Thieves, Vandals Stay Busy During Holidays

Cases of theft, burglary, vandalism and - malicious mischief kept law enforcement officers busy in the city and county during the last 10 days, and one shooting incident also was investigated. Sheriff's officers went to Wilson Dec. 17 to check on a report that a man had been shot. They found Francisco Perez Galvan, 22, in an apartment, with a facial wound. He was taken to a hospital in Slaton for treatment. He told officers he was shot in Lubbock, and the case was turned over to Lubbock officers.

On Dec. 22 Jesus Gomez Rodriguez of New Home reported damage to his 1975 Dodge, with a quarter panel dented, apparently when someone drove the car without his permission. Glynn Moore, northeast of Wilson, reported three firearms stolen from his garage and vehicles on Dec. 17. Missing were two .38 caliber revolvers and a .22 Colt Frontier model pistol.

Home Burglary
On Sunday, Jack Williams reported his home south of New Home had been burglarized the previous night, with about \$4,000 worth of items missing. Among the things stolen were a 30-30 Marlin rifle, Zenith black and white television set, MCS stereo system, frozen meat and clothing items.

Tracy White, 18, of Tahoka was assessed a five-year probation sentence after pleading guilty before District Judge George Hansard last week on a charge of aggravated assault on a peace officer. The incident involved Tahoka Police Chief Jack Miller, who had been called to the scene of a disturbance in the city on May 24.

Two juveniles who broke out a window and were about to go into an apartment on S. 1st St. in Tahoka early Monday morning changed their

minds and fled when the woman resident of the apartment brought a knife with her as she came to investigate. Police said they have names of suspects in the attempted break-in and were checking the case out.

School Vandalism

Desk drawers were broken and pulled out and papers strewn over rooms in Tubb Elementary School as vandals burglarized the place over the holidays. Obscenities were written on blackboards and a picture of the late Floyd Tubb, former principal for whom the school was named, was defaced.

A small school bus also was damaged by vandals who broke off mirrors and slashed a seat in the bus.

A felony charge of criminal mischief was filed this week against Josephine Perez Atkinson, 31, of Tahoka, and charges of assault with a motor vehicle also were filed.

The woman, who was free on \$1,500 bond, was accused

of deliberately driving a 1972 Oldsmobile through a brick wall and into the living room of an apartment on S. 1st occupied by Wanda Webster about 10:30 p.m. Christmas Eve. No injuries were reported.

Vandals with no feeling for Christmas tore down Christmas lights and decorations at the home of Joe Hays, 2028 N. 4th, on Dec. 21.

On Monday Kay Gandy of Tahoka reported a purse had been stolen at a grocery store. The purse was found in an alley, with a wallet containing mostly personal papers and cards missing.

Three vehicle accidents were investigated by city police. On Dec. 19 at S. 1st and Ave. K, a collision involved a 1977 GMC pickup driven by Riley Albert Taylor of Tahoka and a 1976 Ford pickup driven by David Garcia of Tahoka.

On Dec. 23 at Main and N. 2nd a 1976 Chevrolet driven by Jannis Chandler of Tahoka and a 1981 Buick driven by Alan Taylor of O'Donnell collided.

A 1974 Chevrolet driven by Ruben Isidro Fuentes of Tahoka struck a parked 1979 Chevrolet owned by Leonard Rios of Amarillo in the 1800-block of S. 1st St. Christmas Day.

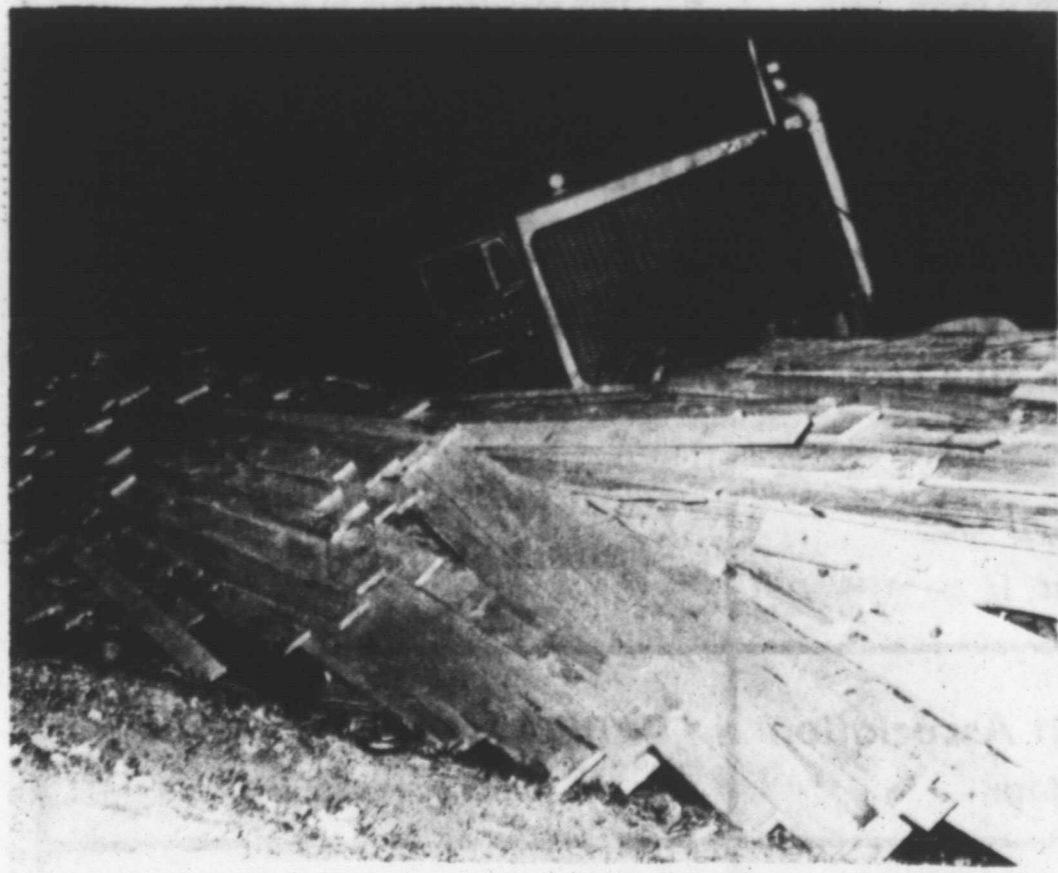

FATAL WRECK ON U.S. 380—A Brownfield man was killed as his 1981 Pontiac in the picture at right and a trailer-tractor rig loaded with lumber crashed headon just after midnight Sunday on U.S. 380 about seven miles west of Tahoka. Robert Clyde Sartain, 54, driver of the Pontiac, was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Ed Hamilton. Sartain's 10-year-old grandson, David Sartain, was a passenger in the car, but was not seriously injured. He was treated and released at Lynn County Hospital, as were three persons in the truck. Driver of the truck was Billy Joe Barton, 37, of Lakeside, Ariz., accompanied by his wife, Patricia, and 10-year-old son Darren. The truck is shown above after it went into the ditch and lost the load of lumber. An investigating officer of the Department of Public Safety said Sartain's car was on the wrong side of the highway, and that the Brownfield man, an employee of Halliburton, apparently fell asleep while driving back to Brownfield from Snyder. Under the Soil and Water Resource Conservation Act of 1977 (RCA) the Secretary of Agriculture was required to determine the key problems involving soil and water resources. Since that time personnel of the Soil Conservation Service have been assisting with the gathering of resource information and

as a result the key problems have now been identified. Under the 1977 RCA the Secretary of Agriculture was required to show Congress how he proposed to solve the key resource problems. The Secretary of Agriculture has drafted his proposals (referred to as the "Preferred Program") and this information has been sent to each county for review and comment by local people before it is sent to Congress to become law.

The Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Directors, all farmers in Lynn County, have determined that the "Preferred program" proposed by the Secretary of Agriculture is bureaucratic, political, and regulatory and should be opposed by all land owners in Lynn County.

They need your help. Please go by your local SCS or ASCS offices and fill out a questionnaire. Do this before Jan. 15, 1982.

Plains Area Cotton Harvest Slows Down

Harvesting of the 1981 High Plains Cotton crop slowed when harvesting passes the 90 percent mark and the final stages started. Many modules have been built in cleared fields waiting to be ginned, according to Mack Bennett, Area Director for USDA's Marketing Services Office at Lubbock.

Estimates indicate that about 65 percent of the crop has been ginned and almost 60 percent has been received by the Lubbock office, Bennett said.

Cotton prices were mostly steady with a firming trend noted for some qualities. Growers sold mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and 52, staples 31 and 32, mike 35-49 at about 43.00 cents per pound, unchanged from one week earlier.

Lubbock's Marketing Services Office classed 148,000 samples during the week ended Dec. 23 for a season's total of 1,059,000. This compares with 1,082,000 classed by the same date last year.

About 31 percent was grade 42, 44 percent was grade 52 and nine percent was grade 53. About 65 percent was reduced one grade because of bark.

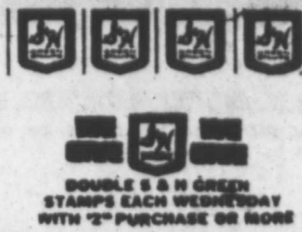
