# **FahokaWoman Beaten, Raped**

A Tahoka woman was savagely beaten and raped and forced to suffer other indignities early Monday morning by a man who apparently had been waiting for her to return home Sunday night. It was the second rape reported in Lynn County in three weeks and Crime Line officials have posted maximum \$500 rewards for information in either case.

The victim of this week's attack, in her early 40s, told officers that she returned to her home in the city about midnight Sunday, unlocking the door and going inside. When she returned to lock the front door, she was seized by a muscular man wearing no shirt, who forced her back inside the house. Officers believe he had been hiding in the yard when she returned to her home.

#### **Attacker Described**

The intruder, described as a Mexican-American between 30 and 40 years old who speaks good English, told her he had a gun, but she saw no weapon. He forced her into a bedroom and ordered her to remove her clothing.

During the ordeal which lasted about an hour, the woman was raped twice and subjected to other acts. He then tied her hands and feet, beat her savagely and left her tied in a bathtub.

A further description of the suspect given to officers indicated he had short, well-groomed hair, with a neatly trimmed short beard, that his complexion is darker than usual, he is muscular with medium build, 5-8 to 5-10, with rounded facial features.

On July 19, a 27-year-old farm wife was raped by a man who came to her home on a pretense of asking directions, then returned, threatening the woman with a hammer. This rapist's description is that of a white male, late 20s or early 30s, slender build, about 5-8, with dark brown hair short and styled. He has dark complexion, and possibly drives a small American-made or foreign two-door car, bronze color.

Anyone with information in either case is urged to call Crime Line, 998-5145. The caller need not give a name, but will be assigned a number and arrangements made to pay the reward later through a third person if the information leads to solving the crime.

## **Council Eyes Cemetery Needs**


Tahoka City Council Monday night discussed the need for more land for the cemetery and possible solutions to the problem.
