Revenue Sharing Budget Higher

On Monday, Aug. 23, the Lynn County Commissioners Court held a meeting to discuss the Revenue Sharing Budget for next year and also voted to buy a historical marker for the Lynn County Courthouse.

The Revenue Sharing Budget is to be adopted for the period Oct. 1, 1982 through Sept. 30, 1983. The total allotment for the new budget amounts to \$114,0083, approximately \$10,000 more than the previous year. A new public assistance plan for Lynn County was discussed, however, a final decision was not reached.

Recently a letter from the Texas Historical Commission nominated the Lynn County Courthouse for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places. It was voted to order an aluminum National Register plaque to be displayed on the building.

It was voted to buy a new ambulance for \$25,000 for Lynn County through Summers Ambulances of Duncanville. Budgeted for the next year is \$2,000 to buy new exhaust fans for the Lynn County showbarn; buy two legal size filing cabinets with two drawers each for the District Clerk's office; and declare the Tahoka Rodeo Assn. as a non-profit organization for income tax purposes.

Garry Mauro Brings Campaign To Tahoka

Garry Mauro, Democratic nominee for Texas Land Commissioner, campaigned in Tahoka and Texas this week stating "the public lands of Texas are of extreme importance to the education of the school children and the university students in this state. Based on the fact these lands generated almost \$800 million in revenues last year, the Land Commissioner needs to have the ability and experience to efficiently manage the General Land Office."

Mauro, 34; an attorney and businessman in Austin, met with County Democratic Chairman Tommy Lawson and others here Tuesday afternoon. He formerly served as the Deputy Comptroller under Bob Bullock, overseeing a staff of over 1,500 employees and a budget of \$25 million. He was campaign manager and a special assistant to former Congressman and Ambassador Bob Krueger. "Texas Business" magazine named him one of the "25 Rising Stars of Texas." He is a

graduate of Texas A&M and received his law degree from the University of Texas.

"Texas is blessed with 22.5 million acres of public land which generate money for our public schools and universities. In order to increase revenues for education and preserve this unique heritage, the Land Commissioner must have the necessary management and business skills to effectively administrate this office," Mauro said. "I plan to bring the latest management and business techniques to this office."

Mauro also spoke in support of the Veterans Land Program which is under the administration of the Land Commissioner. "Texas veterans should be allowed to purchase homes under this program using the money as a down payment."



Seat Belts Save Lives

"I have never seen a dead person taken from a wrecked car who was wearing a seat belt.' This was a statement made in a talk at Rotary last Thursday by Trooper Bert Sinclair of the Texas Highway Patrol.

"I don't like seat belts, either, but they do save lives," he declared.

In a brief talk preceding the showing of a shocking traffic safety film, "Room to Live', Sinclair said 98.5 per cent of the people killed in Texas car wrecks were not wearing their seat belts. Most people killed in violent wrecks are thrown from the vehicles in which they were riding--50,000 a year in the U.S.

The graphic pictures illustrataed the safe area in a car wreck is the passenger compartment, and few people die from being thrown into the windshield or dash or from the car when wearing the seat belts provided in modern cars.

Senate Passes Immigration Bill: The Senate has approved an immigration bill by a 81-18 vote. Strongly supported by the Administration and organzied labor, it provides amnesty for illegal aliens who have lived in the U.S. continuously since 1977 and temporary residence status for those residing here since 1980. It also calls for civil and criminal penalites for employers who knowingly hire illegal aliens, development within the next three years of a counterfeitproof national identity card, and a revised program for temporary foreign workers. The bill now goes to the House where the Judiciary Committee is working on similar legislation. SBA Disaster Loans




