Woman Injured In Hit-Run Crash

A Tahoka woman suffered a broken collarbone Tuesday about 6 p.m. when her vehicle was struck at an intersection by a car which reportedly ran a stop sign, struck the woman's 1981 Chevrolet Suburban and continued away from the scene at a high rate of speed.

Mrs. Milt Draper, driver of the Suburban, was taken to Lynn County Hospital for treatment and later was reported in good condition, but with a broken collarbone.

The wreck occurred at S. 1st and Ave. L. and police Tuesday night were looking for a red 4-door Chevrolet. Later, about 4 a.m. Wednesday, police arrested a suspect, a Mexican National, in a car fitting the description. He was jailed pending charges.

On Sunday at U.S. 87 and N. 2nd St. a 1972 Chevrolet pickup driven by Jimmy Perez of Georgetown struck a parked 1974 Pontiac owned by Josefina Vasquez of Tahoka and also a parked 1978 Pontiac owned by Amancio Sanchez of Tahoka.

Arlic Moore Aycock of 1825 Ave. N was away from her home less than an hour Friday morning, returning about 11:50 a.m. to find her front door open and a Sears portable color TV missing.

Brenda Cloe, who lives on Lockwood, reported Monday that someone put sugar in the tank of her 1978 Ford, and last Saturday Shelia Crawford reported a tire slashed on her car parked downtown.

On Saturday, a nursing home attendant reported someone looking in windows.

Appeals To Public
Burglaries of items from farms and rural buildings, and of rural homes continued to plague county residents and the sheriff's office, and Sheriff Stanley Krause this week asked that residents of rural areas take special note of any suspicious vehicles anytime and to notify the sheriff's office of the license numbers so they can be checked out.

The home of Oscar

Wuensche, northwest of Wilson, was reported burglarized. Items listed as stolen Tuesday included kitchenware, a black and white TV, electric blanket and other articles.

On Monday Cal Womack of Tahoka reported two radios, valued at \$471.35, stolen off tractors in a barn east of Tahoka on U.S. 380.

A Hereford calf weighing 350 pounds was shot and killed sometime last Thursday night about a mile and a half north of New Home, on FM 1730, according to the owner, Kenneth Timmons.

Five quail hunters paid fines of \$25 plus court costs each on charges of trespassing on private property west of Tahoka last week.

A 16-year-old Tahoka youth was arrested in connection with the damage and destruction of highway signs in the area on Dec. 10. He was turned over to juvenile authorities for action. Damage to the signs was listed at \$944.80.

In jail during the week were two for public intoxication, one for assault and traffic violation, two for driving while intoxicated, and the one for investigation of hit and run.

Baptist Men Hear Speaker From Brazil

Rev. Livingston Cunha, executive secretary for the Baptist Convention of the Brazilian state of Pernambuco, spoke Monday morning to members and guests of Tahoka First Baptist Church Brotherhood.

Cunha, who lives in Recife, capital of Pernambuco, encouraged Tahoka Baptists to participate in upcoming mission trips to Brazil. Already a group of members of the Tahoka Church and others from the South Plains have made a mission trip to Brazil, working with churches in training and in revivals. Two more groups will be going to Recife in June and September of next year, and some Tahoka members are planning to make that trip.

During his stay in West Texas, Cunha plans to speak in several churches, including Slaton, Levelland, Lubbock, Plainview, Tulia and other cities.

Scheduled Pay Boasts For Officials Debated

Lynn County Commissioners Court Monday considered the possibility of rescinding raises for elected officials budgeted for the coming year, but after lengthy discussion, voted 3-2 to allow the salary increases.

Only elected officials of the county would have been affected by the action suggested by Pet. 1 Commissioner Eldon Gattis, who told the others that in view of the current financial plight of the farmers in Lynn County and with revenues for the county next year expected to be lower, he would favor of not taking a pay raise next year for himself, or for other elected officials.

Part of the anticipated loss of revenue by the county next year will come from a new state law which exempts farm equipment such as tractors from property taxes.

Gattis' view was opposed by Judge Melvin Burks, who said he favored a pay increase for elected officials, including himself, because, he said "these elected officials work hard and they need an increase to keep up with expenses."

Pay increases averaging 10 per cent had been budgeted for next year for both elected officials and county employees.

After considerable discussion, J.C. Gandy moved to approve the 1982 budget as already drawn up, including the scheduled pay increases, and Commissioner E.R. Blakney seconded. These two voted for the motion and Gattis and Commissioner Bart Anderson voted against it. Judge Burks broke the tie by voting for, leaving the salary increases in the budget. Commissioners did agree to include Justice of

the Peace Ed Hamilton in the salary increase schedule. No pay increase for him had been included in the original budget.

Commissioners also approved an audit of the revenue sharing account, transfer of \$2,500 to each precinct from road and bridge funds, renewal of a fire contract with the City of O'Donnell, with the county to pay that city \$1,250 a year for calls outside the city limits, and a bond for Austin attorney Jack McCreary, employed to collect delinquent taxes.

Accountant Buster Abbe was present to answer questions, mostly by Gattis, about accounting procedures. Commissioners do not plan to meet on Dec. 28.

Keep Yule Lights Bright On Saturday

Persons with Christmas decorations at their homes or businesses were urged this week to keep them lighted Saturday evening as members of the Tahoka Garden Club will make their rounds to judge the top entries.

Tahoka school bands will present a free Christmas Concert starting at 7:30 p.m. today (Thursday) in the high school auditorium, with all school bands from fifth grade up to be featured.

Band Director Milton Fox said the high school band would wind up the program with the main concert. "We'd like to see a lot of folks turn out to show the youngsters they support the band, which has done very well this year," Fox said.

A LOT OF newspapers exchange copies each week with other newspapers, and many publishers make time in their schedules to read the exchanges. They figure (rightly) that sometimes you can get a good idea from what some of the other people are doing, and you can steal it and use it yourself.

I remember about 20 years ago when I first was publisher of the Amherst and Sudan newspapers an incident which occurred when I went into Garland Motor Co. at Littlefield to try to sell some advertising. The owner was busy, so his receptionist asked me to wait, and asked me who I represented. Although I was intending to sell him an ad for both newspapers, I just named one of them in replying that I was from the Sudan paper.

"Oh," she smiled. "I've seen that paper; it's very good." I beamed. Then she added: "We take the Amherst paper, and it's terrible." I never did tell her I published it also.

What I really started out to mention was that sometimes I do go through the exchanges to see if I can come up with a column topic. This week I looked through copies of newspapers from Slaton, Post, Floydada, Abernathy, Canyon, Tulia and Denver City and didn't see too much worth mentioning. Anyway, not here.

There was a headline in the Canyon News which startled me a little: "7th White Boys Beat Dumas." It turned out the 7th grade teams are referred to by the color of their uniforms.

And in the Tulia Herald, Wendell Tooley reported that one of his neighbors says that what he wants most out of his new car is his teenage son.

THE GRINCH who stole Christmas has his counterpart in the crooks who darkened a well-known Christmas tree in Tahoka.

For a quarter of a century the massive, brightly-lighted Christmas tree on Ave. R near U.S. 380 has been a favorite attraction for townspeople and persons traveling through on the highway during the Christmas season. About 10 years ago, the Chamber of Commerce received a letter from a tourist who was passing through Tahoka on Christmas Eve and noticed the beautiful tree topped with a blue star.

This year, just three days after the lights went up on the tree in the Fred McGintys back yard, thieves removed 50 to 60 bulbs from the tree. Police were notified, but had few clues to work with.

The tree remains dark this season.

City Improvements Are Seen From \$2.25 Million In Grants

That multi-purpose \$2,250,000 Federal block grant to the city of Tahoka for town improvements during the next three years should be of great benefit to the entire community.

John Fisher, administrator of the program, said last week. Areas most affected are South Tahoka, from South First to South 10th Streets, Southeast, East, and Northeast Tahoka.

Nearing completion is the street program, for which \$717,500 was appropriated, sewer improvements for which the Federal Government appropriated \$125,000, and water system improvements to cost \$71,500.

Shacks Razed
Now getting underway in the target area is the demolition of abandoned shacks, cleaning off lots for which \$61,000 is available and for which up to \$440 each may be paid by the program.

Applications are now being taken, Fisher said, for improvement, re-building, or replacing sub-standard homes for which up to \$6,000 may be spent on owner-occupied homes and up to \$2,000 on rental units. The grant total available for such is \$805,000, and another \$315,000 is available for relocation payments and assistance.

Six buildings have already been demolished and the lots cleared. These include three buildings and a storm cellar on the J.M. Judge (former Littlepage) property west of the Senior Citizens Center; one house on the Mrs. Bon-

nic Ward property on South 5th; and two houses on the Mrs. Estella Rodriguez lots on S. 6th.

Work Planned
Two other houses have been approved for demolition and two more for relocation. Ten or 12 other buildings are in the process of being approved for demolition.

Many property owners in the target areas as yet do not realize that they may be able to qualify for residence improvements, rebuilding, relocation, and/or lot clearance, Fisher said. Anyone interested should contact Fisher at his office in the Wharton building, the old English Theater building on North Main, phone 998-5255. His office hours are 8 to 5 Monday through Friday.

Of interest to citizens in general is that property taxes

should be paid up to date.

Furthermore, the improvement program should cause the tax base to grow for benefit of town, school district, and county, Fisher says.

In all cases possible, work on the various projects is being done by local labor, thereby helping keep as much money as possible at home.

Building Codes
Also included in the Federal grant is \$75,000 for building code enforcement, three years salary for a code enforcement officer and a housing counselor; and office equipment; and \$80,000 for administration of the program, including architect and engineering fees, advertising, printing, etc. Once before, City of Tahoka

Conduct Of Two Students Studied

Tahoka school board members last week considered disciplinary action against two students, expelling one for the rest of the year and deciding to transfer another into a different history class.

Expulsion was voted for a 13-year-old girl who attacked elementary principal Tom Cooper. Parents of a 14-year-old boy appeared to talk with the board about action taken against their son allegedly

for chewing gum in class and being insubordinate to the teacher.

The teacher reportedly had given the boy a choice of "taking some licks," or copying a portion of a dic-

tionary. After hearing the case, the board decided to move the boy to another class.

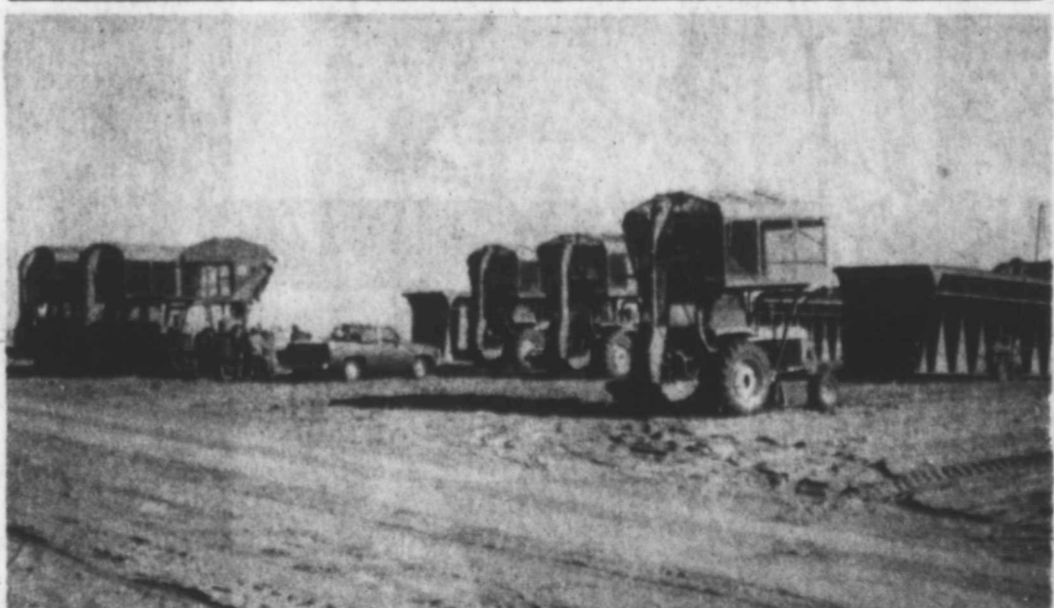
The board also approved a textbook committee for the coming year, voted a 20-cents-per-hour increase for auxiliary workers in the school system and approved an evaluation policy including job descriptions for teachers, athletic director, counselor, nurse, principals and superintendent.

Pam Paris was approved as a substitute teacher.

Tax collections are poor for this time of year, reported business manager David Roberson, who said only about 12 per cent of taxes had been collected since the last notices were mailed. He said about 40 per cent of taxes usually have been paid by this time of year.

It was noted that total school enrollment was down 39 from last May, when 835 students were enrolled in the entire system. After the second six weeks, Supt. Jim Coulston told the board, Tahoka has 796 students.

Principal Jim Marcus said high school enrollment at present is 261, less than the

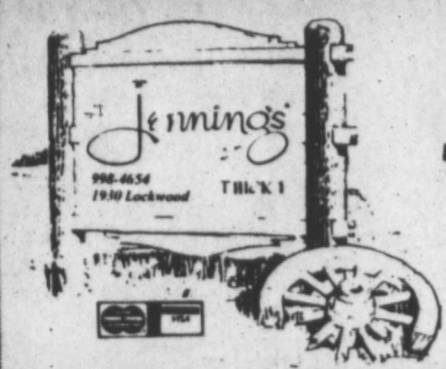

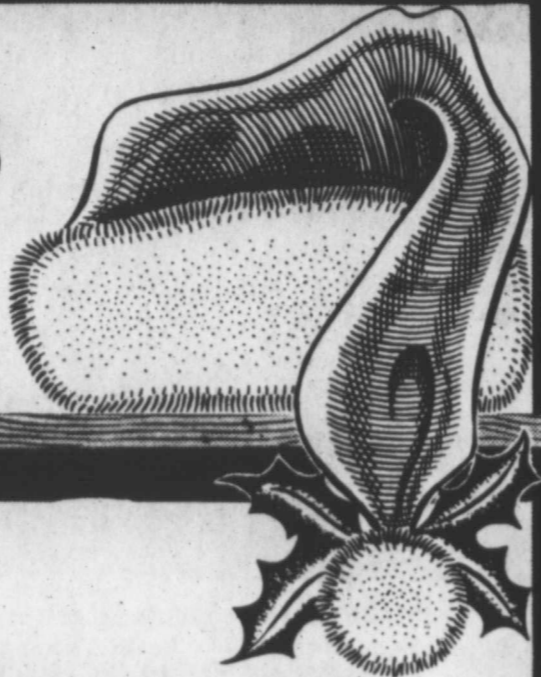

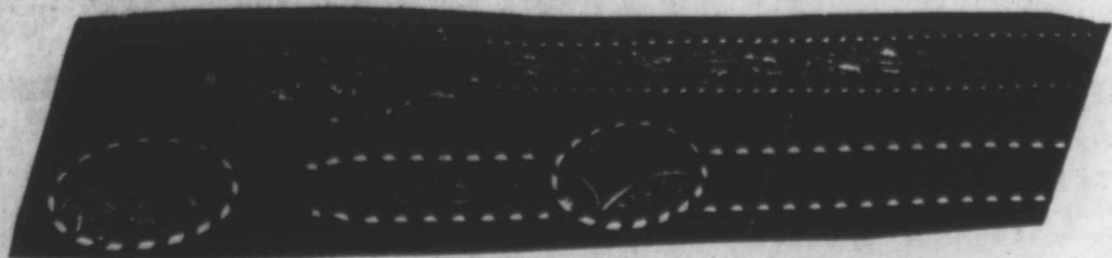

Contractors Indicted In Scheme

A six-count indictment was returned by a Federal Grand Jury in Dallas charging a former AMTRAK official and two Fort Worth contractors and their respective firms with violations of the Mail Fraud Statute and the Sherman Antitrust Act.

The six-count indictment alleges that Fort Worth contractors John L. Guinn, of John L. Guinn & Company, Joseph Demetree, of JLG Services, and former AMTRAK construction and AMTRAK Assistant Chief Engineer Julius J. Brandimarte of Washington, D.C., engaged in a bid rigging scheme to manipulate the awarding of numerous AMTRAK construction and train service contracts throughout the United States. Donald Klawiter, Chief of the Justice Department Antitrust Division, Dallas, said many of the contracts concerned repairs, renovations, and services at various stations on a route which is now known as "The Eagle", formerly known as "The Inter-American, which runs through Texas from Texarkana to San Antonio, and which formerly ran to Laredo.

Brandimarte, an AMTRAK construction engineer, is alleged to have influenced local contractors of upcoming contracts and assisted them in the submission of multiple bids, making it appear as though the bids were competitive. Guinn and Demetree are alleged to have created bids on competitor's stationery under forged official signatures and then submitted the bids via the U.S. Mails to AMTRAK procurement officials in Washington, D.C.

COTTON TODAY

COTTON CROP ESTIMATE UP: The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Dec. 1 estimate for the 1981 cotton crop is 15,569,600 bales, up 10,000 from Nov. 1.

Harvested acreage was raised to 13,754,800 from 13,750,000. Per-acre yield average was put at 543 pounds, same as last month. Ginnings prior to Dec. 1 amounted to 10,157,271 running bales.

EXPORTS CONTINUE STRONG: Net new sales for the 1981-82 marketing year totaled 125,000 running bales during the week ended Dec. 3.

The top buyers were Japan, 40,400 bales; South Korea, 17,700; the Philippines, 16,700; and Taiwan, 13,300. The week's export shipments increased to 156,900 bales, topping last week's total to become the largest for the season.

VIEWS GIVEN ON WATER: The National Cotton Council has submitted a statement giving the cotton industry's views on amending the 1902 Reclamation Act to two Congressional committees.

The statement stressed the Council's policy that opposes reducing and limiting farm size and supports a sliding scale on water costs and the Corps of Engineers' exemption.

Change In CCC Interest Rate Policy Listed

Beginning Jan. 1, the interest rate on Commodity Credit Corporation loans will be set at the rate charged CCC by the U.S. Treasury during the month that the loan is issued, according to Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block.

Loans disbursed since April 1, 1981, and which have interest rates subject to change, will have their interest rates adjusted Jan. 1. These loans, which currently have a 14.5 percent interest rate, will be adjusted to the interest rate charged CCC by the Treasury in January. Previously, CCC interest rates were set semi-annually on April 1 and Oct. 1.

The interest rate paid by CCC has declined from a peak of 16.75 percent in October to 13.625 percent this month. Farmers should benefit from this downward trend in interest rates, Block said.

COTTON CROP ESTIMATE UP: The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Dec. 1 estimate for the 1981 cotton crop is 15,569,600 bales, up 10,000 from Nov. 1.

Harvested acreage was raised to 13,754,800 from 13,750,000. Per-acre yield average was put at 543 pounds, same as last month. Ginnings prior to Dec. 1 amounted to 10,157,271 running bales.
