## Dogs Open '83 Season

The 1983 Tahoka Bulldogs football team will open its season at home Friday night, hosting the always-tough Stanton Buffaloes at 8 p.m. For the Bulldogs and Coach A.D. Shaver, the game is even more important than the usual opener, because the team desperately needs some good things to happen after coming off a winless season in 1982. The Bulldogs were outscored 4 to 1 by state-ranked Littlefield in a scrimmage last Friday, but this is not considered too bad in view of the caliber of the opposition. Some of the players looked very good at times, Shaver said. On the minus side, tackle Gilbert Gonzales broke a leg in the scrimmage with the Wildcats and will be out for several weeks. Stanton returns some of their better players from last year, including halfbacks Robby and Rocky Barnes. For Tahoka, the offense will depend largely on the ability of the line to block for Steve Pierce and keep the opposition away from Quarterback Trey Teaff. Pierce was one of the district's better backs last season and also is a strong linebacker on defense.

## Armed Man Robs Store

A man masked with two bandanas robbed an O'Donnell store of about \$150 cash after threatening the owner with a knife just before 11 a.m. last Thursday. Floyd Thompson, owner of Thompson's Toggery, said the man came into the store wearing the two

bandanas with only his eyes showing, and wielding a long-bladed knife. Thompson, who was not injured, said there was no one else in the store at the time. The man took money from the cash register and then ordered Thompson into a back room. When the owner came out a

few minutes later, the robber was gone.

Officers have a suspect, but are seeking more information and Crime Line, 998-5145, has put a \$300 reward out for more information.

The residence of Bill Hunt, nine miles north of Tahoka on U.S. 87, was burglarized between Aug. 26-28, but most of the stolen items were recovered in Lamesa later. Two suspects were being sought.

A woman who lives near Wilson reported \$1228 worth of items, mostly cookware and gardening tools, missing.

A call to Lubbock Crime Line resulted in recovery of a Reeves Roofing kettle mounted on a two-wheel trailer. The kettle owned by Brown Roofing Co. of Lamesa was stolen from behind the 1500-block of Ave. J in Tahoka in mid-July. Leo Sanchez Jr., 44, of Lubbock was charged with theft over \$200 and under \$10,000.

Sanchez was in county jail during the week and also in jail were one person each for disorderly conduct and public intoxication.

Whoever has been stealing Genaro Cabrera's pigs from pens just north of Wilson must have decided that keeping them up is expensive, because when they stole pigs from that location last week for the third

time, they also took some pig feed.

Tahoka police officers were dispatched to a Tahoka residence on N. 6th regarding a disturbance on Monday night. Officers arrested a Tahoka man for disorderly conduct and was taken to Lynn County jail.

Police investigated a three-car accident on Sunday at the intersection of Lockwood and Ave. J that involved a 1978 Ford pickup driven by Nicolas Saldana of Tahoka and a 1980 Chevrolet pickup driven by Allen C. Smith of Hobbs, N.M. A parked 1984 Ford pickup owned by Bishop Davis of Tahoka was also damaged. No injuries were reported.

On Saturday, a collision at 1529 Ave. J involved a 1974 Mercury driven by Jesus Rodolfo Duran of San Antonio and a parked 1982 Oldsmobile wagon belonging to Emily Jordan of Tahoka.

Jerri Beth McKibben of Tahoka reported that she lost her billfold on Monday.

Two tickets were issued during the past week including one for turning too wide on a right turn and one ticket for no proof of liability insurance.

### Grand Jury Indicts Nine

Nine persons were named in indictments returned last week by a 106th District Grand Jury, including two men who live southeast of Tahoka on charges of sexual abuse of a child and rape of a child.

Named in that indictment were Fred Pierce and William Whitehead, accused in connection with incidents allegedly involving a girl now 11 years old, over a period of several years.

Three persons indicted in separate incidents on charges of driving while intoxicated, subsequent offense, are Felix Leroy York of Brownfield, Juan Luis DeLeon of Lamesa and Jose Antonio Moya of Tahoka.

Mauricio Florez and Roy Garza, both of Lubbock, were indicted for burglary of a habitation in connection with a burglary of the Gary Stennett home west of Tahoka on July 26.

Juan Vargas of O'Donnell was indicted for forgery by passing, and Harold Crooks of Brownfield was indicted on a charge of theft by check.

Martin Longoria Tamez of Tahoka pleaded guilty of forgery and was sentenced by Judge George Hansard to six years in prison, no probation.

Charges of aggravated rape which had been filed against John Rodriguez, 31, of Tahoka, were dropped after the grand jury did not return an indictment.

We don't know if it really works or not. But the price isn't bad: one Christmas card that plays three songs costs \$3.88. To change songs, just close the card and open it again.

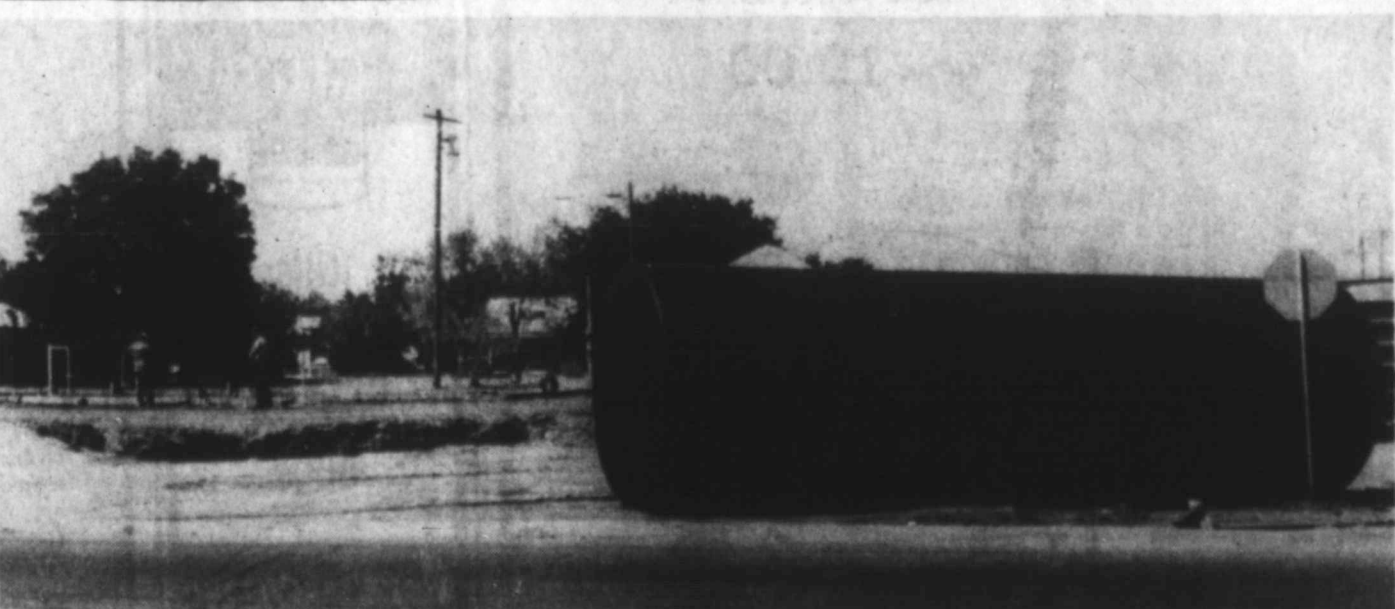

The annual Lynn County farm tour will be held Thursday, Sept. 8, leaving the courthouse in Tahoka at 1:30 p.m.

Result demonstrations showing cotton varieties, grain sorghum production verticillium wilt resistance varieties and nematode resistance varieties will be shown on the tour.

Also, a featured stop on the tour will be surge irrigation which is the latest technique in furrow irrigation.

Soil and water conservation practices will also be viewed and discussed. The latest developments with the farm program will be covered.

Best man was the groom's brother, David Summers, of Tahoka. Groomsman was David Engle, also of Tahoka.

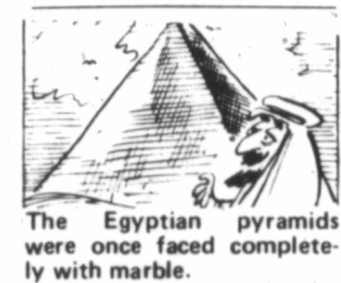
Ushers were Darrel Becker and Stephen Summers of Tahoka, brother of the groom.

## Tahoka Woman Co-Authors New Kind of Cookbook

Tahoka talent has surfaced again in the form of a cookbook titled "Calf Fries to Caviar."

Hot off the press, the Jan-Su publication, printed by Hart Graphics Inc., Austin, is the result of many years of collecting recipes and two years compilation by Mrs. Janel (Punk) Franklin, a resident of Tahoka and Mrs. Sue Vaughn, a Lamesa resident.

Starting out to make a small cookbook for their families, sorting out recipes that were scribbled on the backs of checks, paper napkins, envelopes, etc. the idea snowballed and the two were inspired to design a cookbook suitable for men or women in the beginning or experienced stages of cookery.

The 280-page book has various "true confessions" by the two West Texas cooks in the sub-titles such as the Caramel Nut Pie which supports the sub-title, "Calories, One Zillion or the 'The Better Than Sex Cake' with the sub-title, "Tried and Untrue" and The 11 Flavors of Ice Cream the Jan-Su Way, which invites a person to "Forget the Diet and Pig Out."

In addition to the usual sections on breads, salads main dishes and desserts in many cookbooks the book has sections on Tex-Mex recipes, party food/beverages, breakfast/brunch, soups/sandwiches and potpourri.

**USDA Announces 1984 Wheat Program**

The announcement stated these items:  
 1. \$4.45 per bushel target price.  
 2. \$3.30 per bushel National loan rate.  
 3. No advance deficiency payments.  
 4. Planting cannot exceed 70 per cent of the farm base.  
 5. Conservation Use Acreage must equal to 42.86 per cent of the planted and PIK acreage. CUA must be cropland certified to a small grain or row crop in two of the last three years.  
 6. PIK will be offered for a 10-20 percent additional reduction with payment-in-kind of 75 per cent of the established yield. Wheat for PIK will not come from CCC stocks. Producers in PIK must furnish their own PIK from outstanding loans or 1984 wheat placed in loan. PIK producers that have no loans and harvest no wheat will receive no PIK.

7. No offsetting or cross compliance for 1984.

8. 1984 acreage base will be the average planted and considered planted wheat in 1982 and 1983.

9. CUA can be grazed until April 1, 1984, but cannot be baled or harvested.

10. Signup will be Jan. 16 thru Feb. 24, 1984.

Producers with outstanding 1980, 1981, or 1982 crop upland cotton Form a loans in excess of PIK needs have been mailed a letter informing them of their option to offer a bid. This program extended 1981 crop loans that would have matured July 31, 1983. These loans can be redeemed or bid.

The DPS director called for sober driving, use of seat belts and a reduction in speed.

"We know alcohol contributes to about half of our traffic deaths, so it is obvious that a driver should not drink and drive."
