

Budgets of Schools In County Compared

Texans increased spending on local public schools by \$900 million last year, as trustees in 1,071 school districts adopted school budgets totaling \$8.5 billion. That provided more than \$300 in additional funds for each of the 2,678,000 students in the state, according to the Texas Research League.

State foundation school aid was upped by \$345 million, but local property taxpayers were tagged for an additional \$425 million to pay for the increase. The remainder was funded by increases in special state and federal aid programs and by higher local fees and other revenue.

The figures come from the latest issue of Bench Marks for 1983-84 School District Budgets in Texas, an annual publication of the League.

The Texas Research League is a private, nonprofit, Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

School budgets adopted for 1982-83 called for spending \$2,610.23 per student for current operations. Tahoka ISD's budget provided for \$2454.63 per student based on the 774 students in average daily attendance in 1981-82.

O'Donnell ISD's budget provided for \$3182.23 per student based on the 481 students ADA; Wilson ISD's budget was \$305041 per student based on 266 students ADA and New Home ISD's budget was \$3632.13 per student based on 224 students ADA.

Locally, the Tahoka ISD's tax levy was increased by -3.6 per cent for

1982-83 as compared to a 14.8 percent increase for the average school district in Texas.

O'Donnell's tax levy was increased by 1.4 percent; Wilson ISD by 6.7 per cent and New Home ISD -.9 percent.

The average salary for classroom teachers paid by Tahoka ISD in 1981-82 was \$15823 which was 10.3 percent above the minimum salary prescribed by the state. The average among all school districts in Texas was \$17,537 per classroom teacher, or 20.6 percent over the minimum. The legislature further increased the state minimum schedule by \$88-\$196 a month for 1982-83.

Average salary for class room teachers paid by O'Donnell ISD was \$17163 which was 18.7 percent

above the minimum; Wilson ISD paid \$13962 which was 5.2 above the minimum and New Home paid \$14497 which was 4.7 above the minimum.

There was an average of one teacher for 14.3 students in Tahoka ISD compared to a statewide pupil-teacher ratio of 1 to 16.4. The pupil-teacher ratio is not the same thing as the average class size because teachers and students are not necessarily in class the same number of hours each day.

An average of one teacher for 14.4 students in O'Donnell; Wilson 13.2 and New Home 11.2.

The report noted that the share of the total school payroll paid to classroom teachers has dropped from 73.4 percent of the total in 1969

-70 to 60.4 cents of each payroll dollar last year as many more nonteaching personnel have been hired. Locally, classroom teachers were paid 64.7 percent of the school payroll in 1981-82.

Classroom teachers were paid 54.3 percent of the payroll in O'Donnell; 53.4 percent in Wilson and 59.4 percent in New Home.

The average school property tax rate in 1981-82 was \$0.531 per \$100 of market value (selling price) so that the school tax on a property selling for \$100,000 was \$531 in the average school district. Locally, the rate on market value in Tahoka ISD was \$.594 or \$.594 on a property selling for \$100,000.

The rate on market value in

O'Donnell ISD was \$.525 or \$.525; Wilson was \$.510 or \$.510; and New Home was \$.571 or \$.571.

If the property were a homestead or owned by a senior citizen, the school tax would be less because of various exemptions. Open-space land if qualifying would be valued on productivity value rather than market value and would be taxed less.

The report noted the 68th Legislature increased appropriations for public schools by almost a billion dollars (\$962 million) for the next biennium. However, only an additional \$192 million increase (5.4 percent) in foundation aid to local school districts will be available for 1983-84 school budgets that school trustees are now working on.

Test Exemption Policy Modified

Changes in student policies regarding test exemptions and penalties for students involved in alcohol or drug use in school-related activities took up most of the time in Tuesday night's meeting of Tahoka school board.

The student policy handbook, a copy of which is given to all high school students, was finally approved as presented by High School Principal Tom Cooper, with a few changes. The new handbook has some new language in several places from last year's handbook, as Cooper and Supt. Jim Coulston explained the need for clarifying some points and making some changes in some areas.

One change is in the exemption policy which now will require all students to take at least one semester examination — in the course in which their grade is lowest.

Total Exemptions

Cooper explained that some high-ranking students had graduated without ever having taken a semester test in high school. "They have to take exams in college and some have never had to do it before," he commented. Board members agreed that even the straight A students "need to know how to take a test."

Policies regarding suspension of a student for use of alcoholic beverages or drugs in connection with school-related activities are spelled out in greater detail in the new handbook, mostly as a result of

an incident last year involving a student with a high academic rating which was lowered considerably by the penalties, which include mandatory zeroes in classes missed during suspension. Three members of the board felt this part of the penalty, which also prohibits participation in extracurricular activities, discriminates against the brighter students. A motion to lessen the penalty for first-time offenders by giving them a chance to make up the zeroes was defeated by a 4-3 vote of the board.

Favor Strong Policy

Those who voted against the motion said they felt the penalties, admittedly harsh, should remain as strong as possible, to help keep drugs and alcohol out of the schools. Suspension is mandatory when a stu-

dent is involved in these controlled substances.

One change the group did vote, by a 5-2 margin, was to allow agriculture students with only a C average to take part in at least two major stock shows in addition to the local and county shows.

Coulston reported tax collections 93.5 per cent complete and a balance in all funds of \$361,261 as of July 31, compared to a figure of \$230,354 at the same time last year.

Discussed at length was the tax status of banks and how they have rendered items for taxation in the current year.

A list of 18 substitute teachers and one migrant teacher was approved for the coming school year. Also approved were new lunchroom prices, milk and bread bids by Borden and Rainbo, and setting aside 8 cents of the tax rate of 86 cents per \$100 valuation for retiring bonded indebtedness.

School bus insurance bid by the Clint Walker Agency was accepted.

Crime Line Tip Brings Arrests

A Lynn County Crime Line call was credited with leading to the arrest of two persons charged with burglary in the July 26 break-in at the Gary Stennett home southeast of Tahoka, at which items valued at \$6438 were stolen.

Lynn County Sheriff Stanley

Krause said a \$300 reward would be paid in the case. Sheriff's officers and Lubbock Police Dept. detectives arrested two Lubbock men. Brought to Lynn County jail and held in lieu of \$25,000 bond was Roy Garza, 23. On Wednesday morning Mauricio Flores, 41, was arrested in Lubbock.

One firearm, a .22 Rossi rifle, was recovered and some of the other items stolen from the Stennett home were expected to be recovered.

Officers also were checking this week on stolen items found in a large barn at the farm of a prominent Deaf Smith County man when area officers discovered a large hoard of stolen goods this week. Things stolen in 13 area counties, including Lynn, were believed to be included.

One person was in jail during the week for public intoxication.

Tahoka Police Dept. issued several tickets during the week. These included two for minor in possession of alcoholic beverage and others for exhibition of acceleration, reckless driving and fleeing in an attempt to elude police officers, littering by

Early Dismissal Set; Meal Prices Listed

School will begin for Tahoka students at 8 a.m. and dismiss at 2:30 p.m. Friday, Supt. Jim Coulston said this week.

The school cafeteria will begin serving a breakfast and lunch each school day beginning Friday. Cost of meals in the cafeteria will be as follows:

Breakfast prices range from 30 cents for those qualifying for reduced prices to \$1 for non-school adults. Lunch prices are 40 cents reduced, \$1 for regular student rate, \$1.50 for employees and \$2.50 for non-school adults.

Parents may apply for the free and reduced breakfast and lunches in the school cafeteria today (Thursday) from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. This year it is a requirement for all persons applying for the free and reduced lunch program to bring their W2s or the 1040 Income Tax Form to verify their income.

The application form for 1983-84 must provide the total income of all household members. The application form and a complete income scale will be available upon request for application.

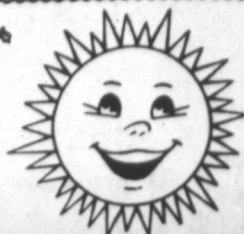

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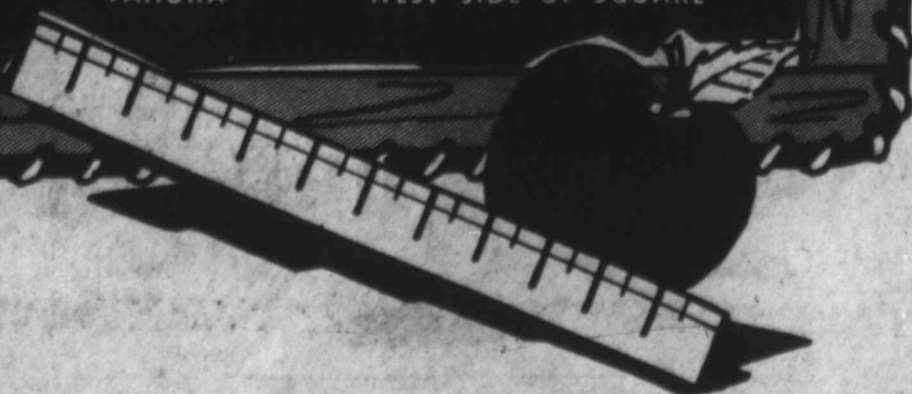

GIVE BIKE PRESCHOOL SAFETY CHECK

School days are just around the corner, and getting ready for school should include giving your bicycle a safety check.

In the 4-H bicycle program conducted by the Texas Agricultural Ex-

tension Service, youngsters learn all about bicycle safety, says Greg Henley, county Extension 4-H program coordinator.

Here are some things 4-H'ers include in a bicycle safety check.

1. Stand beside the bike and hold the handlebars as you do when riding. If you can turn the handlebars up and down, they need adjustment.

2. Lift the weight from the front end to see if the cones in the front end of

the frame are in proper adjustment.

3. Hold the front wheel with one hand and the handlebar with the other. See if you can twist the handlebar post out of position. If you can, have it adjusted.

4. Steady the bike with one hand. With the other, grasp the tire or rim near the front fork. Do the wheelhub bearings feel quite loose, or is the front wheel held securely?

5. Test the rear wheel

the same way.

6. The chain should have about half-inch movement up and down. If it's too tight, the bike will run hard and tire you. If it's too loose, it will wear rapidly on the sprockets. Have it adjusted to the correct tension.

7. Is the seat held firmly in place? You will tire less if you keep the ball of your foot on the pedal, rather than the instep. Try the seat for height. Your leg should be nearly straight when the pedal is in its lowest position.

8. Turn the bike over and let it rest on the handlebars. Hold the frame with one hand and the pedal crank near the end with the other. Is there much looseness in your crank assembly?

9. While the bike is upside down, turn the wheels to check them for wobble. Check the tires for wear and cuts. If they are damaged, replace them. Also, try the coaster brake to see how it works.

10. Are the wheels in good alignment? Are the rims straight and do they run in the center between the forks? If any spokes are broken, replace them to help keep the rims straight. The wheels can be centered in the fork by

a simple adjustment.

11. Are the pedals in good condition? If they are bent and weathered badly, it's usually easier to replace them than to repair them.

12. Check the air pressure in the tires. It should be at the manufacturer's suggested pressure. On a rough road, lower pressure (about 22 pounds on a balloon tire) will make the going smoother. On a hard road, high pressure makes the going easier.

A bicycle rider should practice safety at all times, emphasizes Henley. The rider must obey all rules of the road. Give pedestrians the right of way, stop at stop signs and go slowly in heavy traffic. Stay on the right side of the road, and use arm signals.

Also, cross the street only at intersection. Get off and push the bike through intersections after checking both directions to see if the way is clear.

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

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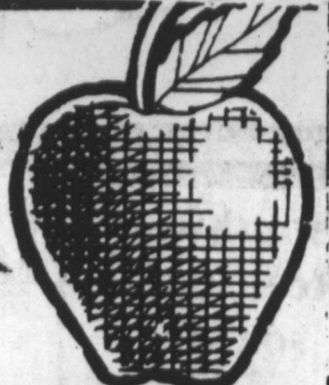
