Parents and others may visit classes anytime during the entire week.

British Isles Trip Offers Fun, Learning

A Texan traveling on an intercontinental flight got into a poker game with three Englishmen. On the first hand, one of the Britons pushed out some chips and announced, "I will wager 10 pounds on this one."

Plans are moving right along for the May 28-June 12 trip to the British Isles sponsored by the Lynn County News, with several already signed up and others expected to do so this week.

Those who travel with the group will have the advantage of going with others of their same background, as all are from the West Texas area. The 16-day trip, priced at \$1775 per person out of Lubbock, offers an unusual opportunity for those taking part to enjoy scenery and viewing historical spots, shop if desired, for specialties of the areas of England, Scotland, Ireland and Wales that will be visited, and increase one's knowledge of history.

The group will leave Lubbock early in the afternoon Saturday, May 28, fly to Dallas on Delta, then board British Caledonian Air Lines jet for a non-stop flight to London.

The tour price includes all air, bus and ferry transportation, transfers from airport, all accommodations in superior tourist class and first class hotels, with private bath or shower, twin beds and two persons to a room. Single room supplements are

\$180 per person, if desired. Also included are continental breakfast in London and full English breakfast elsewhere, and nine dinners, all taxes and gratuities to hotel staffs, porters and local guides, and handling of one piece of luggage per person.

Persons interested in a brochure or in more details of the trip are urged to call Dalton Wood, 998-4888 days or 998-5369 evenings. Or they may write to him at Box 1170, Tahoka, TX, 79373. Or they may send a deposit of \$100 per person to that address to assure a spot on the trip.

Participants will see the mysterious Stonehenge, King Henry VIII's Hampton Court palace and magnificent gardens. Cross the Irish sea on a ferry to Waterford, where you'll visit the showroom of that city's famous crystal glass factory. See the Blarney Stone, Killarney, Limerick, and places where St. Patrick preached. See places made famous by Wordsworth, Shakespeare, John Knox, Sir Walter Scott, Robin Hood, Lady Godiva and Churchill.

Anyone considering the trip who does not already have a passport is urged to go ahead and make application for one, since it takes a month or longer to process. Passport application forms are available at the Lynn County News, which also will take pictures for passports — free to those planning to go on the trip.

Signed up so far are persons from Tahoka, Wilson, the O'Donnell area, Lamesa, Lubbock and Pasadena, Tx.

MOST OF US recently read about the farm housewife who came up with the "recipe book" telling farmers how they can eat their cotton when the government starts giving it back to them, instead of money. A fellow we know who is supposed to be a farmer brought into the office the other day a story written by Bill Stokes of the Chicago Tribune related to the farm economic situation. I was impressed, because I had no idea that anyone in Chicago knew there were farms.

Anyway, Stokes took it on himself to answer "some of the most frequently asked farm-related questions." Here are a few of them:

Q. Do the farmers really want their old grain back?

A. Farm people are sensitive and sentimental, and many of them have developed a genuine attachment to some of their old grain. Tearful reunions are expected across the Midwest this summer as some of the old grain comes back home.

Q. If the farmers are not going to grow grain this summer, what will they do?

A. Some of them will go fishing, and many more of them will probably go bankrupt.

Q. Is the grain being given back to the farmers the same grain that was intended for the Russians before the embargo went into effect?

A. No. That grain was given to Lee Iacocca.

Q. I saw on TV recently where some farmers at a foreclosure sale out West were being tear-gassed by sheriff's deputies. What was that all about?

A. That was a secret federal program to delouse farmers. The farmers may not have been lousy, but somebody in the federal government thought they were. The foreclosure sale was simply a

front, like a "sting," only in this case it was more like a rash.

Q. What was behind the recent cheese giveaway?

A. A government study showed that going without food causes hunger. The free cheese was aimed at alleviating this condition.

Q. Will there be a further cheese giveaway?

A. Not likely because at a recent press conference President Regan said there was no sound reason for anyone going hungry, and to support his claim he pointed to 37 pages of food ads in a recent issue of the Washington Post.

Q. What is parity?

A. Nobody knows.

Q. Why are tobacco farmers considered along with food-producing farmers for government assistance?

A. Some people eat tobacco. They obviously don't like it because they are forever spitting, but they keep eating it anyway. Nobody knows why. Tobacco farmers also help keep doctors and morticians off the unemployment rolls, according to the surgeon general's report.

Q. Is it true that a Wisconsin cow recently sold for more than \$1 million?

A. Yes. But remember that Frank Sinatra got almost a quarter of a million for a one-night stand at Chicago-Fest, and he doesn't even give milk. All things are relative.

Q. Speaking of relatives, why aren't we hearing more stories about farmers' daughters and traveling salesmen?

A. Because many of the daughters and the salesmen are living together in high-rises in the big cities, and nobody pays any attention to them.

A 27-year-old O'Donnell man was charged with assault with a deadly weapon this week after a shooting incident in downtown O'Donnell about 7 p.m. Sunday.

Bond of \$1,500 was set by Justice of the Peace Ed Hamilton of Tahoka for Freddie Salazar, who was arrested Tuesday. He is accused of shooting Joe Castro Jr., 20, also of O'Donnell, in the hand with a .38 caliber pistol. Castro was treated and released at Lynn County Hospital.

In jail during the week were two persons for public intoxication and one each on charges of disorderly conduct, forgery by passing, no drivers license and driving while intoxicated, aggravated assault and reckless conduct.

Police answered a call on Saturday at 12:35 a.m. to go to the 1800 block of Main St. Police arrived to find a large group of teenagers involved in a fight. Charges were recommended on two youths for disorderly conduct, but had not been filed at press time.

On Feb. 4th, police received a call from Lynn Co. Hospital to investigate a man who gave a fictitious name and address and had called the hospital and told them that he was "stoned" and he had a physical problem which needed attention. The hospital advised him to report

The couple plan to be married March 12 at the First Baptist Church in Stratford.

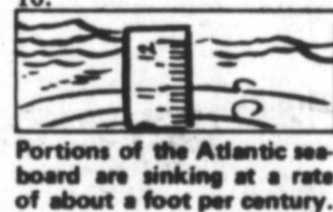

Lynn Kidney Patients Hit Budget Plan

Lynn County patients being treated for irreversible kidney failure at South Plains Dialysis Center in Lubbock this week expressed concern that a recently proposed cut for such treatments would hurt them economically and physically.

According to the center, the state legislative Budget Board has proposed a 50 per cent reduction in funds to the Kidney Health Care Program of Texas, which is administered by the State Dept. of Health.

A spokesman for the four Lynn County patients and one from Lamesa said the Kidney Health Care program "has been vitally important to us in meeting our expenses not covered by the Federal End Stage Kidney Disease Program. Kidney failure results from a chronic disease process usually taking several years, and most of us have exhausted our

financial resources by the time we are ill enough to require dialysis treatments to stay alive."

The group asks that interested persons contact Reps. Jim Rudd of Brownfield, Foster Whaley or Nolan (Buzz) Robnett. All are members of the House Appropriations Committee.

Cotton Harvest Heads For Finish

High Plains farmers returned to finish the long delayed cotton harvest. Extended dry weather with spring-like temperatures dried fields enough to support equipment, reported Mack Bennett, Area Director for USDA's Marketing Services Office at Lubbock. Some cotton stored in modules had been harvested before Christmas and was finally ginned this week. About 95 percent of this season's estimated total has been ginned, Bennett continued.

Lubbock's Marketing Services Office classed 10,800 samples during the week ended Feb. 17. This brought the season's total to 667,800 and compares with 2,283,000 classed by the same date last year. (This season's total consists of 178,800 HVI and 489,000 manual).

Predominant grades were grade 52 at 38 percent, grade 42 accounted for 24 percent and grade 53 amounted to 15 percent. About 56 percent was reduced one grade because of bark and five percent for grass.

Predominant staples were staple 30 at 22 percent, staple 31 amounted to 38 percent and staple 32 was 17 percent for an average of 31.3 thirty-seconds of an inch.

Mike 35-49 was 65 percent, 33-34 accounted for nine percent, 30-32 was 11 percent, 27-29 amounted to eight percent while 26 or below was seven percent for an average of 36.

High Plains growers sold mixed lots of mostly grade 42 and better, staples 30-32, mike 35-49 at about 150 to 300 points over '82 loan rates. Several thousand PIK bales were contracted at 45 cents per pound, basis grade 42, staple 32, mike 35-49 with 1983 CCC loan premiums and discounts.

Gins paid growers \$65 to \$85 per ton for cottonseed - mostly \$75.

USDA's Crop Reporting Board estimated on Feb. 17 that U.S. upland cotton growers will plant 9.2 million acres next spring - 4.8 million in Texas.
