### Response Plan Can Give Help To Older Persons

Lutheran Social Services of Texas has begun a program called Emergency Response Service (ERS) which can be of assistance to older adults, their families and friends in enabling peple to remain in their homes for as long as possible, even if they have some health problems.

A telephone hookup to a response center in Lubbock is available for persons in Lynn County, officials of the social service center said this

Explaining the need for the service, a representative said:

"Most elderly people wish to remain in their own homes or neighborhoods for as long as possible. Yet, some of them have serious illnesses or disabilities that may suddenly become critical. Some persons fall and are unable to get up or to call for assistance."

"Illness, disability and the inability to summon help are of deep concern to the elderly, their friends, and relatives. Consequently, some persons have been institutionalized or forced to live with persons outside their familiar environment."

Lutheran Social Service of Texas uses a device developed by Lifeline Systems, Inc. The subscriber is linked to Contact Tele-Ministries in Lubbock through regular telephone lines. By pushing the button on themain unit or the hand-held unit, the person sends a signal to the Response Center at Contact: Staff at the center then call the individual to see if they can be of assistance. If the phone is not answered, designated friends or relataives are called on to investigate.

A 24-hour timer, if not reset daily, sends a signal in the event a person is unconscious or unable to push the button to call for help.

The hand-held unit works within 200 feet of the main unit that is plugged into the telephone. Therefore, people are able to go about their daily activities and still have the security of emergency assistance without having to get to the phone.

People use their units in the event of heart attacks, strokes, falls, emotional stress, robbery, assault. For further information, interested persons may contact Lutheran Service, 2412 13th St., Lubbock, 806-763-7051.

# **County Runoff Vote Saturday**

Lynn County voters will return to the polls this Saturday in a Democratic Primary runoff election to settle who will be Lynn County treasurer, commissioner of Precinct 4, and Justice of the Peace in J.P. Precinct 4, which is the same as county commissioners Precinct 3.

Seeking the county treasurer's post are two candidates who survived a five-woman race in the first primary. At that time, Cynthia (Cindy) Bryan led the balloting with 700 votes, and Margie Jester had 538 to also make the runoff. The other three can-

Traditionally fewer voters turn out for runoff elections, and even in the first primary only just over half the registered voters in the county (4,229) went to the polls. The total was 2,243.

Persons who did not vote in the first primary still may vote in the runoff if they are properly registered. Anyone with questions as to where they should vote should contact the Lynn County clerk's of-

In Precinct 4, incumbent commissioner E.R. Blakney trailed challenger Robert Edwards in the first vote by 258-225, with a third candidate getting 146 votes.

In the justice of the peace race at O'Donnell, Ben Morrison had 233 votes and David Smith 157, with a third candidate getting 115, so Smith and Morrison are in that runoff.

Several state races also are on the runoff ballot. Some interest has been generated in the attorney general nomination runoff race between "Well, it can't hurt your looks John Hannah and Jim Mattox.



tising campaign. Although the synthetics industry outspends cotton 11 to 1 for advertising (\$70 million for synthetics compared to \$5 million for cotton), Grant feels that cotton has one of the most aggressive advertising programs in the fiber industry.

J.K. 'Farmer' Jones, Vice President of Agricultural Research and Producer Liaison, outlined to the growers research into hybrid cotton, cleaner cotton and cottonseed research. He discussed Proteina bread, candy and peanut' butter, all de-

veloped from cottonseed. Advancements with the mobile cotton trailer dumper were also outlined by Jones.

"The trailer dumper was developed by Cotton Incorporated as a time-andmoney saver for the cotton farmer who can't afford his own module builder,' said Jones, "The unit, which is about the size of a small truck, can dump in a small truck, can dump into a module builder, gin feeder or another trailer.'

The mobile trailer dumper is an advance for the smaller producer and, as Jones said, "an advance generated by producer dollars.



In campaigning throughout the county, I have often been asked: "What does a Justice of the Peace do?" I offer the following explanation in an effort to clarify any questions those of you who intend to vote in the June 5th runoff election might have as to the nature and duties of the office.

A Justice of the Peace Court should be the "People's Court". It has been established by statue as the first rung of the judicial and appellate ladder in our Texas legal system.

Though not a court of record, a concise docket is required to be kept, showing specific annotation and explanation of all proceedings held. At times it must follow the rules of formal pleading and procedure. We all realize that Peace Justices hear traffic cases, perform marriages, and declare people legally dead.

They must also rule on these deaths as to cause and circumstance; making decisions as to inquiries, the necessity of autopsies, etc. They are responsible for setting bonds in criminal cases and civil appeals from their court. Being on call day or night, the Justice is usually the accused's first contact with the judicial branch of government upon ar-

rest. They must hear testimony in lawsuits and preside over jury trials if the parties elect to take their cause to their peers for a solution. Though one may choose to have counsel represent them, the Justice Court may be the only reasonable recourse for those people without sufficient means to employ an attorney to plead their grievance. In this less

The Justice has authority to enforce his judgements and grant relief by attachment, fine, or imprisonment. A Justice of the Peace Court has both civil and criminal jurisdiction over certain lawsuits, forceable entry and detainer (eviction) cases, small claims and consumer complaints, and the issuance of search warrants. He holds examining trials prior to indictment, sets bonds in felony cases, tries misdemeanor criminal cases, holds inquests on deaths, and performs celebrations of marriage, in addition to numerous other responsibilities.

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# May One Of Most Turbulent **Months For Lynn County**

May, 1982, must go down on record as one of the most turbulent in Lynn County's agricultural history, starting with the very first day of the month and ending with the last.

Tahoka officially recorded 6.02 inches for the month, 3.12 on one day (May 27), but several areas of the county received much more. Rains prevented normal planting dates for many. Hail, hard rain, then drifing sand wiped out or damaged some cotton. Rain was recorded in Tahoka on 12 days of May.

#### **Amounts Vary**

Some areas, particularly the north west section and the southwest sections received much more than Tahoka, while other areas such as from old Midway to Draw community received barely enough to plant cotton. In fact, some farms over the county had not been planted as June arrived; some others must be replanted.

Playa lakes are full, and in many places there are lakes of water in fields where lakes of water have seldom been seen before.

The heavy rain and hail of last Thursday afternoon and night brought the most damage--flooding fields, hailing out cotton, breaking terraces, filling up low places in fields. Tahoka received 2.82 inches from 2:45 p.m. to 6:20 p.m. and another .20 that night. New Home area farmers reported up to five or six inches. Additionally, Tahoka received no rain May 13 through May 21, while many other areas were

**Brighter Note** 

However, on the plus side, much cotton is being saved by farmers running scratchers over fields where cotton had just come up to prevent sifting sand from killing the plants. There will be a lot of June cotton and prospects are still good, weather permitting, for at least a fair crop.

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# Rate On Gas

Irrigation served by the West Texas System of Energas Company are being notified that a 10 percent rate increase will be put into effect July 1, company officials said this week.

Letters explaining the rate change have been mailed to all affected customers. The area involved extends from the central Panhandle to south of Odessa.

The new irrigation rate is identical to the West Texas System general service rate through the first 50,000 cubic feet of monthly gas usage. Additional volumes will be at rates that are lower in price than the general service rate.

#### Tech Med School To **Honor Group**

Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center School of Medicine will honor West Texas citizens in recognition of their support in its development Friday with an appreciation banquet and ceremonies awarding Distinguished Associate certificates.

The banquet will launch activities for a week-long celebration of the medical school's first decade in physician education and will culminate with graduation June 6.

The first students were admitted to the medical school in Lubbock in 1972. Over the next 10 years, campuses were developed in Amarillo and El Paso and teaching programs begun.

"Starting a medical school on one campus is no easy matter," said J. Ted Hartman, M.D., interim dean of the School of Medicine. "Development of a school on three campuses simultaneously is a real challenge.

"With the encouragement, support and assistance of concerned citizens throughout the state, but particularly in West Texas, we have grown from a school in a converted dormitory to a multi-campus institution serving the region," he said. "It is fitting that we give special thanks and recognition to the individuals who provided invaluable help during this period of growth as we mark a decade of physician education."

During its first decade, the medical school has expanded from accepting 40 students per year to admission of classes of 100 students. The school has graduated 278 physicians, 105 of whom have completed specialty training programs and have entermedical students, the school has 210 resident physicians in 22 training programs in 11 medical specialties on its three

### - A Visit With Your County Agent

Replanting Hail Damaged A large storm accompanied by heavy washing rains and hail recently hit portions of Lynn County

causing damage to cotton. Many farmers in these hard-hit areas are now faced with the unpleasant task of replanting their crop, realizing that planting in June usually means less than average yields even with normal growing conditions for the remainder of the growing season. Their most important decision now is which cotton varities to use and what cultural practices might be applied that will hasten the maturity of the

Producers should consider varieties that fall into the very early or early range. Note list of varieties.

As for planting rates in late planted cotton, remember that germination and emergence will be enhanced by warm, moist soil conditions. Generally, seedling rates of 15 to 18 lbs. of good quality seed per acre--or 5 to 6 seed per foot of drill--are more than adequate for optimum stands.

Residues preemergence herbicides can be a problem in replanting especially in sandier soils, the agent cautioned. Caparol and Lasso can be leached downward by rainfall and can cause seedling injury in replanted cotton. Normally, this problem can be avoided by replanting in the furrows (not in the original bed). The preplant incorporated herbicides are not a problem in replanting to cotton.

Later decisions concerned practice. In addition to ing irrigation must also be considered after late cotton is up and growing. Because the yield potential for late planted cotton is reduced, fields having adequate moisture at replanting may not require additional summer irrigation. In fact, yields of late cotton can be reduced by too much water. Keep in mind that when yield potential is down the need for water and fertilizer is reduced, the Extension

agent said. Growers in the fringe areas of these storms also face a tough decision: should they try to save the

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


