Bulldog Fever Still Grips 36-Year Chain Carrier

"Bulldog Fever" never wavers with local resident Bill Chancy and he proves it every football season by faithfully toting a chain up and down a football field to aid the officials. Chancy just wound up his 36th year as a chain carrier and as of yet sees no retirement ahead. Remarkably, in these 36 years, Chancy has missed only one game and when questioned he explained that he had made a trip to Dallas and "just couldn't get back." That particular game was played on Oct. 6, 1961 against Petersburg here ... and Tahoka lost.

Chancy acquired this job during his junior year in high school here when he was ineligible to play football. He wanted badly to go to all the games, but had no transportation to the out of town games when the coach asked him if he would like to carry the chain. Chancy could ride the bus with the boys legally and see the game by taking on this job, so he felt privileged to have the opportunity.

One particular game that stands out in his mind is the game against Denver City in 1971. Denver City was favored to win by a large margin and the Bulldogs defeated them that night with a score of 10-0.


A true football fan, Chancy has kept all the programs and clippings from the games from 1947 with the exception of the game against Post in that same year. It has always seemed odd to him that at most of the larger schools there is no one to carry the chain, but the smaller schools are fairly consistent with someone to handle that responsibility.

That's the kind of enthusiasm one can normally expect from Chancy, for whom "Bulldog Fever" has never abated over the vears.



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
