## C-C Leaders Discuss Plans

The Chamber of Commerce Directors met Tuesday, Nov. 2, at the Pastry Place to discuss business for the month of November.

President Melvin Burks directed discussion on the placing of two new Chamber of Commerce signs on the east and west side of Tahoka.

Plans in the making include a Moonlight Madness Sale, possibly the first Friday of December, to encourage residents to shop for Christmas in Tahoka, and the next quarterly meeting in January for all Chamber members.

The directors voted to contribute \$100 to Thomas Young and Todd Lockaby for their participation in February in the Young Americans in Washington program.

Louise Fisher, secretary for the Chamber has resigned effective Nov. 10. Several applicants are being considered for replacement.

## Door-To-Door Sales Ordinance Approved

An ordinance regulating who can sell products door-to-door in Tahoka was approved by Tahoka City Council Monday night. The ordinance, scheduled to go into the effect after a new draft is drawn and certain legal requirements are met, should be in effect before Jan. 1.

The ordinance will require

registration, bonding and licensing of persons who sell things such as cleaning solutions, books and magazines, and other tangible items. It also will cover some types of solicitation for funds, but religious organizations and civic and other recognized charitable or local groups are excluded.

Several merchants and individuals have complained recently of pushy salespersons intruding on homes and businesses and there also have been complaints of products being misrepresented or not being delivered. Councilmen said they hope the new ordinance will provide more protection for the citizens from both the annoyance types and the outright frauds, while still leaving the legitimate and conscientious sales representatives room to operate.

All councilmen were present to review the draft of the proposed ordinance and it was voted unanimously.

Stop signs were approved for several intersections in Tahoka, mostly in the south part of town where new recent paving projects made changes practical.

Councilmen Tom Cooper and Jim Solomon were named to head a committee to study the need for a new comprehensive zoning ordinance in Tahoka. The two were to name their own committee.

O.D. Hearn, district manager of General Telephone Co., presented a program to the council showing how telephone service in Tahoka has improved since a meeting in May at which time he had detailed planned improvements in the system.

## More Burglaries Head List Of New Crimes

Five burglaries of barns and farm shops in Lynn County were reported during the last week, with four of them occurring last Friday night, and with losses expected to total more than \$5,000.

Cases of vandalism, theft and another rape in the county were also being investigated by busy law enforcement officers.

Four of the barn burglaries occurred Friday night. They were reported by:

Elmer Owens of Tahoka, a building about five miles southeast of Tahoka. Items stolen included a Sears air compressor, tools, cutting torch and hose, cases of oil and Prestone and a Hitachi radio. Value was estimated at \$2,500 or more.

Edgar M. Hammonds Jr., Rt. 5, a building seven miles southeast of Tahoka. Items stolen included a chain saw, tools, total value \$805.

Matt Farmer, 1.5 miles northeast of O'Donnell. Missing are a welder, tools and a case of oil.

Howard and Larry Moore, a building three miles northeast of Wells community; missing items included a cutting torch assembly, and there was damage to six tractor tires.

Orville Maeker, a farm shop six miles northwest of Wilson. Among stolen articles were a tool chest and tools.

Crime Line is offering a \$300 reward for information leading to clearing up any of the above burglaries. Anyone with information is asked to call Crime Line, 998-5145 day or night. The caller should not identify himself or herself, but will be told how to expect payment if the information solves the case.

Four young persons who took a commode from the country club and placed it on a downtown street agreed to pay restitution for damages at the country club as a result of the Halloween prank and were released in custody of their parents.

On Friday night in the 2200-block of Main St., a 1977 Toyota driven by Deborah Lynn Harvick and a 1973 Oldsmobile driven by John F. Kennedy Scott, both of Tahoka, collided.

Phillip Munoz of Wilson reported the windshield in his 1974 pickup broken out Sunday.

Leonard Hurst reported a house set afire two miles north of Wilson on FM 400 on Wednesday.

Charles Ashbrook of Tahoka reported a building six miles east of the city burglarized last Wednesday, with a commode and a propane heater stolen.

A resident of the east part of the county called the sheriff's office Wednesday morning to report that a woman who lived nearby came to her house and said she had been raped. Officers were investigating the report and had taken the victim to a Lubbock hospital Wednesday. No other details of the incident were immediately available.

In jail during the last week were one person each for revocation of probation, public intoxication and

destroying public property, possession of alcohol for purposes of sale in a dry area, and transporting alcohol in a dry area.

## Lynn County Goes Heavy For Demos

Lynn County voters Tuesday voted heavily for Democratic candidates in state races, going along with the rest of Texas in giving the Democrats easy victories in most contests.

With the Democratic winners listed first, the county vote totals were as follows in contested races:

U.S. Senator--Bentsen 1378, Collins 632.

U.S. Rep.--Stenholm 1564, Cooley 10.

Governor--Mark White 1147, Bill Clements 900.

Lt. Gov.--Hobby 1308, Strake 683.

Atty. Gen.--Maddox 1420, Meier 537.

Comptroller--Bullock 1311, Richards 652.

Treasurer--Richards 1351, Clark 607.

Land Commissioner--Mauro 1407, Glascock 446.

Ag. Commissioner--Hightower 1406, Thornberry 560.

RR Commissioner--Nugent 1500, Henderson 485.

Lubbock attorney John Montford, who defeated Jim Reese for the 28th Dist. State Senate seat now held by E.L. Short of Tahoka, carried Lynn County by 1432 to 566.

In the race for State Rep. of the 78th District, which includes Lynn County, Steve Carriker of Roby, a Democrat, won, and in Lynn he also won, by 1509 to only 351 for C.A. Jenkins.

Lynn County voted for all the proposed amendments except No. 6. The county's vote for Amendment 3, which would exempt all farm personal property from taxes, passed in Lynn County by 952 to 771. This was closer than the statewide vote, which gave the proposition a 2-1 margin.

The total turnout of 2083 votes in Lynn County was considered "pretty good" by county election officials. This would be about half of Lynn's registered voters and would be almost equal to the 2243 votes cast in the first Democratic primary in the county, when many contested local races were on the ballot.

## Tahoka Man Named To Cotton Committee

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block has named Wayne Huffaker as an alternate grower representative to

a special advisory committee on instrument standards for cotton.

Vern F. Highley, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service in Washington, D.C., said the first meeting of the committee will be held Nov. 4 in Washington. He said the committee will review the history of cotton standards, discuss methods of establishing instrument standards, compare test results obtained from various fiber test instruments, and develop a list of issues and plans for future actions.

Huffaker was born in Austin, but has lived most of his life in Lynn County. He is president of the board of directors for Farmers Cooperative Assn. No. 1. He also is a director of both the Plains Cooperative Assn. and the Plains Cotton Growers.

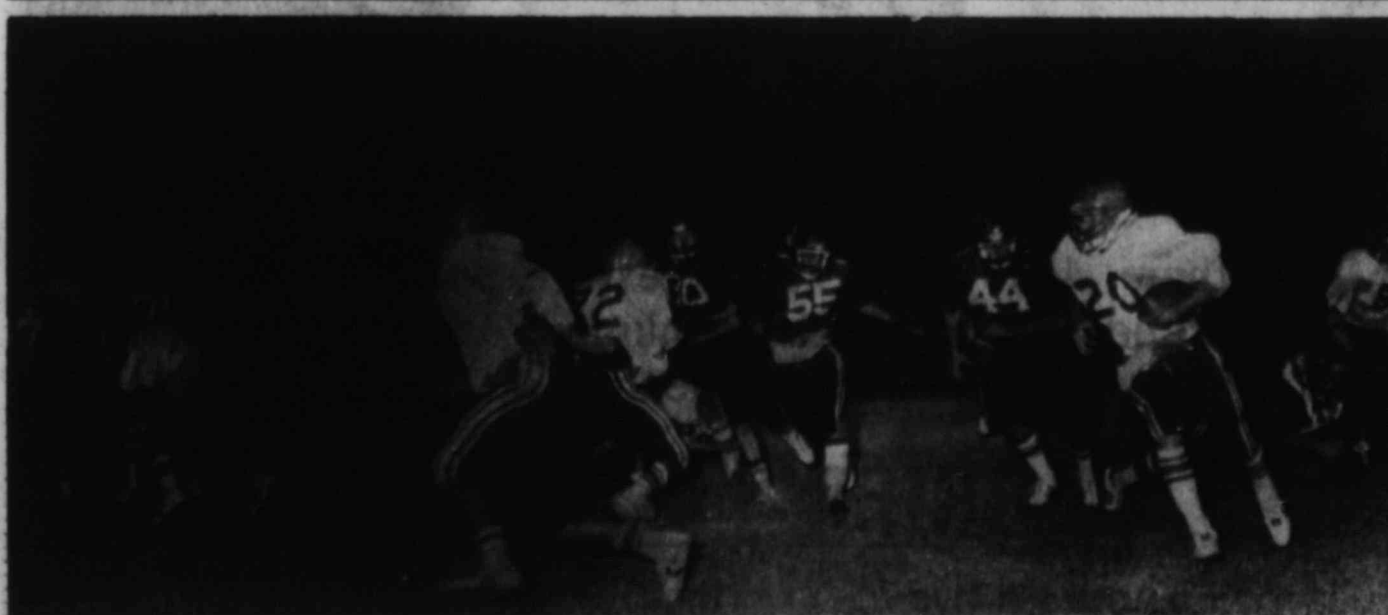
Huffaker served with the U.S. Navy and has been active in many civic affairs in Tahoka where he has resided since 1958. He attended Texas Tech University.

**Mustangs Slam New Home Leopards 33-0**

The Wilson Mustangs ran their record to 7-2 for the year and 4-2 in district last Friday night by wiping out New Home 33-0 before a homecoming crowd.

The Mustangs this week will wind up the regular season at Meadow, with only a slight mathematical chance to get into the playoffs, although first and second place teams this year will go into the playoffs. If Wilson beats Meadow and Smyer beats Ropesville, then Ropes and Wilson would be tied for second place in district. Wilson already has the best record in five years overall.

Kendall Wilke gained 204 yards rushing on 24 carries and scored two touchdowns Friday. Quarterback Keith Spears scored three TDs and gained 87 yards on 13 efforts. He also completed 8 of 19 passes (with one interception) for 91 yards.

Tight end Mark Wuensche caught two passes for 39 yards. Bryan Bednarz caught 3 for 32 and Bradley Wright 3 for 20.

Spears now has scored 62 points and Wilke 44 for the year.

On defense, Wuensche had 18 tackles from his defensive end position. Lineman Tim Trotter had 15 and recovered a fumble; lineman Paul Schwertner had 11; strong cornerback Wright had 12 tackles, and middle linebacker Matt Burch had 10 tackles and a fumble recovery.

In the secondary, Spears, Adam Vaca and David Ehlers each intercepted New Home passes.

Wilson had 22 first downs to 8 for New Home, and 387 total yards offense to 103 for the Leopards.

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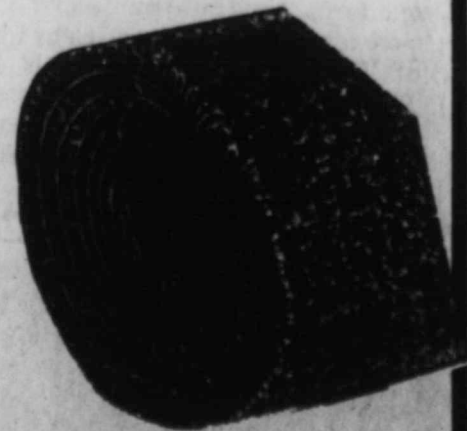
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# Dogs To Close Out Bad Year

Unless the Tahoka Bulldogs can pull off the upset of the year here Friday night, the Bulldogs will wind up with possibly the worst season ever for a Tahoka football team, and also the worst for Coach A.D. Shaver, whose teams have been consistent winners.

Winless after nine tries, Tahoka will host league-leading Frenship in the final game. Although Frenship has lost only one game this year (the opener against Littlefield), they were pressed hard by Roosevelt last week before winning 14-7. This should encourage the Bulldogs, since they played Roosevelt on even terms for more than half the game here a couple of weeks back. The Tigers also are now playing without star quarterback Brent Davis, who has been injured, but who played

when Frenship killed Cooper 69-0 a few weeks back.

Last Friday Tahoka bowed to that same Cooper team 21-13 in a tough battle of teams which had not won a game to that point. Seven lost fumbles destroyed the Bulldogs in the game.

Cooper scored first as QB Chris Mendez ran 5 yards in the first quarter. A kick was wide, leaving it 6-0. Tahoka went ahead late in the first quarter as QB Trey Teaff passed 14 yards to running back Steve Pierce in the end zone, and Leonard Flores kicked the point to make it 7-6.

Cooper kicked a short field goal to take a 9-7 lead at halftime. In the third period, Mendez hit Scott Smith on a 14-yard touchdown pass, again missed the

point and it was 15-7, Cooper.

Tahoka narrowed the gap as Pierce ran 2 yards for a touchdown, and a try for two points failed, leaving the Pirates ahead 15-13. Later in the game, Cooper ended the scoring with a 15-yard pass to Smith from Mendez.

Pierce gained 135 yards in 24 carries and also caught passes of 14 and 40 yards. Flores gained 36 yards in 7 carries. Gilbert Leal had 20 yards in four efforts.

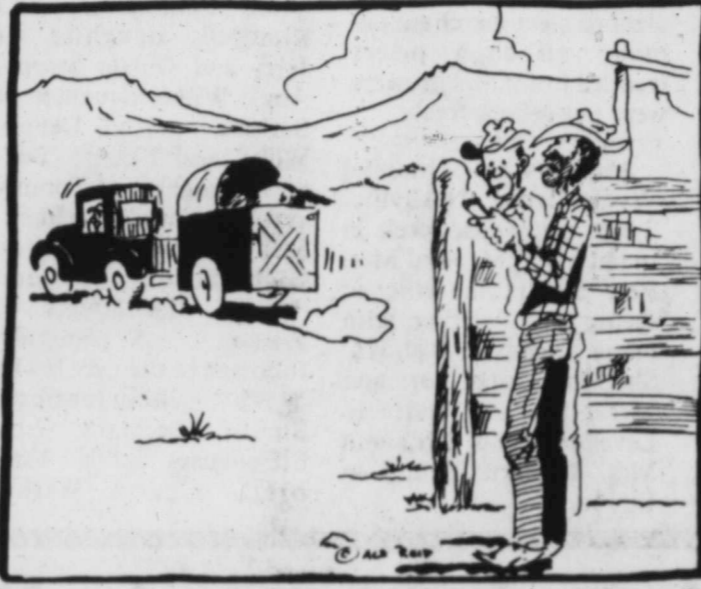

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**Cotton Loan  
Equities Continue  
Trading \$5 to \$15**

High Plains 1981-crop CCC loan equities sold by growers continued trading in the \$5 to \$15 range, mostly \$10. Small new-crop lots of grades 42 and better, staples 30 - 32, base mike brought 200 over loan. Gins paid producers \$55 to \$63 per ton for cottonseed delivered to oil mills. Some gins paid

growers \$80 to \$90 for seed delivered to cattle feeders. Most harvesting to date has been from fields where harvest-aid-chemicals were applied earlier. Last week's freezing temperatures in northern and western High Plains Counties caused some natural defoliation. Harvesting in those areas is expected to begin in early November, according to Mack Bennett, area Director for USDAs Marketing

Services Office in Lubbock. The Lubbock office classed 10,000 samples during the week ended Oct. 28. This brought the season's total to 13,000 and compares with 4,700 classed by the same date last year. Predominant grades during the week were grade 41 at 11 percent, grade 32-26, grade 42 - 38 and grade 52 accounted for nine percent. About 10 percent was reduced one grade because of bark and eight percent for grass, Bennett said.

Predominant staples were staple 30 at 27 percent, staple 31 was 35 and staple 52 accounted for 17 percent for an average of 30.9 thirty-seconds of an inch.

Micronaire 35 - 49 amounted to 69 percent, staple 33-34 was 11, 30-32 was 14 and 27 - 29 accounted for six percent for an average of 37.

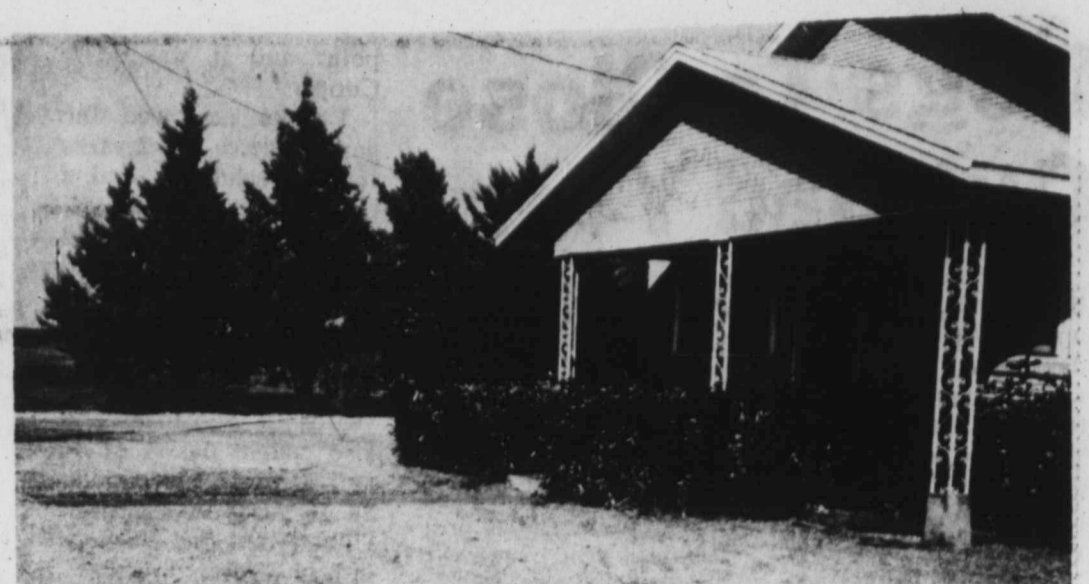

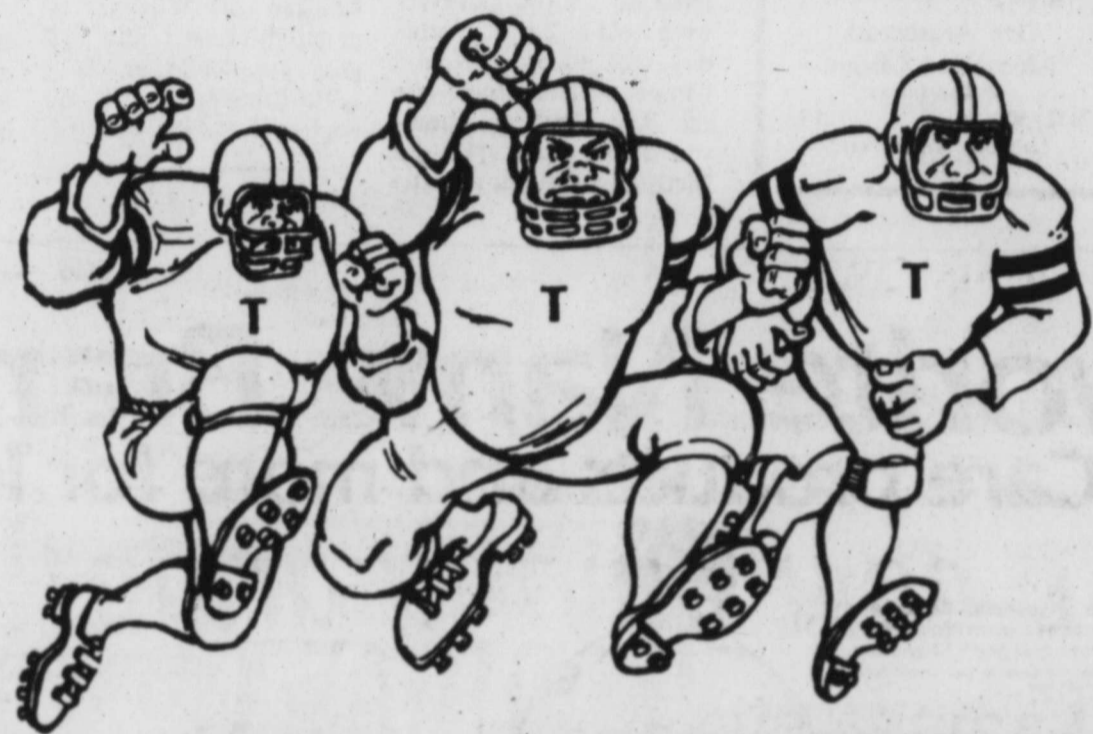

## INSIGHT INTO EYESIGHT

David Gibson, O.D.

This is the "black wall" of the eye that transmits the image to the brain.

What kind of image the brain receives depends on how sharp the picture is. If it isn't in focus, it will be blurred. And that means the eye needs corrective glasses. Difficulty in focusing on objects at a distance or up close (like the newspaper) are common. These are some of the problems corrective glasses can solve.

In the interest of better vision from the office of:

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**HOW WE SEE**  
After centuries of wonder about how we are able to see, science has come up with the answers. It also has answers for people who need help in seeing clearly.  
What happens when we see? It all depends on light (even a cat can't see when it's pitch black). Every object exposed to light emits light rays. These rays travel from the object to our eyes. They enter through the cornea, the transparent membrane in the center of the eye. The cornea bends the rays slightly inward on the way to the lens, which narrows them even more.  
In normal eyes, the rays converge together in sharp focus when they reach the retina.

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

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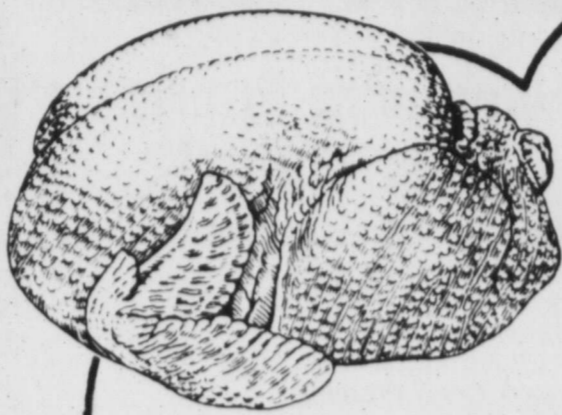

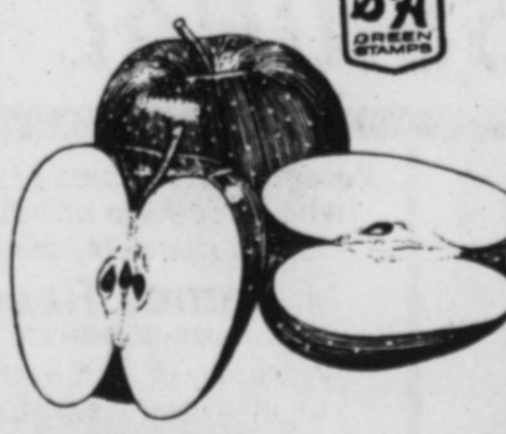
