



HARVEST FESTIVAL SET FOR SATURDAY



Lynn County residents are expected to turn out in good numbers for the seventh annual Harvest Festival Saturday, an annual event which offers a wide range of entertainment, games, contests and other activities all day long on the Tahoka square.

There will be booths, drawings for merchant-donated prizes every hour, with Tom Marrier as master of ceremonies for the drawings, a county fair, the featured Harvest Queen contest, drawing for a Dallas

Cowboys weekend, and two bands. Chuck Braden will be emcee for the Queens Contest at 5 p.m.

A more detailed schedule of times and events is offered in an advertisement inside this issue of the News.

Johnson Show

The Larry Johnson Show, which regularly has a show at the Red Raider Club in Lubbock, will perform during the day, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Johnson is lead vocalist and plays rhythm guitar. Also included are Barbara Raines, vocalist and bass guitar; Royce Glen, vocalist and drums; Tom Head, fiddle; and Bruce Boggs, steel guitar.

Tahoka Rotary Club sponsors the

street dance in the evening, from 8 p.m. to midnight, and pays for the band; therefore the Rotary Club sausage booth is the only booth open in the evening. The Rotary booth and many others will be open all day on the square, however.

Among scheduled activities are a fair at the old Tahoka Dept. Store building on the west side of the square, Miss Piggy contest, frog jumping, turtle race and slipper kicking contests, giant armadillo races throughout the day until someone is champion (the winner gets a trip to Las Vegas), a "kiss a pig" event, and quilt auction.

The giant armadillo race is a new

event featuring large mechanical armadillos with riders working the mechanism to see who can make the distance the fastest. Merchants and organizations have paid \$50 sponsor fees and provide riders to represent them in the races. Winners of various heats throughout the day will compete in the championship race about 4 p.m. and the final winner will earn a round trip ticket to Las Vegas on Southwest Airlines. Second place will be a round trip ticket to Dallas.

Festival visitors are invited to put money in containers carrying several names of Tahoka citizens who some folks might like to see kiss a live pig. The person whose name is on the

container with the most money in it around 3:15 p.m. will have to kiss the live pig in front of everybody. The money will go the child welfare board.

Street Dance

The street dance on the east side of the square will feature the Lone Star Dance Band. They include Sam Mensch, lead vocalist and rhythm guitar; Sonny Morris, steel guitar; Lance Green, drums; Danny Petree, guitar and vocals; and Jay Hat-taway, bass.

Judges for the Queens Contest will be representatives of the Robert Spence modeling school in Lubbock. Contestants and sponsors are:

The grand prize drawing, with tickets sold by the queen candidates, is a weekend trip for two to the game between the Dallas Cowboys and the St. Louis Cardinals; however, the strike of professional football players announced Monday may affect the date of that game. A representative of the Harvest Festival said Tuesday that the prize would still be for the same game, but that the committee has been advised that the game may be played on a later date than originally scheduled.

This year's festival is held in conjunction with homecomings planned Friday night at Tahoka High School and at New Home High School. Tahoka's homecoming parade Friday afternoon likely will include the Harvest Festival theme on some floats.

First Cotton Bale Winner Repeats

For the second year in a row, Joe Tijerina of Tahoka brought in the first bale of cotton in Lynn County, pulling it Sept. 15 and bringing it to Grassland Co-Op Gin, where ginning was finished at 10:45 a.m. Friday, Sept. 17.

The gin processed the bale free and also paid Tijerina a 20-cent per pound bonus. Gin manager Douglas Shepherd said the bale weighed 460 pounds and made 800 pounds of seed.

It was hand-gathered off six acres on the M. R. Jones farmland a mile east and one mile south of Grassland. Tijerina said the land is leased to Joe Garcia and Tijerina helps farm it. The Stripper 31 cotton was planted on dryland on May 20, Tijerina said.

For bringing in the first bale, Tijerina received a \$100 check from the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce, which traditionally pays the bonus for the first bale brought in to a gin in Lynn County.

The bale was put on display in front of First National Bank of Tahoka.

WOODWORK

THERE are lots of people out of work, we're told, and times are getting hard, so I guess a lot of politicians are fearful they may have to go job-hunting after the November elections.

I say this because I can't recall when people seeking offices in the state have been so busy running around everywhere, talking about each other and mailing out tons of stuff to media and to voters. In just one day's mail this week we received three letters from Clements' campaign office, four from Bentsen, and also heard from Jim Collins, Jim Maddox, Bill Meier and a couple of guys I never heard of who are running for offices I also barely recognize. During the previous week I heard by phone or otherwise from the supporters of Mark White, John Montford, Jim Reese, George Strake and one or two I have already forgot.

A lot of the people running for statewide offices are sending out their wives and children, mothers, brothers, sisters and dogs to try to influence people to vote.

Despite all this, probably half

the people who are eligible to vote will either forget or just not bother to go to the polls. It's kind of sad.

In addition to people whose names will be on the ballot in November, there are some amendments to be voted on. A man called me the other day in regard to Proposition 3, which would do away with property taxes on all farm equipment in Texas. At first look, it sounds like a great deal for farmers, but some farm folks are having second thoughts, realizing that the action would hurt school districts and county governments, and that someone else will have to make up those losses in tax revenue; in fact, the farmers themselves who own land and homes and live in the taxing areas may find they have just shifted their own tax burden over to something else. Anyway, it's worth thinking about.

I'd like to see a bill eliminating all state and local taxes for persons whose last name starts with W, but neither Reese or Montford has shown much enthusiasm for introducing such a bill if elected. I think I'll call Mark White.

Grand Jury Indicts 11

Felony indictments were returned against 11 persons this week by a 106th District Court Grand Jury, including two men who were involved in an incident Sept. 11 in which a highway patrolman was threatened with a gun.

Indicted for aggravated assault on a peace officer and escape was Eugene Sullivan White, and his companion in the incident, Lester Fred Lang, was indicted for escape.

Jimmy Ray Smith of Idalou, accused of attempted murder in the wounding of Sharon Elder of Tahoka July 18.

Welton Thomas Flowers of Tahoka and Kenneth Eugene Flowers of Hobbs, N.M., both indicted in the burglary of Chancy Exxon Station June 26.

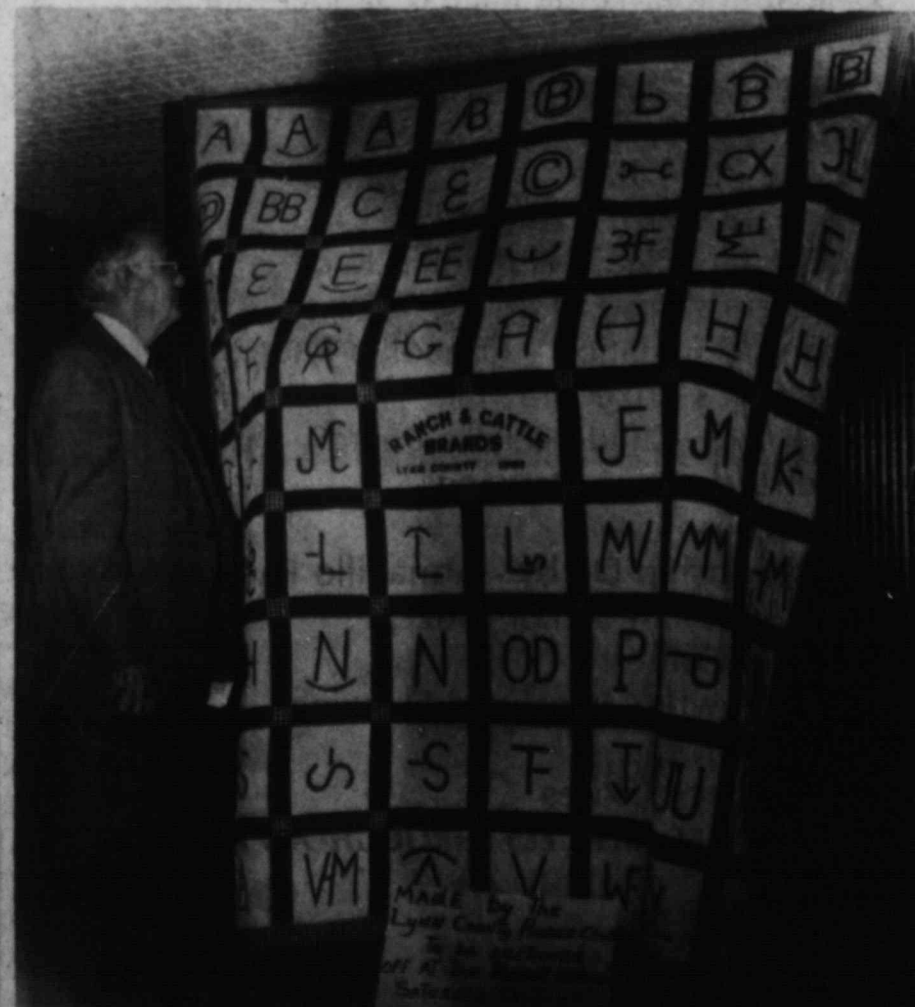
Freddie R. Allen of Lubbock, charged with escape from a Lynn County deputy June 11.

William Stokes Thorp of San Angelo, felon driving while intoxicated, on June 15.

Dogs Still Looking For First Score

The Tahoka Bulldogs, still looking to score their first points of the 1982 season, will play host to the Plains Cowboys Friday night before a Homecoming crowd which hopefully will inspire the Dogs to better things.

The Bulldogs went down 24-0 to visiting Coahoma last Friday, yielding points in the last half after a scoreless first half.

In the first period, Coahoma drove to the Tahoka 20, but the defense, led by a good

tackle by Jesse Vega, stopped that drive.

In the second quarter, Tahoka drove to the Coahoma 20, mostly on running by Steve Pierce, and then Leonard Flores broke into the end zone for an apparent touchdown that was called back on a penalty. A pass interception by Tood Engel of Coahoma killed that chance.

With 20 seconds left, Pierce caught a pass of 31 yards from QB Tony Garcia that carried to the Coahoma 15. Flores tried a field goal that was

blocked on the last play of the half.

In the third, Coahoma went ahead 3-0 on a short field goal by James Gilbert. Featuring a run of 26 yards by Flores, the Dogs then drove all the way to the Coahoma 14, the closest they have been to anybody's goal line this season. But the drive stalled here and ended with another pass interception.

Coahoma's Richard Seals ran 75 yards for a touchdown in the third, with Engel passing to John Wilson for 2 points. In the fourth, Charlie Martinez ran 2 yards for a TD, and Kelley Martin ran 30 yards for another Coahoma score.

Garcia then hit Eric Knight on a nice 16-yard play, but that was all Tahoka could manage before the game ended.

Plains is a lower classification than Tahoka, but will bring a good, fast small team to town. The Cowboys have won two games and lost one. In the opener they beat Farwell 27-21, and

Farwell last week bombed Sudan 62-0. Plains then lost to Dimmitt 21-0 and last Friday beat Ropes 21-0. Coach A.D. Shaver said the Cowboys also have a good passing attack.

Linebacker John Curry turned in a good time for Tahoka on defense last Friday. On offense, Pierce carried the ball 22 times for 77 yards and Flores gained 51 yards on 9 carries. The Dogs gave up the ball four times on interceptions, but did not lose a fumble.

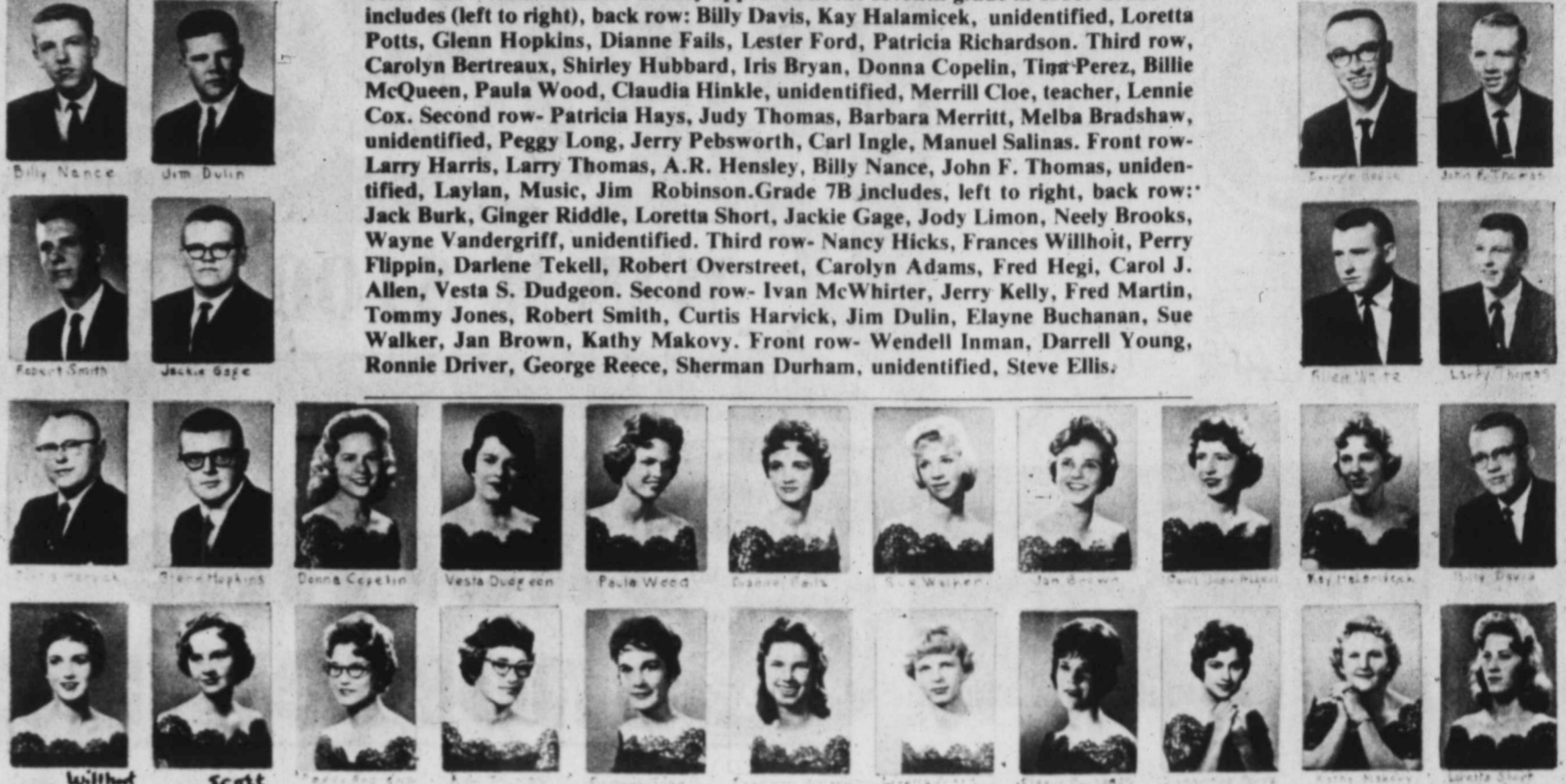
