Accidents Investigated In Tahoka

Two accidents in the city and one on U.S. 87 were investigated by officers during the last week.

On Friday at S. 2nd and Ave. F a collision involved a 1980 Buick driven by Ernestina Castello Zuniga of Tahoka and a 1979 Chevrolet pickup driven by Marty Dale Lindsey, 2101 Lockwood.

There were no injuries listed in that wreck or in an accident Monday afternoon at S. 3rd and Ave. J, where a 1982 GMC pickup driven by Antonio Aleman of Tahoka collided with a stop sign and street sign.

Four miles north of Tahoka on U.S. 87 Tuesday night a collision involved a semi-trailer truck and a commercial street sweeper. Some persons were treated at Lynn County Hospital for injuries and released, but no other details were available at press time.

On Sunday Tahoka Police Dept. officers arrested a 37-year-old man wanted in Stanton for unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. He was taken to Lynn County jail and held for Stanton authorities.

City officers issued one ticket each for failure to control speed and no proof of liability insurance.

An adult and two juveniles, all of Wilson, were arrested Saturday after Mustang Drive Inn at Wilson reported a break-in and loss of three dozen fried pies.

Also in jail during the last week were two persons for public intoxication and one each for felony driving while intoxicated and driving while license suspended, traffic violation and another felony DWI.

City Tax Rate Stays Same

Tahoka City Council Monday night approved an audit report of last year's finances and set this year's tax rate at the same as it now is, after hearing the auditor's opinion that the city's finances appear to be in good shape.

The tax rate is 49 cents per \$100 valuation, with 7 cents of this amount set aside for debt retirement.

The audit report was presented by Joe Hays of the firm of Love, Hays and Schaffner. "Overall, the city is on sounder financial basis than the previous year," Hays said.

City Manager Carl Reynolds told the commissioners and Mayor

Meldon Leslie that he felt the same tax rate would be adequate for the city's operations this year.

Guy Witt appeared to request approval of installation of a diesel above-ground storage tank at Witt Butane in the city limits on U.S. 380 east. After being assured that all legal restrictions on such storage tanks and all requirements of state laws are being met, the council voted to approve the location of the tank.

Purchase of a new GMC pickup from McCord Motor Co. of Tahoka was approved on a bid price of \$7846.

Present were commissioners Richard White, Dalton Wood, Cap Wharton and Tom Cooper. Jim Solomon was absent.

Harvest Festival Schedule Set

Plans are underway for the 8th annual Lynn County Harvest Festival scheduled Oct. 1 to be held in conjunction with the Tahoka High School Homecoming Sept. 30. The big event again this year will be the Dallas Cowboy weekend, plus a gigantic Pet Contest and a Princess Contest (girls in 7th and 8th grade).

Another attraction will be booths to be set up by organizations or individuals. Persons need to contact

the booth chairman to reserve a booth on a first-come-first-serve basis.

A street dance will round out the event starting at 8 p.m. and lasting to 12 p.m. The band for the dance will be announced later.

To be eligible for the Cowboy weekend a person must purchase a ticket from one of the Harvest Festival Queen candidates. The weekend consists of plane tickets for two, accommodations at the Dallas Regent Hotel, transportation to the game, admission and taxes, and tips to the game, date to be set later. You do not have to be present to win.

In addition to the Cowboy weekend, a round trip air fare to Dallas for two will be given away, plus two bicycles, and a "jam box", all to be purchased by the Harvest Festival Committee.

To be eligible for the round trip air fare to Dallas and the two bicycles, tickets must be purchased from a Princess candidate.

The "jam box" will be given away at the 11 a.m. drawing.

The pet show is to begin at 10 a.m. Any pet is eligible and will be judged on appearance, personality, costume and behavior. Prizes will be given in each category. There is no entry fee and rules will be announced next week.

Drawings for the prizes to be given by merchants every hour will start at 11 a.m. Also the "early bird" drawing of the jam box and one bicycle will be at that time.

Drawing for the second bicycle and trip to Dallas will not be announced. The Norwoods will be entertaining throughout the day, plus others to be announced later.

In my estimation she is better off staging a preemptive strike. One day she should announce out

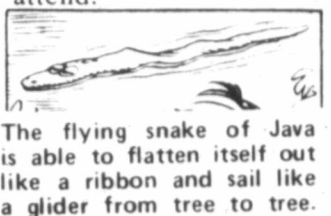

A Visit With Your County Agent

By Stanley Young

The latest research on cotton and grape varieties drought tolerant crops, and weed control will be featured stops for the 74th annual field day of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station for Lubbock and Halfway. The event begins at 1 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 13, at the research site, just north of Lubbock International Airport.

Lynn County producers will find the program particularly applicable, said Stanley Young, County Extension Agent.

Research efforts at the Lubbock and Halfway station focus especially upon needs of producers in Lynn County and throughout the High Plains of Texas, Young said.

The annual field day alternates between the TAES locations at Lub-

bock and Halfway. Field tours will be conducted throughout the afternoon, with tractor-drawn trailers shuttling visitors to key research plots.

The field day is a cooperative presentation of TAES, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the High Plains Research Foundation, United States Department of Agriculture-Agricultural Research Service, and the National Weather Service.

The stops will highlight new techniques and products for weed control, development of new varieties to improve cotton fiber quality, the latest research on grapes, an increasingly important High Plains crop, and development of drought tolerant cotton to better utilize declining water supplies and reduce irri-

gation requirements, Young said.

Other features of the field day will be a display of computers and agricultural programs for computers, a tour of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service Soil Testing Lab and an open house at the Texas Forest Service greenhouse and facility at the Station.

ELM TREES ATTACKED BY BEETLES

Elm leaf beetles are now feeding actively on leaves of elm trees, said Stanley Young, Lynn County Extension agent. This insect is a serious pest of elm trees in West Texas. Feeding from this insect skeletonizes the surface of leaves and premature defoliation of elm trees can occur. This weakens the trees and can be particularly important in dry years like this one.

While timely insecticide applications for this pest should have been made this spring, it's still not too late to help those trees which are being excessively defoliated.

The adult beetles are oval and about 1/4 inch long. They are yellowish to olive-green in coloration with a black stripe

along each side of the wing covers.

The female beetles lay egg which hatch into small worms in a few days. These worms are nearly black in coloration and are covered with short black hairs.

To protect the foliage of elm trees from feeding damage of the elm leaf beetle, trees may be sprayed with Sevin or Orthene. Mix and apply sprays according to manufacturer's directions on the label of the chemical container.

Thorough coverage of the trees with insecticide spray is necessary to obtain satisfactory control of this insect.

To secure additional height and better coverage of the tree, a hose-on sprayer may be tied to a fishing pole or other sturdy object and raised up in the air and sprayed on the tree. Caution should always be exercised when applying insecticides.

Cotton Field Day Set Sept. 13

Area cotton producers looking for a "better mousetrap" that will help them in the marketplace can learn what scientific research is doing to assist them if they attend the 74th annual field day of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES) in Lubbock Tuesday, Sept. 13.

Tours will begin at 1 p.m. and conclude at 5 p.m.

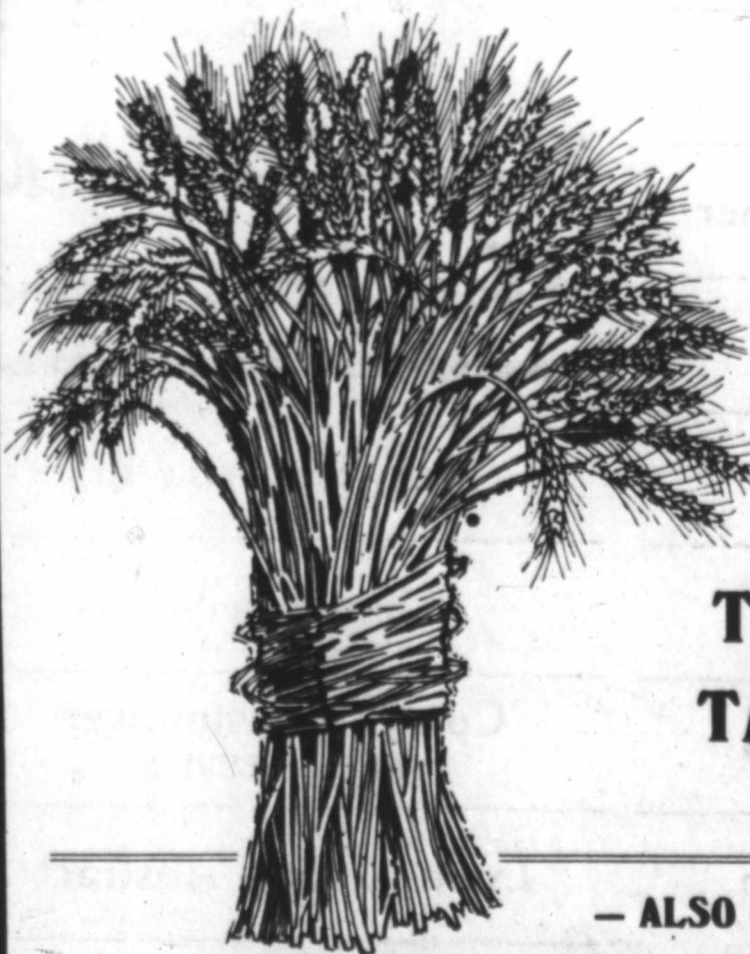

Dogs Drop Opener, Await Tigers

Six turnovers were just more than the young Tahoka Bulldogs could overcome in last Friday's first game of the football season, so the Dogs finally lost to visiting Stanton 13-6, the 12th loss in a row for Tahoka, going back to the last game of 1981.

Tahoka's defense against the run looked pretty good most of the evening, and Stanton's longest gain on a run was 20 yards. Pass defense was another story as Stanton hit 5 of 8 passes, including gains of 34, 50 and 17 yards.

Slaton On Way

This week the Tahoka defense will get a major test as Slaton's Tigers come to town, featuring talented Geryl Lacy at running back. Lacy gained about a half mile rushing last year and is reportedly bigger and just as fast this season. The Tigers, however, are not unbeatable, as Colorado City proved in last week's 14-6 surprise

of the Slaton team.

Tahoka Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a pancake supper at the school cafeteria prior to the game.

Stanton's Robby Barnes intercepted Tahoka QB Trey Teaff's pass and returned it to the Bulldog 27 early in the first quarter Friday and Stanton appeared ready to start doing bad things to the Dogs. The Buffaloes drove to the 11, where, on third and 3, Teaff, Johnny Morin and linebacker Steve Pierce hit the runner for a loss to the 14, and on fourth Tadd Knight and Morin stopped the Stanton ballcarrier at the 10 and Tahoka took over. It was one of several good defensive stands by Tahoka deep in their own end of the field during the game.

Offensively for the Bulldogs, the bright spot in the first period was a 28-yard run by Pierce, who at tailback again went

over 100 yards, as he usually did last season. Pierce rushed 20 times for 124 yards against Stanton.

Passes Hurt

Near the end of the first period, Stanton damaged Tahoka with a 34-yard pass play to the Tahoka 12, and on the first play of the second period, QB Darren Sorley hit wide receiver Derek Sorley for 9 yards and a touchdown. Tackle Bobby Almagar kicked the point, denting the football with his 250 pounds.

After the kickoff, Tahoka fumbled and lost the ball again, but Knight saved the day by recovering a Buffalo fumble at the Tahoka 4. Pierce then ripped off a 22-yard run to get Tahoka out of a hole.

A fumbled punt return by Tahoka put Stanton back in threatening position later in the half, but Tahoka held again, thanks to a penalty and good defensive work, led by Robert Munoz, Habiell

DeLeon and Doug Lawson. It was still 7-0 at halftime.

In the third quarter, Tahoka drove down to the Stanton 8, but lost the ball by inches on a fourth down try. Stanton then put on a long drive, mostly passing, to get down to the 3, and early in the fourth Barnes ran 3 for the TD. Point try was missed and it was 13-0 with 11:15 remaining.

Good Drive

Tahoka came right back with a 73-yard drive, featuring a great 28-yard run by freshman Matthew Scott which took the ball to the Buffalo 12. Two plays later Pierce slashed 6 yards for the Bulldogs' first score of the season, something which wasn't managed until the sixth game last year.

A running try was stopped short, and Tahoka trailed 13-6 with 9:14 left. An onside kick try failed and Stanton took the ball at midfield. Barnes ran 20 yards to the 30, but the Dogs' defense toughened up again, led by DeLeon, Lawson, David Garcia, Morin, Harvey Hallmark and others.

There were 22 penalties accepted in the game, with Stanton drawing 15 of these.

Morin gained 28 yards in five carries from his full-back spot, and also punted very well, averaging over 40 yards. Scott netted 26 yards in three carries.

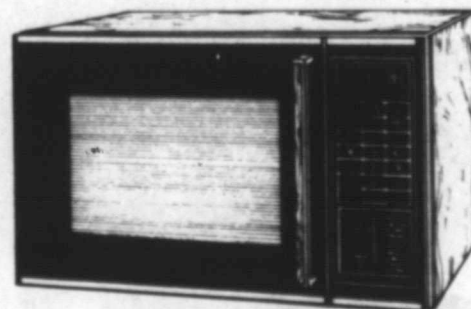

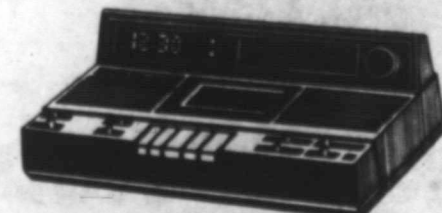
