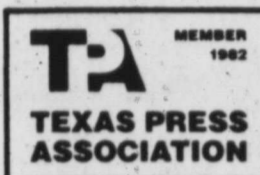

### Tahoka Police Investigate Three Wrecks

Tahoka police investigated three accidents over the past week and also investigated thefts of Christmas trees in the city.

On Sunday, Nov. 23, police investigated a two car accident at the intersection of Lockwood and east access road that involved a 1976 Chevrolet pickup driven by Bert Lambert of Albuquerque, N.M. and a 1973 Cadillac driven by Virgil Crawford of Brownfield. There were no injuries.

On Friday, Nov. 26, Patricia Calvillo of Tahoka, in a 1982 Oldsmobile, was involved in an accident with Mabel Lee Gurley of Tahoka, driver of a 1980 Chevrolet, at the intersection of South First and Ave. M. No injuries were reported.

On Monday, a two car accident involved a 1974 Ford station wagon driven by Maria Torres DeLeon of Tahoka and a 1978 Pontiac driven by JoAnn Truitt of O'Donnell at the intersection of N. 7th and Main. There were no injuries.

Thriftway reported to police that at least six Christmas trees valued at \$19.95 each had been stolen on Saturday night. Also, Ben Blair of 1901 N. 7th reported that someone had stolen two Christmas trees from his front porch at sometime on Sunday.

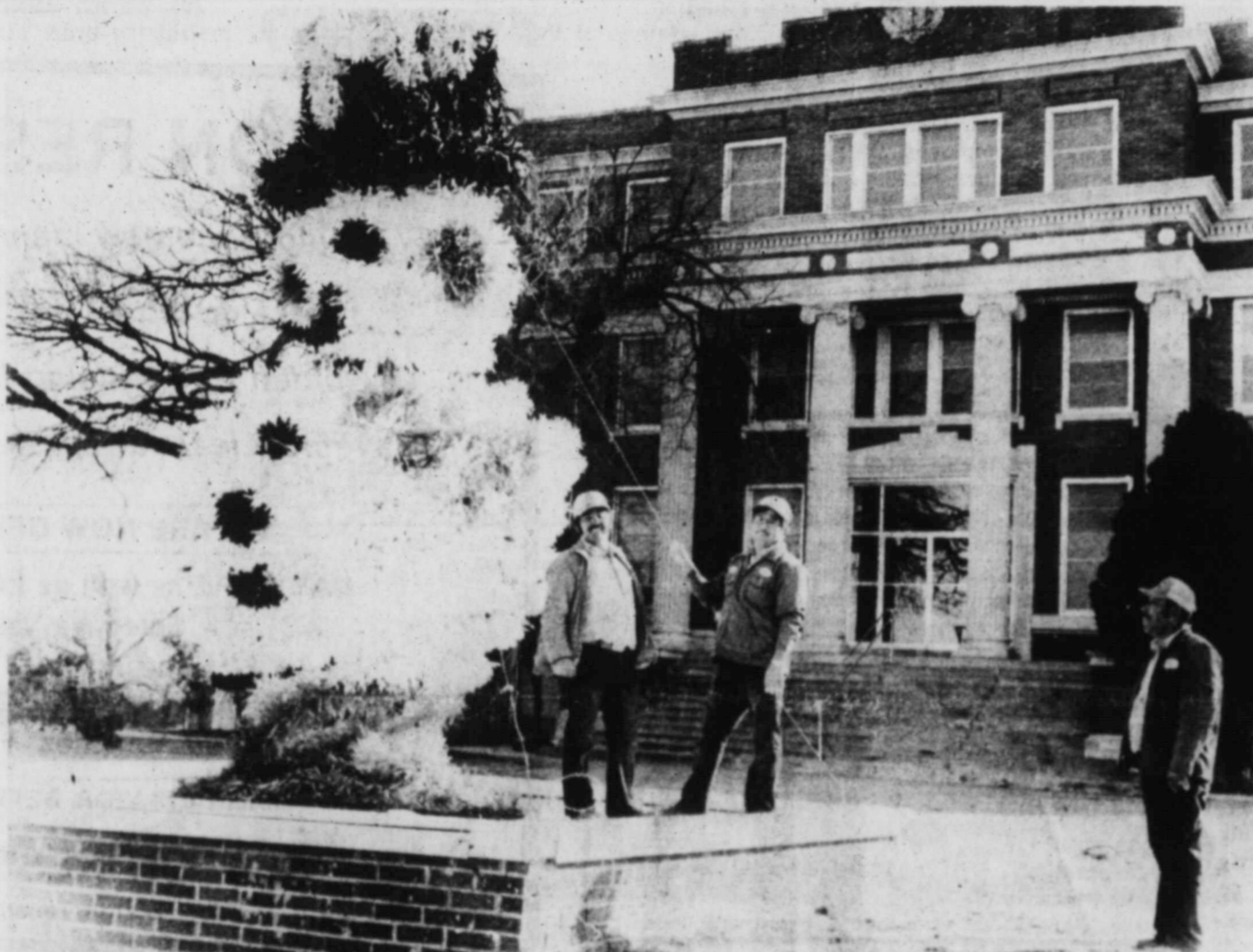

Adams has been breeding Angus cattle since 1959. Today he runs a herd of some 200 registered Angus cows in addition to operating a 2,000-acre cotton farming operation. Adams has been active in both Angus and other livestock association activities. He has served on the board of the American Angus Assn. for six years, serving as chairman of the finance committee and treasurer for four years, chairman of the executive committee, chairman of the board of directors of The Angus Journal, a subsidiary owned by the association, and president of the National Junior Angus Foundation.

He is past president, vice president and treasurer and director of the Texas Angus Assn. He is a director of the National Cattlemen's Assn. and a member of the Southwest Cattle Raisers Assn.

A popular public speaker at various Angus functions across the United States, Adams has been the guest speaker at many state association meetings including, Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Kansas, Georgia, Illinois, New Mexico, Kentucky and Wisconsin.

The association will begin its Centennial year with the National Angus Show during the National Western in Denver, Colo. on Jan. 13, 1983. Adams will represent the association at all Angus functions across the nation during this centennial celebration.

# Bulldog Fever Still Grips 36-Year Chain Carrier

 "Bulldog Fever" never wavers with local resident Bill Chancy and he proves it every football season by faithfully toting a chain up and down a football field to aid the officials. Chancy just wound up his 36th year as a chain carrier and as of yet sees no retirement ahead. Remarkably, in these 36 years, Chancy has missed only one game and when questioned he explained that he had made a trip to Dallas and "just couldn't get back." That particular game was played on Oct. 6, 1961 against Petersburg here... and Tahoka lost.

Chancy acquired this job during his junior year in high school here when he was ineligible to play football. He wanted badly to go to all the games, but had no transportation to the out of town games when the coach asked him if he would like to carry the chain. Chancy could ride the bus with the boys legally and see the game by taking on this job, so he felt privileged to have the opportunity.

**Supports Officials**  
 According to Chancy, "Officials don't make near as many mistakes as the fans think they do." From his position on the sideline, he remarked that the officials do

occasionally make a "bad call", but that most of the time they are accurate and fair in their decisions. Chancy recalls never having argued a call with an official.

The best season Chancy has seen was played in 1978 when the Bulldogs reached the state quarter finals. He is also honored

to have been allowed to carry the chain the the games after the regular season. He almost missed the quarterfinal game against Childress because at first it was decided that only officials would be allowed to carry the chain and the down box, but a few days before the game, he was called saying that

he could carry one end of the chain and a man from Childress would carry the other end.

When the game was about to begin, an official took him and the other man aside to explain the rules and then he placed another official on the down box.

The official looked at Chancy and asked him if he would handle the down box because he had no idea how to do that. Needless to say, Chancy was not too impressed.

One particular game that stands out in his mind is the game against Denver City in 1971. Denver City was favored to win by a large margin and the Bulldogs defeated them that night with a score of 10-0.

A true football fan, Chancy has kept all the programs and clippings from the games from 1947 with the exception of the game against Post in that same year. It has always seemed odd to him that at most of the larger schools there is no one to carry the chain, but the smaller schools are fairly consistent with someone to handle that responsibility.

When asked if his picture could be taken with the chain at the football field he remarked, "Just give me time to go get my Bulldog cap."

That's the kind of enthusiasm one can normally expect from Chancy, for whom "Bulldog Fever" has never abated over the years.

## A Visit With Your County Agent

By Stanley Young

Over the next few weeks, thousands of Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by their field staff. Information obtained provides the basis for determining the final acreage, yield, and livestock and poultry numbers in Texas.

Accurate estimates also are essential to farm organizations and legislators in promotion, planning and enacting wise legislation. The information is also used by Extension economists and management consultants to advise producers, and by exporters in planning and promoting sales of Texas agricultural products.

Since the basic information for estimating in the reports must come from farmers and ranchers you are really helping yourself.

up-to-date information they can get to wisely plan their production and marketing operations.

Accurate estimates also are essential to farm organizations and legislators in promotion, planning and enacting wise legislation.

The information is also used by Extension economists and management consultants to advise producers, and by exporters in planning and promoting sales of Texas agricultural products.

Since the basic information for estimating in the reports must come from farmers and ranchers you are really helping yourself.

Collection and publication of agricultural statistics is a cooperative effort between the Texas and U.S. Departments of Agriculture. This Cooperation avoids duplication of effort, saves money and increases the effectiveness of statistical reports.

Individual farm and ranch information is kept strictly confidential, and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate, notes Young.

Annual county estimates are published for livestock, dairy, poultry, cotton, field crops, small grains, fruits and pecans, vegetables and cash receipts from the sale of farm products.

Much of this crop is being hauled in trailers with only a small portion going into modules. This time last year, we had wall-to-wall modules, Bennett recalled.

Supplies of cotton on hand have been ample to meet merchants' light to moderate demand. Growers sold 1981-Loan equities at \$5 to \$25. New-crop lots of mostly grades 42 and better, staples 30 -32, mike 35 - 49 brought 25 points below loan to 100 over. Gins paid growers \$65 to \$90 per ton for cottonseed.

Lubbock's Marketing Services office classed 65,000 samples during the week ended Nov. 25. This brought the season's total to 210,000 and compares with 293,000 classed by the same date last year.

Predominant grades were grade 42 at 47 percent, grade 32 was 27 percent and grade 52 accounted for 10 percent. About eight percent was reduced one grade because of bark and five percent for grass.

Predominant staples were staple 30 at 37 percent, staple 31 amounted to 37 percent and staple 32 was 12 percent for an

average of 30.7 thirty-seconds of an inch. Mike 35 - 49 was 85 percent, mike 33 - 34 accounted for seven percent, mike 30 - 32 amounted to six percent and mike 27 -29 was two percent for an average of 39.

The week's breaking strength averaged 24.6 grams per tex.

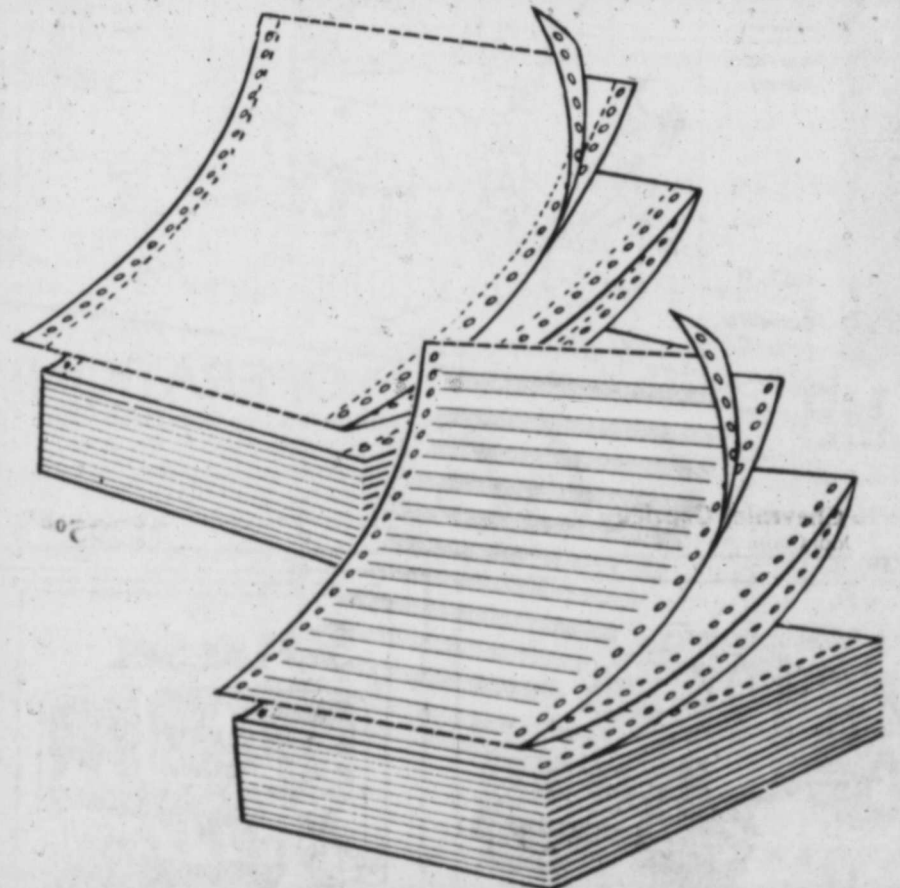
