Legislative District as effectively as the voters who made up his old 101st Legislative District. Lynn County now will be in Healty's district.

Healty, dean of the Texas Legislature with more than 28 years service, will soon represent several counties that were not in the district that he currently serves.

"First, I want to welcome the citizens of this new district, and to pledge that I will continue to give the same consistent and effective service as I have during my entire public career," Healty said.

Nolan, Fisher, Jones, Lynn, Scurry and part of Taylor counties join with Cottle, King, Knox, Stonewall, Kent and Garza counties to make up the 78th Legislative District as a result of a new reapportionment plan voted

by the State Legislative Redistricting Board.

"The residents of the rolling plains of West Texas share a common interest and philosophy, and it is one that I have been able to represent their views on in Austin as a member of the budget board and appropriations committee where I've served for more than a quarter century," Healty said.

Healty, a champion of rural issues including highway and road funds to rural counties and a strong advocate of tax exemptions for livestock, said common economic and social issues tie the new 78th District together as well as any in the state.

He has been a resident of Paducah since 1946, and was born and reared on a farm. He has lived in the present Legislative district for more than 35 years and has not moved his residence since moving to Paducah. His wife is Jonnie Green Healty and he has three sons, Gene, Bill, and Stan, all married. He is

also Chairman of the Official Board of Elders and Deacons of the First Christian Church in Paducah.

Wreck On 87 Leaves Two Girls Injured

The driver, Debbie Owen, 19, of Mason, and a passenger, Laurie Anderson of Port Neches, were taken to Lynn County Hospital for treatment, with Miss Anderson reportedly still in the hospital Tuesday with broken ribs and other injuries. Miss Owen was reportedly admitted to a Lubbock hospital for treatment of neck injuries.

The two students at Sul Ross in Alpine, were enroute to Slaton to visit someone when the accident occurred.

With that in mind, if one serving of presweetened cereal contains eight grams of sugar, that's the same as adding two teaspoons of sugar to cereal, she says.

Sherry Etheredge Says . . .

The first Pilgrims celebrated Thanksgiving after harvest and before the first harsh signs of winter. The tradition spread as the country grew. But it wasn't until 1863 that Sarah Josepha Hale, editor of "Godey's Lady's Book", urged President Lincoln to set a regular date. He set the last Thursday in November, but Franklin Roosevelt upset the precedent in 1939 by proclaiming the third Thursday as the nation's official Thanksgiving day. Now the holiday is celebrated the last Thursday of the month.

You can hardly remember Thanksgiving festivities without thinking about bountiful dinners of roast turkey, cranberries, sweet potatoes and other such traditional dishes.

If roasting turkey is a new task for you, let these suggestions from U.S. Dept. of Agriculture home economists guide you.

Buy a bird that fits your needs. To estimate the size of the bird you need, allow 1/4 pound of turkey per serving. Generally you can serve 6 to 10 people with a 6 to 8 pound turkey; 10 to 15 people with an 8 to 12 pounder; 15 to 20 people with a 10 to 12 pounder; and 20 to 26 people with a 12 to 14 pounder.

For tenderness, look for the age of the bird on the label. "Young" means tender, and young turkeys are usually labeled young hen, young tom, young turkey or fryer-roaster.

Look for the USDA grade shield to determine quality. U.S. Grade A birds are full-breasted and meaty with an attractive appearance and good finish.

You may find turkey that

has been pre-basted. These birds have been injected with a solution usually including vegetable oil, water, salt, sugar, an emulsifier and flavorings. Solutions are designed to contribute flavor and texture.

If you baste your own you can choose your own baste to suit your needs. The choice to baste or not is yours. But basting throughout cooking usually helps to secure even browning of the bird.

When you're ready to cook the bird, you can stuff it. Never add stuffing the night before or never stuff a turkey and then freeze it. This increases the chances of food borne illness. Stuff the turkey loosely to allow heat to penetrate the stuffing. Use a meat thermometer to make sure the interior of the stuffing reaches a minimum temperature of 165 F. and remove all stuffing after cooking.

You may wish to truss the bird to make it as compact as possible for even roasting throughout. You can do this by folding the neck skin toward the back and fastening with skewers, a few strings, or metal trussing wires. Tuck the legs under the band of skin at the tail or the trussing wire, or tie down. Fold the wing tips back on the wings and secure.

Spread skin of turkey with melted butter, margarine or baste. Then place breast down on rack in shallow pan. Do not add water, and do not cover. If you cover the pan, you are actually braising the bird and will not end up with a crisp-skin roast. Place in preheated oven set at proper temperature or about 325 F. Baste with drippings from bottom of pan, prepared solution or melted butter or margarine during baking. Turn from one side of the breast to the other, then breast up.

If the breast, wings or drumsticks get done before the thighs or the rest of the bird, use aluminum foil to cover these and keep them from browning too much. For the breast make a loose aluminum foil tent and remove during basting.

The bird will be done when it reaches internal temperatures of 185 F. If you do not have a meat thermometer,

test for doneness about 30 minutes before time indicates by moving the drumstick up and down. If the leg joint gives readily or the meat feels soft when pressed between the fingers, turkey is ready.

Plan roasting time so that the turkey will be done 20 to 30 minutes before serving. This "rest period" helps make meat juicy and carving easier.

6 to 8	3 to 3 1/2
8 to 12	3 1/2 to 4 1/2
12 to 16	4 1/2 to 5 1/2
16 to 20	5 1/2 to 6 1/2
20 to 24	6 1/2 to 7

Prepare Stuffing Carefully

These grand holidays—such as Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's—are occasions for delicious feasts—not upset stomachs. Food safety usually requires special attention at holiday times. Reminds the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture.

Here are some precautions you can take when stuffing your holiday turkey. Suggests USDA's Food Safety and Inspection Service.

Stuff the bird loosely just before roasting. This allows heat to penetrate the stuffing. Use a meat thermometer to make sure the interior of the stuffing reaches a minimum temperature of 165 F. Remove all stuffing after cooking.

For absolute safety, bake the stuffing separately from the bird. Germs love the ingredients in stuffing, and the warm, moist inside of the turkey is a perfect place for germs to grow. The thick meat on the turkey protects the germs from extreme heat or cold; so they continue to grow to dangerous numbers. Also, the stuffing gets a lot of handling in preparation, and it's easy for germs to get inside the turkey.

Refrigerate leftover stuffing and turkey in separate containers.

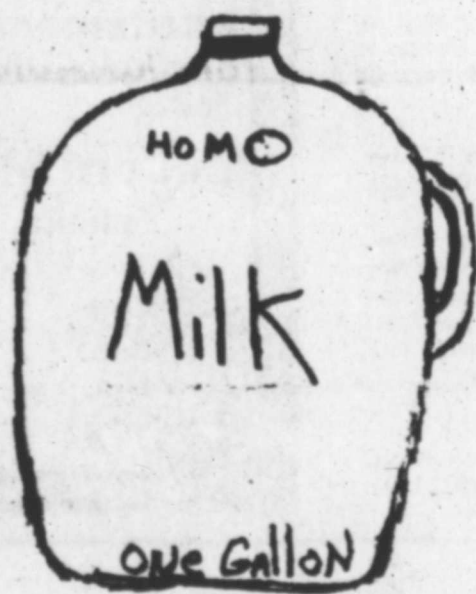

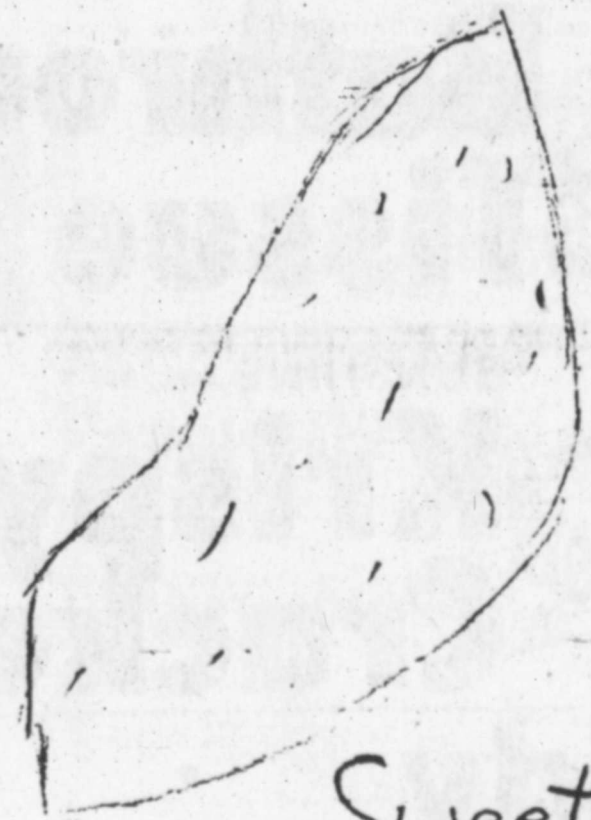

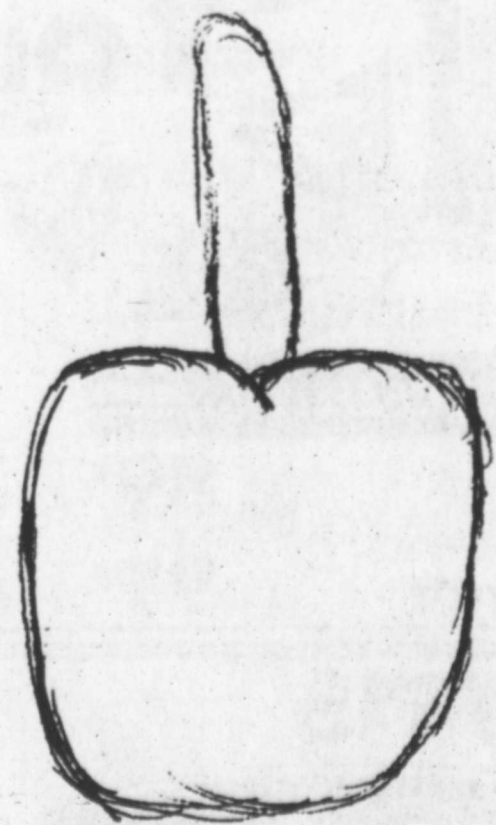

Cotton Prices Remain Weak

Prices paid growers for High Plains cotton remained weak during the week ended Nov. 5. Mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and 52, staples 31

and 32, mike 35 - 49 brought about 49.65, according to Mack Bennett, Area Director at USDA's Marketing services Office in Lubbock. This was 35 points lower than a week earlier.

Damp, cloudy weather moved across the High

Plains Friday morning and harvesting slowed. Most early ginnings have been from fields treated with harvest aid chemicals and hail damaged fields, Bennett said. Most growers are expected to delay harvest until after freezing temperatures provide a natural kill.

Lubbock's Marketing Services Office graded 22,100 samples during the week ended Nov. 5. This brought the season's total to 29,000 and compares with 206,000 graded by the same date last year.

About 50 percent was grade 52 and 20 percent was grade 42. Below grades accounted for 18 percent. About 39 percent were reduced one grade for bark and one percent for grass.

Staples were 20 percent staple 31, 35 percent staple 32 and 23 percent staple 33. Staples averaged 32.4 thirty-seconds of an inch during the week.

Micronaire was 41 percent 35 - 49, 16 percent 33 - 34, 22 percent 30 - 32, 15 percent 27 - 29, five percent 24 - 26 and one percent below 24 for an average of 34.

Breaking strength averaged 24 grams per tex. Gins paid growers \$70 to \$85 per ton for cottonseed.

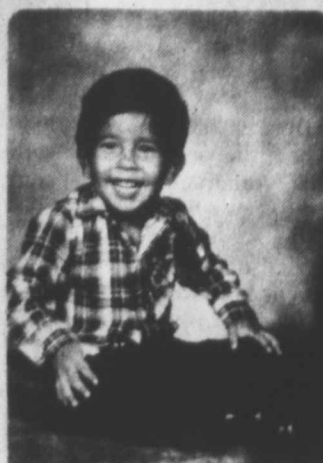

WIND EROSION--The "blow season" for the High Plains area of Texas, which includes Lynn County, officially starts on Nov. 1 each year. Based on what the winds have already done this fall it appears we may be in for a lot of high winds the next 6 months. Fortunately, we have good soil moisture and can stop a lot of blowing with some type of mechanical soil tillage. However, there are other practices which will help, according to the Soil and Water Conservation District. One is to leave the cotton stalks as long as possible. A chisel needs to be run between the rows to rough the soil surface. Another practice is to seed wheat or rye on terraces, turnrows, borders and odd areas. Most blowing problems start in these places. It's a little late for normal seeding of these areas but soil moisture is good and the soil is warm enough to sprout the seed.

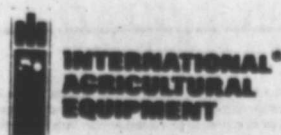

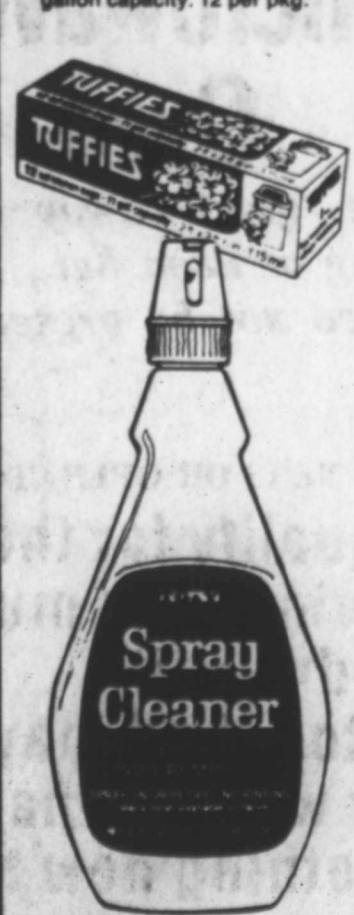

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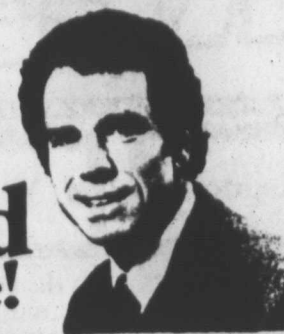
