# **More Burglaries Head List Of New Crimes**

Cases of vandalism, theft and another rape in the county were also being investigated by busy law enforcement officers.

Four of the barn burglaries occurred Friday night. They were reported.

Elmer Owens of Tahoka, a building about five miles southeast of Tahoka. Items stolen included a Sears air compressor, tools, cutting torch and hose, cases of oil and Prestone and a Hitachi radio. Value was estimated at \$2,500 or more.

Edgar M. Hammonds Jr., Rt. 5, a building seven miles southeast of Tahoka. Items stolen included a chain saw, tools, total value \$805. Matt Farmer, 1.5 miles northeast

of O'Donnell. Missing are a welder, tools and a case of oil.

Howard and Larry Moore, a building three miles northeast of Wells community; missing items included a cutting torch assembly, and there was damage to six tractor tires.

Orville Maeker, a farm shop six miles northwest of Wilson. Among stolen articles were a tool chest and tools.

Lynn County voters Tuesday voted heavily for Democratic candidates in state races, going along with the rest of Texas in giving the Democrats 'easy victories in most contests.

With the Democratic winners listed first, the county vote totals were as follows in contested races: U.S. Senator--Bentsen 1378, Collins 632.

U.S. Rep .-- Stenholm 1564, Cooley 10.

Governor--Mark White 1147, Bill Clements 900.

Lt. Gov .-- Hobby 1308, Strake 683. Atty. Gen .-- Maddox 1420, Meier

537. Comptroller--Bullock 1311,

Richards 652. Treasurer--Richards 1351, Clark

607 Land Commissioner--Mauro 1407,

Glasscock 446. Ag. Commissioner--Hightower 1406, Thornberry 560.

Lubbock attorney John Montford, who defeated Jim Reese for the 28th Dist. State Senate seat now held by E.L. Short of Tahoka, carried Lynn County by 1432 to 566.

In the race for State Rep. of the 78th District, which includes Lynn County, Steve Carriker of Roby, a Democrat, won, and in Lynn he also won, by 1509 to only 351 for C.A. Jenkins.

Lynn County voted for all the proposed amendments except No. 6. The county's vote for Amendment 3, which would exempt all farm personal property from taxes, passed in Lynn County by 952 to 771. This was closer than the statewide vote, which gave the proposition a 2-1 margin.

The total turnout of 2083 votes in Lynn County was considered "pretty good" by county election officials. This would be about half of Lynn's registered voters and would be almost equal to the 2243 votes cast in the first Democratic primary in the county, when many contested local races were on the ballot.



### \$300 Reward For...

Information leading to clearing up any of five burglaries of barns and farm shops in Lynn County last week. Friday night burglaries were reported at shops owned by Elmer Owens, five miles southeast of Tahoka; Edgar Hammonds Jr., seven miles southeast of Tahoka; Matt Farmer, northeast of O'Donnell; Howard Moore, three miles northeast of Wells community. The fifth burglary was at a shop owned by Orville Maeker, six miles northwest of Wilson.



Several merchants and individuals have complained recently of pushy salespersons intruding on homes and businesses and there also have been complaints of products being misrepresented or not being delivered. Councilmen said they hope the new ordinance will provide more protection for the citizens from both the annoyance types and the outright frauds, while still leaving the legitimate and conscientious sales representatives room to operate.







HOW WE SEE After centuries of wonder about how we are able to see, science has come up with the answers. It also has answers for people who need help in seeing clearly.

What happens when we see? It all depends on light (even a cat can't see when it's pitch black). Every object exposed to light emits light rays. These rays travel from the object to our eyes. They enter through the cornea, the transparent membrane in the center of the eye. The cornea bends the rays slightly inward on the way to the lens, which narrows them even more.

In normal eyes, the rays converge together in sharp focus when they reach the retina.



This is the "black wall" of the eye that transmits the image to the brain





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
